

### Alcoa Development Effects B.C.

AUGHT between two huge aluminum developments, Prince Rupert and Central B.C. citizens may feel their future has received another boost towards prosperity and progress.

No doubt, a good deal of prosperity's run-off will hit this centre from the north and from the south and a good deal will by-pass us. These are probably the first reactions to the announcement by Aluminum Company of America that it will build a \$400,000,000 plant near Skagway, Alaska.

There is, however, at least one other major point included in this announcement which affects British Columbians and Canadians as a whole. In order to operate an aluminum plant in the Skagway area, Alcoa must get its water power from northern Canadian sources.

Alcoa plans to dam the Yukon River, fill up a basin comprised of 104-mile-long Atlin Lake, 50mile-long Surprise Lake, and several other smaller lakes in the area. A large part of this source of waterpower lies within the boundaries of B.C.

But a news dispatch says that although Alcoa has made its announcement of plans, it must first get permission of the Canadian and the B.C. governments to use this waterpower source.

We don't follow quite so fast. Have the American financiers just taken for granted that this, one of the michest waterpower resources in Canada, will he handed to them? Or have they already received the blessings of our governments? It is hard to understand that a multi-million dollar project of such magnitude would be announced before all major problems have been overcome.

Surely, when we as British Columbians have such a large stake in the natural resources on which Alcoa depends for its development, we should be among the first to know of plans to dispose of them.

It may be, however, that Canadians have no intention of developing this waterpower source for their own use. It may be that granting Alcoa the water rights would be the best move ever made for the development of North America's northland. We would like to hear both sides of this subject, one of major importance to all B.C.

We would like to hear some definite opinions or facts in the case from our Victoria government, as well as from Ottawa. No doubt the benefits from another big aluminum plant in our vicinity will be sizeable, but we should know what we are getting in return for a good chunk of our own resources.



SAN FRANCISCO. - I shall probably never return to this city of the Golden Gate without experiencing a pang for the

delayed dream of 1945.

These papers publish in many Polish, German, Yiddish, Norwegian, Hungarian, Swedish, Icelandic and Slovakian.

The main reason they have concentrated here is Winnipeg's geographical location. Lower transportation costs are a big factor in their tight budgets.

The Community Press has a responsible and highly-specialized-task-to link the Canadian way of life with the traditions of Europe, and to introduce Canada to the new-comer. Some of the sheets have been performing this task for more than 80 years.

Although the language is for-1 eign, the spirit is Canadian. Michael Pohorecky, editor of the tri-weekly New Pathway says "the men who work in this field !" are dedicated people. They work with an emphatic zeal for the cause of Canadian citizanship."

#### WRITE OWN HISTORY

One of several publications offering complete information services to new immigrants is the Hungarian News which distributes without charge a 256-page book on Canadian history and

This book, written in Hungarian by Editor G. Nemus, gives Hungarian Canadians a true description of Canada in their native tongue.

"Those who enter jobs from the moment they land, and never have the benefits of a Canadian education, can never get a true picture of Canadian history unless material of this sort is provided," said Nemes. "I feel we editors have a definite duty in this field."

The Ukrainian paper has 20 000 subscribers compared to the 3,000 of the small Swidish Press. All the foreign-language papers compete for advertising revenue; their particular problem is to. convince the advertiser that their special language group will respond to his product.





### Canada Builds Big Gun Range on River Marsh

By DOUGLAS HOW Canadian Press Staff Writer

OTTAWA .- In a tranquil, marshy widening of the St. Lawrence River, Canada is building a 13-mile firing range to test the big guns and shells she is making for herself and her allies.

By September, officials of the ment of national defence say land they will be in full-scale operation with shells flying out into marked-off section of what is called Lake St. Peter but which is actually a broadened St. Lawrence.

Already, after several months work, some testing of guns and shell is going on at the Embryo Range, within two miles of the quiet village of Nocolet and 35 to 40 miles from Sorel where variety of big guns are made.
