## BRITISH AVIATORS UNDER WAY ONCE MORE

### BEING PLANNED TO HAVE U.S. FLIGHT COMMANDER LEAD SQUADRON HOME

#### Stuart M'Laren in Air Again After Delay and Yanks to Fly Tomorrow

BOMBAY, May 13.—Having received a new motor from Bagdad and installed it in his machine, Stuart MacLaren, the British round-the-world aviator, arrived safely at Nasirabad from Paris today, resuming his flight after a delay of over two weeks.

GORDOVA, May 13.—The American army round-the-world flying cruises Boston, Chicago and New Orleans, in command of Lieut. Lowell Smith, Lieut. Leigh Wade and Lieut. Erik Nelson with the first-mentioned as flight commander, intend to hop off Wednesday from Chicago Harbor, Attu Island, for Paramushiri Island, Kurile Archipelago, Japan.

This will be the longest and most strenuous flight of the entire cruise around the globe and will test the endurance and skill of the aviators to the utmost. For hours they will be out of sight of land and will be guided entirely by compass. It is one of the few hops of the flight in the course of which land will not be nearby and, if it is executed successfully, the chances of the Americans in circumnavigating the globe will be greatly increased. The flight from Paramushiri Island down the Kurile Archipelago to the main islands of Japan, it is anticipated, should offer no difficulty. The next hops on which there may be trouble will be in the tropics of Indo-China and India and on the crossing of the North Atlantic ocean by way of Iceland and Greenland.

#### QUEEN MARIE IN ENGLAND

Heroine Queen of Rumania Paying State Visit at Her Grandmother's Old Home

#### GREAT RECEPTION

LONDON, May 13.—Queen Marie of Rumania arrived in England yesterday to pay a visit to her grandmother's old home at Buckingham Palace and received a welcome truly Victorian in splendor. Battalions of brilliantly uniformed troops and mounted bands lined the route from Victoria station to the palace.

After introductions at the Palace, King Ferdinand and Queen Marie went to Whitehall where they laid a wreath on the cenotaph. Tomorrow they will visit the Guildhall and receive the freedom of the city. Their state visit will be crowded with balls, receptions and dinners.

#### PREMIER TAKES BIG MISSOURI

Vancouver Has Rumor to That Effect—Said Will Operate Property

VANCOUVER, May 13.—It is reported here that the Guggenheim interests, which control the Premier mine, have absorbed the Big Missouri, developed by A. B. Trites, and the B.C. Silver, adjoining the Premier of the north-west.

The Big Missouri is owned by Dan Lindeberg, Andy Lindeberg, Proudfoot and the Stevens' estate and was under bond to Trites, Wood and Wilson. The Premier is said to have taken over control for operation at least.

The Premier Co. already had an interest in the B.C. Silver together with the Selukwe Gold Co. of the Rand.

#### LLOYD GEORGE VERY PLEASED

Result of French Election, He Says, Will Conduce toward Pacification of World

LONDON, May 13.—In the course of a political speech last night, Ex-Premier David Lloyd George alluded to the results of the French elections as a great Liberal victory. The event, he declared, was one of great significance and deep moment and one that he believed would conduce toward the much needed pacification of the world.

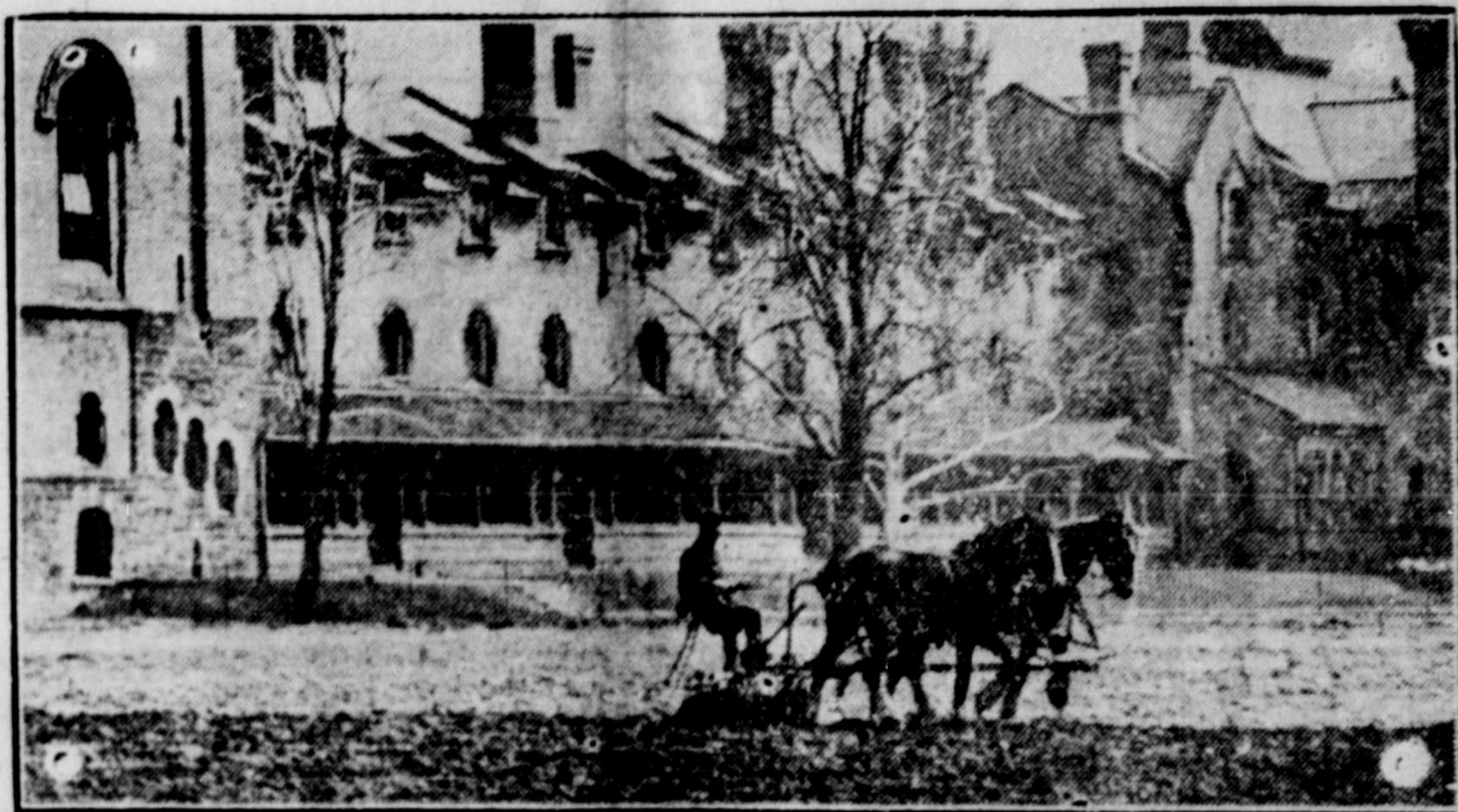
#### MANITOBA GRAIN ACT MODIFIED BY COURT

That Section Providing For Taxation on Future Deliveries Declared Ultra Vires

OTTAWA, May 13.—The Supreme Court of Canada today declared that portion of the Manitoba Grain Act which passed the legislature in 1923 and which provides for taxes on grain sold for future delivery ultra vires. #### DRASTIC DECLINE VALUE OF FRANC

NEW YORK, May 13.—The outcome of the French elections has brought about a break in the exchange value of the franc of more than fifty points—the most drastic decline since French currency collapsed in March. The rate dipped to five and a half cents. The par value of the franc is 19 cents.

#### POINCARÉ TO QUIT JUNE 4

French Premier Considers Election Result Repudiation of His Government

PARIS, May 13.—Premier Poincaré and his recently reorganized ministry will step down from power on June 4, the earliest possible date under the law. The premier considers the result of the election on Sunday, at which the Opposition gained control, a repudiation of his government.

Newcastle United Assessed £750 for Fielding Weak Team Prior to Cup Final

LONDON, May 13.—At a meeting of the Association Football League at Manchester, the Newcastle United club, winner of the English Cup final, was fined £750 for playing a weak team before the final match. On April 21 Newcastle put into the field against Aston Villa only two members of its regular team and was defeated six to nil. The following Saturday, Newcastle defeated Aston Villa in the cup final by two to nil.

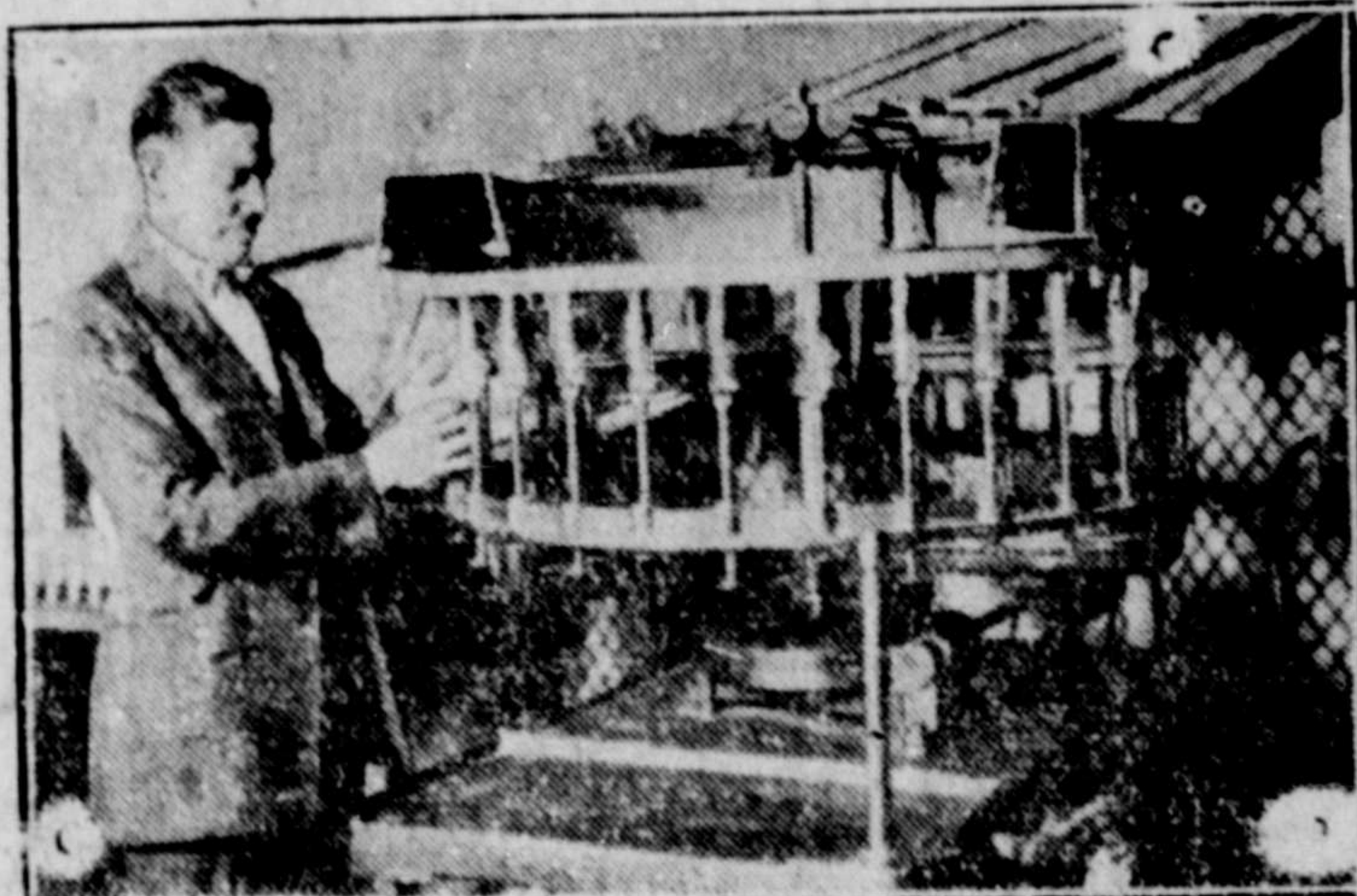

#### Order-in-Council Passed at Ottawa Respecting Disposal of Halibut Culled by Buyers

"All halibut and other deep-sea fish that are brought to the port of Prince Rupert for sale there and that are rejected by the buyers as being unsuitable as to size or quality and that are known locally as 'culs' shall, if they are subsequently sold for any purpose, be sold only with the knowledge and consent of the owner."

Such is the ruling of an order-in-council that has just been passed at Ottawa, according to announcement made by Fred Stork, M.P. for Skeena.

#### Fred Dorey, Sam Fry, William Murphy of Hyder Burned to Death in Midnight Blaze While Asleep

STEWART, May 13.—Fred Dorey, Sam Fry and William Murphy, all business men of Hyder, were burned to death in Murphy's cabin on his mining claim in the Thumb Creek district twelve miles out of here on Wednesday night.

The fire evidently started when the men were asleep and was caused, it is assumed, by an overheated stove. The remains of the victims were not found until Sunday morning when the prolonged absence of the men caused a search to be instituted. A coroner's inquest was held and the verdict was that the deaths were accidental.

Fred Dorey moved to Hyder only a short time ago from Stewart. He was engaged in the transfer business. During the war he was a lieutenant in the air service.

Sam Fry was a partner of Dorey's in the transfer business and was well known to all in Hyder.

William Murphy was well known as a prospector. Several years ago he sold some claims in the Hyder regions to John Ronan, Former Governor Thomas Riggs, Jr., and associates.

#### Major Martin Ordered to Washington; to be Sent to Europe Later

BELLINGHAM, May 13.—Acting on instructions to give up the flight and return home, Major Frederick L. Martin sailed from Port Moller last night at midnight for Bellingham. He and Staff Sergeant Alva L. Harvey are coming south on the Pacific Fisheries cannery tender, Catherine D.

WASHINGTON, D.C., May 13.—Major Martin and Sergeant Harvey have been ordered direct to Washington from Port Moller and will be assigned to the air service headquarters temporarily but their names will be kept on the list of globe flyers in compliment and in recognition of the hardship valiantly endured in attempting to lead the squadron. The other three planes will proceed around the world with Lieut. Lowell H. Smith acting as commander. It is the intention to send Martin and Harvey across the Atlantic in time to meet the globe circlers and lead them home from Europe, thus giving the commander the post of honor which he lost through hard luck.

#### FISH ARRIVALS

Sixteen Schooners Marketed 193,100 Pounds of Halibut at Exchange this Morning

Halibut sales on the Fish Exchange were again heavy this morning when nine American and seven Canadian schooners marketed a total catch of 193,100 pounds this being 32,300 pounds in excess of yesterday's total. Of to-day's total the Americans landed 163,000 pounds and the Canadians 30,100 pounds. Prices for American fish remained about the same as those prevailing yesterday while the Canadians received approximately a cent more for first class fish. #### MORE ONTARIO MEN ARRESTED

Well Known Financiers Are Charged with Conspiracy to Defraud Public

TORONTO, May 13.—Aemilius Jarvis, Sr., bond dealer and internationally known capitalist; Aemilius Jarvis, Jr., his son and the manager of the firm, Harry Pepall, who were arrested late yesterday, were charged in the police court here this morning with conspiracy to defraud of Ontario government. They were remanded until May 21.

The charge against the men is that they unlawfully conspired together with A. Pepall, Peter Smith and other persons unknown by fraudulent methods to defraud the public in the province of Ontario by manipulating market prices, succession duties and free bonds of the province contrary to the criminal code.

Peter Smith, former provincial treasurer, is already under arrest.

#### RESERVE BANK IS PROPOSED

In Commons Banking and Commerce Committee by Independent Member for Calgary

OTTAWA, May 13.—The establishment of a central or reserve bank was proposed at the banking and commerce committee of the House of Commons this morning by J. T. Shaw, independent member for Calgary. Before this subject came up, four witnesses on United States methods of banking inspection were mentioned as likely to be called to give evidence. Mr. Shaw argued that the federal reserve bank in the United States had protected depositors and stated that several Canadian bankers has already expressed the view that the formation of such a reserve bank in Canada would only be a matter of time.

#### SUN YAT SEN IS VERY ILL

Reports of his Death from Brain Fever are Contradicted, However

HONG KONG, May 13.—Sun Yat Sen, president of the southern government of China, is seriously ill with brain fever but there is no indication that reports of his death are correct.

**PRINCE RUPERT MILK DISCUSSED**

Tests For Tuberculosis Not Carried Out Properly Here, Council Alleges

Consideration of bylaw amendments respecting the keeping of stock within the city caused a general discussion of some length at last night's council meeting with regard to the city's milk supply and the condition of cattle herds in Prince Rupert. There was some criticism of the methods employed by the provincial government inspectors in the making of tuberculosis tests and lack of co-operation between the government and city authorities was alleged. Dr. J. P. Cade, medical health officer, attended the meeting and participated in the discussion.

The whole question was brought up in connection with the consideration of bylaw amendments providing that goats shall not be kept in the city within 25 feet of any dwelling house and that no manure or straw used in connection with the keeping of stock shall be burned within the city limits. These amendments were put through their first readings and were passed and will come up for final consideration and adoption at the next meeting of the council. They were assented to by Dr. Cade. Regulations governing the keeping of stock in Vancouver were brought to the attention of the council but they were dropped in view of the fact that it was not intended to prohibit altogether the keeping of stock in Prince Rupert. Such action was not considered necessary here at the present time.

When the matter of cattle was brought up, Dr. Cade told the council that it was his duty to test milk offered for sale in the city with respect to "butter" fat content. This work, the doctor said, would be greatly facilitated if there was a sanitary inspector to gather the samples. Dr. Cade said that his jurisdiction did not extend to the examination of cattle for tuberculosis. This was a matter for the provincial inspectors.

**Hushing Things Up**

Ald. Macdonald referred to the number of milk cows that had been ordered destroyed here because of tuberculosis. He did not agree with the policy of hushing such things up. It was the right of the citizens to know so that they might protect themselves. Government inspectors had come here and ordered that cattle be destroyed but the city authorities were never advised. Somebody was falling down on the job.

Dr. Cade admitted that there was lack of co-operation between the provincial and civic authorities. Inspectors had come here and gone away again without reporting to the city. Many cattle had been ordered destroyed and he himself had had to write direct to Victoria before he could get any information on the matter.

In answer to questions, Dr. Cade expressed the opinion that tuberculosis tests should be made every six months. The last tests were made here last September. There were, however, only a few dairy cattle left in the city. Only one dairy was operating in town and he estimated that three-quarters of the milk now sold here came from the outside. The cattle from the interior, Dr. Cade said, were more free from tuberculosis than those in the city. The butter fat content was also higher. It was only a matter of time until the keeping of dairy cattle in the city would have to be prohibited for the stock could not long be kept free from tuberculosis on account of being stabled under damp conditions.

**Keep Closer Touch**

Mayor Newton suggested that the medical health officer keep closer in touch with the situation. The council would not object to a little extra expense if it was necessary in connection with the making of milk tests. Ald. Colliart did not think it was necessary to make milk tests every week. Anyway, these milk tests did not apply to tuberculosis.

Ald. Macdonald said he was prepared to offer a resolution asking the minister of agriculture to make more frequent tuberculosis tests here.

depending largely, however, on the method of cooking it. A temperature of 150 killed all tuberculosis germs. Ald. Casey thought there should be someone in authority to make tuberculosis tests here and he was in favor of Ald. Macdonald's suggestion to take the matter up with the government and point out the lax methods of the past.

Dr. Cade said the matter had already been brought to the attention of the minister and he had expressed regret at the seeming laxity.

The original amendments were then passed but no action was taken with respect to the tuberculosis matter.

**Hospital Day Here On Thursday.**

Hospital Day will be observed in Prince Rupert on Thursday of this week and the public is asked to co-operate with the hospital board in its celebration. The hospital and nurses' home are to be thrown open for inspection. By taking advantage of this opportunity to visit the institution, citizens may be able to observe at first hand the importance of the work that is being carried on.

National Hospital Day which is the "come in and get acquainted day" of the thousands of hospitals of the United States and Canada has awakened remarkable interest in the great work of these institutions of mercy. Presidents and other national leaders, heads of states and provinces, mayors, and influential men and women of all classes are co-operating in helping the hospitals to tell their communities of their service, and it is no wonder that although the idea of a National Hospital Day was originated only as late as 1921, the movement is generally observed throughout the United States and Canada, and has aroused interest of progressive hospitals in Alaska, China, Egypt, Hawaii and in other parts of the world.

**French Electioog And Foreign Policy.**

The result of the election in France on Sunday will very likely mean considerable if not entire change in that country's attitude towards reparations matters. Whether "pound of flesh" attitude towards Germany, which has been in practice through the occupation of the Ruhr for the past year and more, is to be continued, remains to be seen, but with circumstances developing as they have of late it seems probable that there will be some change of policy. The result of the election may be taken as the voice of the people on that matter and it will in all probability be acted upon accordingly.

**Playground Important To All Communities.**

It is gratifying to be informed that the Gyro Club has its playground program in such a state that it will shortly be realized. Since the advent of the automobile, it has become absolutely necessary that places be provided where the children can play in safety. Statistics recently published reveal the astounding fact that 93,000 children were either killed or seriously injured by street traffic in the United States during 1923. Prince Rupert has had its share of such accidents though, in a place of this size, it is not to be expected that they would take on very large proportions. However, if the Gyro playground should be the means of saving but one child's life, the project would have been worth all that it involved.

It has become a responsibility of the community to provide playgrounds where the physical and moral welfare of the children may be properly fostered. In many cases this is taken care of by the Parks Boards and in some cities by the School Boards. In Prince Rupert the Gyro Club has embarked upon this cause and the organization, in its endeavors, is entitled to all the support that can be given it.

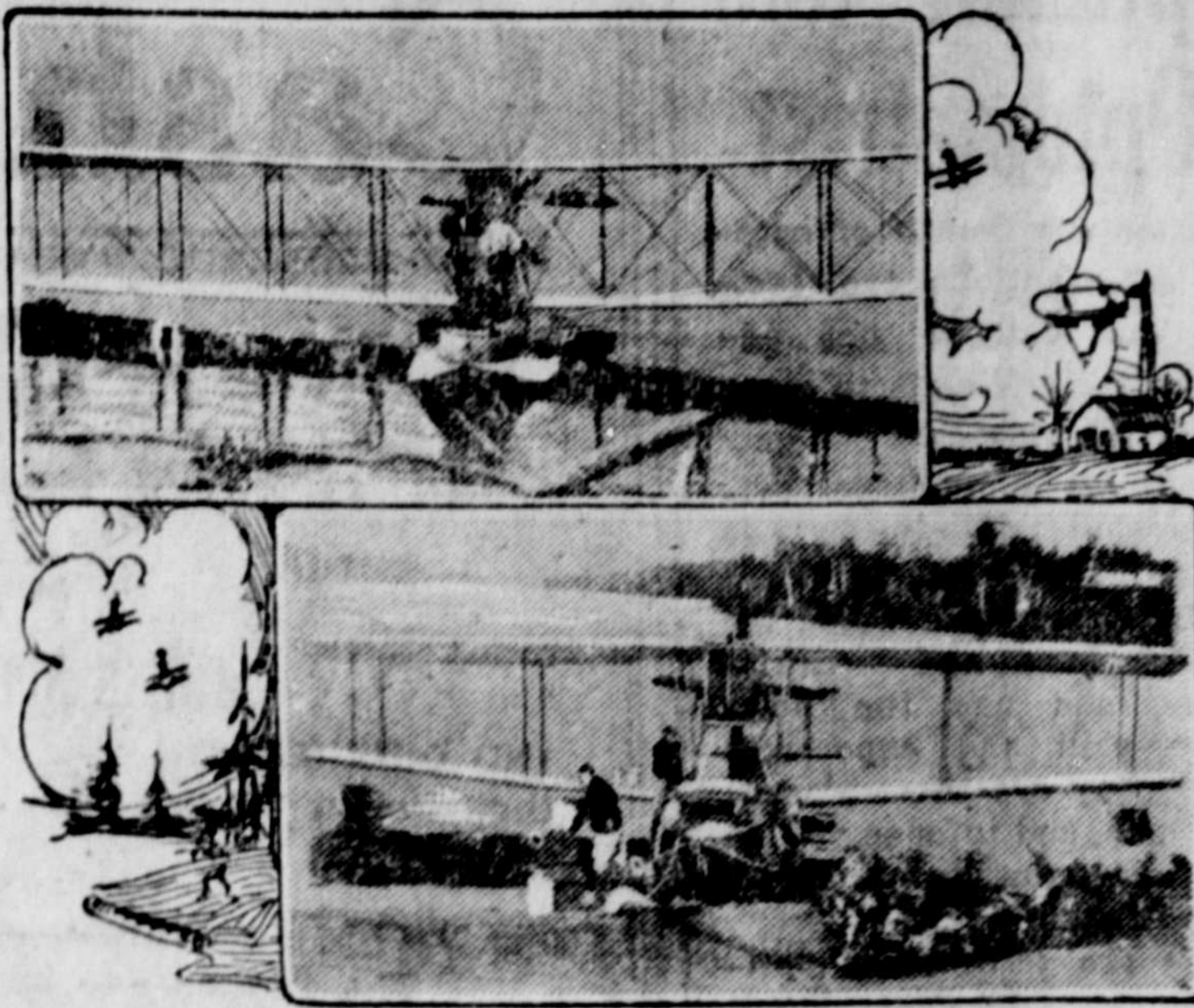

### One Flies to the North



"Contact!" "Contact!" The last audible words between pilot and mechanic are spoken, and with stentorian roar of engine and propeller the giant, human and baggage freighted plane, glides swiftly over the surface of the Quince. One feels the churning waters tumbling at the bottom of the boat until momentum has increased to such extent that a touch of the "stick" causes the Vickers Viking to slowly rise.

Two turns in as many minutes and the passenger, having adjusted his goggles and seated himself more comfortably, peers, at first cautiously, over the side of the pit, and far below him lies the little town of Angliers, the head of the Canadian Pacific steel which twists and turns in and out of the forest to the south like a living thing. The earth is as a map below, lakes and rivers shining in the distance and beneath, and ragged patches of bush and arable land smudged here and there like a child's attempt to depict relief. Turning east the plane heads down Lake Quince, following the water course to Lake Expanse, — one sees from the air how appropriate is its name, — thence north for some fifteen miles up the Ottawa River and further north over one of its tributaries to Lake Fortune and Roayn, upon nearing which the plane leaves the glorious rolling clouds and gradually sinks until once more the water tumps the bottom of the hull, checking it with sudden jerks which tend to slow the boat until it stops within a few feet of tie-up. One wonders how the pilot could, at such a speed, have judged his distance so well. But then he does the same thing more than once each day bringing to the new Gold Fields of Quebec, in fifty minutes, passengers and supplies which, before the air service was started took two days at the least to arrive.

Commencing May 18th the Air Service to the Gold Fields will be regular on Monday, Wednesday and Friday, large flying boats capable of carrying five people being scheduled to meet all Canadian Pacific trains at Angliers. This service, which will eliminate the hardships of the past and enable prospectors and tourists to travel to the Roayn Mining District in less than an hour will include regular stops where they are required and accommodation is available.

DEVIL'S BIBLE PHOTOGRAPHED

Has Full Page Picture of His Satanic Majesty with Cloven Hoofs and Horns

STOCKHOLM, May 12.—One of the most remarkable books in the world, called the "Devil's Bible" and also the "giant of books," has just been brought out of its hiding place in the Royal Library of Stockholm, following a request for a photostat copy from the city of Prague, where it was captured at the Swedish conquest in 1648.

It was written 800 years ago, and legend says that it was completed during a single night by a monk who was doomed to die. He had to have assistance from the devil, however, and in gratitude made a full page portrait of him, horns, cloven hoofs, and all, which has ever since remained in the book.

The book is probably the largest Bible in the world, the pages being a yard high by a foot and a half wide. It is written on 309 parchment sheets, for which, according to tradition, 100 donkey hides were required. The lettering is beautifully illuminated in gold and bright colors.

SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENTS

VACANT, UNRESERVED, SURVEYED Crown lands may be pre-empted by British subjects over 18 years of age, and by aliens on declaring intention to become British subjects, conditional upon residence, occupation, and improvement for agricultural purposes.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes, and which is not timberland, i.e., carrying over 5,000 board feet per acre west of the Coast Range and 4,000 feet per acre east of that Range.

Applications for pre-emptions are to be addressed to the Land Commissioner of the Land Recording Division, in which the land applied for is situated, and are made on printed forms, copies of which can be obtained from the Land Commissioner.

Under the Grazing Act the Province is divided into grazing districts and the range administered under a Grazing Commissioner. Annual grazing permits are issued based on numbers ranged, priority being given to established owners.

LARGE INCREASE IN GRAIN SHIPPING

WINNIPEG, May 12.— Grain loadings along Canadian National lines are still increasing, figures for the week ending May 8 showing a gain of 885 cars over the same week of last year, while the total loadings since September 1 amount to approximately 33,000,000 bushels more than for the same period of the previous season.

During the week mentioned, Saskatchewan marketed 491,000 bushels and loaded 1,700,000 at points along the Canadian National Railways while Alberta marketed 275,000 bushels and loaded 708,000 bushels.

Arrivals at Vancouver number 43,933 cars up to May 7, being more than three times the number of cars of the period previous crop shipped over National lines to the Pacific coast outlet.

ENGLISH NEWSPAPERS ON FRENCH ELECTION
