BEER QUESTION IS BEFORE LEGISLATURE

VANCOUVER DISAPPOINTED OVER GRAIN DELIVERIES AT PORT THIS SEASON

Manson Threatens Brewers to Take Extreme Measures Enforcing Regulations Regarding Deliveries

VICTORIA, Dec. 12.—Warning that he was prepared to use any available weapon to make effective the amendments he proposes to the Liquor Act, giving the Government greater control over beer deliveries, was given to the breweries by Hon. A. M. Manson, attorney general, in the Legislature yesterday.

Mr. Manson stated that it was not necessary that the Government purchase beer from the breweries, owners of which contended that the amendments were ultra vires of the province.

The Attorney General said he regretted that his fellow Liberals had not agreed with him in his proposal to take over the breweries.

PENDRAY MAYOR OF VICTORIA

Walter Stanland is Police Commissioner and Shanks Among Aldermen

VICTORIA, Dec. 12.—J. Carl Pendray, head of the British-American Paint Co., was elected mayor of this city to follow Reginald Hayward, who is now a member of the legislature. The aldermen chosen consist of:

P. R. Brown, real estate and financial broker.

J. B. Cleriburn, solicitor and former member of the legislature.

J. A. Shanks, barber.

E. S. Woodward, secretary.

W. H. Gullin, former King's Printer.

M. P. Blair, timberman.

J. L. Mara, real estate broker.

Walter Stanland, paint manufacturer, was elected police commissioner. He was formerly a member of the police board but was defeated last year. He takes the place made vacant by Dr. Ernest Hall.

J. A. Shanks, better known here as Five Point Shanks, has been a candidate for alderman, police commissioner or some other public office every year for many years past but heretofore has never been elected. Last summer he went north to Stewart where he opened a barber shop in the King Edward Hotel and he also worked in Prince Rupert during September.

SLIDE NEAR PACIFIC HOLDS UP TRAFFIC

Passengers, Express and Mail Were Transferred from One Train to Another Yesterday

On Wednesday afternoon a slide of rocks, mud and trees about 100 yards long came down over the Canadian National Railway tracks just east of Pacific. It prevented the train leaving here for the East Wednesday afternoon getting through and also the train coming west yesterday. Accordingly passengers, express and mail were transferred and the west bound train returned East while the eastbound train came back here arriving about midnight last night.

G.N.R. steamer Prince John, Capt. E. Mabbs, is due from Vancouver via the Queen Charlotte Islands on Sunday night. The vessel will return south on the same route Monday night.

MAGOFFIN IS OPTIMISTIC

Well Known Railway Contractor Tells of Psychological Change in East

A great wave of optimism which has just started in Montreal is sweeping across Canada and should soon be felt on the Pacific Coast declares S. S. Magoffin, the well known railway contractor, who arrived in the city from the East last night. Mr. Magoffin attributes the marvelous psychological change now in evidence directly to the results of the British and United States election which have had a stabilizing effect on industries and business and have caused a general rise on the Stock Exchange.

As is usual at this time of year there is a good deal of unemployment to be seen in such cities as Winnipeg and Edmonton, Mr. Magoffin says.

Mr. Magoffin is here on business and will remain in the city for several days. He is registered at the Prince Rupert Hotel.

FORMER RUPERT MAN GIVEN ADVANCEMENT

J. G. McNab Appointed Foreign Freight Agent for the C.P.R. Succeeding F. H. Clendenning

Announcement is being made in Vancouver of the appointment of J. G. McNab, for five years general agent of the Canadian Pacific Railway in Prince Rupert and since 1915 district freight agent for the Canadian Pacific Steamships Ltd. succeeding F. H. Clendenning who has resigned to take over the active presidency of the Empire Shipping Co. Many friends in Prince Rupert of Mr. McNab will be pleased to learn of his promotion. He will be succeeded as district freight agent by Walter Wright, at present assistant to Mr. Clendenning.

MUD AND ROCK SLIDE DELAYS TRAIN AND CUTS TELEGRAPH WIRE

Wire Connected During Night Parted Again This Morning

A slide of rock and mud just east of Dorreen delayed the train, which came through last night seven and a half hours late. Following the cleanup of the slide one telegraph wire was connected but it parted again this morning and the result is that very little news is coming through.

BRITAIN MUST SHARE PAYMENT

Newspapers Support Demand to Continental Nations to Liquidate Debts

LONDON, Dec. 12.—Allied war debts continue to hold first place in London newspapers, which unanimously support the chancellor of the exchequer, Right Hon. Winston Churchill, in the announcement that if continental nations begin paying their debts to the United States they would be expected to make proportionate payments on obligations to Britain.

PARIS, Dec. 12.—Premier Briand, who is ill with grippe, presided today at a cabinet meeting in the bed chamber at the foreign office.

WORK COMMENCES ON NEW ROUTE TO GOVERNMENT DOCK

The work of tearing down the old overhead approach to the Government dock as part of the work of constructing the new approach which goes in from Cow Bay, has commenced, and it is understood will be carried through to completion by the time the fishing season reopens.

WEDNESDAY'S GALE VERY WIDESPREAD

Alice Arm, Stewart, the Islands and Interior Points Affected by it


The gale of Wednesday night which put the telegraph wires down on both systems and made newspaper publishing difficult, was quite widespread. Word received from the Islands is that it struck the Queen Charlotte Islands just as fiercely as here. Also Anyox reports that the gale messed things up at the smaller town. A launch in the harbor was wrecked and everywhere along as far as Stewart the force of the wind was destructive.

From the interior, word was received from Hazelton and other points that they had the blow very much like it was here.

NEW GERM KILLER HAS BEEN DISCOVERED

LONDON, Dec. 12.—Three English chemists claim to have discovered a new group of germsides of remarkable power. So intense is their antiseptic action it is declared, that they will destroy bacteria in certain cases as weak a form as one part in 20 millions.

The new antiseptic group is a complicated compound of the rare element tellurium, and was discovered as a result of investigations carried out in the University of Birmingham.

Gale Struck Alice Arm, Drove Power Boat Vesta and Did Other Damage at Mine Town

(Special to Daily News)

ALICE ARM, Dec. 12.—Alice Arm inlet and town was visited late Wednesday night by the worst windstorm that has been experienced here in years. The power boat Vesta, Capt. James Wintemute of Prince Rupert, was wrecked on the shore of the arm and gasboats belonging to Gust Anderson and Frank Smith were sunk. The logging camps of Miles Donald and Joe Wheately were damaged. Part of Miles Donald's bunk-house was completely carried away. Broken telegraph and telephone wires, loose radio aerials and unrooted buildings are in evidence all about. The government telegraph line along the shore of Alice Arm for several miles is a mess of fallen trees.

Perhaps the most exciting experience of the day was that of the gasboats Vesta and Ace (Capt. Frank Naremor). The Vesta, engaged in telegraph line repairs between Alice Arm and Anyox, late Wednesday afternoon had spliced the last break on the line following a storm on Tuesday and the linesmen were anticipating an hour's run home to solid comfort ashore when serious engine trouble developed on the Vesta. Rather than spend the night anchored, Capt. Wintemute decided to row down in search of the gasboat Ace which was wintering at Way Point. Fortunately, or otherwise, the Ace soon came chugging along and the crippled Vesta was lashed alongside. About half an hour later, the linesmen had just got nicely settled in the galley of Vesta when the captain's call came down warning that a storm was coming and ordering the life-boats lashed.

Soon after everything had been made secure, the storm came up in all its fury with a long protracted cyclonic variation. The towing boat fought bravely but, just as she was doing some of her neatest aerial flops, her engine stopped and refused to start up again. Capt. Wintemute cast loose the Vesta to prevent it from being smashed to pieces against the other boat. The Vesta drifted ashore and those aboard made dry land although they got rather wet in the meantime. The Ace got its engine running again and gained shelter in a cove.

ECLIPSE OF SUN ON JANUARY 24 IN EAST

WASHINGTON, Dec. 12.—The total eclipse of the sun on Saturday, January 24, 1925, will be visible in the eastern section of the United States, if the weather is favorable, in a shadow patch stretching from Minnesota, just east of Red Lake, extending over Michigan, part of Canada, New York, Pennsylvania, to New Jersey, Connecticut, Massachusetts and Rhode Island.

Naval observatory scientists say it will be the first time the east has been able to witness a total solar eclipse for many years. The central path of the eclipse will run very nearly through such centers of population as Buffalo, N.Y., and New Haven, Conn. The eclipse will terminate in the Atlantic Ocean, north of the British Isles. Communities outside the shadow path will witness the eclipse as partial.

Vancouver Penalized; Laxity of Inspection at Lakes is Charged

VANCOUVER, Dec. 12.—Business people of this city are much perturbed at the small amount of grain being shipped this way compared with that going out by way of the Great Lakes and investigations are being carried out with a view to determining where the trouble lies.

While the fact that the Manitoba crop is heavy and the Alberta and northern Saskatchewan crop is light, affects the western business adversely, that does not account for the large shipments east compared with those west.

A bulletin issued by the Canadian National Railways at the week end showed that out of 56,473 cars loaded on their system this year only 1,287 had come to Vancouver.

It is claimed here that while the Government inspectors insist on the letter of the law at this port, there is a laxity at Fort William and Port Arthur which makes it easy for the shipper. The result is that Vancouver is doing only a fraction of the amount of business it considers it should have. Charges in regard to inspection have been made by the Merchants Exchange here and the chairman of the Board of Grain Commissioners, Leslie H. Boyd, is coming to confer in regard to the matter.

Moisture not Penalized

It is stated here that while grain with fourteen per cent moisture is allowed to pass without penalty at Fort William, at Vancouver the inspectors would insist upon a reduction of grade. As this has been a wet season on the prairies and grain has not been in as good condition as usual, the inducement to ship by the lakes has been great. This has had a detrimental effect on the trade of this port.

From this time on grain will come this way, because it cannot get out by the lakes until spring, but practically all the earlier shipments have gone east. Be More Watchful

After this Vancouver will keep a more watchful eye on the Lakehead operations and will see that the western route gets an even break in matters of grade. Other possible handicaps will be investigated and an effort will be made to induce much larger western shipments from this time on.

LONDON, Dec. 12.—The mayor of Plymouth has requested that the portrait of Lady Astor which is to be removed from the House of Commons in accordance with parliamentary action be sent to the Plymouth art gallery. Lady Astor favors this.

**Important Questions
For United States.**

Apparently there is some difference of opinion in the United States as to whether they should have a big navy or not. If the country is to take a part in world affairs and to be a real influence it must have power behind it and the only power that seems to count is that of physical force. A navy represents the power to move at will in any part of the world. Without a navy the country must shut itself up and keep apart from world affairs. The size of a country and the power to make itself heard is not so important as the ability of the country to carry out its ideas.

The difficulty in building a navy today is that by the time it is built it may have little value as a fighting unit. Air fighting, the use of high explosives, poison gas and electricity in connection with hostilities may altogether do away with the value of ships and trained armies. That is the thing that will make any country pause before committing itself to any enormous expenditure on ships.

**Another Important Matter
Is That Of World Court.**

The President of the United States favors the establishment of a world court of justice. Just what would be its powers and limitations has not been announced authoritatively. It has yet to be formed and its constitution arranged. One thing that is objected to by most countries is the suggestion that the army or navy of a country should be at the call of the world court.

Policing has to be done and unless all the armies and navies of the world are available to enforce the dictums of the court, it might as well not be in business. Force is what is needed to back up the judgments of the court. The time will come doubtless when all nations will listen to reason, but today prejudices are too strong for reason to be an important factor.

**Timber Business
Should Improve.**

There has been a slack time in the lumber business of late. Most of the northern mills have been shut down and logging operations have stopped. Now there is renewed interest in logs and mills and it looks as if by early spring things would be humbling once more. That will help to improve business all round.

**Being Close To Orient
Has Its Advantages.**

Being close to the Orient, as we are, has its advantages. This is the meeting ground between East and West. It is the frontier. One side of the ocean is yellow and the other is white and the means of transportation are very easy.

Unless care is exercised we may easily become the dumping ground for the countries of China, Japan and India. Also should there be a quarrel with an Oriental country, we are on the frontier and would be the first to suffer, especially when the coast is wholly unprotected, as it is today. Because of this we should study Oriental questions and act always without prejudice.

**Forest Conservation
And Water Supply.**

Professor John Davidson of the University of British Columbia recently read a paper before the Vancouver Natural History Society in which he took exception to the action of the Provincial Government in logging off the Capilano watershed. He is trying to arouse the people to what he calls a conservation policy but a policy which is in other quarters designated a policy of waste.

As we understand the problem of the Capilano timber, it is something like this. The Government has several million dollars' worth of timber on the watershed which is over ripe and is going to waste. This timber belongs to the province as a whole and should be sold for their benefit to relieve taxation. If this is given to the City of Vancouver and allowed to remain untouched, the rest of the province has to pay that much more taxes.

In all parts of the British Columbia coast, timber very quickly reproduces naturally. Many experts say the best results are obtained when the slashing is burned by allowing a fire to run through it at certain periods of the year. As soon as the old crop of timber is removed, the new crop begins to grow and thus the wastage which has been in progress as a result of an over ripe crop standing, is changed to a reproductive condition. There is no need of planting, as nature attends to that. All that is necessary is to burn the slashing, following the logging operations.

The water supply of the Capilano at Vancouver, for instance, would be benefited by changing the old over-ripe stand of timber for a young and vigorously growing stand and this would protect the watershed years hence when the city shall have grown to such an extent as to need it. At the same time the whole province, including Vancouver, will benefit from the income derived from the sale of the timber and the royalties collected and the city of Vancouver will benefit doubly from having the logs cut at their mills.

This is not a thing to get hysterical about but simply a matter with which forestry experts should deal as they have the information at hand and know the local conditions.







**QUIET SESSION
POLICE BOARD**

Routine Business and General
Conditions Discussed at
Monthly Meeting Yes-
terday

The police commission was in regular monthly session in the city council chamber yesterday afternoon. There was little more than routine business and a very tranquil hour was spent, the commissioners congratulating themselves and the police department on the enviable quiet condition of the city from a crime standpoint. There were present at the meeting Mayor Newton, Commissioners Cameron and Montgomery, City Solicitor Jones, Chief Vickers and a representative of the Daily News.

The report of the chief of police for the month of November was read and ordered filed.

It stated that there had been 40 cases in the police court during the month resulting in 36 convictions, three dismissals and one case withdrawn.

Included among the offences that had been dealt with were 24 cases of intoxication, five supplying liquor to Indians, three assaults, one bogus check case and one each of discharging firearms and having firearms in possession.

Departmental collections totalled \$471.50, including \$454.50 in fines and \$18 for keep of provincial prisoners. The payroll amounting \$8930 and accounts amounting to \$260.47 including \$101 for transportation of prisoners south were passed for payment. The mayor suggested a better division of taxi hire among the various firms. Weights of coal and bread were reported to have been inspected and found correct.

Cow Bay O.K.
Regarding measures that had been taken to clean up Cow Bay, City Solicitor Jones reported that the provincial police had communicated with Victoria and had been advised that the matter was



one for the city police to take care of. There were no bootlegging establishments on provincial government property and undesirable tenants who had been there had removed. Mayor Newton said there had been no complaints recently as far as Cow Bay was concerned. Other commissioners agreed that the situation which had been complained had apparently been remedied.

Commissioner Montgomery inquired if there had been any complaints lodged with the police as to objectionable characters on Fourth Avenue West. Chief Vickers replied that there had been and that the particular party in question was moving out.

Clean-up Campaign

In answer to Commissioner Montgomery, Mayor Newton stated that the special patrol of suspicious premises down town decided upon at last month's meeting of the commission had been carried out. There had not been sufficient evidence obtained in the opinion of the chief to warrant police court actions being instituted but there had been a beneficial effect obtained in the way of ameliorating the conditions that had been complained of. Commissioner Montgomery urged that, whenever it was

deemed necessary in the future, such special watch be kept on particular premises. Mayor Newton stated that the chief understood this to be the desire of the commission.

Commissioner Cameron stated that he had been in many places and Prince Rupert today seemed to be as orderly as any he had ever been in.

"But it don't get a good name on the outside," interjected Commissioner Montgomery.

"More Vancouver propaganda" opined Commissioner Cameron.

Solicitor Complimentary

City Solicitor Jones saw nothing to complain of as far as Prince Rupert was concerned in the point of law observance and enforcement. The fact that there had been only two cases at the Supreme Court Assizes and these had been for the same crime indicated a healthy condition in the north. Mr. Jones commended Chief Vickers and the work of his staff.

The commission agreed on the point that crime prevention was more to be desired than police court convictions.

Winnipeg Paper Tells of Change Which Has Taken Place

(Manitoba Free Press)

The old railway mess has disappeared, the numerous moribund or decrepit or weak lines have vanished from the railway map of Canada and in their place is a new, coherent, co-ordinated and efficient transportation company whose revenues for 1923 show a surplus of more than twenty million dollars over the operating expenses for the year. What this means, of course, is perfectly obvious.

It means that the lines in the National system have been jacked up into real railways giving first-class service in all departments of transportation.

This, at first sight, may seem to be very gratifying result, and undoubtedly it is, but it contains implications which may not be at once apparent, and it entails responsibilities which perhaps have not been fully realized.

The crux of the present problem is that while as an engineering proposition it is moving rapidly to high efficiency, financially it is a derelict.


