MORE AIRPLANES PRINCE RUPERT PATROL

MANY IMMIGRANTS ARE ARRIVING IN CANADA INCLUDING FIRST LOT BOYS

Leaving Europe Stew in her Own Juice not Good Policy for States

NEW YORK, March 19.—America will unquestionably feel the impulse to work for the permanent peace of Europe on which a large measure of her prosperity lies and not "leave Europe to stew in her own juice," said Sir Esme Howard, British ambassador, at a Pilgrim dinner here last night.

A cable message from King George expressed appreciation of the accomplishments of the Pilgrim Society on behalf of Anglo-American friendship and a message was read from the Prince of Wales.

"The attitude of complete aloofness and lack of interest in the affairs of the other white continent cannot be wholesome or in the end be good business for either of the two," said the ambassador.

Jules Jusserand, French ambassador, pointing to the fact that after many wars throughout the ages, England and France were now entering the second century of peaceful relations and declared: "We intend to astonish and delight the world by the length of our peace."

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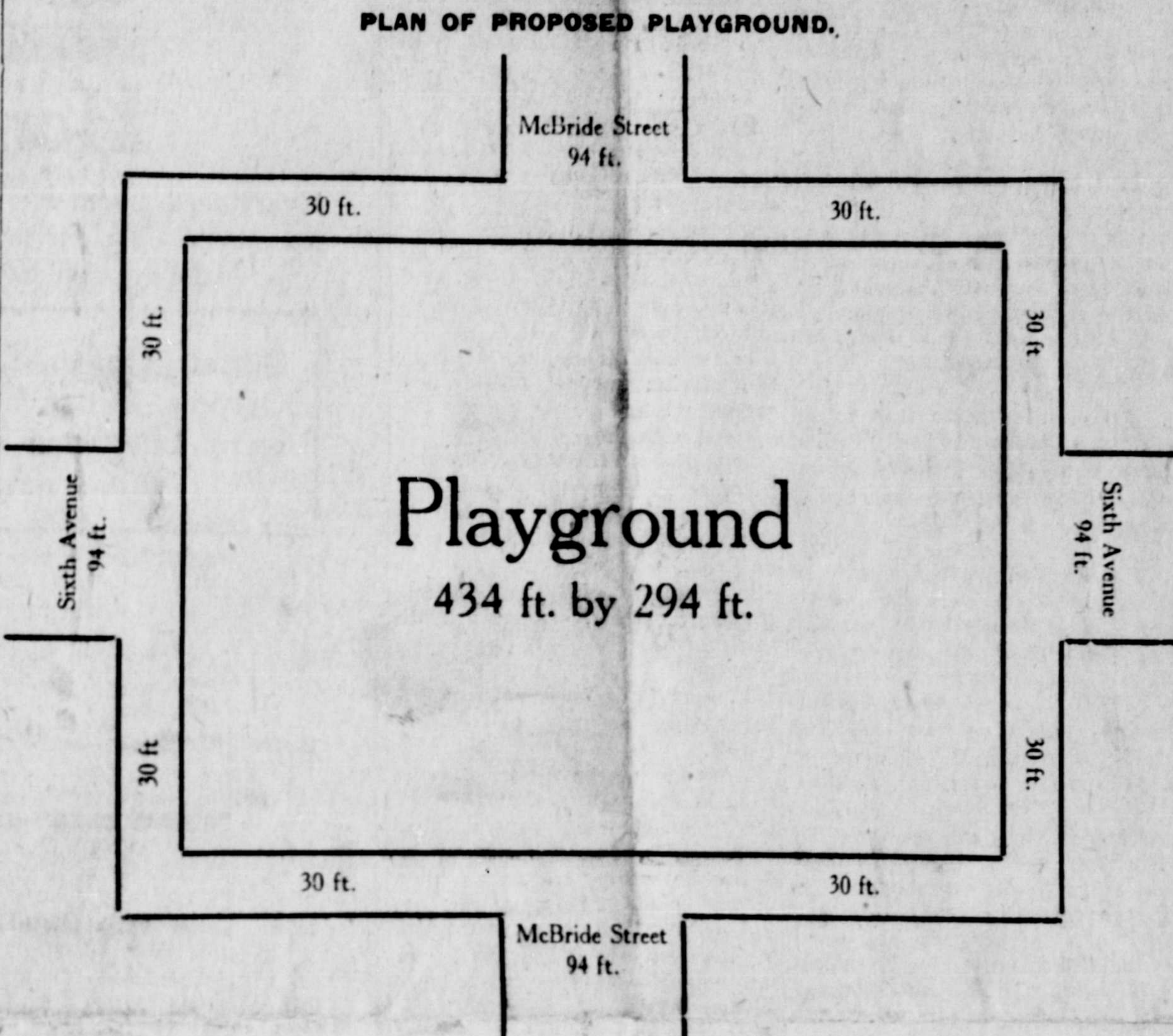

Airplane Fisheries Patrol to be Extended this Year and two Machines Expected to Operate

VANCOUVER, March 19.—Major Earl Godfrey, squadron leader of the Vancouver unit of the Canadian Air Force, wired from Ottawa, where he has been attending a conference of airman, that plans for the extension of the patrol service in the Prince Rupert district have been approved.

Last year there was one plane used in this district and it was very successful, although it suffered somewhat from being away from its base too long. The despatch today seems to indicate that there will be two machines here this year and one machine at least should be a better one than the one that operated last season. Conditions here have changed since last season. Gas boats are to be allowed to operate on the Skeena and Naas rivers and Indians will take out seining li-

Government Sustained by Huge Majority with Conservatives Isolated

OTTAWA, March 19.—By the biggest majority in the memory of parliamentary old timers, 121 votes to the good, the government of Right Hon. William Lyon Mackenzie King was sustained early this morning in the first division of the present session at Ottawa. The vote was taken on an amendment moved by a Conservative and which technically would have been an expression of want of confidence in the administration if it had been carried. It was voted down by the combined forces of the Liberal, Progressive, Labor and Independent members, the government getting 167 against 46 for the opposition. None but Conservatives supported the amendment.

BRITISH OFFICER KILLED IN AMBUSH NEAR AFGHANISTAN

PESHAWAR, British India, March 19.—A British officer and two Indian soldiers were killed and six wounded in an ambush near the Afghan border. The casualties of the attackers is unknown.

First Contingent of Boys Reach Winnipeg and go out to Farms Adults and Families Coming

WINNIPEG, March 19.—The first large contingent of teen age boys, brought from Great Britain under the Salvation Army plan of settlement of future farmers in this Dominion, reached Winnipeg early last evening over the Canadian National Railways and will be distributed from here to farm homes in the West, chiefly in the province of Manitoba, where they are to learn Canadian methods. The party which numbered 60 boys and girls, on landing at Halifax from the S.S. Regina, had been reduced to 28 boys, by the time Winnipeg was reached, the remainder having been destined for Ottawa, Toronto and other points en route to the west. The majority of these reaching Winnipeg tonight are to go to the Brandon district with a number going also to Killarney, Manitoba.

Boys Excited
On arrival here, the youngsters, whose ages range from 15 to 19 years, were all excited over the sights they had seen and the experience they had enjoyed since reaching Canada. They were chiefly English boys, with here and there one who spoke with a broad Scottish accent. They were all eager to know on their arrival if the Canadian farms were all that had been described to them and "if this was winter out here."

The party travelled from England in charge of Col. Will Thompson of the Salvation Army and after spending the night at the hotel here are being sent further westward today and Thursday.

A second large party of teen age boys and girls being brought to Canada by the Salvation Army will sail for Canada about the end of the month, the majority of the boys and girls in this case also coming to the prairie provinces.

Other Immigrants
In the immigration party reaching Winnipeg last night were also some 160 other immigrants, chiefly from the British Isles and destined for various points in the three western provinces.

A second large party to arrive later in the evening on the Continental Limited from Halifax and Montreal, and a further large contingent of immigrants numbering over 260 from the S.S. Lithuania and Ausonia left via the Canadian National early yesterday morning for Winnipeg, where they are due on Thursday morning by special train.

Continuous Flow
That the west may look for a continuous flow of immigrants through the efforts of the Canadian National Railways overseas colonization plan, which is being carried out under the direction of Dr. W. J. Black, is evident from the receipt of information at the Winnipeg offices of the company this afternoon that agreements have been signed whereby the British government will provide advances to assist in the group settlement in western Canada of 500 British families, who are to be brought to this country during the next few weeks and settled on farms under plans whereby the new comers will be encouraged to take up farming amongst their own friends and thus avoid the feeling of isolation which so often hampers the progress of the new settlers.

Finding Employment
For the majority of the adult immigrants reaching Canada so far, farm work has been waiting and the free employment service organized by the Canadian National Railways department of colonization has resulted in most

ROUND WORLD BY AEROPLANE

British Flight to Commence on Tuesday From England to France

LONDON, March 19.—The British flight round the world will be started next Tuesday when three aviators, headed by Squadron Commander Stuart McLaren, will hop off from Calshot, Southampton, and will make the first stop at Lyons, France.

The route for the flight as planned includes India, China, Japan, and up the coast to Kamchatka, the Aleutian Islands, Alaska, Prince Rupert, Edmonton, and passing north of Winnipeg to Ottawa.

JAPANESE SUB. STAYING DOWN

Four Officers Rescued But 39 Remain Under 26 Fathoms of Water

SASEBO, Japan, March 19.—Submarine Number 43 of the Japanese navy collided with the warship Tatsuta outside Sasebo Harbor and sank in 26 fathoms of water. Four officers of the forty men aboard have been rescued and the work is proceeding.

Survey Commenced On The Road.

The commencement of the actual survey of the road out of the city in an easterly direction is the first step in the work of construction, which it is promised will commence soon. The first thing is to get the road located and the levels established.

Round World Fliers Will Start Soon.

It has been officially announced that the round the world fliers, both British and American, will start about the end of this month. Just now the American fliers are making their way from California, where the machines were constructed, to the point of departure at Seattle, and enthusiastic newspapermen have stated that they had commenced their round the world flight. They are due here about April 1 or within a few days of that, everything depending on the weather conditions.

The British flight takes place in the opposite direction from England and it will be interesting to note the progress of the two parties and the relative distances they cover. It will be a race for which shall finish first. While the Americans will have four machines the British will have only one so that the advantage lies with the Yankees.

Pricking Bubbles Is Favorite Sport.

A favorite sport in Victoria today is pricking bubbles. The P.G.E. charges are the bubbles and all have gone off in thin air so far. The latest in which the sub-contractor admitted he had been mistaken when he laid the charges is an example of what is happening. This is the sort of thing on which the new party flourished and which is now knocking it over backwards. It will take a lot of McRae and corporation money and talk to get the Provincials back into a position where they can hope to be a factor in the fall elections unless they have something up their sleeve of which we have not yet heard.

Shall We Be Able To Hear Thoughts?

The Nelson News in a recent editorial says: Whether or not thought produces waves which can be caught on the antennae of radio receiving sets and so made audible at a distance—that, of course, is a matter of fact, not of opinion, and the question is to be decided by experiment and not on presumptions. The investigations which have been made recently in Chicago are to be taken seriously because of the quality of the men engaged in them, and, while the results so far achieved seem small and vague, if these investigators think them of some importance they cannot be dismissed hastily.

EVENING SUN COMMENT PRINCE RUPERT HARBOR RECENT HERRING RUN

Under the caption, "The Return of the Herring," the Vancouver Evening Sun mentions the case of Prince Rupert editorially as follows:

There is a lot to learn about the coming and going of the great shoals of fish. For many years the Grimshy men used to put out to certain banks in the North Sea. Then, all at once, the marine harvest failed them there and had to be sought in distant waters.

Scientists investigated and theorized. Something had happened to the plankton, the minute organisms on which the fish feed, and that in its turn was due to a slight change of temperature in the water itself, caused by a trifling deflection of the Gulf Stream.

It may have been so, but nothing very definite was established.

And now we have the herring back in Prince Rupert harbor after an absence of years. Time was when the shoals were so dense, both there and in Nanaimo harbor, where also they are no longer plentiful, that they could be scooped into a boat with an implement something like a large garden rake.

Have the shoals been depleted by excessive fishing or have the herring found more attractive feeding grounds elsewhere? Here is a subject for an inquiry of real importance.

JURY DISAGREE DELORME TRIAL

Second Attempt to Convict Priest of Murder at Montreal Falls

MONTREAL, March 19.—The second trial of Abbe Adelaire Delorme on a charge of murdering his half brother, Raoul, ended this morning in the disagreement of the jury after deliberating all night.

The jury was discharged and the court adjourned until tomorrow morning to permit crown officials to confer regarding their future action.

Raoul Delorme was murdered on the night of January 6, 1922, his body being found in the suburbs riddled with six bullet wounds. His half brother, the Abbe, was arrested and declared insane. Then he was said to have recovered and was put on trial and the jury disagreed. The trial just finished was the second. Both occupied a good deal of time and caused great interest, not only because of the circumstances attending the crime but also from the fact that the man charged with the crime was in holy orders.

ANOTHER TRIAL OF ESKIMO IN ARCTIC

Judge Dubuc to Visit Far North and Try Man at Mouth of Mackenzie River

EDMONTON, March 19. — Another trial of Arctic coast natives will take place in the far north this coming summer, and, as previously Judge Dubuc will make the long trip via the river steamers to carry justice of the white man to the Eskimo peoples. The native in this instance—as last year—is accused of murder, and he has been in the hands of the mounted police for more than a year. He was taken by boat last season from the Royal Canadian Mounted Police post on Coronation Gulf to Herschel Island to be tried, but owing to the little vessel being held up in the ice the island was reached too late for the trial of the prisoner, as by that time Ahikomiak and Tatamagama had been sentenced to death and Judge Dubuc had left for the "outside." Since that time the Eskimo has been held by the guardians of the North at Herschel Island, awaiting justice.

ALBERTA FARMERS CONTINUE SYSTEM ELECTION DEPOSIT

EDMONTON, March 19. — The principle of candidates making cash election deposits will be continued in the provincial elections in the future, according to an amendment to the election bill by A. L. Saunders, farmer, Stettler, which was passed in the committee of the whole in the Legislature by a vote of twenty-one to twenty.

Besides making a deposit, candidates will be required to have twenty-five signatures on their nomination papers. Under the old system, only four signatures were required, and the deposit was \$100. Although the principle of an election deposit had been adopted, no definite amount has been stipulated. When the clause amending the election bill in this respect is brought down for discussion, some definite sum probably will be fixed.

ALL THAT IS LEFT OF WOMAN IS PETTICOAT

That is What Lecturer Says of One Who Enters Race Against Man

EDMONTON, March 19. — Declaring that woman was "set by her Creator for one task, and one only," and that she is not fitted (today for the physical demands of parenthood, Dr. H. Burton Logie, in an address on "The Prevention of Nervous Diseases in Children," created a distinct sensation when he supplemented his statements with the assertion: "When one sees her enter the race against another sex, one feels that all that is left of her is her petticoat!"

Asserting that woman's savage progenitor has instincts which "were not so distorted that sex was but a plaything," Dr. Logie said that if the prehistoric female did not recognize a child as a "Heaven-sent responsibility, she at least did not receive it into limorous and rebellious arms."

TREASURE IN ANCIENT HOUSE

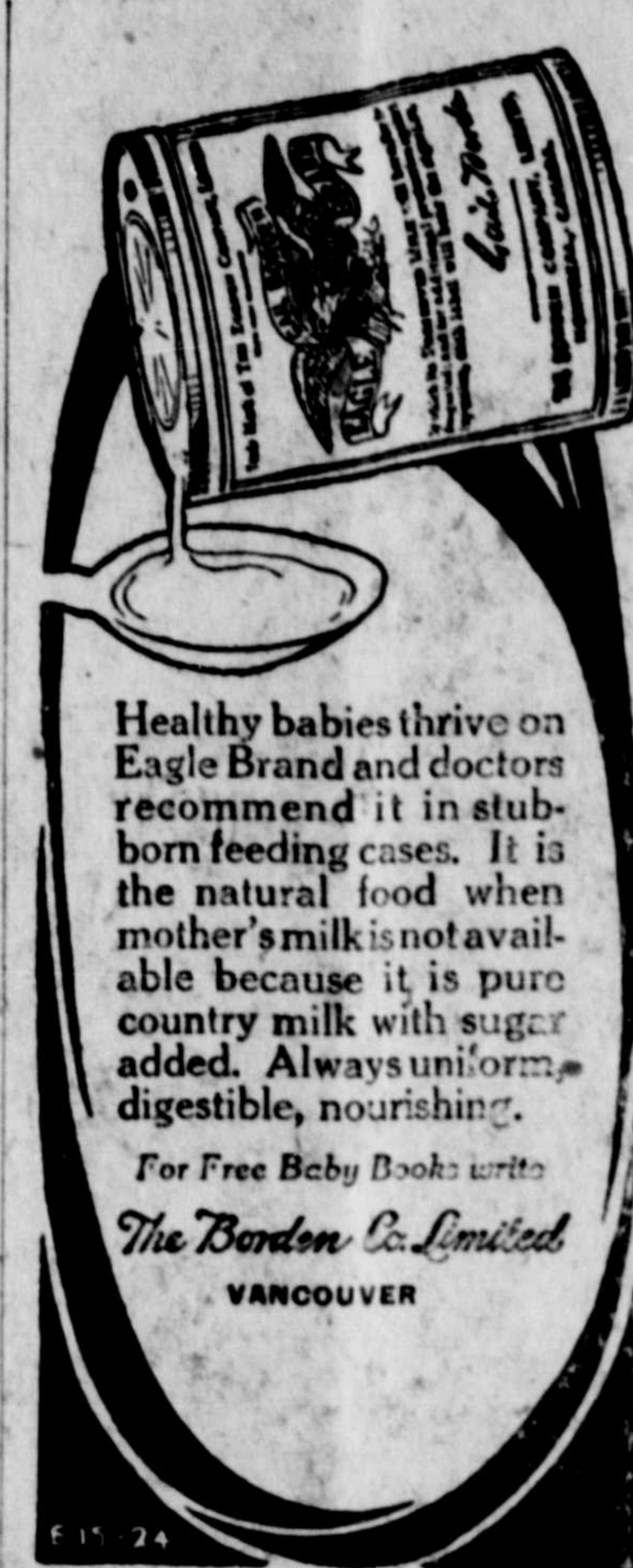
Gold Valued at \$100,000 in Walls of Residence of Deceased Banker

ANN ARBOR, Mich., March 19.—Shades of the past startled Ann Arbor with the discovery of gold coin believed to be worth \$100,000, a bundle of paper money worth \$700 and skeleton of a baby in three wall pockets as wreckers tore down the pioneer home of Jackson D. Knight, one-time president of the First National Bank.

Lever said the box of gold coin was all that one of his workmen could carry. The weather beaten old home has stood a little way back from the road for more than sixty years. Careful recollections of city old-timers say it was built in 1860 by Knight himself.

The box of gold also contained, it is said, papers on which brief notations showed deposits had been made in 1860 and in 1876. The box itself had weathered the years in fairly good condition.

The \$700 in currency was found when a workman, tearing away the ruins, kicked his foot through a faded piece of cloth. In another partition pocket the baby's skeleton wrapped in a burlap sack was found.

SHOT AN INDIAN AT ALASKAN FOX RANCH

Supposed Poacher Killed With the Goods on Him at Sisters Island, Pybus Bay

JUNEAU, March 19.—An unknown Indian, alleged to be a fox poacher, armed with a rifle, was shot and killed on Sisters Island, Pybus Bay, while attempting to take cover and stand off the rancher, caretaker and three companions, according to telegraphic advices received at local headquarters of the Southeastern Alaska Blue Fox Farmers' Association.

Haynes and three companions, all of them armed with rifles, it was stated in the information received by the association, discovered the Indian near his tent. He had a rifle in one hand and a fox in the other. Haynes ordered the Indian to drop his gun.

The Indian refused and immediately jumped to get behind his tent, carrying his gun with him. As he reached shelter of the tent, Haynes fired, dropping the Indian. The caretaker and his companions reported the shooting to Petersburg authorities.

SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENTS

PRE-EMPTIONS Vacant, unreserved, surveyed Crown lands may be pre-empted by British subjects over 18 years of age, and by aliens on declaring intention to become British subjects, conditional upon residence, occupation, and improvement for agricultural purposes.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes, and which is not timberland, i.e. carrying over 5,000 board feet per acre west of the Coast Range and 3,000 feet per acre east of that range.

Applications for pre-emptions are to be addressed to the Land Commissioner of the Land Recording Division, in which the land applied for is situated, and are made on printed forms, copies of which can be obtained from the Land Commissioner.

Pre-emptions must be occupied for five years and improvements made to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivating at least five acres, before a Crown Grant can be received.

For more detailed information see the Bulletin "How to Pre-empt Land." PURCHASE Applications are received for purchase of vacant and unreserved Crown lands, not being timberland, for agricultural purposes.

Minimum price of first-class (arable) land is \$5 per acre, and second-class (grazing) land, \$2.50 per acre. Further information regarding purchase or lease of Crown lands is given in Bulletin No. 10, Land Series, "Purchase and Lease of Crown Lands."

Mill, factory, or industrial sites on timber land, not exceeding 40 acres, may be purchased or leased, the conditions including payment of stumpage.

LEASES For grazing and industrial purposes areas not exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or a company.

Under the Grazing Act the Province is divided into grazing districts and the range administered under a Grazing Commissioner. Annual grazing permits are issued based on numbers ranged, priority being given to established owners.

OAK BAY WILL TAX IMPROVEMENTS TO EXTENT OF 25 P.C.

General Tax Will be 36.4 Mills But Without Improvements Would be 55 Mills

VICTORIA, March 19.—Oak Bay will have a mill rate of 36.4 mills and a 25 per cent tax on improvements, if the decisions of the estimates committee of the council, which consists of the entire council, is put into effect.

The Oak Bay Council finds itself faced with having to either have a land tax of 55 mills or place a place a tax of 25 per cent on improved properties in the locality.

Two features of the plans arranged in relation to the present tax situation in Oak Bay are that the taxes on land will not be any larger than last year, while the 25 per cent improvement tax is a compromise between the views of a number of owners of big portions of vacant lands, who urged a tax of 50 per cent on improvements, and the body of people who were totally against any change from the system of single tax, which is in vogue in the municipality at the present time.

Another feature of the affair is the fact that the six councillors who sit on the present Oak Bay council were elected to office at the municipal elections last January on a single-tax platform. They now find it impossible to levy a land tax of 55 mills, and must support the imposition of an improvement tax. It would not be surprising if the 1924 councillors, placed their reasons for not carrying out their mandate from the electorate to a final conclusion before the ratepayers at a public meeting held in the near future.
