THE worst year for forest fires in British Columbia in 10 years should weigh heavily on every thinking person. Many of these fires, say forestry officials, have their start in human negligence.

This means just plain carelessness with instruments of ignition: matches, cigarets, pipes; campfires, friction machines.

It seems a grim reflection on Canadian shrewdness that we should tolerate the human depletion of one of our greatest natural assets through human negligence. Authorities claim that throughout Canada, the nation pays an annual penalty of more than two million acres of devastated countryside and 400,000 acres of forest growth.
