The adjournment was announced by the president while the delegates howled as Alexander Howat, president of the Kansas City district, was dragged from the platform by two sergeants-at-arms. Howat was forcibly removed when he sought to address the delegates, despite the president's refusal to recognize him.

SYNOPSIS OF

PRE-EMPTIONS

Vacant, unreserved, surveyed Crown lands may be pre-empted by British subjects over 18 years of age. and by aliens on declaring intention to become British subjects, conditional upon residence, occupation. and improvement for agricultural

Full information concerning reguations regarding pre-emptions is given in Bulletin No. 1, Land Series. 'How to Pre-empt Land," copies of which can be obtained free of charge y addressing the Department of ands, Victoria, B.C., or to any Govrnment Agent.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes, and which is not timberland, i.e., carrying over 5.000 board feet per acre west of the Coast Range and 8,000 feet per acre east of that

Applications for pre-emptions are to be addressed to the Land Com missioner of the Land Recording Di vision, in which the land applied for is situated, and are made on printed forms, copies of which can be obtained from the Land Commissioner.

Pre-emptions must be occupied for five years and improvements made to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivating at least five acres, before a Crown Grant can be

PURCHASE Applications are received for pur

chase of vacant and unreserved Crown lands, not being timberland, for agricultural purposes; minimum barometer, price of first-class (arable) land is \$5 per acre, and second-class (grazing) land \$2.50 per acre. Further information regarding purchase or lease of Crown lands is given in Bulletin No. 10, Land Series, "Purchase and Lease of Crown Lands."

Mill, factory, or industrial sites on imber land, not exceeding 40 acres. may be purchased or leased, the conditions including payment of stumpage.

HOMESITE LEASES

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesites, conditional upon a dwelling being erected in the first year, title being obtainable after residence and improvement conditions are fulfilled and land has been surveyed.

LEASES For grazing and industrial purposes areas not exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or a company.

GRAZING

Under the Grazing Act the Province is divided into grazing districts and the range administered under a Grazing Commissioner. Annual grazing permits are issued based on numbers ranged, priority being given may form associations for range management. Free, or partially free, ermits are available for settlers, ampers and travellers, up to ter

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
