

Rate Of Growth

Similar To U.S. In an interesting address given at the Rotary Club luncheon yesterday Milton Gonzales incidentally drew attention to the fact that in 1812 Canada had a population of approximately half a million while United States had a population of eight millions. He deplored the fact that while United States now had a population of one hundred and ten millions Canada had a population of only nine millions. What he did not draw attention to is the fact that the rate of increase in Canada has been greater during that time than in the United States. In Canada population, according to Mr. Gonzales' figures, has increased seventeen hundred per cent whereas the increase in the States was for the same time only thirteen hundred and seventy per cent. According to those figures Canada has made greater progress in the same time than the United States.

Recent Drain Canada To California.

What has drawn particular attention to population and migration recently has been the movement to California and other states recently from Canada consequent on a boom in those places and on the demand for men and money there. Another outstanding event is the recommencement of an immigration movement to this country by the governments and railways which has caused people to look at immigration problems and try to solve them.

The California boom seems to have broken and many of those who went south would like to be back if they had the price. Usually, however, we hear more of those who do well than of those who fail. Pretty soon we are likely to see a move-

ment to Canada. . Is it impossible to stop these migratory movements. While it is said there are as many Canadians in the United States as in Canada, it must also be remembered that there are in Canada a large number of Americans so that to a certain extent the movement across the border either way is reciprocal. The difficulty is that the customs duties and the immigration restrictions on both sides prevent a natural flow of population and trade between the two countries.

Free Travelling

All Over Country. Owing to the abundance of motor vehicles on the roads of the continent, there are thousands of people who heat their way from place to place. Many men never think of paying railway fare, but get rides in vans and private cars. It is a common thing to see a man stand in the road, hailing one car after another until he finds one that will pick him up and give him a lift. He may then ride for a mile or two or for fifty miles, as the case may be, and eventually he reaches the place for which he set out. This movement of the poorer part of the population as well as that of those who have money tends to bring people to any place that has a temporary period of prosperity and to take them from the place that is quiet. It is a new phase of life. What new developments will take place along this line is not apparent but the whole world seems to be moving as it never moved before and this, along with the facilities for dissemination of news, causes that feeling of restlessness which comes over us all.

That Feeling Of

Exclusiveness. We are a handful of people in Canada living in an immense country and yet we persuade ourselves that we own the country. The Indians were born in the country and are the real Canadians yet we did not recognize that they had any proprietory rights, except over a small portion. Living in the corner of an immense territory does not give the right of ownership, unless the territory is used. We may claim it and get away with the bluff as long as no one calls it. The country belongs to all mankind as a heritage and we have no right, except the doubtful one of might, to hold it and say we will not have people come here, unless we are prepared to bring in other people who will use the country and develop its resources.



Vacant, unreserved, surveyed Crown lands may be pre-empted by British subjects over 18 years of age, and by aliens on declaring intention to become British subjects, condiional upon residence, occupation, and improvement for agricultural

Records will be granted covering mly land suitable for agricultural purposes, and which is not timberand, i.e., carrying over 5.000 board feet per acre west of the Coast Range and 8,000 feet per acre east of that

Applications for pre-emptions are o be addressed to the Land Commissioner of the Land Recording Diision, in which the land applied for is situated, and are made on printed

forms, copies of which can be obtained from the Land Commissioner. Pre-emptions must be occupied for five years and improvements made to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivating at least five acres, before a Crown Grant can be

PURCHASE

Applications are received for purchase of vacant and unreserved Crown lands, not being timberland, for agricultural purposes; minimum price of first-class (arable) land is \$5 per acre, and second-class (grazing) and \$2.50 per acre.
