

LONDON, July 9 .- A White Book, issued by the government, giving correspondence between the British and Allied governments relative to the proposed London conference on July 16, tells of Premier Macdonald's instructions to the British ambassador at Rome to inform the Italian government that the sole object of the conference is to agree upon terms of an instrument formally binding the Allies and Germany to carry out the provisions of the Dawes' report.







LONDON, July 9. — Oxford University has found a subject for heated discussion in speech made recently by Rhodes Scholar from the United States, W. C. Greene, of Rhode Island, a graduate of Brown University. Mr. Greene was replying to a toast proposed by Rudyard Kipling at the annual dinner at Oxford of the Rhodes Scholarship Trust.
