# ROAD TO GALLOWAY RAPIDS IS PROMISED

## SEVERE SNOWSTORM SWEEPS OVER CENTRAL STATES AND STALLS TRAINS

### Government Will Build Road to Galloway Rapids First and Make Surveys for Going Beyond

"It is the intention of the provincial government to commence construction of the road to Galloway Rapids and while that is going on to make a thorough reconnaissance of the country between here and Terrace with a view to finding out where the road will have to go before commencing construction on the other side of Galloway Rapids." That was a statement made by Hon. T. D. Pattullo in addressing the Liberal Association last night when referring to local issues.

Mr. Pattullo emphasized the fact that he had always favored building of a road to the back of the Island and also one to the top of the mountain. He had found that there were many difficulties in the way, however. When the road westward from Prince George had been planned, it was with a view to going only as far as Hazelton. He had then told the minister of public works he would not support any such policy unless the road eventually was carried through to Prince Rupert. The ultimate object is to get through to Vancouver from Prince Rupert by road. No matter what route was taken, the minister said, they would have to go by way of Galloway Rapids. Accordingly it was proposed to build that section first and by the time it was finished they would have the road beyond located. It was useless to carry the road to Tyece if it was to end there.

**Salt Lakes**  
Speaking of the recent deal in connection with the Salt Lakes and other lands, Mr. Pattullo explained that there was an agreement between the Railway Company and the government by which certain lands on Kaien Island and vicinity were to be subdivided and the province was to get one quarter interest. Under present conditions the cost of subdivision was considered too great, so an arrangement was made by which the Government secured its land in a block. The Salt Lakes and surrounding land were conveyed to the province to be used for park purposes and eventually this would be turned over to the city of Prince Rupert. He did not think it would be wise to do it now, as in that case the city would have to pay all costs of improvement. He also did not advise that the land should be declared a public park as they could spend only monies voted for park purposes and such a vote had not been made for years. It was better, he thought, to keep in touch with the public works department here and get what work they could do rather than have the land conveyed just now.

### FRANCE WILL NOT FALTER

Will Meet All Obligations Caused by Failure of Her Debtor, Germany

PARIS, Feb. 5.—France will honor the engagements she was obliged to contract by the failure of her debtor, Germany, declared President Millerand at a banquet here. To win victory in the Great War she had given all her sons; to maintain her credit intact she would have to give all her resources, he said. Such was the unanimous will of France irrespective of the part she shared, the president declared.

### LLOYD GEORGE PAYS TRIBUTE

Woodrow Wilson's Name Will Go Down in History, He Says—Dreams Not Yet Realized

LONDON, Feb. 5.—"Woodrow Wilson will become one of the great figures of history," declared David Lloyd George yesterday when notified of the death of the ex-president of the United States. "Wilson, like Lincoln and other great idealists did not live to see his dreams realized."

ALBANY, Ore., Feb. 5.—Seven persons are dead and three dying as a result of eating home preserved beans, which it is believed were spoiled and had produced a deadly poison known as Botulism.

All should be welcomed here. It could not be expected that a man would soon forget his own country. He would not be a good citizen if he did. What was necessary was to instill in them the spirit of Canadianism and make the children into good Canadians. He did not believe Canada was going to the dogs. Business conditions in the country were never sounder than today and they must get away from the spirit of pessimism.

### STORM RAGES CENTRAL U.S.

Trains Stalled and Several People Killed Owing to Driving Snow

ST. PAUL, Feb. 5.—Stalled trains, sleeted wires and snow drifted on the roads today are the result of a storm which raged yesterday and last night through the middle states. Many Chicago circuits were cut off.

At Ypsilanti, Michigan, two women in an automobile were killed. At Flint a boy was killed driving a car which was struck by a train. A man fatally injured was run down by a truck in the driving snow.

### REBEL LEADERS ARE SENTENCED TO DEATH

Commander of Former White Army and 20 Others to Pay Penalty

MOSCOW, Feb. 5.—General Deylayev, former commander of the white army and 20 of his followers, have been sentenced to death by a military tribunal at Chian for counter-revolutionary activities in Siberia after Koltchak's defeat. Fifty seven others have been sentenced to prison.

### PRESBYTERIANS MAKE GOOD COLLECTIONS FOR CHURCH FUND

With only 6 of the 11 canvassing teams reporting their returns, the total for the Presbyterian Church building fund last night stood at \$6,000 showing net collections of the day to be around the \$1,000 mark for the six committees. Bright and early the canvass started yesterday morning and the enthusiastic teams met with splendid results indicating that the canvass will go over with success. The objective is a minimum of \$10,000 but it is now hoped that this total will be exceeded.

### FLOOD AT INDIAN RIVER DOES DAMAGE

Logs Carried Away, Trees Uprooted and Roadways Badly Damaged—Waters Now Subsiding

VANCOUVER, Feb. 5.—More than a million feet of high grade logs were carried away, hundreds of trees were uprooted and roadways were badly damaged by a flood which raged for twelve hours at Indian River fifteen miles northwest of here. The extent of the damage has not yet been estimated. The flood waters are now subsiding.

### POOLING SALARIES

LONDON, Feb. 5.—The cabinet ministers are reported to be seriously considering pooling their salaries, as was done during the war.

### NEW LAUNCH IN FORESTRY DEPARTMENT

### PRINCE RIDES HORSES ENTERED FOR RACES

Reported that he Engaged in Formal Contest with Jockies Training at Epsom

LONDON, Feb. 5.—The Prince of Wales, it is reported, motored yesterday to Epsom downs, rode several of the horses quartered there and entered in the forthcoming races, and engaged in a formal contest with the professional jockies who are training there.

### GHANDI ORDERED TO BE RELEASED

LONDON, Feb. 5.—The Bombay government has ordered the release of Ghandi, the Indian nationalist leader, who on March 18, 1922, was sentenced to six years' penal servitude for sedition.

### Germany Sends Note to France Complaining of Action Toward Separatist Move in her Country

BERLIN, Feb. 5.—Germany has sent a new note to France emphasizing the heavy responsibility of France in the event of inability to meet her financial obligations. The note complains that French support of the separatists entailed a serious infringement of the sovereignty of the Reich and the oppression of 700,000 defenseless persons. Germany asks that the French re-establish conditions in the Palatinate of Germany according to the treaty, disarm the separatists and allow unrestricted resumption of the activities of the German authorities.

### ALICE ARM TO HAVE BRIDGE

Work on Suspension Structure Across Kitsault River Will Start Soon

Work will soon start on the construction of the cable suspension bridge across the Kitsault River at Alice Arm, Major R. M. Taylor, district engineer for the provincial department of public works, announces. Tenders are being called for the piling and timber work, and as soon as the contracts have been let and the piling assembled, work will proceed.

The new bridge, which will be located almost at the mouth of the Kitsault River and very close to the town of Alice Arm, will replace ineffectual ferry services which have been employed for some years. It has been agitated for by the people of Alice Arm for some years and final decision to build it was reached following the inauguration of extensive logging operations on the east side of the river.

The bridge will have one central cable suspension span of 230 feet with timber decking and approaches from either end.

It is planned to have the bridge completed and ready for operation by the end of April.

### OLIVER WILL FIGHT BATTLE

Will Defend Himself in Person Before Royal Commission of Investigation

VICTORIA, Feb. 5.—Premier Oliver will fight his own battle before the Royal Commission on P.G.E. Railway affairs, it was learned here yesterday. The premier will not be represented personally by counsel but will appear for himself to disprove the sweeping charges of the provincial party.

The Premier, it is understood, will be prepared to answer all attacks made upon him.

While the Premier and members of the cabinet are anxious to have the Royal Commission start work as soon as possible, a considerable number of legal matters must be arranged by Attorney General Manson before the investigation can open. The announcement of the appointment of the commission and its scope will be made this week, it is understood.

### CAPITAL LEVY IS DEFENDED

Smillie Says Government Justified in Using Wealth of Unduly Rich

KIRKINTILLOCH, Scotland, Feb. 5.—Robert Smillie justified a capital levy at a labor demonstration here last night. He said he believed the labor party could justify itself in taking from the excessively wealthy people the larger part of their riches in order to consummate reforms essential to a better standard of life among people generally.

### BRITISH ROUND WORLD FLIGHT

Planes Will Take Opposite Routes to Flyers From United States

OTTAWA, Feb. 5.—North Ottawa and Montclair will be on the route of the round world flight to be attempted by British airmen commencing about the middle of March, Col. L. Broome announces. He declared that they aimed to complete a round the world trip in 90 days. Starting from Groydon, England, the flight proceeds eastward through India, Italy, Burma, China, Japan, and Canada back to the starting point.

### PESSIMISM IS OUT OF PLACE

Fred Stork Delivers Optimistic Address to Liberal Association

KING REAL LEADER

Whisper of Death Campaign Should be Refuted on Every Occasion

The affairs of the country never were in better shape than they are today, declared Fred Stork, M.P., in an address to the Liberal Association at its annual meeting. He was glad to see so many stalwart pioneers in the meeting and also so many on the executive. It was a good omen for the continued success of Liberalism. It was the duty of Liberals to refute on every possible occasion the campaign of pessimism and the whisper of death. They had today the best Government that could be obtained, the best possible cause and the best country and they need never despair as to its future.

Mr. Stork in opening his address reviewed briefly the history of the Liberal party. He told how in England John Bright had led the Liberals against the aristocrats until his name was anathema with them and one day he would walk twenty miles to see John Bright hanged. About the same time William Lyon Mackenzie in Canada had opposed the family compact and by rousing the people had incurred the enmity of the public. So bitter was the feeling against him by the privileged few that when it was found that his paper, "The Advocate" had been put with others in the foundation of the Brock monument, the cement foundation had been torn up and the paper removed.

**Laurier's Optimism**  
Mr. Stork traced the growth of Liberalism until the advent of Sir Wilfrid Laurier when strengthened and it would be in a business was at a standstill. He

had encouraged immigration and converted Canada into a prosperous country. He had conceived the idea of the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway but was defeated in 1911 on a proposal to have reciprocity with the United States, the same policy that Prince Rupert now declared she wanted. The defeat had been brought about by instilling into the campaign passion and prejudice.

The Borden Government that followed had attacked everything that looked like Laurier, including the railway. They had done it with the same bitterness with which the foundation of the Brock monument had been torn up. Attempts had been made to discredit the greatest statesman Canada ever produced. It was useless for him to enumerate the army scandals and other Tory difficulties. The clock ran down and Liberalism came back under the grandson of William Lyon Mackenzie.

**Batteries Unmasked**  
Today again the batteries of the enemy were unmasked. The whisper of death told of what they called a carnival of extravagance. The present government had inherited a debt of two and a half billion dollars and a government railway system that had proved a burden. It behooved not Mr. Meighen to talk of the national debt and excessive taxation. The Government had called in one of the greatest railwaymen Sir Henry Thornton and he was putting the railway on its feet so that it would soon be a paying proposition.

Mr. Stork then told of the efforts being made to reform the civil service in order to reduce expenses of Government. He said that William Lyon Mackenzie King was a real leader, the best and wisest in the Dominion. It was no snap to be a leader of a government that was carrying on without a majority in the House. ## ANNUAL REPORT OF UTILITIES POLL AND ROAD TAX DISCUSSED

Presented by Superintendent to City Council Last Evening

### GOOD SURPLUSES IN LIGHT AND TELEPHONES

An estimated surplus in 1923 of \$15,829.44 on electric light operation and a surplus of \$11,577.92 on the telephone system was reported to the city council last night by Ernest Love, superintendent of utilities, in the course of a detailed report on the operation of the utilities for the year. The estimated revenue on light and power was placed at \$88,000 and expenditure \$72,170.55, while estimated telephone revenue was \$13,200 with expenditure, \$31,822.08. Revenue in both cases for the year was \$2,000 less. There was a 29,000 kilowatt hour increase in light and power production but the decreased revenue was accounted for in the sale of a large part of the output to the dry dock and railway at smaller rates.

In the course of his report, the superintendent reported that in February he reduced the staff from 26 to 18 men in response to the demand for rigid economy. Thus a saving on the payroll of \$13,481.99 had been effected for the remaining ten months of the year. The "tie in" connection with the dry dock and the new connection with the Canadian National Railways had been made during the year at a cost of \$5,754.25, not including stores on hand. Nine additional street lights had been added. The Cow Bay steam plant was in bad condition and in need of repairs. Otherwise the outside light plant was in fairly good condition.

During the year 48,000 feet of telephone cable was added to the system and several additional facilities were installed. The cost of this work had been \$13,146.98. When the new work now under way in the telephone department was completed late in 1924, it would then be possible to reduce the payroll another \$10,000 per year without in any way affecting the efficiency of the plants, the superintendent predicted.

The report was tabled for further consideration.

**Giant's Work**  
Mr. Stork referred to the efforts that had been made to get F. G. Dawson on the Board of Railway Commissioners. Mr. Dawson was doing giant's work and he felt sure they would soon have evidence of the splendid work he was doing. The tie contracts for Central B.C. were obtained through his efforts. It nothing else had been done but getting him on the board that was sufficient to justify the action they had taken in electing a Liberal member.

### Ald. Collart's Bylaw For Repeal of Latter is Considered by Council

Ald. Collart's bylaw amendment calling for the repeal of the annual road tax was given its first and second readings and discussed in committee stage at last night's council meeting. Difference of opinion as to the effect of the amendment arose and it was decided to rise from committee leaving the matter open for further consideration.

Ald. Collart pointed to the confusion that had arisen last year in connection with the \$5 poll tax and \$2 road tax, neither of which had been properly collected. A property owner was enabled to get on the list by paying at least \$5 taxation. He felt, therefore, that householders should be allowed the vote for the \$5 poll tax. For this reason he was moving for the abolition of the \$2 road tax which last year had to be collected as well, making a total of \$7.

### Status of Women

Discussion brought out the fact that \$2 would still have to be paid by women householders who wished to vote. Ald. Casey did not think the amendment went far enough. He proposed asking the legislature to amend the statutes so that householders, otherwise qualified as one year residents and British subjects, would be immune from either poll or road tax. The paying of rent for one year, he was of the opinion, constituted indirectly the payment of full taxation quota. He pointed to legislation secured some years ago by the city of New Westminster making it unnecessary to pay the poll tax so long as the intended voters were duly registered.

### Poll Tax Compulsory

Mayor Newton asked City Solicitor Jones if the imposition of the poll tax by the city was optional and was told that it was compulsory under statute. If the city did not collect it, the government would.

In any case, Ald. Casey thought the city should start early in the year to collect poll tax from those persons from whom it was due. Many people escaped paying because collection was left off until November.

Ald. Collart said that he had already taken this matter up with the city treasurer and steps would be taken this year to have the collections made properly from the first of the year. His amendment must be settled first, however.

Ald. Macdonald felt that those who had paid the required tax should automatically go on the list. He was shown, however, where it was necessary that the declarations should be taken to establish British citizenship and one year residence.

### Reported Progress

Ald. Collart said it was not his intention to press the passage of the amendment at this juncture and suggested that, in view of the fact that three members of the council were absent, the committee arise and report progress, asking leave to sit again. This was done.

### PRINCE GEORGE

Ralph Gray, an employee of the Cranbrook sawmills, is in the city hospital suffering from painful injuries sustained when a tree he was falling fell upon him.

B. Horby, who is farming a piece of land in the Salmon River settlement, has started a crusade to induce the farmers in this vicinity to experiment with the growing of apples, plums, cherries and other fruits in this vicinity. He points out that success has been met along this line in North Dakota under less favorable circumstances.

Additional teachers will be required in the public and high schools here this year, the school board has decided in bringing down its estimates. It is proposed to fit up the old public school for high school purposes.

Ed. Hall has returned to Prince George from a four months' trip in the United States.

Rev. David Graham of Edmonton will fill the pulpit of the

Knox Presbyterian Church during the month of February.

The Prince George Board of Trade plans sending a delegation to Ottawa to ask for the building of a railway from Prince George to the Peace River.

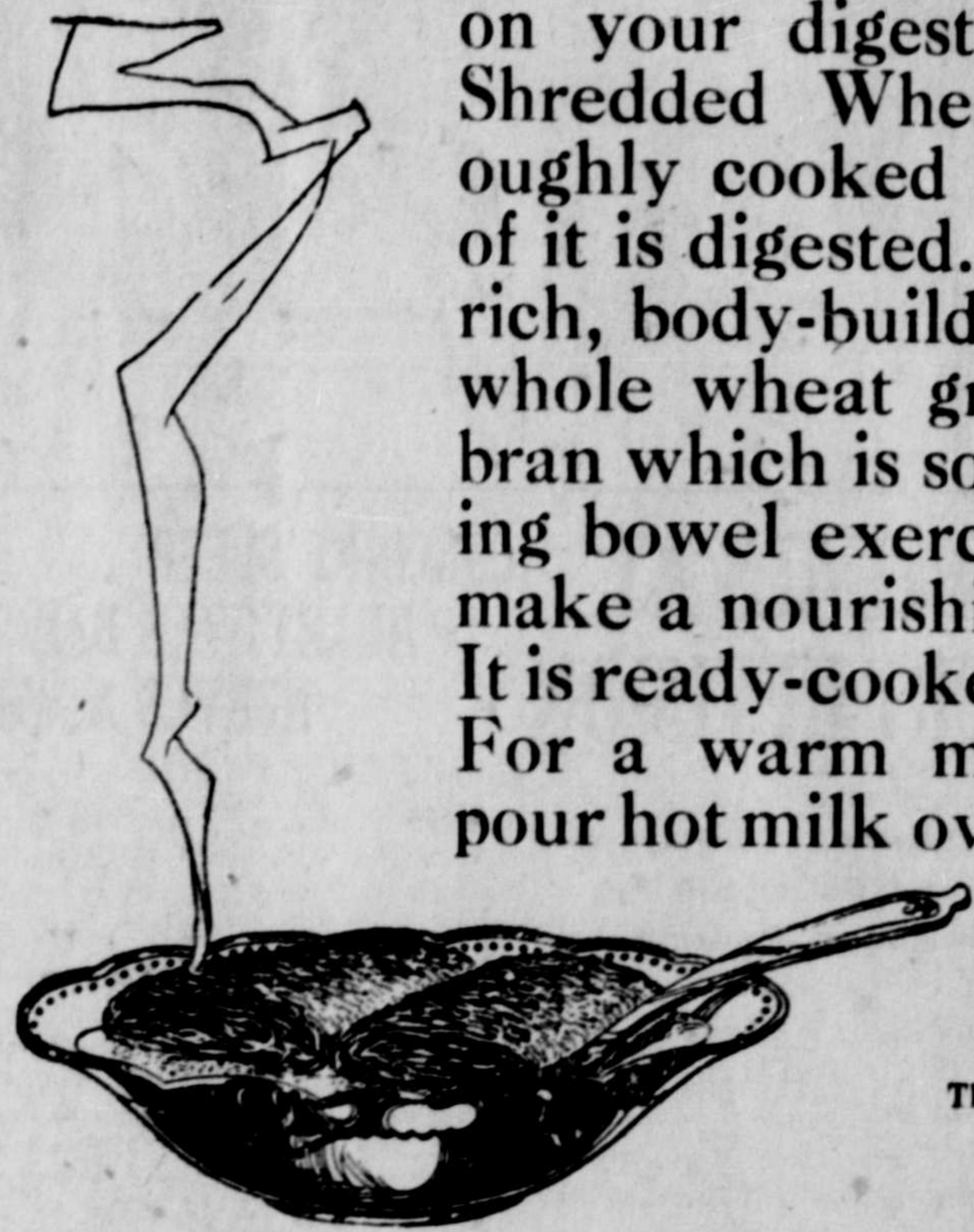

**Provincial Issues Discussed by Hon. T. D. Pattullo at Annual Liberal Meeting Last Night**

"Five more years for you, Duff," was a cry from the back of the hall last night as Hon. T. D. Pattullo rose to speak to the Liberals assembled in the old Carleton Cafe, Third Ave., for their annual meeting last night. Mr. Pattullo was given a rousing reception and so was Fred Stork who also addressed the meeting. Both spoke optimistically of the future prospects of the city, the country and the party. Mr. Pattullo asked for a high grade of Canadianism, for there was no better country on earth than Canada and the people were imbued with a high moral purpose. He asked that all get away from the spirit of pessimism.

"There are no pessimists in heaven," declared Mr. Pattullo, therefore they must all go to hell." He urged that the resources of the country be put to the greatest possible use in order to serve the whole people.

In opening his address, the minister of lands urged that Liberalism should stand for the good of the country. Partisan politics did not amount to much unless it stood for the good of the country first of all. There had recently been injected into the provincial field, he said, what was known as the provincial party. They were sowing the seeds of misinformation and the people were in a receptive mood to believe anything. The new party said the old parties were corrupt and incompetent, and if this was true he agreed that the sooner they were gone the better. He did not think they were, however.

**Thorough Investigation**  
In regard to the charges made against the government in connection with the P.G.E., there would be a thorough investigation and he was not worrying as to the outcome. He thought it would be a good thing to settle the minds of the people by granting this investigation.

Taking up the matter of taxation, Mr. Pattullo objected to the statements that the government had been extravagant. He said that the people who were criticizing were unable to point out where reductions should be made. One of the planks of the provincial party was to give a business administration which was another way of saying "put the others out and put us in." It for every party claimed to advocate business administration. Presuming that the members of the present government were honest, they ought to be in a better position to administer affairs in a business-like manner than they were when first elected.

**Burned Midnight Oil**  
Mr. Pattullo asked where would the critics of the government cut down the expenses? Would they close down the P.G.E.? He did not think any administration

would dare do it. The University took half a million dollars a year, and would they close it? Admitting that it was started too early in the history of the province, now that it was an established institution he did not think any government would dare propose closing it. It was all right to talk economy but they should show where to economize. The members of the Oliver government had burned the midnight oil trying to find out where they could cut down on expenditures.

The present government was not responsible for the P.G.E. or for the University. Both were inherited legacies, but they were responsible for the expenditures of the mothers' pensions. Some people thought they were going too fast in this regard, but "we are not going to revoke the mothers' pensions. What is the provincial party going to do about it?" inquired the minister, amid applause.

Mr. Pattullo said the population of the province had trebled in twenty years and the province had to expand. Capital had to be invested. The province was paying its way on current account, but it was necessary to borrow on capital account for developing the country. It was not enough for the opponents of the government to say "put me in and I will reduce taxes." What people wanted to know was where the taxes were to be reduced. The administration was playing an important part in developing the country. In the development of agriculture, in mining and in timber they had done much. It was impossible to spend money on developing the country and reduce taxes at the same time.

A petition signed by W. G. Oakley and 78 others asking that a new sidewalk be built from the terminus of Sixth Avenue East to Eighth Avenue at Seal Cove was presented to the city council last night and referred to the board of works and finance committee.

The petition pointed out that the present walk giving the desired connection was out of repair and dangerous. Admitting that the walk asked for would pass over private property, the residents stated that it would afford the only direct access from many residences to the sawmill and cold storage plant. It was estimated that 30 residents were using the present broken down walk and in the summer the number would be larger. Should the sawmill operate, it would still further be used. It was also a favorite route for holiday walkers.

### 5,000 RADIO FANS HEAR LECTURE GIVEN VICTORIA ON SPOOKS

Everyone Surrounded by Aura: Ghosts Are Stored up Thought Impressions

VICTORIA, Feb. 5.— Between 50,000 and 100,000 persons, as far as could be estimated in Western Canada and in the United States as far south as Texas, listened to a remarkable radio lecture in Centennial Methodist Church delivered by Prof. R. S. Baker on the late developments in modern science, particularly with those having to do with the psychic world.

San Francisco psychologists heard the lecture by means of a special radiophone, set after telegraphic communication with Victoria earlier in the day. Nearly 5,000 instruments in Seattle alone were tuned in on it, according to estimates. There was a large personal audience in the church.

Dr. Baker created the greatest interest when he told of modern revelations with regard to haunted houses and the way science has solved their mystery and found a way of purifying them.

#### Shadow Leaves Trace

"Your shadow never falls upon a wall without leaving traces that can be brought out by proper treatment," Dr. Baker said. "Radiant forces are constantly passing through all objects to other objects, and can be brought out as we have learned to do with the sensitized film of the camera, on which we can see no trace of the subject until it is developed. You cannot enter a room without leaving your portrait behind you. Your dog knows and believes it. Hours after his master has gone along the street he is able to follow by the effect on the stones until he finds him."
