## SERIOUS DISTURBANCE IN CENTRAL RUSSIA

### CAMPAIGN FOR FUNDS SUCCESSFUL, NEW PLACE OF WORSHIP NOW ASSURED

#### Communist Activities are to be Checked by Former Czarist Heads

LONDON, Feb. 7.—A Reuters despatch says there are serious disturbances in the Kharkov district of Russia. Commissar Bolzaroff, with a considerable military force, is said to be supporting insurgents whose banners read "Long life to the Soviet government with Communist Dictatorship." Explosions followed by fire destroyed a large part of the munition plants at Tula. A Moscow despatch says that the military authorities, incensed by the political proclivities of the new officers in the district, have decided to reappoint former Czarist officers.

#### SENSATION IN GREAT BRITAIN

Lloyd George Hints That There Was Secret Pact Between France and U.S.

#### FRANCE DENIES IT

LONDON, Feb. 7.—Newspapers here are promulgating a sensational statement by Lloyd George given out in an interview on Sunday that an agreement existed between Woodrow Wilson and Clemenceau regarding French occupation of Rhineland of which Lloyd George was unaware until the French government sought permission to publish the document.

The British foreign office throws cold water on the statement, saying they believe the original Lloyd George statement had been much exaggerated.

Premier Ramsay MacDonald has written Premier Poincare expressing regret for the incident. PARIS, Feb. 7.—The foreign office here denies the existence of a secret pact between this country and the United States. The French government knows of no document to which the insinuations of Lloyd George would apply. "If Lloyd George will produce the agreement between Wilson and me, I will pay the reparations," said Clemenceau.

Lloyd George Denies LONDON, Feb. 7.—A despatch from Lloyd George's Surrey home claims that he will publish a full reply to the interview regarding the Rhineland pact which he never gave. The premier states that the correspondent who cabled to America was confused by a private conversation with him.

#### AGED METLAKATLA WOMAN PASSED AWAY

Mother of Capt. Herbert Clifton Died at Native Village Yesterday

Mrs. Clifton, aged mother of Capt. Herbert Clifton, former master of the tug McCulloch, passed away at Metlakatla yesterday. Burial will take place at the village, a casket having been shipped across by the B.C. Undertakers.

#### RUSSIA WILL ATTEND NAVAL CONFERENCE

GENEVA, Feb. 7.—Russia has notified the League of Nations of her acceptance of an invitation to attend a naval conference at Rome on February 14 for the extension of the principles of the Washington naval treaty with other powers.

#### THIRTY MILLION REVENUE WANTED IN COMING YEAR

That is Ambition of Sir Henry Thornton as Stated in Radio Talk

MONTREAL, Feb. 7.—The necessity of treating the traveling public with all courtesy and respect and of placing their comfort before all other considerations was stressed in an address by Sir Henry Thornton, president of the Canadian National Railways, broadcasted by radio last night from station CHYC, Montreal. Owing to the absence from the city of Sir Henry, the message was delivered for him by W. D. Robb, vice-president. The occasion was the third of the radio programs to be broadcast from Montreal by the Canadian National Railways, the address of Sir Henry being the only speech on last night's program. The remainder consisted of instrumental and vocal selections by prominent artists of the city.

In his address, which was more in the nature of a chat with system employees, Sir Henry stated that while the net earnings by Canadian National Railways last year were a little more than twenty million dollars, they wanted thirty million net this year. Given a luck and the support of all employees, he had no fears of the result.

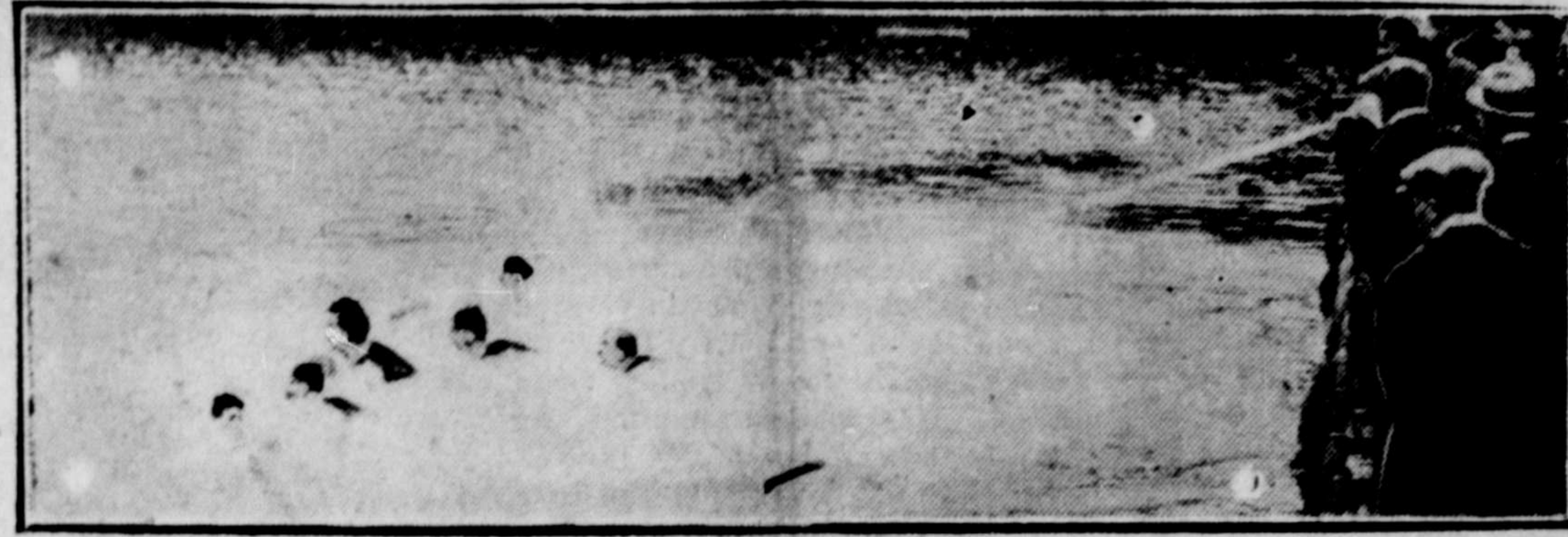
#### NAVAL PROGRAM OF FRANCE EXTENSIVE

Will Have Nine Battleships and Fourteen Cruisers in About Year

PARIS, Feb. 7.—When France completes the reduction of the first section of her naval program, elaborated in conformity with the Washington disarmament agreement, the fleet of the republic will consist of nine battleships, 14 destroyers, 60 torpedo boats and destroyers, and 64 submarines. This will be done by the spring of 1926.

Of the nine battleships, however, two are now obsolete and are not even today carried in the parliamentary reports as effective weapons of offense. Six of the 14 cruisers will have passed the age limit, and 17 torpedo boats and destroyers are admitted by naval experts to be unequal to the task that would be allotted to them in present naval warfare. Twenty of the submarines which saw service during the late war, according to a parliamentary report, would be useless.

#### LIMITED GROUP LATEST POLICY

Railway to Place Settlers on Land in Such Way as to be Attractive and Beneficial

MONTREAL, Feb. 7.—Considerable interest is being expressed in Great Britain in the colonization plans of the Canadian National Railways according to a report from W. J. Black, minister of colonization and development of the National system in London, England. The report, which was received today by W. D. Robb, vice president in charge of colonization and development, sets forth that a great many inquiries have been received at the London office since Dr. Black returned there last month and that the policy of limited group settlement appears to be appealing quite strongly to prospective settlers.

The limited group policy of the Canadian National Railways has been drawn up to prevent large communities difficult to assimilate into the national life of Canada being formed but at the same time to permit of the settlement of sufficient numbers of the same race of people in a community to give them freedom of religious and social exercise according to their custom.

Dr. Black has practically completed his organization and expects to send large numbers of adaptable immigrants to Canada during the coming year in connection with immigration from the United States.

An interesting statement was made by J. E. Laforce, general agent of colonization and development of the Canadian National railways at Boston. Mr. Laforce, who was in Montreal yesterday states that on an average 150 families of French Canadians are returning to Canada from the New England states weekly. This movement has been going on since the first of the year and considerable increase is expected with the arrival of spring. The majority of these families are settling again in the province of Quebec.

#### PRINCE ALBERT BACK TO VANCOUVER AFTER ANOTHER BOOZE TRIP

The Western Freighters' whiskey steamer Prince Albert, formerly of the C.N.R. coastwise service, returned to Vancouver last week after another successful run towards Mexico with spirits and beer. The Albert will sail south again with another precious cargo as soon as some repairs have been effected.

#### WOMAN GOES TO SCAFFOLD

Mrs. Katherine Tratch of Saskatchewan to Hang For Murder

PRINCE ALBERT, Feb. 7.—Found guilty of murdering her husband in the Fish Creek district on October 19, Mrs. Katherine Tratch last night was sentenced to hang on May 20. According to Mrs. Tratch's confession to the police she was persuaded to poison her husband by another man whom she loved.

#### WILL COMPLETE NURSES' HOME

Rotary Club Committee Appointed to Provide Ways and Means For Financing Project

At the meeting of the Rotary Club today, President H. R. Grant, in the chair, it was decided to guarantee a sum up to one thousand dollars for the purpose of finishing five rooms on the third storey of the Nurses' Home and a committee was appointed to find ways and means of raising the money.

It was felt by members of the club that all had contributed more or less to the original building, doing their share with the rest of the community. For that reason they did not think they should again assess themselves for the full cost of the work. Instead of that the committee will arrange for some entertainment program that it is thought will appeal to the public and by means of which the cash will be raised.

The matter was discussed at some length and the decision to proceed was unanimous. The directors of the hospital will now be able to let the contract for the completion of the building with the guarantee that the money will be forthcoming in the near future. The directors have assured the club that the accommodation at the home is badly needed and that in no way could the club serve the public better than in having this work go ahead.

The committee to devise ways and means is composed of J. W. Nicholls and C. H. Orme.

#### WOULD DISARM STILL FURTHER

LONDON, Feb. 7.—Prime Minister Macdonald would welcome the calling of another convention similar to the Washington conference having as its objective further diminution of the naval and military equipments of the world. He stated so this afternoon.

#### EX-PRESIDENT TAFT IS CONFINED TO BED

Suffered an Attack of Indigestion Yesterday and is Ordered by Doctors to Take Rest

WASHINGTON, Feb. 7.—Chief Justice William H. Taft, ex-president of the United States, who suffered an attack of indigestion yesterday, has been ordered by his physicians to take a complete rest for a few days. He passed a restful night but is still in bed.

#### New Presbyterian Church will be Erected; Tenders to be Called for Building Soon as Possible

The campaign for funds conducted during the past three days having been highly successful, the erection of a new Presbyterian Church in the city is now assured. Excavation of the lots just west of the present building will commence at once. Plans for the proposed \$25,000 building of frame construction and cement foundation will be perfected immediately and tenders called for putting it up at the earliest possible date. Before the end of the year, the Presbyterian congregation will be housed in an edifice the need for which has been so long felt.

The whirlwind campaign came to a close last night with the canvassing committees reporting a total of \$9,732 already raised. Owing to the shortness of the time it was impossible to see all prospective contributors but it is confidently expected that the total will reach \$12,000. The balance required to erect the church will be advanced by the General Assembly on loan.

To mark the end of the campaign, a congregational rally was held last night in the church hall. George H. Munro, chairman of the board of managers, presided and besides himself the speakers of the evening were F. G. Dawson, Fred Stork, M.P., Rev. Dr. H. R. Grant and Mrs. R. M. Taylor, president of the Ladies' Aid. The splendid and generous spirit with which the canvassers had been received by the contributors was appreciatively commented upon by all. Great enthusiasm prevailed. Refreshments were served.

#### CAPTAIN COURAGE HAS BEEN ARRESTED

Charged with Violation of Fisheries Act; Refused to Stop When Fired On

NANAIMO, Feb. 7.—Alleged to have been in command of the fishing craft Siloam, fired on by the government fisheries boat Malaspina, April 25, after her crew had refused to stop, the firing resulting in the fatal wounding of the steward while the captain and crew successfully escaped to shore in a small boat, Captain J. Courage is in the Nanaimo city jail. He was brought over from the west coast by Constable Woods of the provincial police, after being arrested at the Kildonan cannery.

Captain Courage is charged with a violation of section 47 of the fisheries act, and, it is understood, will be turned over to the fisheries department. The authorities could find no trace of the captain and crew of the Siloam, which was captured just off Solander island, and it was only with the greatest difficulty that she was beached, the crew having scuttled her.

#### BIG STANDARD OIL TANKER IS DUE TO ARRIVE THIS WEEK

The Standard oil tanker Hanna A. Shorkey and infant daughter is due here this week from San Francisco with 45,000 barrels of fuel oil for the Imperial Oil Co.'s local tanks. This will be the first call here of the Hanna which is one of the Standard Oil Co.'s largest tank ships. It is understood she will be the largest tanker ever to enter Prince Rupert Harbor. She is making another British Columbia call en route north.

#### GRAIN MARKET IN VANCOUVER

Interests in Southern City Pressing For Reforms to Existing Regulations

VANCOUVER, Feb. 7.—The creation of grain inspection facilities at Vancouver with the ultimate object of establishing a primary or cash grain market here was the announced objective of Vancouver interests when they prepared to lay a series of demands before the Canada Grain Board. Harbor commissioners, elevator officials and grain men declare they will press for changes in the regulations of the grain trade which they deem inadequate and antiquated.

#### LOG SCALING IN JANUARY

P. S. Bonney, District Forester, Announces Total of 5,777,174 Board Feet

According to the report of P. S. Bonney, district forester, log scaling in Prince Rupert district during the month of January totalled 5,777,174 board feet marking a falling off from the corresponding month last year. Linal feet of poles recorded totalled 350, cedar piles 350; railway ties, 4,823 and pulpwood, 147 3-8 cords.

Today we are publishing an article descriptive of the museum and historical library of the territory of Alaska at Juneau. It seems to be a very important institution and is constantly being improved by the addition of more specimens.

British Columbia's provincial museum was also started in a small way by the Natural History Society of British Columbia located at Victoria, the members of which gave of their time and talents to secure the establishment of the institution.

Vancouver has a small museum and art collection but so wrapped up in commercialism have the people there been that they have had little time for anything else.

Prince Rupert should be a museum and art centre for the northern and central portion of British Columbia. It is the natural centre and all that is needed is for someone to take an interest in it and get it started.

Ramsay Macdonald Is Real Leader.

Whatever else he may be, it must be admitted that Premier Ramsay Macdonald is a real leader. He will not sit down quietly and let things drift. BOGUS MONEY BECOMES COMMON IN GERMANY

BERLIN, Feb. 7. - Bogus money has become very common in Germany since the decline of the mark and the passage of financial transactions out of regular banks into the hands of money-bootleggers.

A number of one dollar bills which have been raised to \$100-bills have turned up in Berlin. They are said to be similar to raised bills which have appeared in Russia. There are also many counterfeit one-pound notes in circulation.

It is relatively easy for forgers to float bad paper today, for the street corner bankers are not as yet very expert in detecting counterfeits.

JUNEAU HAS A FINE MUSEUM

Natural History, Art and Photography as Well as Historic Library

JUNEAU, Feb. 7. - In his annual report for 1923 Rev. Andrew P. Kashevaroff, pastor of the Greek Orthodox Church in Juneau, gives the following brief outline of the museum and library.

"The specimens contained in the Museum represent the early culture of the aboriginal races of Alaska. The larger portion of exhibits represent the arts and crafts of the Eskimos, though the Western Aleutian races and the Thlingit people are now well represented.

The whole collection is unsurpassed by any museum in the United States. There are certain specimens in the museum that are not duplicated by any other institution in America. Notably the specimens from kitchen middens are of very rare art and so old that many of them are not only fossilized but carbonized.

Specimens Received

"New specimens are constantly received, mostly from interested people by donation. Recently three pre-historic lamps from Kenai, Alaska, were donated by Mr. Branch of the Libby, McNeil & Libby Co. A very old and rare American flag used at Point Barrow by the American Relief Station was presented by Frank Yasuda, and 41 water color pictures of the scenes on St. Paul and St. George Islands were presented by the Alaska Commercial Company. A rare Russian linen towel elaborately worked in cross-stitch designs, was presented by Mrs. Chas. Blandy of New York. Four historic photographs of Prince, Princess Mak-soutoff, Captain Emmons and Commissioner Koskul, all taking part in the transfer of the Territory of Alaska to the United States, were presented by Lieut. Emmons.

"The Museum at present owns two mounted moose heads, two sheep heads, two caribou heads, 45 mounted water and land fowls, one mounted black bear, one mounted cow moose, one mounted young deer, and one mounted brown bear head. One mounted white owl has been donated by James G. Moore of Fairbanks, Alaska.

Photos Increasing

"The collection of photographs and transparencies is constantly growing in number and importance. Many rare photographs of intensely interesting historic worth are from time to time acquired. The 14 transparencies, giving scenes in Alaska, are of very rare beauty and artistic merit. The four albums, containing photographs of scenes about Nome and vicinity, Fairbanks and Nenana section, natives of the Northwest Alaska, and summer scenes of Nome and vicinity are of great interest to the visitors at the Museum. Many new photographs of rare historic value have been added to the collection.

Native Baskets

"A small number of additional baskets has been added to the collection which now practically represents all sections of Alaska. The baskets on hand are those made by the best weavers of the old school in which the material used and the manner of weaving shows the true art of the Alaska natives before it was debased by commercialism. The number on hand is fully sufficient for the study of this art which, unfortu-

Samples of raw and prepared material used in basketry from natural root to the finished split and dyed roots and grasses, have been added to the collection. Mr. E. P. Walker, in charge of the Biological Survey, has kindly promised to loan the Museum some unfinished baskets and other specimens from the Aleutian Islands.

The library has now every chart of bays of Alaska from Dixon Entrance to the Arctic Sea.

"The historical Library is an assured fact, and any wishing to use the reference books for any purpose whatsoever, can find a very rich source of information in the collection of books, pamphlets and charts. There are many literary compositions, fiction and poetry on Alaska."

### Here and There

That the average weight of Alberta's 1923 wheat was 64 pounds to the bushel, or four pounds more than the standard, is the statement of George Hill, Dominion Grain Inspector at Calgary.

The season of navigation for the year 1923 is the longest since the year 1814, or 109 years ago, according to a statement made at Quebec by Captain J. E. Bernier, Arctic explorer.

Two-thirds of Canada's exhibits for the British Empire Exhibition are now in England, most of these being already at Wembley. Among them is a monster silver nugget, weighing nearly three tons, the biggest ever unearthed, which was dug up in Canada.

E. W. Beatty, President of the Canadian Pacific Railway, has accepted the honorary presidency of the Province of Quebec Safety League, succeeding the late Lord Shaughnessy, who was its first honorary president. The object of the League is to institute safeguards for the protection of life, especially children, providing protected playgrounds and streets.

It is estimated by the provincial tourist bureau of the Province of Quebec that 125,000 American automobiles visited the province in 1923. Of this number 40,000 travelled over the King Edward Highway, the principal route of automobilists from across the border motoring to Montreal and a record in the annals of that thoroughfare as regards American cars.

The Canadian Independent Oil Company, of St. John, New Brunswick, has closed a contract to supply lubricating oils of all kinds to all Canadian Pacific steamships plying to Atlantic ports. This is said to be the biggest contract for lubricating oils ever closed in Canada. This company means a new industry for St. John, for its compounding plant will be located in East St. John.

The Klondyke is in the throes of another gold and silver rush. At the head of the Beaver River, 50 miles west of Keno Hill, a silver and gold discovery of unusual proportions has started a stampede from Mayo, the major mining settlement of the Yukon, to the new country, where it is said assays reveal pay dirt running 1,100 ounces of silver to the ton.

Rapid progress is being made in preparing the Canadian section of the British Empire Exhibition. The giant pavilion was roofed in and ready for exhibits in sixty days from its commencement and will be ready for opening on March 1st. Two million feet of Canadian lumber, 7 miles of roofing and 200 tons of nails, nuts and bolts have already been used in the building.

It is reported that the Rothermere interests of England, which recently acquired a large block of timberland in the Manicouagan River basin, have headed a syndicate which will spend \$16,000,000 in erecting pulp and newsprint manufacturing plants near Quebec city. With this news comes the announcement that the St. Regis Paper Company will build a \$4,000,000 plant near the parish of St. Augustin, a suburb of Quebec.

Records compiled by the Bureau of Railway Statistics in Chicago show how greatly the cost of railroad equipment in North America has increased in the past sixteen years. Since 1907, these figures show, the cost of heavy freight locomotives has risen from \$16,243 to \$53,559 each; passenger locomotive from \$16,057 to \$66,200 each; passenger coaches from \$7,330 to \$28,900 each; freight cars from \$700 to \$2,301 each; and steel rails from \$28 to \$43 per ton.

The Indians of the three prairie provinces in the 1923 season harvested the greatest crop in their history, according to the annual report of the Department of Indian Affairs in the three provinces, the Indian harvested 638,561 bushels of wheat, 574,282 bushels of oats and 62,300 bushels of barley. The report shows they raised 53,264 bushels of potatoes and 10,000 bushels of other vegetables. They sown 20,000 acres of land, broke 6,800 acres, put up 57,000 tons of hay and 9,516 of green feed.

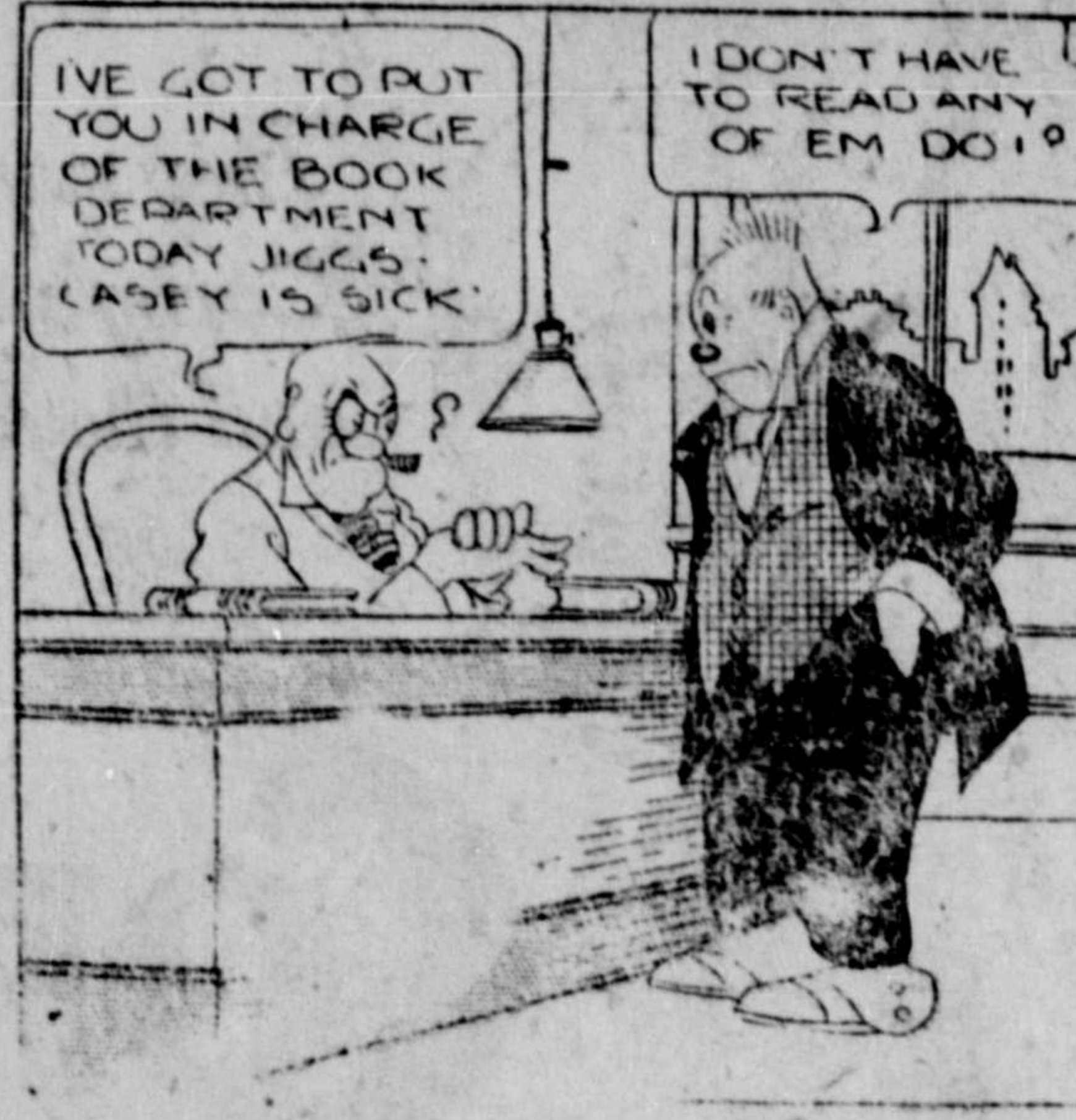

## MINORITY HOLDERS GET NOTHING FROM COMPANY'S PROFITS

Case Tried at Victoria Where Order of Court Sought Protecting Shareholders

VICTORIA, Feb. 7.—The rights of minority shareholders in a limited liability company are involved in a case tried here before Mr. Justice Murphy. Mrs. Jemima Houston, a minority shareholder in the Victoria Machinery Depot, is suing Mrs. Marguerite E. Spratt, its managing director, asking for a declaration of the court that the sum of \$6,000 paid to Mrs. Spratt, in virtue of her office was wrongly appropriated from the assets of the company which should have been distributed as dividends. The result of the payment of directors of the concern is that no dividends were declared and the minority shareholders got nothing.

Nine years ago the practice of paying salaries to directors commenced, on one occasion a director getting as high as \$16,000. Last year the salary was \$6,000. Until recently all went well, but then a disagreement arose between members of the company and the number of directors was reduced, the minority shareholders, it is alleged, having been "frozen out." Accordingly they brought suit.

It was argued in court that as long as they were on the directorate they made no objection but it was only when they were kept off the board that they took exception to the method. Judgment was reserved.

## BIG HERRING CATCH IN BARKLEY SOUND

Fish Run Well on West Coast of Vancouver Island; 30,000 Tons Taken So Far

PORT ALBERNI, Feb. 7.—Some enormous hauls of herring have been made this season by the seine boats operating in Barkley Sound. All previous records have been broken, larger quantities of fish are taken in each drawing in of the larger seines now in use, and less fish is wasted than formerly, the loss having now been reduced to a minimum as compared to a few years ago, when half the catch had often to be sacrificed owing to suffocation and crowding of the fish when the seine was drawn in.

To date the total catch of herring in Barkley Sound is well over 30,000 tons from October last. A conservative estimate of the total the fishing will yield by the end of the season, in about six weeks from now, is 40,000 tons. This, at an average of five herring to the pound, is equivalent to 400,000,000 herring that will be taken and exported from Barkley Sound in about a five-month season. One boat alone caught over 3,000,000 as a result of one night's work. The principal packers operating on the

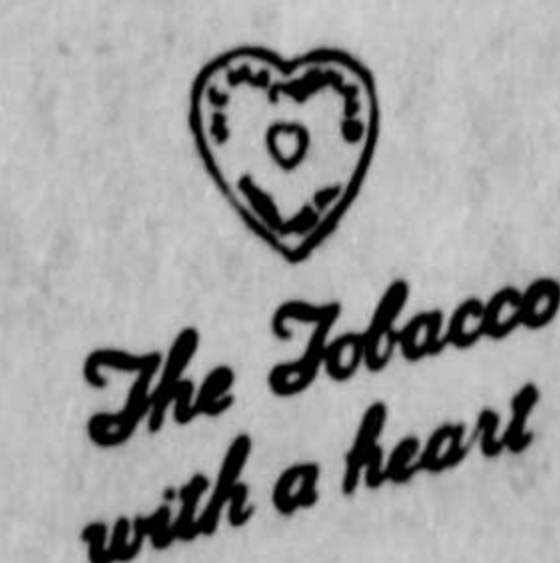

### BOWSER MAY ENTER SUIT FOR DAMAGES

Says Thirteen Lawyers Had Pussyfooted When it Came to Signing Document

DUNCAN, Feb. 7.—In an address delivered here at a Conservative gathering, W. J. Bowser, leader of the opposition in the Legislature, intimated that legal action may be taken against Progressives who had signed a document charging him with corruption. He said he was not issuing any writ at present against General McRae or the signers of the petition in which such charges were made because the Government had decided to name a Royal Commission to investigate. If he were vindicated he had two courses open to him, one to arrest everyone who signed the petition, and second, to issue a writ for damages.

"I want to promise General McRae and everyone who signed that petition that they must prove their case. They tell you I received \$50,000 from P.G.E. interests, that someone went to the Union Bank and withdrew that amount and paid it to me, a Minister of the Crown, for protection and favorable treatment." Did that charge, he asked, stand in the face of the well-

### SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENTS

**PRE-EMPTIONS**  
Vacant, unreserved, surveyed Crown lands may be pre-empted by British subjects over 18 years of age, and by aliens on declaring intention to become British subjects, conditional upon residence, occupation, and improvement for agricultural purposes.

Full information concerning regulations regarding pre-emption is given in Bulletin No. 1, Land Series "How to Pre-empt Land," copies of which can be obtained free of charge by addressing the Department of Lands, Victoria, B.C., or to any Government Agent.

Records will be granted covering any land suitable for agricultural purposes, and which is not timberland, i.e., carrying over 4,000 board feet per acre west of the Coast Range and 5,000 feet per acre east of that Range.

Applications for pre-emption are to be addressed to the Land Commissioner of the Land Recording Division, in which the land applied for is situated, and are made on printed forms, copies of which can be obtained from the Land Commissioner.

Pre-emption must be occupied for five years and improvements made to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivating at least five acres, before a Crown Grant can be received.

For more detailed information see the Bulletin "How to Pre-empt Land."

**PURCHASE**  
Applications are received for purchase of vacant and unreserved Crown lands, not being timberland, for agricultural purposes; minimum price of first-class (arable) land is \$5 per acre, and second-class (grazing) land \$2.50 per acre. Further information regarding purchase or lease of Crown lands is given in Bulletin No. 10, Land Series, "Purchase and Lease of Crown Lands."

Mill, factory, or industrial sites on timber land, not exceeding 40 acres, may be purchased or leased, the conditions including payment of stumpage.

**HOMESITE LEASES**  
Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 30 acres, may be leased as homesites, conditional upon a dwelling being erected in the first year, title being obtainable after residence and improvement conditions are fulfilled and land has been surveyed.

**LEASES**  
For grazing and industrial purposes areas not exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or a company.

**GRAZING**  
Under the Grazing Act the Province is divided into grazing districts and the range administered under a Grazing Commissioner. Annual grazing permits are issued based on numbers ranged, priority being given to established owners. Stock-owners may form associations for range management. Free, or partially free, permits are available for settlers, campers and travelers, up to ten head.

### RESTRICT CATCHES TROUT TO 25 FISH

Herring to be Closed from Saturday Midnight to Sunday Midnight

Changes in the B.C. Fishing regulations made by recent orders in council provide that "In angling no one shall use more than one rod with one line attached thereto, or one line held in the hand; and, except under the provisions of section 29 of these regulations, no one shall fish for trout of any kind, in non-tidal waters, otherwise than by angling.

"No one shall fish for, in one day, more than twenty-five cutthroat, rainbow or dolly varden trout, salmon trout or Roeky Mountain whitefish, or of the different species named than will in the aggregate amount to more than twenty-five fish.

Fishing for herring or pilchard by any means from Saturday midnight to Sunday midnight of each week is prohibited.
