LABORITES ARE DISORDERLY POLITICIANS

SILVER WAVE IS FOURTH VESSEL CAUGHT THIS SEASON IN NORTHERN ICE

Wild and Stormy Receptions are Given Opponents of Labor Party in Old Country Election Campaign

LONDON, Oct. 23.—Wild and stormy receptions were given prominent Liberal and Conservative candidates at several meetings in Scotland last night.

When Right Hon. H. H. Asquith rose to address a meeting at Paisley he was greeted with the singing of the "Red Flag." Disorders several times brought the proceedings to a standstill.

At Glasgow Sir Robert Horne was set upon by a mob of men who hurled wild threats at him. A stone thrown through the windshield of the car in which he was driving hit Hogbin in the face. Women deliberately spat in the face of Mrs. Hogbin and the result was that the couple had to relinquish the canvass.

PRINCE JOHN IS ALL RIGHT

After having been delayed for 7 hours in Browning Entrance on account of her oil pump being clogged up with oil from a dirty tank, C.N.R. steamer Prince John, Capt. Neil McLean, arrived in port shortly before midnight last night. She had a large passenger list and considerable freight including 500 cases of salmon from Lagoon Bay.

The John could have continued her schedule to Stewart and Anyox but preparations had already been made for the sending of the Prince Rupert there, it at first having been feared that the John was out of commission. The Rupert accordingly is doing the northern run today and, returning late this evening, will sail for Vancouver—24 hours late. It was announced this afternoon that the Prince Rupert will not arrive from the south Saturday night and, consequently, there will be no sailing south that night.

The Prince John will resume service with the next regular scheduled sailing for Stewart and Anyox on Wednesday, October 29.

DEWDNEY ELECTION IS UNDER PROTEST

VICTORIA, Oct. 23.—Maxwell Smith, defeated candidate in Dewdney riding filed a writ in the supreme court here protesting the election of J. A. Catherwood on technical grounds of irregularities on the recount.

Mrs. L. G. Harris and children of Isleton, California, arrived last night on the Prince John with Mrs. C. F. Van Valkenburg with whom they have been visiting at Watun River. They will sail on the Prince Rupert tonight for the south. Mrs. Van Valkenburg will visit for a couple of months in Vancouver.

FAULTY CHARGE SETS MEN FREE

Chinese Released from Prison Sentences by Chief Justice Hunter

VICTORIA, Oct. 23.—Failure of the prosecution to insert the words "of Chinese origin" in charges of fraudulent entry into Canada preferred against Chong Hang and nine other Chinese under the Chinese immigration act led to the quashing of convictions and prison terms against them yesterday in the Supreme Court under habeas corpus motion.

Chief Justice Hunter held that proof of the allegation of nationality is essential to a charge under the terms of the act which is set aside expressly for those of Chinese origin.

The release of the accused from convictions returned them to the status of Chinese not yet landed in Canada and they will be returned to China by the immigration officers.

LIQUOR VOTE IN ONTARIO

Electors Casting Verdict Today on Question of Prohibition or Government Sale

TORONTO, Oct. 23.—Whether it will be prohibition or moderation is the all-absorbing question in Ontario today. Goodly numbers of the two million men and women who are entitled to vote on the question are going to the polls to cast their verdict one way or the other. The plebiscite is to decide whether the Ontario Temperance Act of 1916 restricting the legal sale of liquor to homeopathic quantities on doctors' prescriptions shall survive or whether it will give way to comparatively open sale at government dispensaries as in British Columbia and the most of the Canadian provinces.

AGED MAN KILLS WIFE AND SELF IN LOS ANGELES

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 23.—Gustave Egli, aged 80, shot and killed his wife, Leontine, aged 72, here last night and then killed himself according to the police. The aged couple are said to have relatives in Canada.

J. Killas is sailing for Juneau on the C.P.R. steamer tomorrow in answer to a call by wire that his brother Harry is lying dangerously ill there. Mrs. Killas Sr. is also going.

SMITH MURDER BEING PROBED

Vancouver Weekly Has Article Charging That Money Being Used to Shield Guilty

The current number of the Saturday Tribune edited by J. S. Cowper, formerly editor of the Prince Rupert Daily News, has a front page editorial article entitled "Has Money Been Used to Hush up the Murder of Janet Smith?" In it the writer draws attention to the obvious fact that the familiarity of the murderer with the Baker Home narrowed down the scope of the inquiry to a limited circle of suspects. He says further:

"At the present moment names of members of the younger and more drunken of Shaughnessy Heights social leaders are being spoken of wherever people meet. They are demanding that an inquiry be made into an alleged 'party' held at the scene of the murder on the night prior to the announcing of the killing of the girl."

The article also says:

To be perfectly frank about it, in the opinion of the great public which is wrought up over this dastardly murder, the whole Janet Smith murder, faked up suicide, hasty burial and verdict of "suicide" smells of—Money.

Two New Companies Formed to Extract Gold from Sands on the Queen Charlotte Islands

Charles T. Cabrera who was the engineer in charge of the P.B.C. Mines Companies' work on Graham Island is staying at the Hotel Rupert. He arrived last night on the Prince John and is on his way east on a business trip. D. R. Willemar of Smithers, the assistant manager, is in temporary charge of the company's properties.

Mr. Cabrera announces that while he retains his interest in the P.B.C. Mines Co., he is in no way connected with the management or active business affairs of that company.

Two new corporations will commence operations on Graham Island before the first of the year. Both of these companies are from the eastern part of the States and are composed entirely of experienced mining men.

Among the placer claim owners on Graham Island are:

Frank L. Taek, a well known Oklahoma oil operator. His claim is situate on the east coast near Cape Fife.

Walter Pinius, a prominent real estate operator of Philadelphia, is the owner of a claim on the northern coast of Graham.

S. S. Williamson of the firm of Williamson & Williamson, patent attorneys of Washington, D.C., owns a placer claim just north of Massett.

The records also show the transfer of a claim on the north beach to A. H. Robson, purser on the S.S. John.

KETCHIKAN IS WORRIED OVER HALIBUT DUTY

Word comes from the south that a movement has been started, emanating from Canada, to induce President Coolidge to eliminate the tariff on fish says the Ketchikan Chronicle in a belated issue. This is to aid the Canadian fisheries which are competing with the American fishermen.

At the present time the American halibut fisheries have an advantage of two cents per pound over the Canadian boats. Talk at Prince Rupert and Vancouver was that all sorts of retaliatory measures would be taken against the American fishermen unless the tariff was wiped out. Such talk, of course, was pure bunk and it failed. Now Canada wishes to take a new course, with the hope of deluding the American government at Washington by persuasion and sweet words. They should not prevail in their endeavor.

Prevent Move

Through misunderstanding, some of the fishermen opposed the imposition of a duty on the fisheries. They have seen, however, that it has worked to their

Ice Carries off Schooner in Ice of Arctic Ocean While Skipper Watches Helplessly

NOME, Oct. 23.—Gasoline schooner Silver Wave of Nome with four men aboard has been carried off by the ice of the Arctic. This is the fourth vessel seized this season in the fatal grip of the ice in the Alaskan Arctic. She was caught in Kotzebue Sound, 180 miles north of Bering Strait, whither she was arriving for safety on her last trip before winter.

The Silver Wave first landed her cargo and the passengers were taken off near the end of the Long peninsula. While Capt. Heness, master and owner and engineer were ashore the schooner was seen moving out into the ocean.

Slush ice prevented the master and engineer from reaching the vessel and kept the four men, the remainder of the crew, who had remained aboard, from coming ashore.

The gasoline schooners Arctic and Letts of San Francisco and the Lady Kindersley of Vancouver, B.C., were lost in the ice, the cargoes of the Arctic and Kindersley being lost. The crews of all three vessels were saved.

LOGGERS WIN DAMAGE SUIT

Six are Awarded Nearly Quarter of a Million Dollars Under Judgment

VANCOUVER, Oct. 23.—Six logging operators were awarded \$233,345 damages against the Canada Timber and Lands Ltd. by Harold Brown, deputy registrar of the Supreme Court, who conducted the reference pursuant to the judgment of the judicial committee of the privy council, handed down November 28, 1923. The loggers are Julius Clausen, Phillip Cain and William J. Blundell.

The Privy Council sustained the judgment of Mr. Justice Murphy, who decided that the defendant company wrongfully terminated a contract by which plaintiffs were logging 200,000,000 feet of fir, cedar and spruce on Toha River.

The successful litigants claimed damages for over a million dollars.

SIR EDMUND OSLER LEFT \$4,000,000

Late President of Dominion Bank Was Wealthy Man — Will Filed For Probate

OTTAWA, Oct. 23.—The late Sir Edmund Osler, president of the Dominion Bank who died recently, left an estate of \$4,000,000 according to the will which was yesterday filed for probate.

MEMORIAL SERVICE VANCOUVER SATURDAY

Bishop Du Pencier and Principal Vance Coming Here for Archbishop's Funeral

Bishop Du Pencier of Westminster diocese and Rev. W. H. Vance, principal of the Anglican Theological College of B.C., will arrive in the city on the Princess Mary tomorrow to participate with Archbishop G. A. Rix in the funeral service for the late Archbishop F. H. Du Vernet on Saturday.

A telegram received from Principal Vance by Archbishop Rix is as follows:

"Bishop Du Pencier and I will arrive in Prince Rupert on Friday. A memorial service has been arranged to take place in Vancouver at 2 o'clock Saturday afternoon in Christ Church. The three co-operative theological colleges—Methodist, Presbyterian and Anglican—have cancelled their lectures for that day and will attend the service in body."

CANADIANISM GYRO SUBJECT

W.E. Williams Deplores Lack of Confidence in Home Investments Addressing Gyro Club

FOLLOW U.S. POLICY

W. E. Williams addressed the Gyro Club last evening on "Canadianism." Showing how the Dominion had gradually evolved from the position of a crown colony twenty-five years ago to that of a near-nation today, the speaker drew attention to some of the responsibilities resting with the people of Canada in the way of government and development.

Invest at Home

The speaker deplored the lack of confidence that Canadians, through their investments, had shown in their own country. To make Canada a great nation, population was required but to support this population it was necessary that there should be industrial development.

Home Projects

Localizing his theme, Mr. Williams referred to projects that, with a small amount of capital, might be started by the people of Prince Rupert themselves. He would have liked to have seen an elevator financed by Prince Rupert people.

Besides Mr. Williams' address, the club's program for the evening included selections by an orchestra consisting of Miss St. Cyr, A. A. Easson and George Rorie, jr. Master William Murray played a violin solo accompanied by W. Vaughan Davies.

Death of Archbishop Lay To The World.

The death of Archbishop Du Vernet was a disinet loss to the world. He was a great man, outstanding in the Church and pre-eminent as an advanced thinker, theologian and philosopher.

Hobby Is What He Will Be Known From.

Like many other great men he had a hobby and it is from that he will be best known in years to come. He was a psychologist of note and in the course of his studies he became interested in thought transference or mental communication.

Believed In Laws Controlling Everything.

An article written about the work of the Archbishop in connection with his psychological work was submitted to him for correction in order that there might be no mistake as to his real aims and objects. At the end of the article he wrote with his own hands these rather remarkable words:

Was An Admirer Of Henri Bergson.

The Archbishop was an admirer of Henri Bergson who in his book on "Mind Energy" says: "If telepathy be a real fact, it is capable of being repeated indefinitely. I go further: if telepathy be real, it is possible that it is operating at every moment everywhere, but with too little intensity to be noticed, or else in such a way that a cerebral mechanism stops the effect for our benefit at the very moment it is about to clear the threshold of consciousness. We produce energy at every moment, the atmosphere is continually electrified and we move among magnetic currents yet for thousands of years millions of human beings lived who never suspected the existence of electricity. We might very well have gone on without perceiving it, and it may be that this is now our case with telepathy."

WANTED -- A TRADE REVIVAL

The steady growth of British Columbia has depended in the past and will depend in the future upon the fair progress of its premier industry.

Every thinking citizen of the Province should realize to what an extent the destiny of British Columbia is entwined with that of its forest industries.

As an instance—the taxes that the lumbermen of British Columbia paid into the public treasury in 1923 more than settled our total education bill (including the grant to the University) and in addition covered the whole amount appropriated for the maintenance of the public works of the Province.

The British Columbia forest industries may be capable of beating this unique record in the furtherance of the prosperity of the Province but an increase of taxation must be based upon a more solid output—upon a free expansion of activities, upon larger markets, and more stabilized values.

An unembarrassed lumber industry is the key to British Columbia's prosperity. The uncertainty now existing regarding the unamended Timber Royalty Act of 1914 is without doubt the main cause of the existent depression not only in the lumber industry but in the many groups dependent upon its vast purchasing power.

A settlement of this vexed question satisfactory both to the industry and to the public should bring about the trade revival that British Columbia is so anxiously awaiting.

Vendor of Property Gets Only \$4,000 Whereas He Was Offered \$7,000

WINNIPEG, Oct. 23. — Word was received here last night to the effect that the award had been made in the expropriation case of the Canadian National Railways versus Chagan at Fort William, Ont., by Judge McKay, the arbitrator. Prior to the hearing, the railways offered without prejudice \$7,000 in settlement which, being rejected, was withdrawn and the case proceeded with.

The hearing of a large number of witnesses including half a dozen experts in regard to the quality of gravel and a market for it, occupied three days of last week. The arbitrator today awarded the owner the original offer of \$4,000 made by the railways, the owner to pay all costs.

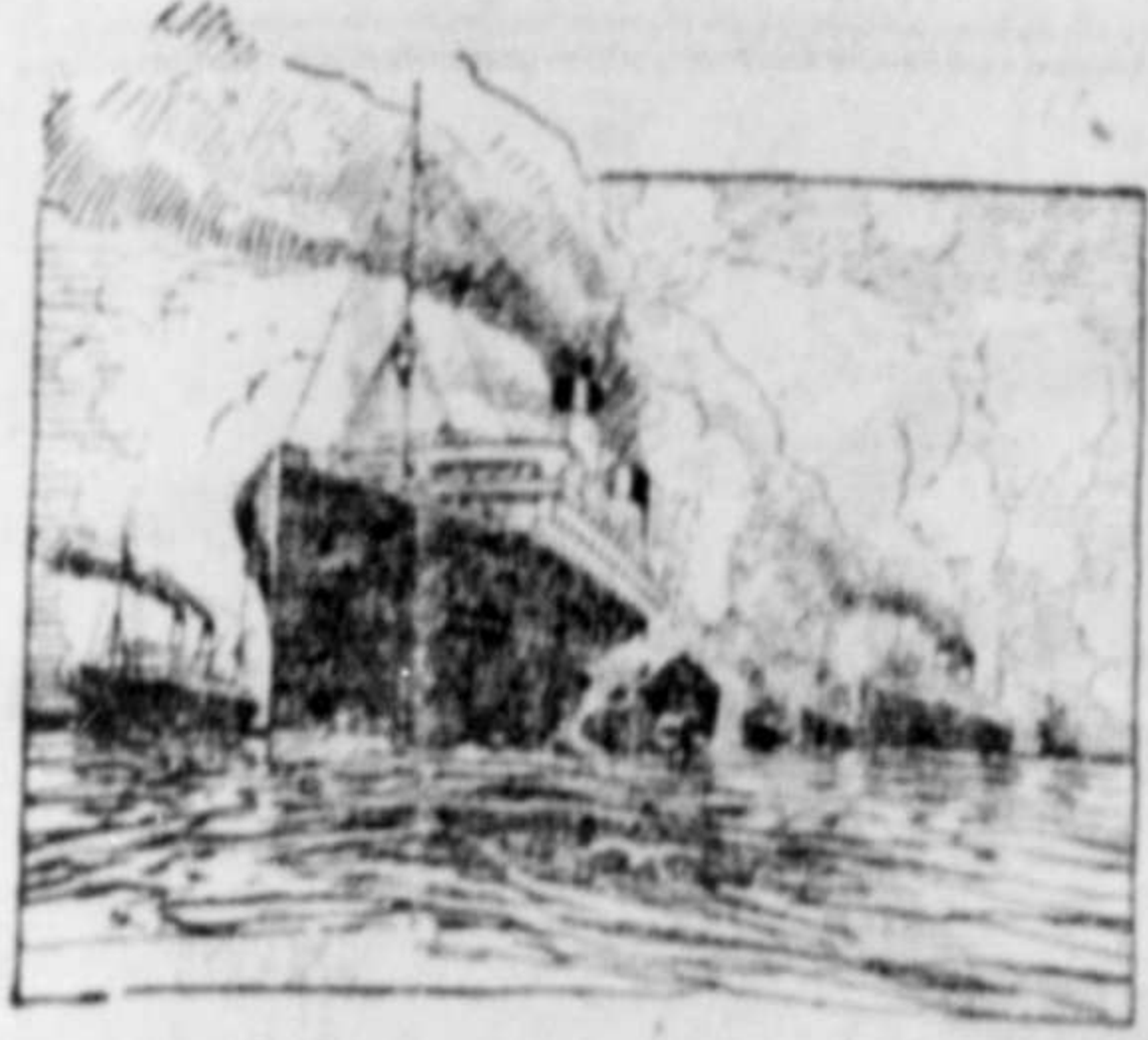

advantage and they should now put forth every effort to prevent the Canadian move. The attempt is not to assist the American fisherman or fishing boat but to help build up and sustain Canadian industry.

And that is another question, "sustaining industry." Ketchikan has been building up on the fisheries for a number of years. Many thereby have come to the conclusion that Ketchikan must be the center of the fisheries. Such is not the case. To keep what we have the people of Ketchikan must be alive. They must fight all the time to retain what they have and to build, for there are other places just as anxious for business as are we and they are going to leave no stone unturned to get it.

All Join Hands

We must go forward or we go backward. We cannot stand still, for to stand still is to go backward, as has often been said. In this attempted repeal of the duty on fish everyone in Alaska should join hands to overcome any arguments that may be presented to the treasury department or to President Coolidge. This is the more necessary as some of the dealers in Chicago that are representing Canadian interests are doing everything possible to have that two cents a pound wiped out. And being advantageously located, politically speaking, these Chicago and other eastern interests will be able to bring much pressure to bear—not to help American industry, but to aid their own pocket-books.

Let everyone in Ketchikan who has a five cent piece invested in a little home or business be alive to the situation. Let everyone in Alaska realize that Canada is trying to do everything possible to wipe out the first piece of legislation which was ever passed and designed to assist in the upbuilding of the Alaskan halibut fisheries as against the competition of those of a foreign state. And while that legislation did not go as far as it should have gone for protection it nevertheless was a step in the right direction, an advance which must not be repulsed.

MINERS FORM ASSOCIATION

Masset Organization to be Known as Graham Island Miners Association

The gold miners and residents of Masset and district have recently formed a Miners' Association the objects of which are explained in a letter just received from the secretary as follows: Editor Daily News.

You are probably aware that experimental mining operations have been carried on for the last few months for the recovery of gold and other minerals from the sand and gravel deposits on Graham Island.

The P.B.C. Mines Co., who have been making these experiments now claim that they are able to recover the gold and that in large areas it is in good paying quantity; on this account some fifty of the inhabitants of Masset and district decided to form a Miners' Association whose purpose it is to further the interests of Graham Island by issuing authentic reports on the conditions here, contradicting as far as possible untrue and exaggerated statements which may be sent out by irresponsible persons and by supplying to inquirers reliable information in regard to mineral conditions, locality of recorded claims, freights, transport, labor, etc., which might assist any individuals or corporations intending to conduct mining operations here.

Officers Chosen

On October 7, the Graham Island Miners Association was formed for the above purpose, bylaws were passed and the following officers and committee elected:

President, C. T. Cabrera.
Vice-President, C. W. Baker, J.P.
Secretary and Treasurer, Dr. J. C. S. Dunn.
Committee—H. Carpenter, J. Lane, C. Spence.

It was also decided to publish a quarterly report, the first number will shortly be issued and a copy forwarded to you.

On October 15, a well attended public meeting was held in Masset, when the purposes of the association were clearly placed before those present and many joined as active or associate members.

This Association is not formed for gain but purely for giving assistance, it has no intention of dealing with claims of shares, it does not intend to own or operate mines or even to advise inquires in regard to these matters but hopes to assist the interests of Graham Island and all likely to become interested in mining here by issuing as far as possible reliable information and answering genuine inquiries.

All inquiries should be sent with a stamped addressed envelope enclosed to the Secretary, the Graham Island Miners' Association, Masset, B.C.

We do not advise anyone expecting employment to come here at present and it is unlikely any operations will be commenced at this time of year.
