Government Makes Announcement That has Been Hanging Fire

VICTORIA, May 14 .- The transprovincial highway into the interior will be via the Fraser River canyon according to an announcement made by the government. A sum of \$1,250,000 will be spent for the highway up the canyon from Hope to Lytton a distance of 97

There has been a fight on for a couple of years as to whether the highway would follow the Fraser River canvon or whether the Princeton route further south would be selected. Southern centres of the province favored the latter route while Kamloops, Revelstoke and Prince George and other points favored the Fraser River being followed. The Prince Rupert city council last year passed a resolution favoring the Fraser route.



Return To Gold Basis Is Urged.

Urging that gold payments be resumed in Canada in order to stabilize commerce, the May bulletin of the Royal Bank of Canada in part says:

From the time that Canada suspended gold payments at the beginning of the war, there has been a general feeling in this country that our currency would undoubtedly be re-established on a gold basis at some time in the future, when such action became feasible, and when it would not have a disturbing effect WHIST DRIVE AND on business.

A careful examination of our present position leads to the belief that gold payments would be resumed today without any action being necessary, other than an official announcement to Affair Held by Royal Purple in the effect that Dominion notes were once more convertible into gold at the offices of the Receiver General, and that gold could be exported and imported at will, the announcement to be backed by such legislative action as would be required to bring pre-war laws governing the Dominion note issue into conformity with the actual state of affairs. Not every country could get back Cafe dining hall last night under to a gold basis in this very simple way. Many are prevented from doing so, because their note issues are inflated, and their price levels relatively too high. This is far from being the case in Canada, and a return to the gold standard in this country would not involve the presentation of notes in large volume for conversion, nor would it involve a fall in prices.

It is never possible for the Canadian dollar to command more than a very small premium over the U.S. dollar, and unless gold first prize was Mrs. Joe Howe payments are resumed, the tendency will always be towards a


discount on Canadian funds. The disadvantage to the country as a whole without gold payments lies in the fluctuations of the rate for U.S. funds. Exchange fluctuations carry with them a risk of loss, and have been a great impediment to business all over the world, since

CAN NO LONGER EVADE TAX BY RESIDING OUT OF UNITED KINGDOM

LONDON, May 14. - Britons who have for many years been living abroad for six months of the year in order to evade the income tax collector, received a shock on reading in their papers that the Inland Revenue department officials are after them.

This method of tax evasion has become so widespread that action had become necessary. Every bank in Great Britain and Sealed in Northern Ireland has been circularized announcing that whether a man lives aproad six months Package in the year or not, his income must be taxed.

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
