## SEAL COVE LUMBER PLANT HAS BEEN SOLD

### B. C. LEGISLATURE ASKS FOR REFORM OF SENATE ON MANSON'S MOTION

**Prince Rupert Mill Has Been Sold to Vancouver Men who are Planning to Operate it Soon**

**Will Negotiate With City and Railway Company in Regard to Arrangements Prior to Starting up**

(Special to Daily News)  
VANCOUVER, Dec. 19.—The sale of the mill at Prince Rupert, owned by the Emerson Estate, to J. A. Smith of Vancouver, was announced by J. A. W. Bell today at Vancouver. Mr. Bell said: "It is true that a sale of the mill at Prince Rupert has been made to John A. Smith of this city. Mr. Smith is one of the best known operators in Vancouver and I am also associated with Mr. Smith in the purchase."  
When asked what the company proposed to do, Mr. Bell stated that it was hoped to get the mill into operation at an early date and later to extend into the manufacture of pulp and paper, but the starting of the mill would very largely depend upon arrangements which might be made with the city of Prince Rupert and the Canadian National Railways. He felt sure that if satisfactory arrangements could be worked out, the mill, despite the more or less unfavorable conditions, would soon be in operation.

**PARLIAMENT OPENS FEB. 5**  
Meets Earlier This Year Than Last When it Met on Last Day of February

OTTAWA, Dec. 19.—Parliament will open on Thursday, February 5, Premier King announced at the conclusion of a cabinet meeting last night. The date of the opening is almost a month earlier than last year when Parliament was summoned to meet on the last day of February.  
The coming session will be the third of the present Government, which is the fourteenth Parliament since confederation. Many think this will be the last session before an election, but there are a good many others who look to see at least one more session after this before an appeal to the country.

**LABOR LEADER LAID TO REST**  
Samuel Gompers Buried in Sleepy Hollow Cemetery Among Other Renowned Dead

TARRYTOWN, Dec. 19.—Samuel Gompers, head of the American Federation of Labor, was buried yesterday on a little knoll in Sleepy Hollow cemetery his body was laid to rest with some of the most noted personages in the history of the United States in a spot famous in tradition.

**HEAD OF MILITARY AFFAIRS COMMITTEE OF U.S. HOUSE DIES**

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 19.—Representative Julius Kahn, chairman of the House military affairs committee, died at his home here yesterday when an illness which had lasted several weeks suddenly became complicated by heart attacks. He was 63 years old.

**RECEIVING CLASS HAS OLD STUDENT**

Tom Savos, a 17-year old Greek youth, will report in one of the local public school receiving classes at the first of the year. Chairman Parker reported at last night's board meeting. Savos is a recent immigrant from Greece and he has attended school in that country but so far he knows little English. **CONFERENCE OF WHITE RACES IS SMOTHERED IN WASHINGTON HOUSE**

WASHINGTON, Dec. 19.—A resolution proposing a conference of white nations bordering on the Pacific was unanimously "smothered" in the House yesterday. The proposal was introduced by its author, Representative Brittan, Republican of Illinois, and found among its most earnest opponents House leaders who live on the Pacific coast.

**LOST HIS LIFE ON FLIMSY RAFT**

C. Benson's Body was Recovered Yesterday After Being Washed out to Sea

VANCOUVER, Dec. 19.—Attempting to cross the swollen waters of Beano Creek near Nootka on the West coast of Vancouver Island, C. Benson was drowned when the flimsy raft on which he was endeavoring to make the trip parted in mid stream and he was washed out to sea. He disappeared on November 27 and his body was recovered yesterday.

**HUDSON'S BAY COMPANY BUYS VALUABLE LAND IN CITY OF WINNIPEG**

EDMONTON, Dec. 19.—The biggest land deal in some years was consummated here when the Hudson's Bay Company bought 160 foot frontage on Jasper Ave. adjoining their store for \$260,000. Eight businesses are affected by the purchase.  
As a result of the deal it is thought that the Hudson's Bay Co. will extend their store.

**MANY PERISH EXTREME COLD**

Middle West Added to Domain of Storm and Cold

CHICAGO, Dec. 19.—The middle west today was added to the domain of the storm and cold that for five days has held in northwest and Rocky Mountain region in an icy grip. Three died in the Rocky Mountain region. One death was reported in Oklahoma and two died in Chicago from causes attributable to the cold and ice and snow. Injuries were numerous due to falls on the ice, in fires, and accidents.  
Thousands of deer north of the Grand Canyon of Arizona, which refused to be headed to greener pastures on the south side of the canyon were reported as perishing, vegetation having failed.

**LAUNCH BROKE UP ON ROCKS**

Sixteen People Including Two Women Escaped in Nick of Time at Rivers Inlet

VANCOUVER, Dec. 19.—Pounded by huge waves and driven by a biting northwest gale, the gas boat Ardena, carrying fourteen men and two women from Draney's Inlet to Rivers Inlet to catch a steamer for Vancouver for Christmas was hurled on to the rocks off Wadham's Point last Friday, according to word brought here today. Ten minutes after the last passenger scrambled to safety on a narrow strip of beach, the big launch was dashed to splinters.

**MANITOBA LEGISLATURE**

WINNIPEG, Dec. 19.—The legislature of Manitoba will be convened on January 15.

**King Frost Invades California Where Smudge Pots Used to Keep Him From Damaging Citrus Crop**

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 19.—Vegetables were slightly nipped and fruits were damaged only "nominally if at all" by the cold weather that has held California in its grip for the last few days, the weather bureau announced. Low temperatures prevailed in many parts of the state.  
Regular watches manned smudge pots in the citrus groves in southern California where the coldest weather was reported near Redlands, it there being 26 degrees above zero.  
The Pacific northwest states experienced cold weather again yesterday. In Western Oregon it was 2 degrees above zero at Eugene and in Eastern Oregon it was 32 below at Meacham.

Passengers going south from Anyox today include Dr. and Mrs. Harry Simmons. Dr. Simmons is a dentist at the smelter town.

**German Butcher Lured Men and Boys to Lodging and Murdered Them With Teeth**

HANOVER, Germany, Dec. 19.—Fritz Haarmann, the wholesale murderer, whose trial for the slaying of 26 persons has stirred all Germany, was sentenced to death yesterday, with his companion Grans.  
Haarmann, a Hanover butcher, was shown at the trial to be a criminal degenerate, who lured men and boys to his lodgings and there killed them by tearing their throats with his teeth and sucking their blood.  
Behind closed doors among the allegations was that the murderer as a butcher, offered his customers human flesh for consumption.

**CHARGED WITH MANSLAUGHTER**

Paul Pollard of Bella Coola Committed for Trial as Result of Death of Norman Clellamin

An Indian named Paul Pollard was committed for trial at Bella Coola on December 19 by Stipendiary Magistrate G. H. Hill of Ocean Falls on a charge of manslaughter resulting from a rear-end collision between an automobile and motor truck on December 8 when Norman Clellamin, another Indian, was killed. Clellamin was driving the truck and Pollard, the lighter car. Shortly after the accident which occurred at 8 o'clock on the evening of December 8, Clellamin died in the Bella Coola Hospital.  
A coroner's jury inquiring into the death returned the following verdict: "That Norman Clellamin came to his death through a rear end collision between the two motor vehicles near Hagensborg, the accident being caused by the inattention of Paul Pollard."  
Pollard will be taken from Bella Coola to Okalla where he will await trial at the spring session of the Supreme Court assizes in Prince Rupert.

**WILLIAM GREEN NEW PRESIDENT**

Ohio Man Succeeds Sam Gompers as Head of Labor Federation

NEW YORK, Dec. 19.—William Green of Ohio was today elected president of the American Federation of Labor to succeed the late Samuel Gompers. The election of Mr. Green was unanimous. The keynote of his administration, he said, would be constructive progressivism.

**Legislature of B. C. Asks for Reform of the Canadian Senate**

VICTORIA, Dec. 19.—The Legislature last night adopted Attorney-General Manson's Senate reform amendment to the original resolution moved some weeks ago by R. H. Neelands, Labor member for South Vancouver, calling for the total abolition of the Upper Chamber of the Federal Parliament. The vote was 28 to 14.

Mr. Manson's amendment called for an amendment to the British North America Act in order to prevent the Senate from "defeating the will of the people." It proposed that the object sought be gained either by altering the constitution of the Senate or by limiting its powers to reject measures approved by the House of Commons. It also expresses opposition to the appointment of senators for life.

R. H. Pooley, opposition leader, took the issue lightly after Mr. Manson had made a vigorous appeal in behalf of his amendment. Mr. Pooley said that Senate reform, being a federal issue, the lead should come from the Federal House of Commons. Constitutionally the only way in which the step could be effected, he said, was for the House of Commons to pass its resolution, submit it to every legislature for ratification and then, unless the verdict from the provinces was unanimous; the Imperial Parliament would not act.

MOBILIZATION IN ALBANIA  
ROME, Dec. 19.—The Albanian lezation here last night announced that the Government of Albania has decreed a general mobilization.

**KING WILL OPEN THE NEW DOMINION OFFICES**

Will be on Finest Site in Empire Close to National Art Gallery

LONDON, Dec. 19.—King George has consented to open the new Canadian Government office in Trafalgar Square. The formal opening will take place on June 29 next.  
The Canadian Government office in London will occupy one of the finest sites in the British Empire. The building is in Trafalgar Square, practically adjoining the National Art Gallery.

**CAPT. MOREHOUSE IS NEW PRESIDENT**

Former Local Skipper is Elected President of Merchant Service Guild in South

Capt. W. S. Morehouse, formerly in command of G.T.P. steamers plying into this port and more recently a deep sea pilot in Vancouver, was this week unanimously elected president of the Merchant Service Guild in Vancouver.  
Capt. N. P. Hocking, known here as former skipper of the Canadian Scottish, and Capt. W. J. Boyce, formerly of the Princess Beatrice and now of the Princess Charlotte, were elected representatives of the ocean going and coastwise passenger vessels respectively.

**WINDOW IS INSTALLED**

New Presbyterian Church on Fourth Avenue May be Opened Next Month

The handsome window in the new Presbyterian Church on Fourth Avenue provided by the local St. Andrew's Society as a memorial to its members who gave up their lives in the Great War was put in this week and is being admired by all those seeing it. The window was obtained through A. W. Edge & Co. and was put in by the contractors, Mitchell & Currie.

Mr. Mitchell stated this morning that he hoped to have the church completed about the middle of January making it possible to have the formal opening some time towards the end of that month. The untimely death of the plastering contractor, the late C. McB. Blyth, has caused certain delays.

**BANK ROBBERS FIRE VILLAGE**

Wrecked Banks, Carried Away Safes and Left Valley View, Texas, in Flames

FORT WORTH, Texas, Dec. 19.—Bank robbers today set fire to the town of Valley View early in the morning after wrecking a state and national bank and carrying away two safes. The business section was wiped out by the fire with a loss of \$150,000. The safes weighed two tons each.

**NEGROES WANT OWN REPUBLIC**

Would Set up Completely Independent of the White Race

LONDON, Dec. 19.—Serious unrest among the natives of South Africa is reported by the Capetown correspondent of the Daily Express, who says their aim is to set up a republic and establish their complete independence of the white race.

**STRESEMANN REFUSES TAKE FURTHER ACTION**

BERLIN, Dec. 19.—Dr. Gustav Stresemann, minister for foreign affairs in the Marx cabinet and leader of the German People's Party has definitely refused to form a ministry.

#### Christmas Dinner For Unemployed.

The Salvation Army is arranging to give a dinner to the unemployed on Christmas Day. To do so, some money is needed. These men in many cases are out of work because of no fault of their own. Many of them are homeless and if the Salvation Army is willing to bring a little joy into their lives the people of Prince Rupert will support them, we think.

Here is an opportunity, among others, to do something to show that we appreciate the Christmas spirit of making everybody as happy as possible on this one day of the year.

#### Weather Reports Make Us Contented.

When we read the weather reports from various parts of the continent it makes us very contented with our own lot in Prince Rupert. Tornadoes, floods, extreme cold, injuries to crops, heavy snowfall—all are included in the reports of a few days, and here during that time we have an equable if not a salubrious climate with nothing unusual to disturb our equanimity. Then by and large, the climate of Prince Rupert is equal to most places and better than many.

#### Splendid Treatment For Orientals.

Now and then we read of improper treatment of people of one race by those of another. Sometimes we read of unpleasantness in China or Japan over treatment accorded foreigners. Similar cases occur on this continent. The school concert the other night at Booth School is an indication that here, at any rate, there is no discrimination. Little Chinese and Japanese children took a leading part in the school entertainment, absolutely no distinction being shown. It is probable that at no place in the world is there such an opportunity given the children of the Asiatic races to mingle on equal conditions with the children of the white residents. It is a good spirit and makes for the development of a tolerant attitude in future.

#### Senate Amendment Request Is Passed.

The Legislature is asking for limitation of the powers of the Senate. While we strongly favor the resolution of the South Vancouver Labor member asking for total abolition, it is quite evident that today we cannot expect to go that far and must be well satisfied if we can extract some of the old men's molar.

### ASKS BETTER TREATMENT OF PUBLIC MEN

George Munro Makes Plea For Less Criticism and More Appreciation

Making a plea for better treatment of men in public life, Geo. Munro gave a short address to the Rotary Club at its meeting yesterday afternoon at their luncheon in the St. Regis Cafe.

Mr. Munro spoke of the serious reflections made upon the public men who took part in the business of the city. This was the election season and he thought it timely to draw attention to the fact that men offering themselves for public office without any hope of being elected took on themselves to criticize officials and place them in awkward positions, retarding their work.

Mr. Munro mentioned one or two cases of splendid men whose services had been lost to the city in this way. One of them was a former supervising principal of the schools, Harold Campbell, who was one of the best school principals British Columbia had produced.

#### Larger Issues

The speaker urged that men running for public office should confine themselves to the larger issues and tell their own qualifications rather than criticizing others. He spoke appreciatively of a former mayor, T. H. McClymont, who in his pre-election addresses seldom mentioned his opponents but told what he stood for and suggested that if they wanted him they could elect him. And he was elected.

"Public service in Prince Rupert has been unsatisfactory because of the custom of criticizing everyone," said Mr. Munro. There was little in the way of reward for those who served the city, giving their time and energies. Under present circumstances the best men would not offer their services. He suggested that they should be backed up instead of being criticized and scandalized.

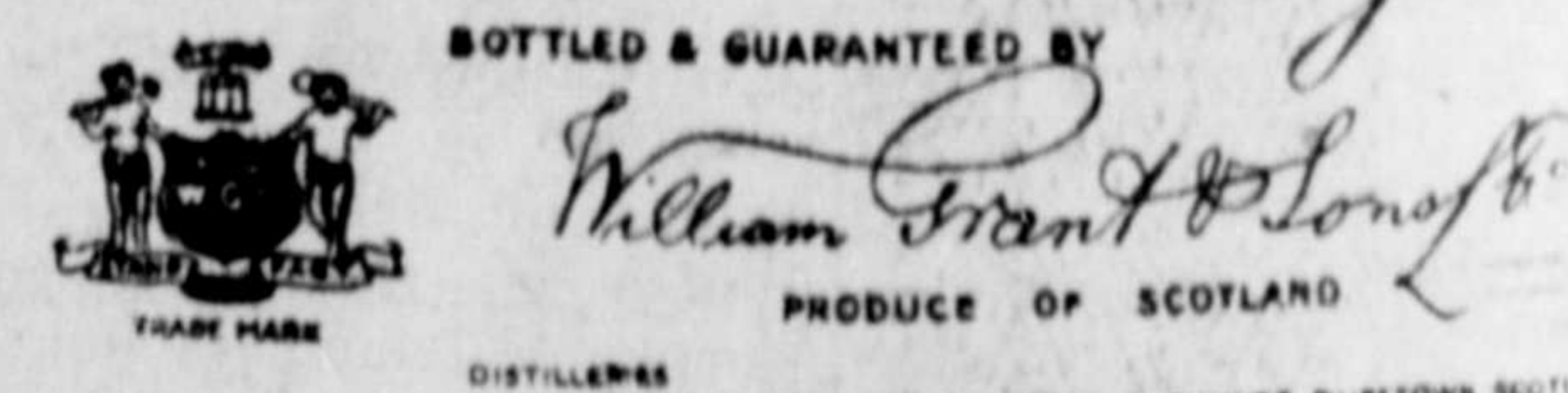

School Board Receives Application from T. Ross MacKay for Extra Remuneration Over Contract

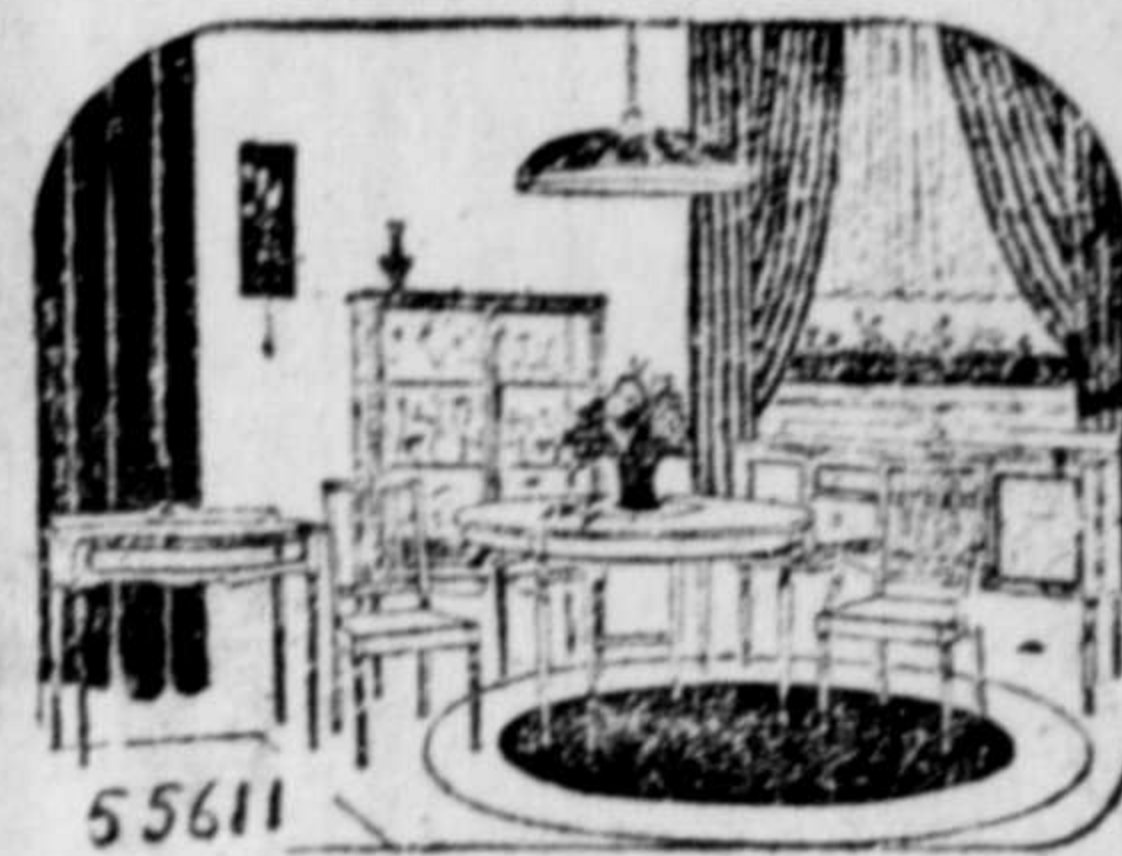

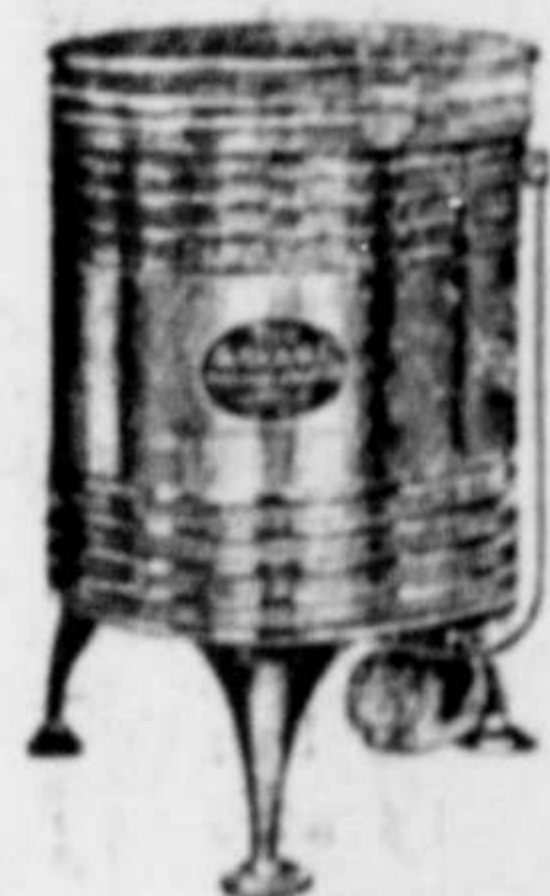

## FUR AUCTION AT EDMONTON

Over Five Thousand Dollars Worth of Pelts Change Hands

EDMONTON, Dec. 18.—At the first sale of raw furs here this season over five thousand dollars worth of pelts changed hands.

Coyotes and rats made up the greater part of the offerings, these being the first furs of the season to appear in any quantity. No. 1 and good No. 2 coyotes averaged around \$12.00 each, and fall and early winter rats brought an average of 70 cents each free of tax to the buyer. A few very good beaver pelts appeared in a number of the lots and changed hands at about \$16.00 each. The remainder of the offerings were made up of bear, lynx, fox, weasel, mink, badger and rabbit skins, all of which were in good condition and brought satisfactory returns.

A summary of the transactions at the sale shows that the first lot, containing 5 beaver, 17 coyote, 2 lynx, 1 bear, 2 red foxes and 228 rats, brought \$541; the second lot of 4 cross foxes, 9 mink, 10 weasels, 16 coyotes and 23 rats brought \$188; a lot of 5 bears realized \$38; 16 rats, 2 coyotes and 7 weasels brought \$48; 3 silver foxes sold readily for \$150; 5 coyotes, 1 red fox, 2 weasels and 25 rats brought \$90; 12 coyotes, 2 red fox, 1 lynx and 1 cross fox sold for \$224; 77 cats, 1 wolf and 1 skunk brought \$82; 14 weasels and 3 coyotes brought \$53; 5 coyotes and 20 weasels made \$95.

A lot containing 236 rats made \$207 and another lot of 237 brought \$170. Three beaver brought \$52; 17 weasels, 3 coyotes, 1 beaver, 2 cross foxes, 1 red fox, 4 rats and 1 mink

brought \$177, and 3 coyotes, 26 weasels, 1 skunk, 1 mink and 50 rats realized \$135. A lot of 275 rats brought \$191, and another lot containing 263 rats made \$185.

The high price for the sale was made by a lot of 595 rats, 1 badger, 47 weasels and 6 coyotes, which brought \$608, while 19 coyotes, 17 weasels, 10 skunk, 2 red foxes, 198 rats, 5 beaver, 1 cross fox, 2 mink and 26 rabbits made \$560. A lot of 5 coyotes, 3 wolverines, 125 rats, 2 cross foxes, 1 red fox, 15 weasels, 15 mink and 3 beaver made \$500, while a straight lot of 25 coyotes made \$319 and a small lot of 2 coyotes realized \$15.
