

# Deadlock Still Halts Allied Conference in London Dealing with Dawes Plan for Germany

LONDON, July 25. — Every effort to break the deadlock GARDEN PART which halted the work of the inter-allied conference has been put forth to put the Dawes plan into effect but thus far without success. The conference stumbling block is a difference between Premier Herriot of France and British and American financiers over the sufficiency of guarantees which might accompany the proposed forty million pound loan to Germany.

The bankers insist that they are interested only in proper security for the loan and expect to draw up a formula embodying their outline before they ap-
