Ir. Justice Kelly Decides Against Occupants of Hall Because of Doctrines Held

FORT WILLIAM, April 7 .- In handing down judgment in a case in which an effort was made to oust the Red element from control of a Ukrainian society at Fort William, Mr. Justice Kelly disclosed a serious condition, so serious that a criminal action may follow the civil case.

According to the history of the case as outlined by the judge the Ukrainians formed a culture society for the purpose of selfimprovement. They built a hall and paid for it, and then the Red element entered in and captured the society and the hall and used it for propaganda purposes. In the words of the judge

"-these interlopers departed from the original purposes and aims of the society as set out in the constitution and acted upon by its earlier members. Pre-emptions must be occupied for five years and improvements made to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivating at least five acres, before a Crown Grant can be

PURCHASE

Applications are received for purchase of vacant and unreserved Crown lands, not being timberland for agricultural purposes; minimum price of first-class (arable) land is \$5 per acre, and second-class (grazing) and \$2.50 per acre.
