





# HOME BANK PROBE

Fifteen Thousand Dollars Not Accounted for Declares Liquidator

TORONTO, April 5 .- It was brought out at the meeting of the public accounts committee of the legislature that a check for \$15,-000 as a rebate from the Home Bank to the Ontario treasury department in December, 1919, on a bond transaction, apparently never reached the department, although it was eashed. The original check can not be located by G. T. Clarkson, liquidator of the Home Bank, who gave evidence. All that could be found was a stub on which was marked 'P. Smith, \$15,000." There was also an item in the teller's book of December 18, 1919, indicating that the check had been paid. According to the chief auditor and the chief clerk of the treasury department at the parliament buildings they could find no trace of the check or of a credit to the province at that time for \$15,000, although they have been searching for a week. This check was issued and cashed about a month after Peter Smith took office as provincial treasurer in the Drury government.

# GERMAN EXPERIENCE WITH NEWSPAPERS IN DEBATES OF HOUSE

Poor Speaker Gets Little Mercy From Men Who Help to Frame Destinies of Country

BERLIN, April 2.—Reporters in the German Reichstag get just as tired of dry routine as American newspapermen do the press galleries of Congress, and many amusing incidents arise over the failure of reporters

of the German legislative body. Dr. Otto Arendt, who belonged to the Reichstag for many years, tells in his recently published memoirs of an experience Herr Lingens, a deputy of the Catholie party, had with the German press. Herr Lingens was accustomed to deliver a long speech every year on Sunday observance. He delivered this in connection with the consideration of the budget, ordinarily. But one year he spoke at length on another subject and in such a low voice that the galleries emptied and the reporters took refuge in the cafes of the Reichstag, which are

famous for their excellent beers. Th next day the press announced "Delegate Lingens spoke is his habit on Sunday rest.

PRE-EMPTIONS

Vacant, unreserved, surveyed Crown lands may be pre-empted b British subjects over 18 years of age. and by aliens on declaring intention to become British subjects, condiional upon residence, occupation and improvement for agricultura purposes.

Full information concerning reguations regarding pre-emptions is given in Bulletin No. 1, Land Series. 'How to Pre-empt Land," copies of which can be obtained free of charge by addressing the Department of ands, Victoria, B.C., or to any Govrnment Agent.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes, and which is not timberland, i.e., carrying over 5,000 board feet per acre west of the Coast Range and 8,000 feet per acre east of that

Applications for pre-emptions are to be addressed to the Land Commissioner of the Land Recording Di vision, in which the land applied for is situated, and are made on printed forms, copies of which can be obtained from the Land Commissioner. Pre-emptions must be occupied for five years and improvements made to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivating at least five acres, before a Crown Grant can be

PURCHASE

Applications are received for purchase of vacant and unreserved Crown lands, not being timberland, for agricultural purposes; minimum price of first-class (arable) land is \$5 per acre, and second-class (grazing) land \$2.50 per acre. Further information regarding purchase or lease of Crown lands is given in Bulletin No. 10, Land Series, "Purchase and Lease of Crown Lands."

Mill, factory, or industrial sites on timber land, not exceeding 40 acres, may be purchased or leased, the conditions including payment stumpage.

HOMESITE LEASES

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesites, conditional upon a dwelling being erected in the first year, title being obtainable after residence and improvement conditions are fulfilled and land has been surveyed.

For grazing and industrial purposes areas not exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or a company.

Under the Grazing Act the Province is divided into grazing districts and the range administered under a Grazing Commissioner. Annual grazing permits are issued based on o established owners. Stock-owners may form associations for range nanagement. Free, or partially free, ermits are available for settlers, ampers and travellers, up to ter

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
