Chargea *Murder* of two-year-old Child At Pentecostal Meeting

NANAIMO, Nov. 11.—Leslie Dickie, 50 years of age, a miner, is held by the local police charged with murder in connection with the death of his two year old grandson, Leslie Dickie, on Saturday night. Chief of Police Harris alleges that Dickie suffocated the boy by placing his hand over the lad's nose and mouth during the holding of Pentecostal services at his residence.

Although the boy's mother, Mrs. L. Dickie of Merritt, her mother and two sisters and three brothers are alleged to have been present at the meeting, no attempt was made to resist the grandfather's action, the police claim. Dickie joined the religious body a year ago and since then has been laboring under a strong religious fervor, according to the police.

SENATOR LODGE DIED SUNDAY

Was Prominent in Political Life
of the United States

CAMBRIDGE, Mass., Nov. 11.—Senator Henry Cabot Lodge died here Sunday night.

Looked upon as one of the leaders of modern democracy on the continent, Senator Lodge had sat in the Senate since 1893 continuously and since August 1918 had been leader of the Republican party. He opposed the League of Nations and the Treaty of Versailles and led the contest against President Wilson for ratification, winning the fight.

Mr. Lodge was a friend of Roosevelt and was always during his administration—and since, prominent in party councils. He was also a student of art and literature and spoke French fluently.

CECIL JOINS THE CABINET

Two Ministers Added by Premier

LONDON, Dec. 11.—Premier Baldwin completed his cabinet yesterday by appointing Viscount Peel, first commissioner of works and public buildings, and Viscount Cecil, chancellor of the Duchy of Lancaster.

The King called a meeting of the Privy Council at the Palace yesterday and Parliament was further prorogued until December to enable the new ministers to become acquainted with their departments before the opening of Parliament.

Premier Baldwin has called a cabinet council for tomorrow to discuss matters of policy.

The addition of Viscount Cecil to the cabinet is considered important owing to his interest in the League of Nations. It is also regarded as showing the government's policy in connection with the League remains unchanged.

JOURNALIST DIES

TORONTO, Nov. 11.—John Sheppard, 69 years of age, founder of Saturday Night and at one time the foremost journalist in Canada, died in California on Saturday.

CAPT. NIXON IS DEAD

VICTORIA, Nov. 11.—Capt. E. A. Nixon, R.N., retired, died of pneumonia here at noon today. He was head of the former naval college here and senior naval officer at Esquimalt.

HALIBUT SALE IS LARGE ONE

Approximately 600,000 Pounds
Disposed of Here in Two
Days

There was no holiday at the Fish Exchange or in the local halibut packing houses yesterday day. In fact, arrivals yesterday were unusually large and 381,800 pounds was marketed. Today another 200,000 or so pounds was sold, making a total for the three past days of 600,000 pounds.

Weather has been cold and clear on the banks lately and very suitable for successful fishing. As a result a number of the large schooners have been getting in with their catches earlier than expected. None of the boats arriving over the weekend will return to the banks as it is only a few days now until the close season starts. The most of the large American schooners after selling here, are leaving for Seattle where they will tie up for the winter.

TRAIN AND BOAT SERVICES CHANGE END OF THIS WEEK

Change of train service on the Canadian National Railways comes into effect next Sunday it is announced at the local city ticket office. Starting next Saturday evening there will be a fortnightly steamer service to Vancouver via the Queen Charlotte Islands by the Prince John.

INQUEST TODAY

Armistice Day is being Celebrated in London, Paris and Dublin Today

DUBLIN, November 11.—For the first time since the end of the war, Armistice Day is being generally celebrated throughout the Free State with memorial demonstrations in Dublin and elsewhere. Thousands of poppies were sold, the wearers including Republicans as well as Free Staters. A parade of ex-service men was held.

LONDON, November 11.—Tens of thousands of people of London gathered around the cenotaph in remembrance of one million of their kin who died in the Great War. King George, the Prince of Wales and the Duke of York were present at the ceremonies and placed wreaths on the tomb. The military and navy held a memorial service in Westminster Abbey.

PARIS, Nov. 11.—Armistice Day for the first time is a full holiday in France. Celebrations were centred at the Arc de Triomphe and at the tomb of the unknown soldier.

While the holiday for Armistice Day in Canada is combined with that for Thanksgiving, the exact date today is being observed. At the hour of eleven this morning, marking the exact time when hostilities ceased in Europe six years ago, all industries and business in the city suspended activities and observed two minutes silence. Tonight, the Great War Veterans' Association is giving a banquet for ex-service men to celebrate the momentous anniversary.

British Premier Makes First Public Pronouncement Since Return to Power at Election

LONDON, Nov. 11.—Stanley Baldwin was the guest of honor at last night's Lord Mayor's banquet at the Guildhall, other guests being Conservative ministers and their wives and the ambassadors of the United States, Spain, Italy and Japan.

Austin Chamberlain, toasting the foreign ambassadors, emphasized the Empire's desire for peace and said: "We rejoice in the co-operation of the United States and trust this will not be withheld in the difficulties now to be faced."

Premier Baldwin said the main object of the Government's

foreign policy would be stability and continuity. He intimated that if the Dominions and great industries were ready to do their part, the Government was ready to make provision for the reopening of the Wembley Exhibition next year. He said the Government would do everything possible to improve the lot of the masses along lines the country had hitherto pursued and "not by changing the basis of our system by which we would fall into the pit of poverty and misery."

COLD WEATHER ALL OVER THE DISTRICT

Ten Below at Hazelton Saturday
Night and Skeena is Freezing
Over—No Snow at Stewart Yet

The clear cold spell which Prince Rupert has been experiencing for the past week and which today shows signs of becoming even more marked is not local. From the interior come reports of an unusual snap for this time of the year. At Hazelton, the thermometer registered 10 below on Saturday night and in places the Skeena River is already frozen over.

Though the weather has been cold there is no snow at Anyox or Stewart, officers on the steamer Cardena reported this morning.

STATION TO BE BUILT IN SPRING

Site on Government Wharf Found
to be Most Suitable for
Biological Depot
Here

All the available sites on the waterfront for the biological station that the department of marine and fisheries is to establish here were inspected on Saturday by Dr. A. P. Knight, chairman of the biological board, and John Dybahn, the local member, and that on the government wharf was found to be the most suitable. Dr. Knight will probably report to this effect to the executive committee. There will be no definite decision reached until this report is made. A special meeting of the whole biological board is called for next month and it is likely that the matter will be dealt with at that time. The building will be erected by the provincial government and leased to the biological board and it is expected that construction will start in the early spring.

Armistice Day
For Seventh Time.

This is the sixth anniversary of Armistice Day and once again Prince Rupert people join with the rest of the people of the British Empire and the allied and associated nations in bringing to remembrance the great deeds done in defence of the ideal of democracy. In the war many lost sons, brothers, fathers or more distant relatives. None wholly escaped. Of those who returned many bear with them the marks of the great conflict. Life was held cheap at that time and the cry was every day for more men, and those the very best the nation could supply. They went freely, and today is the anniversary of the closing of the big fight. Since that time people have been gradually readjusting themselves to the changed conditions. As we look back over the past seven years we see that the change has been gradual but sure. Yet we shall never go back to the conditions as they were before 1914. Possibly the war was one of the steps in the evolution of the race. The human mind is expanding in its scope but it still is unable to grasp the really big things of the world and to consider them in their relative importance.

Nature Not Careful
Of Teeming Life.

Nature has never been careful of life. In the sea one creature eats another from the smallest to the largest. In giving birth to new life millions of salmon die annually in the rivers and lakes of the country. During a bad season the wild things die and during the fruitful season they thrive and increase. Floods, fires, earthquakes, all take their toll of life and plagues are common. Compared with some of the ravages of nature, the deaths from the war were not numerous. It is said that more people died from Spanish Influenza during the few months at the time of the close of the war, than from the whole four years of fighting. From this it will be seen that as a world event the war was not as great an event as we sometimes consider it to be.

It was the greatest war in history but the death list was comparatively small.

Big To Individual
Small To Nature.

If the war was only an incident in the steady progress of Nature, it was big to those who took part in it and to those whose loved ones lost their lives there. To many the war was everything and they still mourn for loved ones although the mourning is hallowed by time and the grief has lost its bitterness.

It is well for us all to look back once a year and consider the sacrifices our young men made and the grief our women bore uncomplainingly. The lessons of the war are getting less insistent as time passes but they are brought to our notice annually with extreme vividness. The poppies remind us of the bloody battle fields and of our duty to those who suffered.

LUMBER AND
ITS SALE

The disposal of the low grade material produced by our sawmills is a very serious problem confronting the lumbermen of British Columbia. It is a factor which must on no account be left out of consideration when measuring the ability of the industry to absorb heavy royalty charges on standing timber.

Our more fortunate competitors in Washington and Oregon possess substantial local markets for their low grade sawmill products. The proximity of their plants to large manufacturing centres and the facilities they possess for shipping by rail and water to their home markets enable them to participate profitably in the production of low quality lumber.

In B.C., on the other hand, there are very restricted opportunities for the disposal of low grade material owing to lack of population and heavy freight charges to lumber buying centres.

Three direct results of British Columbia's weakness in this respect are:

- 1.—A lower gross yield per acre.
- 2.—A higher cost of production.
- 3.—A lower margin of profit to the operator.

It is clear that if the premier industry of this Province is to be carried on successfully it must be maintained on a basis that will permit it to compete with neighboring districts producing actually the same softwood species.

No settlement of the British Columbia Timber Royalties question will be finally satisfactory, either to the public or the industry itself, that does not encourage British Columbia to yield more timber and manufacture it more economically.



BYLAW NO. 476

A BYLAW TO PROVIDE FOR THE EARLY CLOSING OF SHOPS PURSUANT TO THE "SHOPS' REGULATION ACT," CHAPTER 211, REVISED STATUTES OF BRITISH COLUMBIA, 1911, AND AMENDMENTS.

WHEREAS a petition has been presented to the Municipal Council of the City of Prince Rupert praying for the enactment of this Bylaw;

AND WHEREAS it has been proven to the satisfaction of the City Council that the said petition is well founded, and less than three-quarters in number of the occupiers of shops in the City of Prince Rupert in which the after-mentioned retail businesses are carried on, and also that the remaining number in each class of business not less than three-quarters of the persons carrying on such class.

AND WHEREAS the classes of shops referred to in the said petition are: Hardware and Sporting Goods, Electrical, Stationery, Drygoods, Clothiers, Butchers, Grocers, Paint, Furniture, Musical, Boot and Shoe, Bakery and Musical Shops.

NOW THEREFORE THE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL OF THE CORPORATION OF THE CITY OF PRINCE RUPERT ENACTS AS FOLLOWS:

1. In this bylaw the word "person" shall mean and include any body corporate or partnership, or party, and the heirs, executors, administrators, successors, or other legal representative of such person to whom the context can apply according to law.

2. Words importing the singular number, or the masculine gender only, shall in this bylaw mean and include any plural, parties, or things of the same kind that are females as well as males, and the converse.

3. In the construction of this bylaw, and for the purpose of classification of shops as provided in Section 7 of the "Shops' Regulation Act," the following classifications are hereby declared and enacted, that is to say:

(a) "Hardware and Sporting Goods Shop" shall mean and include all shops or stores in which, as to the whole or any part of the business carried on therein, there are offered for sale retail electrical goods, such as lamps, switches, fittings, wire, fuses, switches, safety condensers, fuses, knobs, lock-nuts, icon, metal, laundry, jacks, sockets, etc., or any of the class of goods known to be trade at electrical goods.

(b) "Stationery Shop" shall mean and include all shops or stores in which as to the whole or any part of the business carried on therein, there are offered for sale by retail any goods manufactured for wood, cotton, or silk sold by the yard, or any manufactured clothing, or wearing apparel, manufactured suitable for the wear of ladies or children.

(c) "Clothing Shop" shall mean and include all shops or stores in which, as to the whole or any part of the business carried on therein, there are offered for sale by retail men's clothing, boys' clothing, or any class of goods known to the trade as "Gents' Furnishing," whether for men or boys.

(d) "Butcher Shop" shall mean and include all shops or stores in which, as to the whole or any part of the business carried on therein, there are offered for sale by retail meat or fish.

(e) "Grocer Shop" shall mean and include all shops or stores in which, as to the whole or any part of the business carried on therein, there are offered for sale by retail a stock of groceries.

The following list of articles shall be included:

Almonds (ground), almond paste, apple butter, arrowroot, bacon, baking powder, beans (dried), bird gravel, bird seed, biscuits (bluing), breakfast foods, butter, canned fish, canned fruit, canned meat, canned mushrooms, canned soups, cheese, chicory, chocolate (cooking), chutney, cleaning powders, cocoa, coconut nut, coffee, coffee essences, punging corn, cornflakes, cream, cracker dust, crispino, dried fruit, dried fruits, dried grapes, dried salt, eggs, egg powder, essences of rhubarbs, evaporated fruits, extracts (flavoring), fish (cured), flour (wheaten), flour (buckwheat), flour (graham), flour (rye), flour (whole), fruit (dried), fruit (juice), fruits (dried), gelatin, ginger, honey, horseradish, jams, ice-cream powder, jams, jelly, jelly powder, jelly tablets, junket, macaroni, maple butter, maple syrup, marshmallows, milk (canned), mince meat, molasses, mushrooms, mustard, nutmegs, oatmeal, oats (rolled), oil (salad), olives, peas (dried), pea flour, peanut butter, pearlized peels, pickles, preserved eggs, preserved fruits, preserved meat, rice, sage, salad dressing, cured salmon, table salt, sauerkraut, laundry soap, soap, sugar, canned soups, concentrated soups, spiced spices, starch, sugar, syrup, glucose syrup, tapioca, tea, toothpicks, vermicelli, vinegar, vegetables and yeast.

(f) "Paint Shop" shall mean and include all shops or stores in which, as to the whole or any part of the business carried on therein, there are offered for sale by retail paints, varnishes, stains, kalsomine and wall paper.

(g) "Millinery Shop" shall mean and include all shops or stores in which, as to the whole or part of the business carried on therein, there are offered for sale by retail hats, caps, or other millinery.

(h) "Boot and Shoe Shop" shall mean and include all shops or stores in which, as to the whole or part of the business carried on therein, there are offered for sale by retail shoes, leather dippers, overshoes, or other similar footwear for men, women or children.

(i) "Bakery Shop" shall mean and include all shops or stores in which, as to the whole or part of the business carried on therein, there are offered for sale by retail cakes, bread and pastry.

(j) "Musical Shop" shall mean and include all shops or stores in which, as to the whole or part of the business carried on therein, there are offered for sale by retail pianos, organs, gramophones, and other musical instruments, or sheet music.

3. On and after the coming into force and effect of this bylaw, every person occupying and keeping such shop closed from six (6) o'clock in the afternoon until midnight of every week day; but nothing in this bylaw shall prevent any such person from keeping his shop open until ten (10) o'clock in the afternoon, on Saturday days, prior to public holidays, the ten (10) week days next preceding Christmas and on each day during the week in each year in which the Annual Exhibition of the North-West Agricultural and Industrial Association is held.

4. Bylaw No. 358 is repealed.

5. Any person guilty of an infraction of this bylaw shall upon conviction thereof before the Mayor, Police Magistrate, and Justices of the Peace, or other Magistrate or Magistrate or Magistrate having jurisdiction in the City of Prince Rupert, on the oath or affirmation of any credible witness, forfeit and pay to the City Clerk of the City of Prince Rupert, for the use of the Mayor, Police Magistrate, Justice, or other Magistrate or Magistrate convicting, a fine or penalty not exceeding the sum of One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) and costs, and for the expenses of defending the person thereto, forthwith. It shall be lawful for such Mayor, Police Magistrate, Justices, or other Magistrate, or Magistrate convincting as aforesaid, to issue a warrant under his or their hand and seal to levy the fine or penalty and costs only, by distress and sale of the offender's goods and chattels, and in case of no sufficient distress found to satisfy the said fine or penalty, it shall and may be lawful for the said police Magistrate, Justices, or other Magistrate, or Magistrate convincting as aforesaid to commit the offender to the common jail or any lock-up house in the City of Prince Rupert for any period not exceeding two (2) months (with or without hard labor) un-


