Prince Rupert is interested.

With the understanding current that Hon. Ernest Lapointe, minister of marine and fisheries, is to succeed Hon. Sir Lomer Gouin as minister of justice, Prince Rupert takes more than passing interest in any changes that may be made in the federal cabinet following the resignation of Sir Lomer. Having perhaps a better insight into Pacific coast problems than many and always believed to have been sympathetic with the aims and aspirations of this port, regret will be general here if Mr. Lapointe is removed from the portfolio of marine and fisheries. However, William Duff, the member for Lunenburg, would probably be his successor and his qualifications as far as the Pacific coast are concerned are equally recognized. Mr. Duff, as chairman of the 1922 fisheries commission, did valuable work for the Pacific coast and had ample opportunity to see conditions at first hand.

It seems conceded that the Maritime Provinces will get the minister of marine and fisheries if Mr. Lapointe goes to the ministry of justice. That being the case, Mr. Duff would be his logical successor.

Political Watchfulness In Great Britain.

Political watchfulness is being observed by all three parties in the British parliament. While it had been generally expected that there might have been some declarations of moment when the House of Commons opened on Tuesday, such failed to appear and the proceedings were politically very uneventful up to yesterday. The parties are apparently biding their time but there will be plenty of opportunities in the very near future for them to exert their anomolous influences in any direction they may see fit.

While neither Conservatives, Laborites or Liberals are in

control of the House, their respective standings give them such influence that their opponents cannot exert much power. None are strong as far as constructive possibilities are concerned but their opportunities in the other direction are very marked. It is doubtful if such a condition of affairs will long be satisfactory to the people unless the plane of politics is very high.

Improving Canada's Financial Condition.

The announcement made yesterday at Ottawa that Canada's debt at the end of 1923 was only three million dollars higher than it was at the end of 1923 reflects careful administration of finances by the federal government during the past twelve months. Hon. W. S. Fielding, minister of finance, has been holding expenses down and is improving the Dominion's financial condition thereby, even if he has been criticized by some for his conservative policies which have undoubtedly prevented the expenditure of money on development.

Political Situation Here Like Britain.

The Canadian government finds itself today in a somewhat similar predicament to that which exists in Great Britain in that it is working with a minority which, of course, is not so marked as that in the Old Country. While there is little likelihood that the Liberals will be defeated in a House vote, it would be much more comfortable if they had the one or two seats on their side that would positively ensure them being sustained.
