vancouver, Aug. 28.—M. H. McLeod, consulting engin-eer for the Canadian National Railway, returned to Vancouver FOUR INJURED Tuesday night after having the same day made Premier John Oliver a proposal for the Pacific Great Eastern Railwy.

Mr. McLeod was assisted in his negotiations with the government by D. A. Campbell, construction superintendent for the Canadian National, and together these two leading officials of the C.N.R. will spend the next few days motoring over the P.G.E. Territory. This morning they left Ashcroft and will spend the

the week travelling through Cariboo and looking up the possibilities of the P.G.E. territory from a colonization; standpoint. They will go as far as Prince George.

Canadian National engineering parties are now in the field looking over the whole P.G.E. scheme.

McLeod is willing to take over, the Pacific Great Eastern Railway as it stands from Clinton to Quesnel and on to Prince George but would join up with the C.N.R. al Asheroft by abandoning the P.G.E. for those sections east and west of Lillooet. These rails he would lay between Ashcroft and, Clinton and make a through connected line of the project.
