TEAPOT OIL SCANDAL WORRIES AMERICANS

H. G. PERRY OF PRINCE GEORGE URGES BUILDING RAILWAY THROUGH B.C.

Refusal to Grant Lease to Secretary of Navy Ties up Alaskan Coal

WASHINGTON, Feb. 15.—Former Secretary Fall and Secretary Denby it was declared in a letter laid before President Coolidge by John Blaine, the Alaskan railroadman, had entered into negotiations in 1921 for the transfer and lease of the rich Matanuska coal reserves in Alaska along the same lines as was followed later in the Teapot Dome oil reserves. The Alaskan agreement was not executed, but Blaine said the navy had since refused to permit the use of Alaskan coal by the navy.

MOSES RETURNS FROM ARCTIC

Accompanied Sergeant Thorne to Herschell Island But Left Before Executions

DAWSON, Feb. 15.—The first news in months from Arctic coast points was received by Royal Canadian Mounted Police and Bishop Stringer of the Anglican Church when Peter Moses, an Indian, arrived at Crow River post on the Porcupine River from Herschell Island.

Moses was the guide for Sergeant Thorne, the mounted policeman from Fort Yukon, who went to Herschell Island early in the winter when Thorne crossed Alaska and Yukon territory with the death warrant of execution for the Eskimos condemned to death. Both arrived at Herschell Island after a hard trip. Moses, however, started back before the execution and had no word of it.

ROBBED BANK OF MONTREAL

Four Masked Men Locked Officials in Vault and Rifled Teller's Cage

MONTREAL, Feb. 15.—Cote de Neiges branch of the Bank of Montreal was held up by four masked bandits and robbed of \$2,000. The men entered the building just before closing time, marched the officials at the point of a revolver into the vault and locked them in and then collected all the cash in the teller's cage and made off.

BULKLEY FARMERS ARE DISCUSSING CONDITIONS

Meeting This Afternoon at Round Lake to Talk Marketing and Other Matters

TELKWA, Feb. 15.—This afternoon farmers of the Bulkley Valley and others having to do directly or indirectly with the farming industry are meeting at Round Lake Hall to consider ways and means of improving the condition of the farmers in the valley. One of the important subjects to be discussed will be the marketing of the product of the farm and it is possible that some co-operative plan will be formulated.

OTTAWA, Feb. 15.—D. J. McDougal of Toronto has been appointed to the directorate of the C.N.R., succeeding R. P. Gough, the well known businessman.

DORY FOUND UPSIDE DOWN NEAR CANNERY

Provincial Police Leave to Investigate if This Was Boat Used by Missing Man

The provincial police received a message from the Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Co. this afternoon to the effect that a dory had been found floating upside down by the watchman at the Prince Rupert Cannery, Chief Spiller and Constable Saint left this afternoon for the head of the inlet to investigate. It is feared that this is the dory that was used by Fred Blondel of Seal Cove who has been missing since last Monday when he left the cold storage plant to cross the harbor.

SIR HENRY LEAVES SUNDAY FOR WINNIPEG

WINNIPEG, Feb. 15.—Announcement is made today by the Canadian National Railways here that Sir Henry W. Thornton, chairman and president of the system, is leaving Montreal Sunday night for Winnipeg to spend a few days in his office here, meeting western delegations and attending to matters of policy in connection with this region.

FRENCH GOVERNMENT IS AGAIN SUSTAINED

PARIS, Feb. 15.—The government was sustained this morning on the question of confidence when another lottery loan scheme intended to improve France's finances was rejected by 330 to 242.

STEAMER AMUR IS STILL ON ROCKS

Salvage Boat Tees Arrived in Port From White Cliff Island For Supplies and Water

Pacific Salvage Co.'s steamer Tees, Capt. Hewison, came in at noon from White Cliff Island, bringing word that the Coastwise Steamship & Barge Co.'s steamer Amur is still sitting on the rocks, attempts to float her having so far been unsuccessful. The work of lightening the Amur is continuing and, shortly after the Tees arrived, the Marmion came in towing a scow containing that portion of the Amur's cargo which has already been taken off. The Tees is here for supplies and water and will return to the Amur at once. It is now expected that the stranded vessel will be freed tomorrow on the high tide.

LUXOR, Feb. 15.—Howard Carter presented himself at Tutenkhamen's tomb today and was refused admission by the chief of police, who presented a written order to that effect from the Egyptian government.

CREW OF SKANDIA GOT \$800 EACH ON RECENT LONG TRIP

The American fishing schooner Skandia, Capt. O. O. Ivaldum, a fifteen man boat, made a record for the largest gross stock of any individual vessel to arrive at the port of Prince Rupert when she unloaded 120,380 pounds of halibut on Tuesday morning. This was in addition to a considerable deck load which was discharged at Ketchikan on the trip south.

The total gross proceeds from the catch was approximately \$16,450. Deducing a fifth share for the boat and taking the expenses of the trip at \$1,160, this would leave a balance of \$12,000 to be divided between the crew of fifteen men or a total of \$800 per man. The catch was secured on the Portloch fishing banks and the vessel was away from port about four weeks.

Perry Urges Building of Railway to Peace River from a British Columbia Point Instead of Brule

Urging that Prince Rupert use its utmost endeavor to have the branch railway of the Canadian National built through British Columbia rather than from Brule through Alberta and presenting good reasons therefore, H. G. Perry, member of the Legislature for Fort George riding, yesterday addressed the Rotary Club of Prince Rupert most convincingly and eloquently. His great point was that by way of a railway from Peace River to Prince George and on to Prince Rupert grain could reach tidewater in 745 miles with a good water grade whereas to Vancouver by Brule the distance would be 812. By taking the B.C. route a good country would be developed and the haul would be an easy one and it would tap the centre of the Peace River Block of Dominion Government lands.

Mr. Perry is not insisting that the railway should come out by Prince George but that it take a route which will bring it out in British Columbia instead of Alberta and thus avoid the bad grades.

The visitor opened by mentioning that Prince George and Prince Rupert were born and cradled at the same time of the same parents. They had gone through similar trials and in each city there was a large body of men that still had faith and confidence in regard to the future. They realized the wonderful resources of the country and realized that these must be developed.

Vital to Rupert

The question of transportation, he claimed, was more vital to Prince Rupert even than to Prince George. The port was dependent largely on the development of central and northern B.C.

Here was a country in the Peace River rich in resources which had been known for 100 years but only since 1888 was it considered seriously. In that year the Senate instituted an inquiry into the possibilities of the country and surveyors went through with a view to locating a railway. If the G.P.R. had decided to come this way he opined that the country would have been thickly populated years ago. Professor Dawson had reported that there were 15,000,000 acres of land in the district that could be cultivated and this would produce 400,000,000 bushels of grain each year. It was found later that this estimate was low. There were also

School Estimates for Year are Three Thousand Dollars less than Last: Play Sheds Provided for

Estimates for the year totalling \$84,242 were finally adopted by the school board after lengthy discussion which lasted till a few minutes before midnight last night. This total provides for \$76,092 ordinary expenditure and \$8,150 extraordinary. It is \$3,253 less than last year's total estimate of \$87,495 when \$76,495 was put in for ordinary expenditure and \$11,000 for extraordinary.

Contrary to what seemed to have been the general expectation, the matter of salaries was not even discussed by the board and the schedule of last year was again used in compiling the estimates. There will be a reduction of some \$3,000 in the payroll as compared with last year, however, caused by several teachers of many years' service having left and being replaced by successors commencing at a lower point on the salary schedule.

The ordinary estimates having been almost completed last week, it remained for the board to decide on only a few outstanding points.

Inclusion of an estimate for technical education was discussed at length resulting in the decision to set aside \$500 for this purpose. The trustees were in favor of making provision along this line but there seemed to be some doubt as to how such classes would be patronized. Finally it was decided that committee should be appointed to investigate and report. Trustees Williams and Orme were named the committee by the chair. As it was felt that such classes would not be opened until the fall term, anyway, \$500 was considered an adequate amount to place in the estimates. This will be increased by financial assistance provided by the department for technical education.

The question of estimates necessary for the repairs of various schools was taken up. There was a report from John S. Nelson indicating that reshingling of the King Edward High School was an immediate necessity. Accordingly \$700 was decided upon for this purpose and additional sums of \$500, \$50 and \$360 were put in for new blackboards, blinds and seats respectively, making a total for the school of \$1610. An estimate of \$900 for painting, kalsomining, repairing the roof and providing blackboards and blinds for Borden Street School was accepted.

To further ascertain what was the trouble with Booth Memorial School a sum of \$500 was set aside and Seal Cove and Westview schools were allowed \$250 and \$100 respectively for repair purposes. The total estimate for repairs was \$3,360.

The most important item in the total estimate of \$84,242 for extraordinary expenditure was \$1,000 to provide playsheds at both King Edward and Borden Street schools. These sheds, it is estimated, will each cost \$2,000. Trustees Orme and Williams were both strongly in favor of providing the playsheds. Trustee Rochester thought that \$4,000 was too much to put in the estimates for this purpose and was of the opinion that one shed was as far as the board should go this year. Finally it was moved by Trustee Orme and seconded by Trustee Casey that an estimate of \$4,000 providing for the two be made. The motion carried unanimously.

The balance of the extraordinary estimate was made up of \$3,500 for legal contingencies, \$500 for the Booth school playground and \$150 for Borden Street grounds.

HUMANE POLICY REGARDING WAR

British Government Will Not Depend Upon Military But on Reasonableness

LONDON, Feb. 15.—Speaking in the House of Commons on national defense Premier Macdonald declared that the government was inquiring into the whole problem from the humane viewpoint of preventing war conditions and that in bargaining with foreign powers they would not depend upon military forces but upon a reasonable policy.

INDIANS AGAIN INVADE OTTAWA

Object to Adoption of Report of Royal Commission on Indian Affairs

OTTAWA, Feb. 15.—A deputation from the allied Indian tribes of British Columbia are here to interview the government in regard to the matter of Indian rights in that province. They said that the report has reached British Columbia that the government would pass an order in council adopting the report of the Royal Commission on Indian Affairs in British Columbia. This committee was appointed in 1913 and spent several years investigating conditions, but the Indians consider their report unfavorable and claim that land rights are not clearly defined and the amount of compensation to be awarded is not definitely fixed.

PRESBYTERIANS ASK UNION BE DEFERRED UNTIL VOTE IS TAKEN

VICTORIA, Feb. 15.—A mass meeting of Presbyterians passed a resolution urging the Dominion government and the legislature to refrain from enacting Church Union bills or defer action until the membership of the church had an opportunity of expressing its untrammelled judgment in regard to the matter.

THREE OLD TIMERS OF KLONDIKE ARE DEAD

DAWSON, Feb. 15.—Three old time Klondikers died this week. They are Otto Paulson, a well known Bonanza Creek miner; Peter Olson, rancher and stockman at Pelly Farm near Selkirk, and "Old Spirit" Girard of Forty Mile post.

DOCKERS GO ON STRIKE

Negotiations Failed This Evening and Men Go Out Tomorrow

LONDON, Feb. 15.—Negotiations for the settlement of the dispute between the dock workers and their employers over the question of wages collapsed this Friday evening and the strike is scheduled to commence tomorrow.

VANDERLIP AND OIL INTERESTS

Millionaire Says He Mentioned Harding's Paper to Clear Name of Dead President

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 15.—Frank A. Vanderlip told the Senate oil committee today that he had no facts whatever to go on when he recently brought the name of President Harding into the oil scandal. His recent speech asking for an inquiry into the sale of Mr. Harding's Marion Star, he declared, was made because he wanted to call attention to current rumors so as to stop them. "I was a life long friend of President Harding and wanted to clear his memory," he stated. He had never heard any intimation that money paid for the Star came from the oil interests.

Ship Grain From Canadian Ports.

In all the talk about shipping grain westward instead of eastward, there has been little mention made of the development of Canadian ports as against American. Halifax is asking that grain be shipped through that port rather than through Portland, Maine, but the cost of hauling the grain to Halifax is excessive compared with the cost of taking it to Portland. Also the Canadian National Railway has a line to Portland and the business is handled largely by a Canadian road making profits for the Canadian people.

The case of Prince Rupert and Vancouver is different. Grain from Alberta and Saskatchewan can be shipped to these ports much more easily than it can be taken to an Atlantic port and at the same time Canadian ports are being developed, Canadian workmen encouraged and Canada as a whole is being benefited.

Give Canada Benefit Whenever Possible.

When it is possible to do so Canada should be given the preference. Ketchikan is always trying to get laws enacted to give her the preference and to put an embargo on Prince Rupert. That is because Prince Rupert has all the natural advantages. By putting an embargo on this port the people of the United States, the consumers, are the ones who pay the extra cost of the products imported.

We are not asking for anything so foolish as the Ketchikan people ask. What we want is an even break with the American cities and we can then hold our own. Let the rates, mile for mile westward be equal to those eastward and we can compete on an even basis with any port. That is all we ask. By giving the Pacific coast ports that fair treatment they can then rustle for business and if they get it no one can grumble. The shipper of grain from the prairies is benefited and the consumer also shares in the benefits.

Why Place Embargo To Build American Port?

Why should the railways of Canada place an embargo on the Pacific route and thus build up American ports. Grain is now being shipped to American ports from the prairies, getting a better rate, mile for mile than is given shipments to Vancouver and Prince Rupert. This, we claim is unfair, unbusinesslike and unpatriotic. "Canada for the Canadians," wherever possible, is a good motto.

Winnipeg is opposing the giving of the Pacific coast a fair deal because at the present time Winnipeg is the grain market of the prairies and it fears that this market will be shifted to Edmonton and Calgary if the grain comes west. Winnipeg is willing for the sake of benefiting itself financially to continue the unjust impost on the Pacific coast. It is purely a matter of financial interests. Winnipeg is also leading a movement against expenditures. That is to prevent the west being built up, to prevent elevators coming here, to prevent harbor works at Vancouver, to prevent new expenditures as much as possible.

Edmonton Stands To Develop With Us.

If Prince Rupert becomes a great grain shipping port, Edmonton will become a great grain market. The interests of the Pacific coast and Edmonton are closely associated. Each stands to gain from the progress of the other. Prince Rupert must look more and more to Edmonton in a business way. The people of one city should get to know the people of the other. With a common interest we can well get together to enforce our just demands.

DAWSON BOOSTS PRINCE RUPERT

Tells People of Edmonton What Advantages This Port Has For Grain Shipments

The time is not far distant when half of all the wheat shipped from the prairie provinces will be exported by the Pacific coast ports is the prediction of F. G. Dawson of Prince Rupert, a director of the Canadian National Railway, who was in the city Saturday, says the Edmonton Journal. Mr. Dawson arrived on the Prince Rupert train in the afternoon and left again Sunday morning by the Continental Limited to attend a meeting of the board of directors in Montreal on Thursday.

Prince Rupert, says Mr. Dawson, expects to share in the western coast grain business with Vancouver and energetic efforts are being made to secure the establishment of grain elevators at that city. On his visit east this week he will take up this matter with the federal government.

Special Advantages

Mr. Dawson is a strong booster for Prince Rupert as a western grain export port and as some of its special advantages along this line he instances the following: Deep water along entire waterfront, no dredging necessary. Much shorter pilotage distance than other Pacific coast ports. No privately owned waterfront. The C.N.R. owns 10 miles of waterfront, and one mile is owned by government of British Columbia. This obviates the possibility of exorbitant charges for real estate required for elevators and associated industries.

C.N.R. operates over its own road right into Prince Rupert and thus does not have to pay tolls to any other railway as it does on cars taken into Vancouver. C.N.R. has already over five miles of trackage on the waterfront.

Better Grade

Grain rates from Alberta points to Prince Rupert are the same as to Vancouver. While the distance is a little longer it is fully made up by better grade and other advantages. Saving of several hundred miles in the distance to Oriental ports. While the distance from Prince Rupert to the United Kingdom by Panama Canal is greater than from Vancouver, Mr. Dawson said existing freight rates are the same from both ports and he had no doubt this would apply to grain once a grain movement has been started.

The saving in pilotage and other charges would offset to the vessel owners the longer time that would be required for the trip from Prince Rupert to the United Kingdom.

Ten Years Ago In Prince Rupert

The following motion has been placed upon the city council notice board and will be voted upon tomorrow night: "That no portion of the hydro-electric undertaking be proceeded with until the city engineer and superintendent of utilities submit estimates, plans and specifications and same are filed with the city clerk according to by-law."

GREAT ACHIEVEMENT CANADIAN NATIONAL RADIOPHONE SERVICE

Speaker in Telephone at Winnipeg Broadcasted From Calgary and Heard Everywhere

WINNIPEG, Feb. 15.—A radio experiment conducted in connection with the Canadian National Railways program broadcast from Calgary whereby a message by long distance from Winnipeg was broadcasted at Calgary proved a distinct success. The talk from here was heard simultaneously over the radio in Winnipeg and as far west as Victoria, Nanaimo and Portland, Oregon, and was picked up at many intervening points and by the Canadian National westbound transcontinental train at Kamloops.

While general passenger agent Osborne Scott of Winnipeg was speaking over the telephone to Calgary general baggage agent Harry J. Spence also in Winnipeg was listening to Mr. Scott's message from Calgary over his radio.

Many phone calls from local radio fans told Mr. Scott how clearly his voice had been heard from Calgary and one Winnipeg fan asked him to listen over the phone to his loud speaker a few moments. What Mr. Scott heard very distinctly was himself being addressed by the broadcaster at Calgary saying that they had had forty acknowledgments by wire and telephone within twenty minutes after Mr. Scott's talk from all parts of the West. Also expressing Calgary's appreciation of 595 winter carnival and wishing the same success for the Winnipeg winter sports week.

This achievement marks a distinct step in the combined use of the radio and long distance telephone and is the most remote broadcast ever made, the distance between Winnipeg and Calgary covered by the telephone being between eight and nine hundred miles.

STANDARD PASSENGER TRAIN EQUIPMENT IS ORDERED BY RAILWAY

Prospective Business Causes Preparation to be Made by Securing More Cars

MONTREAL, Feb. 15.—Orders for 45 new pieces of standard passenger train equipment have been placed by the C.N.R. Railways with firms in Montreal and Hamilton, Ontario. Work has commenced on the new cars and delivery of them will be made in time to place the equipment in service to take care of the heavy traffic which is expected during the coming summer. Orders for 24 cars have been placed with the Canadian Car and Foundry Company, Montreal. This order calls for the building of 10 first class passenger cars, 10 second class passenger cars and 4 compartment cars, orders for 11 cars have been placed with the National Steel Corporation at Hamilton, Ontario. This order calls for the building of seven baggage cars and four baggage smoking cars. The later cars are divided into two sections, the rear half for smoking and the front for baggage.

PREMIER CO. IS SUING TRANSPORTATION FIRM

Claim of \$17,600 Entered in Supreme Court at Vancouver For Loss of Ore From Barge

The Premier Gold Mining Co. Ltd. is suing the Coastwise Steamship & Barge Co. in the Supreme Court at Vancouver for \$17,600 alleged to be the value of a cargo of gold and silver crude ore which was lost from a barge between Stewart and Anyox about two years ago. The plaintiff contends that the scow was unseaworthy and the defense argues that transportation was at the plaintiff's risk and that any unseaworthiness was caused by loading.

The case is now in progress and several witnesses from Stewart are being heard.

POLICE POLICY IS DISCUSSED

New Commissioner Takes Lively Interest in Affairs and Approves Methods

GOOD CONDITION OF CITY

Matters of general policy were discussed at length by the city police commission yesterday afternoon. The new commissioner, W. H. Montgomery, had several inquiries to make and also some suggestions.

Mayor Newton said that last year's commission had made special efforts to rid the downtown sections of the city of women bootleggers. As far as the government liquor act had been concerned, the city had endeavored to keep down glaring infractions but there had been an inclination to let the government step in itself if it was not satisfied.

Commissioner Montgomery endorsed the policy of a segregated area. The city seemed to be in better condition now than it had been although this was possibly due in a measure to the quiet times prevailing. A close tab should be kept on things, however. Bootleggers had no business in the city and could not operate, he thought, if the police knew about them and at least kept them on the run. It was better to get rid of the bootleggers than secure convictions against them, he thought.

Had Been Urged

Mayor Newton said the police had been urged along such lines and had met with a measure of success.

The matter of stool pigeons was discussed. On principle Commissioner Montgomery said he was opposed to using them unless it became absolutely necessary to do so in the effort to overcome evil. Mayor Newton replied that the city had not been obliged to engage detectives last year through the activities of the provincial government along that line in the fall.

City Solicitor Jones expressed the opinion that from the standpoint of crime the city was in a good condition. If it had a bad name, it was due to the politicians he said in reply to a remark of Commissioner Montgomery's.

The new club regulations were referred to but there seemed to be a lack of definite information on them although it was the general opinion that the city had little more to do with them than from a straight matter of policing.

Protecting Minors

Mayor Newton said that an effort had been made to keep minors out of billiard halls and such places last year. There was no reason for complaint now. Commissioner Montgomery stressed the importance of making the streets safe for women and children.

Commissioner Montgomery brought up the matter of waterfront patrol and Chief Vickers stated that this could be done by extending the present beats of the officers.

DEPARTMENT READS ACT TO BOARD ON RECENT DECISION

No Beginners Will be Taken in School this February but Next Year

A letter from S. J. Willis, superintendent of education, pointing out that the school act made it compulsory for school boards to provide accommodation for all children in the municipality between the ages of 6 and 16 was received and filed at last night's board meeting. The letter, which came as a result of a citizen making a complaint to the department of the board's recent decision to not admit beginners in February, also stated that it was customary to take beginners twice a year.

Trustee Williams felt that it would be wise in future to make provision for taking beginners both in September and February. Explaining the decision which was made by last year's board, Chairman Parker stated that it would have necessitated the obtaining of two new teachers to start receiving classes this February. That was not sufficient excuse, Trustee Williams thought.

SCHOOL ATTENDANCE SHOWS AN INCREASE

Superintendent H. S. Hurn Reports 677 Pupils Enrolled During Month of January

The total number of pupils registered at the city public schools during the month of January was 677, an increase of 9 over December, according to the monthly report of Superintendent H. S. Hurn submitted to the school board last night.

An increased number of cases of sickness was responsible for a lower average attendance of 95.62 per cent. At the present time there were some 32 pupils absent owing to measles, the report stated.

The report referred to the popularity of recent lectures by the forestry department and the increased interest in athletics, especially in basketball during the winter months. The sport was being carried on in an organized manner as far as accommodation for playing of games would permit.

PERRY URGES BUILDING OF RAILWAY TO PEACE RIVER FROM A BRITISH COLUMBIA POINT INSTEAD OF BRULE

(continued from page one)

other resources of oil and minerals and timber. The Imperial Oil Co. had spent a lot of money boring and the Provincial Government had also done some work and reported that it was a country of tremendous possibilities from an oil producing standpoint. There was good semi-anthracite coal at Hudson's Hope on the B.C. side which had just been put on the market for the first time. Tests showed that one third of the quantity of coal would do the same work as the Drumheller coal. The first shipment was made from there last year, going by scow to Peace River Crossing. There was also gold and silver-lead mining and yet little prospecting had been done.

Question of Distances

Ten years ago, Mr. Perry said, it was proposed to build into the country and the Dominion Government issued pamphlets urging settlers to go there, promising them transportation. Only lately it had been suggested that a railway should be built from Brule, 150 miles to Grand Prairie, tapping the coal fields by the way. There was considerable elevation and the grades on the line would be poor. It would be necessary then to build another 125 miles to get to the centre of the block of lands in B.C. owned by the Dominion Government. This was the garden spot of B.C. It was 812 miles to Vancouver and there were the difficulties of elevation and poor grades. Building, say from Prince George, the same point could be reached in 280 miles, making 745 miles to tide-water at Prince Rupert, and there was a water grade the whole distance. Summit lake was only 35 miles from Prince George. Any British Columbia route had an advantage over Brule. Also there was the additional advantage of opening up British Columbia territory. This meant the development of new industries.

Build Right

The condition of Canada was such, the speaker said, that only one railroad was likely to be built for some years, so it was more than ordinarily essential that the interests of the province should be conserved and the road built in the right place. If the railway were built from Brule, it would be one of the most colossal blunders that the country would make. There were no resources along the road except coal and to reach it there would have to be another branch line off this one. When the coal was obtained there would be no market for it except in Vancouver near where the collieries on Vancouver Island were already languishing.

Mr. Perry said he had concerned himself with the development of Prince Rupert for some time past and he found that the progress here had been some-

what similar to that of Prince George. There had been no alarming change in six or seven years. Traffic was the great need of the port and that should get from the country to the north. They should get grain coming this way and elevators would quickly follow. The only argument for building the railway by way of Brule was the Vancouver influence and the influence of the coal interests.

Admired Vancouver

All admired the energy and enthusiasm of the Vancouver people and Central B.C. was to be blamed for not showing as much pep. We must criticize ourselves for not fighting for our rights. Prince George Board of Trade was going to ask the Prince Rupert board to take action in regard to this matter and he hoped they would back it. The associated boards had endorsed a similar resolution and the Prince Rupert delegate, W. J. Alder, had supported it. The legislature had unanimously passed a resolution favoring building through this province. He felt sure something would be done soon and they must see that the road was built in the right place. Prince Rupert and Prince George might well cooperate. If their mutual interests were protected it would be a great thing for this port. What good, he asked, were the resources if they were not developed. If British Columbians failed to develop the country they must not complain if the Europeans, the American or the Orientals came in and did it.

TALK ECONOMY YET ASK EXPENDITURES

Nelson Board of Trade Refuses to Follow Suggestion of Winnipeg Board

NELSON, Feb. 15.—The Nelson Board of Trade had before it a communication from the Winnipeg board suggesting a "National Economy Week." In discussing it Alex Leith said it was time Canadians thought of economizing. "Ten years ago we talked in thousands, now we talk in millions; and the children who used to talk in nickels, now talk in dollars," he said.

R. W. Hinton said that while the board was on the subject of necessary economy it might be well to remember Nelson was agitating for the expenditure of thousands of dollars for a bridge. "If no good asking for economy and the expenditure of huge sums of money at the same time," he said. "If we expect to go on working for ourselves we should have nothing to do with endorsing a resolution commending economy."

Kenneth Campbell, M.P.P., said he fully agreed with Mr. Hinton's view. Now was not the time to agitate for a bridge. The provincial government had put in the ferry at an expenditure of \$2,000 only a few years ago, and it was not only the best in British Columbia but, according to many tourists, was better than any ferry in the nearby states. He believed that when this ferry went, a bridge would be built, but not before.

Cut in Personality
Mr. Campbell also spoke briefly of the work done during the last session on the personal property tax, which had been reduced by 50 per cent. In due time, he said, he believed it would be abolished altogether. He mentioned, too, that the tax on farm lands had been cut in half.
