### Professionalism Pervades Everything.

In sport professionalism seems to pervade everyone. It has so grown on the world that a good many teams today will not play except before an audience that has paid to see the game. In Scotland it is seen in a recent attempt to bribe players to throw a game. From the little folks up there is something of the same spirit shown. No game can be played without collecting a fee from the audience. No one is safe today in stopping by the wayside to watch the youngsters play for fear someone will be passing the hat around.

Time was when young people and old played a game for the sake of the sport. They wanted no spectators but enjoyed the game for its own sake. Today all that is changed.

We are not suggesting any remedy. Possibly nothing can be done to change it. It is simply one of the signs of the times.

### Power Of Orient Is Being Felt.

When the United States decided to keep Japanese from entering that country there was a howl of remonstrance from the yellow men. So serious were the Japanese over the situation that one or two of them publicly committed hari-kiri or suicide by ripping themselves open, more for the sake of impressing their countrymen than with hope of influencing the United States.

Recently when the Dominion Government ordered that to prevent smuggling of Chinese into the country all should be photographed and the photo kept in the official archives, there was a strong protest made by people of that nationality in this country.

At the opening of the fishing season on the Skeena River the Japanese fishermen went on strike and tied up the fishing there. So it goes. Everywhere the influence of the Orient is strong on this continent, and no one can say how strong it would have been had not the Laurier government raised the tax against Chinese to \$500 and made an agreement with Japan to keep nationals of that country at home. The influence here today is as strong as we want it. The race problem's one that is a danger to any community. Any people that can be voted en bloc are dangerous.

### Newspaper Making Young Man's Job.

The late Lord Northcliffe, formerly Alfred Harmsworth, is credited with saying that making a newspaper is a young man's job. He says that anyone starting a paper should not be over thirty years of age.

## FIFTY MILLIONS INVESTED

### VAST SUM SUNK IN OPERATION OF PROVINCE'S PULP AND PAPER INDUSTRY

British Columbia Only Cuts One-Thousandth Part of Her Pulp Wood Annually

It is estimated that the huge sum of \$50,000,000 is invested in the manufacture of pulp and paper in British Columbia which is one of the great divisions of the Forest Products industries of this province. British Columbia possesses the finest stand of high grade pulp wood in the world. The quantity is placed at 180,000,000,000 feet or 255,000 cords.

In 1922 the plants of British Columbia converted 274,000 cords or roughly a thousandth part into the manufactured product. Yet British Columbia produced 9.2 per cent. of all the pulp and 9.6 per cent. of all the paper in the Dominion of Canada.

### Pulp and Paper

In 1922 the pulp and paper industry of British Columbia employed 1823 persons in its plants alone with an annual payroll of \$3,578,000 and spent considerably over \$3,000,000 in the purchase of supplies. In addition the logging of the raw material employs many hundreds of men and greatly adds to the industry's payroll.

Enormous sums are spent annually in renewals of machinery, enlargement of plants, and in keeping the processes up to the latest scientific standards.

The establishment of a modern pulp and paper plant entails the expenditure of several million dollars. The growth of an industry vast enough to keep pace with our increasing pulpwood supply is only a question of creating taxation conditions that will encourage the investment of the huge sums needed.

## MONKEY GLANDS ARE ONLY MYTHOLOGY IS OPINION OF DOCTOR

Clarence McWilliams of New York is an Advocate of Plastic Surgery

CHICAGO, June 26—Rejuvenation by transplantation of any kind of glands was branded as mythology before the surgery section of the American Medical Association, by Dr. Clarence A. McWilliams, New York surgeon, close September 5.

A. A. Cox, architect, arrived in relation to skin grafts or

from Vancouver on the Prince George yesterday afternoon and one creature to another.

"In numerous instances I can point out where the uniform result is the disappearance of the grafted tissues," Dr. McWilliams asserted. "The scientific reason is that between animals of the same species, even, there are unknown biological differences that prevent the survival of the transplanted arteries. Reported successes would indicate that these grafted organs seem to take, but they suddenly disappear, in a few weeks at the most."

## Skin Grafting

"The same facts govern the grafting of skin from one individual to another. In order to grow, skin must be taken from the same person. Apparent success of other individuals' grafts is explained by the fact that the patient's own skin grows under the transplant and pushes it aside."

"Plastic surgery holds the greatest promise to those having either congenital or unfortunate acquired facial deformities," he added. "A hideous deformity may be transformed into a scarcely noticeable disfigurement."

DISAPPEARS**Broke Into Society and Sporting  
Circles in Victoria Recently**WANTED BY POLICE**Bought Real Estate and Posed as  
Mining Expert and Capitalist

Voluminous correspondence which he conducted with women in the United States and Canada, his eccentricity demonstrated on several occasions, his interest in matrimonial papers and the general air of mystery that surrounded him are quoted as indications to justify the linking of the George Cummings, known in Victoria, with the man sought in connection with the investigation of the death of a woman near Wittenberg, Wis., says the Victoria Times.

Claiming personal friendship with leading Jewish financiers in Canada and the United States, he did not, when he first arrived in Victoria from Vancouver, appear to be well supplied with funds but a few weeks after his arrival, commenced to make investments in real estate. He first bought a piece of property for \$1,000 which he soon turned over. He made first payments on two other pieces investing in all \$3,500, but even after a short acquaintance those with whom he came in contact grew distrustful. He claimed to be making investments for capitalists who placed implicit confidence in him and to be travelling with an unlimited expense account calling for no details for his expenditures. Always well dressed, with a Jewish cast of countenance, and claiming to be a son of French parents who settled in Montreal, Cummings stated that he served in France with a French Canadian battalion and was wounded on active service.

Soon after he arrived in Victoria he made attempts to break into society and into print. He attended many public meetings where city affairs were discussed, claimed to be financially interested in the Amusement Centre and talked largely but vaguely of mining deals and reorganizing companies some of which he said netted him tens of thousands for a few days work.

**Wrote to Many Women**

His correspondence was extensive. Nearly every day he mailed from thirty to forty letters and nearly all were to women. He left behind him specimens of his peculiar handwriting.

One of his strange moods for a man who is probably not much over thirty years of age was the number of two-dollar bills he was making of wills.

He made one distributed them freely. He also soon after his arrival here which he requested W. H. Davies to place in safe keeping in the safe of the Empire Realty Company, having had dealings with Fred Landsberg, manager of the company. A week later he appeared with another will and asked for

He claimed acquaintance with moving picture actresses of Hollywood and gave introductions to one Victoria man making a trip south. In the light of recent happenings the opinion has been expressed that he was in correspondence with ladies through a matrimonial bureau.
