## GOVERNMENT OF SOUTH AFRICA RESIGNS

### ROUND WORLD FLYERS EXPECT TO BE READY TO LEAVE IN THE MORNING

#### Smuts Government of South Africa Resigns and Election Will Prove Important Event

Nationalists stand for Republic and have been gaining strength in country of late

**BY-ELECTION WENT AGAINST PARTY NOW IN POWER THERE**

British and Progressive Dutch support the present Administration and its Policy

CAPETOWN, April 8.—The government of the Union of South Africa has been dissolved by Premier Smuts. In announcing it to the Legislative Assembly the premier said it was doubtful after the Waakerton by-election in which the government candidate was defeated by a nationalist, whether it still had the confidence of the country, and the dissolution was for the purpose of testing it.

It is officially stated that the dissolution will apply to the Legislative Assembly only and that the Senate will carry on as it is empowered to do under the constitution. This gives rise to a serious position as Premier Smuts has a majority in the Senate. The election is likely to take place in June.

LONDON, April 8.—The dissolution of the South African parliament is recognized here as holding possibilities of the greatest importance, not only to South Africa but for the British Empire. The political campaign against Premier Smuts has been for a long time gaining force while the strength of the Nationalists and Laborites has been correspondingly growing.

Upon the question whether General Hertzog, who stands for Republicanism, or General Smuts with the support of the British community and the progressive Dutch, carries the day the election is an event upon which matters of far reaching consequence depend. Every possible Nationalist majority will be returned, although it is understood they are not pressing their republican views, says Commissioner Walton for South Africa in London.

Premier Ramsay Macdonald, it is announced, will not resign.

#### LABOR CABINET IS DEFEATED

Adverse Vote in House of Commons Will Not Be Accepted as Verdict

LONDON, April 8.—The Macdonald Government was defeated yesterday by a vote of 221 to 212 on the rent evictions question. The defeat was the result of an amendment offered by Neville Chamberlain to the Rents Bill opposing the second reading, this being carried.

Premier Ramsay Macdonald, it is announced, will not resign.

#### WORKER FELL WAS KILLED

Was Caulking Deck of S.S. Canadian Prospector When Slipped and Dropped 40 Feet

VICTORIA, April 8.—Falling a distance of 40 feet from the deck of the steamer Prospector in Esquimalt drydock, M. Macpherson, a shipyard worker, died ten minutes later.

Macpherson was caulking the deck when he slipped over the side and was dashed to the cement floor below.

The action of the Ontario Legislature in so amending the bill as to almost nullify it seems to have inspired the federal members with a similar desire.

#### ONLY TWO FISH BOATS SELL THEIR CATCHES

Price Advances Owing to Lack of Supply This Morning

Only two boats arrived to sell their catches at the local fish exchange this morning. One was the American schooner Eidsvold which sold 30,000 lbs. to the Royal Fish Company for 12.40c and 5c and the other was the Canadian boat Cape Spencer which sold 2,500 lbs. to the Gold Storage Company for 10.50c and 5c.

#### RICH STRIKE AT DOME MOUNTAIN

This has caused much excitement not only at the camp but throughout the valley. The ore was found in the Grizzly shaft where a five foot seam was struck carrying good values.

#### READY TO FLY TOMORROW FOR HOP TO SITKA

Only Weather Will Delay U.S. Flyers at Prince Rupert After Today

The four United States aerial cruisers are to resume their flight around the world from Prince Rupert with Major F. L. Martin still in command. A fine tooth-comb inspection of Major Martin's machine, damaged in landing Sunday afternoon, established that two broken struts and four broken vertical brace wires on the left side near the fuselage constituted all the damage that was done. A set of wires is carried on the flight and the struts were made at the dry dock last night.

**New Flag For Canada Adopted.**

Canada has a flag now and it is a better one than the old but not yet satisfactory. It consists in a red ensign with the Union Jack as usual in one corner and a new shield having the three lions of England, the lion rampant of Scotland, the harp of Ireland, the fleur de lis of Scotland and beneath them all the maple leaf of Canada.

While the flag is an improvement over the old it is still much too complicated. The Union Jack is sufficient intimation of the fact that we are part of the Empire without the individual emblems of England, Scotland and Ireland. Eastern people would like to have simply the maple leaf on the red but we would much prefer the beaver as a more suitable emblem although perhaps not quite so artistic. The present agglomeration is not artistic or anything else.

**Laminated Wood Plant on Skeena.**

A laminated wood plant is to be established on the Skeena River about fifty miles from here by a Vancouver concern. It is the intention to utilize the cottonwood that grows on the islands and along the banks of the river in the making of boxes, panels and other laminated wood articles. For this class of material there is at present a great demand because the wood is light and strong and takes a good finish for panels.

We told about the formation of this company a year ago and a few months ago the organizer of the concern, Frank Burdett, was in the city and advertised in this paper the application to purchase Devil's Island from the government. At that time he was anxious that nothing should be said about the company and its prospects because everything was in the formative period. Now the plans have been matured and it is announced that work will begin.

**Co-operation In Land Settlement.**

R. C. W. Lett of the Canadian National Railway colonization department told yesterday of the good results obtained from co-operation in regard to land settlement. This is true always and applies to other matters besides land settlement. It is true in all walks of life.

Land settlement can be most effectively carried out by the railways, the Dominion and Provincial governments and the local municipalities joining hands to make the plans a success. So much depends on the treatment the new immigrants receive as to whether more will come. A satisfied settler is the best advertisement the country can have.

**Full Knowledge Of Conditions.**

Another important factor in land settlement is to let the prospective settler have full knowledge of the conditions. Last autumn during bad weather Sir John Pitka came through Central B.C. and saw the country almost at its worst. He returned a week or two later when things were better and he went over the land which was to be settled. He examined the soil and being a practical farmer himself knew exactly what he was advising his fellow countrymen to do. Now they have begun to arrive and if Prince Rupert can in any way aid in the settlement this is a good time for them to commence.

**VANCOUVER IS MUCH WORRIED**

**Fears Loss of Fisheries Office and Gets Nasty About it**

The latest publication in Vancouver to get worried over the fishery headquarters is "The Hook," edited by a former editor of the Prince Rupert News, J. S. Cowper. Under the heading, "A Prince Rupert Booster," it says: "You must take off your hats to these Prince Rupert boosters. With only six thousand inhabitants to Vancouver's two hundred thousands, by dint of superior brain power (which comes no doubt from eating fish) they have two members in the Provincial Cabinet while Vancouver has none. They have a Prince Rupert man as director for British Columbia on the Canadian National Railways Board, and a member of Parliament sitting on the government side of the House."

**Hands Off**

"All this is very much to the good for Prince Rupert, and none would say them nay. But when the member for Prince Rupert proposes to abolish the office of Chief Inspector of Fisheries from Vancouver and place the control of the Pacific coast fisheries under an inspector in Ottawa, the estimable Mr. Stork is facing in the wrong direction. After Liberals have been working since the days of the Family Compact for the decentralization of federal government, it is a cruel blow to find a Liberal M.P. from the breezy healthy north advocating such a measure of bureaucracy.

"Our fisheries ought to have their headquarters as well as their chief inspector's office, on this coast. There is something palpably grotesque in having the headquarters of the Pacific Coast fisheries situated in a sleepy inland town on the borders of Ontario and Quebec, nearly four thousand miles away.

**All for Vancouver**

"Closing the position of Chief Inspector here would not (or let us hope not) involve the withdrawal of the fishery protection service which last year had 90 boats engaged, and which involved the expenditure of over \$50,000 in Vancouver in oil, gas, and supplies. It would not even reduce the clerical staff here. All it would mean would be to oversee and no local authority to make decisions. It would mean doing business by telegraph instead of on the spot, and spending the salary of a chief inspector many times over on the travelling expenses of visiting Ottawa officials.

"Mr. Stork is the head of a large hardware business in Prince Rupert. If there is any merit in his theory that big business can be better conducted 4,000 miles away from its base, let him prove it by appointing an official in the parliament buildings to run his hardware store for him. When he can show economies and efficiencies thereby, The Hook will be a convert.

**Likes Boosters**

"There is another matter too that Mr. Stork may not have thought of. There is a \$6,000,000 fishing business done out of Prince Rupert each year. If the office of Chief Inspector were abolished from this coast, it would mean that Mr. Stork would be inundated with problems arising out of the fisheries. He would have to act as the local recommending authority on all fishery matters. It would keep him pretty busy most of the year sending in recommendations to Ottawa. But even a desire for work ought not to actuate this active gentleman in the north in his aim to dislocate the fishery department in Vancouver.

"We like these Prince Rupert boosters, but we like them to be reasonable."



The ladders will cost \$88 and \$45 respectively. Ald. Macdonald explained that the deputy fire marshal on his recent visit recommended, among other things, the purchase of such equipment. The fire chief had stated that it would greatly facilitate the department in coping with fires that might break out in higher buildings.

The request of Arthur Brooksbank that he be allowed to wire a building he proposes erecting on Third Avenue with knobs and tubes instead of conduit cannot be acceded to by the city council. A report from the utilities stating that such would be contrary to the requirements of the Fire Marshal's Act and recommending that Mr. Brooksbank be notified accordingly was adopted by the council last night. In the same connection, Ald. Macdonald pointed out that the present building bylaw was not being lived up to, suggested that it be gone over and revised by the city solicitor in order to make it effective. This is to be done by the solicitor.

## DELEGATION ON SPORTS GROUND

The athletic associations would assist with their labor but had no funds to offer.

Bert Morgan felt that all the money should be spent on the surfacing of the grounds and sand should be put on instead of ashes. There had been many accidents in the past on account of the condition of the grounds. He thought that it was up to the city to spend some money for the work.

Ald. Collart explained that provision had already been made in the estimates to meet the request and he assured the delegation that the work would be taken care of. Accordingly the mayor referred the matter to the board of works requesting the delegation to appoint a committee to confer with the board. In retiring, Mr. Hill expressed the thanks of the delegation to the council.

Finally, the matter has referred to the board of works for report.

## FORTY MILLS IS RATE FOR YEAR

City Council Adopts Finance Committee's Estimates—School and Special Rates Increased

Prince Rupert's mill rate for the year 1924 will be 40, a reduction of 2.7 mills from last year when the rate was 42.7. It is made up as follows: general tax, 14.83; schools, 10.80; special tax, 14.37.

The city council last night adopted the finance committee's report to this effect. The estimates as set by the committee are also adopted.

Ald. Collart, chairman of the finance committee, stated that the lower rate this year was due entirely to a reduction in general taxation. The general tax rate this year was 14.83 as against 19.524 in 1923. School tax, however, showed an increase from 10.686 to 10.80 and special rates from 12.49 to 14.37. The reduction in tax rate had been effected in spite of an assessment which had been reduced by \$387,000.

## CITY INVITED TO NAVAL RECEPTION

Council Asked to Send Representatives to Assist in Welcome to British Fleet in South

An invitation for representatives of the city of Prince Rupert to attend the welcoming ceremonies attendant on the visit of the British naval squadron to Victoria on June 24 and Vancouver on June 25 was received by the city council last night from the joint entertainment committee of these two cities. The suggestion was made that the city might also desire to donate a cup or other trophy to one of the ships as a lasting memento of the reception. After some discussion it was decided to table the matter for a week.

Apparently slighted that the fleet was not to visit Prince Rupert, some of the city fathers did not receive the proposition with much enthusiasm. Ald. Casey thought that the matter of sending delegates to the reception ought at least to be considered. "In my opinion it would be cheap and selfish to have something of this kind where the whole of the Empire is represented going on next door to us and we take no notice of it," he said.

## REDS OUSTED BY JUDGMENT

Mr. Justice Kelly Decides Against Occupants of Hall Because of Doctrines Held

FORT WILLIAM, April 7.—In handing down judgment in a case in which an effort was made to oust the Red element from control of a Ukrainian society at Fort William, Mr. Justice Kelly disclosed a serious condition, so serious that a criminal action may follow the civil case.

According to the history of the case as outlined by the judge the Ukrainians formed a culture society for the purpose of self-improvement. They built a hall and paid for it, and then the Red element entered in and captured the society and the hall and used it for propaganda purposes. In the words of the judge

"—these interlopers departed from the original purposes and aims of the society as set out in the constitution and acted upon by its earlier members. The first outward manifestation of their real intent was their objection to the use by the society of the Canadian flag and Canadian patriotic songs and their insistence that only the red flag of revolution be used. Then came the introduction into the society's library of books of communistic tendency and the expulsion from the society of a member on the sole ground that he was a church member; and above all was their sympathy with the principles inculcated by those who proclaimed the doctrines of revolution."

In summing up the evidence, Mr. Justice Kelly quotes one E. Buceluk, connected with the Winnipeg organization, as having stated at a mass meeting in the hall that:

**Only Saviour**

"The only saviour of the labor class is the red army. This is the same gentleman who, in describing publicly the results he said would follow the introduction of communism, is sworn to have advocated free love, and to have stated that under that system there would be a state, communistic cradle for the care of children, thus emancipating women from that part of their maternal duties. Other pronouncements said to have been made by these agitators were to the effect that only such communistic conditions as existed in Russia were suitable for the working people; that those who disagreed with these conditions were traitors to the working people; that in Canada within a year there would be a revolution such as had taken place in Russia and that the rights of the people would be obtained by force and in respect of marriage, under the expected new conditions, it was said that a system would come with the new order of things, by which marriage unions and the annulment thereof would be effected by mere registration."

**Menace to Canada**

He further adds that the evidence:

"Establishes beyond doubt the existence of a deliberate design by defendants to acquire by improper means—in effect by force—the property and assets of the Proseita Society—with the deliberate intent of converting it and its belongings to uses and purposes of a dangerous character and altogether destructive of the spirit, purposes and intentions of the founders and their legitimate successors. That these interlopers are and have been in direct communication and connection with and are now under the direction of an organized body whose doctrines are a menace to Canadian citizenship is a reasonable deduction from the evidence."

**Restored to Owners**

The result of the judgment is that the defendants are restrained from using the property and assets of the society for other than its original purposes, and from any attempt to alienate, transfer, or otherwise deal therewith. The original name of the society is also to be restored.

## SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENTS

**PRE-EMPTIONS**

Vacant, unreserved, surveyed Crown lands may be pre-empted by British subjects over 18 years of age, and by aliens on declaring intention to become British subjects, conditional upon residence, occupation, and improvement for agricultural purposes.

Full information concerning regulations regarding pre-emption is given in Bulletin No. 1, Land Series, "How to Pre-empt Land," copies of which can be obtained free of charge by addressing the Department of Lands, Victoria, B.C., or to any Government Agent.

Records will be granted covering any land suitable for agricultural purposes, and which is not timberland, i.e., carrying over 5,000 board feet per acre west of the Coast Range and 8,000 feet per acre east of that range.

Applications for pre-emption are to be addressed to the Land Commissioner of the Land Recording Division, in which the land applied for is situated, and are made on printed forms, copies of which can be obtained from the Land Commissioner.

Pre-emption must be occupied for five years and improvements made to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivating at least five acres, before a Crown Grant can be received.

For more detailed information see the Bulletin "How to Pre-empt Land."

**PURCHASE**

Applications are received for purchase of vacant and unreserved Crown lands, not being timberland, for agricultural purposes; minimum price of first-class (arable) land is \$5 per acre, and second-class (grazing) land \$2.50 per acre. Further information regarding purchase or lease of Crown lands is given in Bulletin No. 10, Land Series, "Purchase and Lease of Crown Lands."

Mill, factory, or industrial sites on timber land, not exceeding 40 acres, may be purchased or leased, the conditions including payment of stumpage.

**HOMESITE LEASES**

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesites, conditional upon a dwelling being erected in the first year, title being obtainable after residence and improvement conditions are fulfilled and land has been surveyed.

**LEASES**

For grazing and industrial purposes areas not exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or a company.

**GRAZING**

Under the Grazing Act the Province is divided into grazing districts and the range administered under a Grazing Commissioner. Annual grazing permits are issued based on numbers ranged, priority being given to established owners. Stock-owners may form associations for range management. Free or partially free permits are available for settlers, campers and travelers, up to ten head.

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
