AMUR STILL ON ROCKS HAS LEAK IN TANK

MILITARY IS CALLED OUT IN ILLINOIS TO STOP FIGHT WETS VERSUS DRY'S

Amur Still Ashore Near Mouth of Skeena River Twenty Miles South but may be Taken off

The Coastwise Steamship & Barge Co.'s steamer Amur is still firm on the reef at White Cliff Island but her plight is not as serious as first reports might have indicated. This is the information that was brought to the city this morning by Capt. Gammon of the power tug Pachena which reached the scene of the stranding yesterday afternoon and rendered assistance to the distressed vessel and took her barge, Griff, loaded with coal, to safety at Inverness. It is the opinion of Capt. Gammon that the Amur is not in very serious danger and that, with a wrecking outfit, she may be pulled off without much difficulty.

Capt. Thomas Cliff of the C. P. R. steamer Beatrice passed the Amur shortly after midnight. The distressed vessel's lights were on but she gave no signal and was apparently in a secure position.

It is understood that the Coastwise Co.'s tug Marmion, Capt. Hunter, has been despatched from Anyox to stand by and relieve the Amur. J. G. Johnstone, of this city who, in the absence of Capt. T. M. Wilkie, is representing the Vancouver Salvage Co., received instructions to send a tug to the Amur with the wrecking outfit but was unable to get a suitable

tug and is awaiting further instructions.

The Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Co.'s schooner Zibassa, Capt. Caudow, which set out for the scene of the wreck yesterday afternoon, was forced to return to port from Lawyer Island through stress of weather and did not reach the Amur.

The Pachena was en route to Canman, Gardner Canal, and reached the Amur yesterday about 12 o'clock noon. Finding that there was no water in the wrecked vessel and that there was still steam on her boilers, Capt. Gammon sent a man aboard and took a stern anchor from the steamer and put it down. The barge, which after being secured alongside the Amur had gone adrift, was picked up by the Pachena about half way between White Cliff and Genn Island and towed to safety at Inverness cannery. The barge was apparently not leaking.

The Amur went ashore about 4 o'clock yesterday morning but Capt. Gammon was unable to state what the cause was. In any case when he left the Amur at 3 o'clock in the afternoon she did not seem to be leaking and apparently had no hole in her at that time. The crew was still aboard and a part of the vessel was under water. After delivering the barge at Inverness, the Pachena returned here at 9:30 this morning.

The Amur is commanded by Capt. Ormiston, a cousin of the skipper of the Princess Mary.

Marmion Returns

Capt. Hunter of the Marmion, who has been to the Amur and who left there this morning at half past ten says the vessel has a slight leak in Number 1 tank and some of the coal cargo will have to be discharged before the vessel can be taken off the rocks. She is not submerged and the captain thinks she can be got off. He is here to report to the underwriters who will arrange for salvaging her off. All the members of the crew are still aboard.

A. M. Kipp, manager of Baldwin Cannery, came in on last night's train from the Skeena River and returned to Vancouver on the Camosun this morning. There are 900 men affected.

PAIR OF JACKS EXCITING TRIP

Canadian Boat Had Close Call
Off Triple Island When
Engine Started to
Miss

After an exciting passage across Hecate Straits and one which at times was fraught with almost immediate possibilities of disaster, the Canadian halibut schooner Pair of Jacks, Capt. John Ivanson, reached port this morning—the only arrival of the day. Her catch of 8,000 pounds is held over for sale until Monday.

The Pair of Jacks had a particularly strenuous time crossing Hecate Straits and the distance of 38 miles from Rose Spit to Lucy Island took 22 hours.

There was a heavy southeast gale with tremendous seas running. In the breakers of Lucy Island, the vessel's engine started to miss and it looked as if she was doomed. The motor, however, by the best of fortune, kept going and the vessel pulled safely past the point of danger.

FISH MATTERS ARE DISCUSSED

Joint Meeting of Committees
Last Night—Fishermen's
Home to be Looked Into

COW BAY IMPROVEMENTS

Committee Appointed to Take up
Matters of Federal Policy
with Fred Stork, M.P.

Various matters concerning the fishing industry of the port were taken up at a joint meeting of the several fisheries committees and interested organizations which was held in the city council chamber last night. Those attending the meeting were Mayor Newton and Ald. Casey representing the city council; President S. J. McLeod of the Board of Trade; H. M. Daggett, secretary of the Fishing Vessel Owners' Association, and J. H. Meagher, John Penny, Fred Miller and W. R. Goodlad representing the Deep Sea Fishermen's Union. Mayor Newton was appointed permanent chairman of the joint committee and H. M. Daggett, acting secretary.

The matter of establishing a fishermen's home in Prince Rupert was discussed and it was referred to the Fishermen's Union to report on the advisability of such an institution, the kind of structure and its control.

The necessity of improvements at Cow Bay for the convenience of fishing vessels was taken up and the question was referred to the Boat Owners' Association to report definitely on what is needed. The matter will later be taken up with the provincial government with a view to having the necessary work done.

A committee was appointed to take up with Fred Stork, M.P., matters coming within the purview of the federal department such as the duty on fishermen's supplies and the appointment of an inspector of weights, scales and fish. The committee consists of G. W. Nickerson, H. P. Lipsell and J. H. Meagher.

Ald. George Gasey occupied the chair until Mayor Newton was appointed permanent chairman.

Wets Fight Drys in Illinois Where Knights of Flaming Circle Oppose Ku Klux Klan

HERRIN, Ill., Feb. 9.—Herrin, the scene of the miners' riot in 1922, was taken over by state troops today as a result of a near riot last night between wets and drys in which Constable G. Gaegle was killed and the deputy sheriff seriously wounded.

The trouble was the result of wholesale dry raids conducted recently by reputed members of the Ku Klux Klan.

The Knights of the Flaming Circle, an anti-Klan organization, was in session when the crowd stormed the hall. Shooting followed and later shots were fired into the hospital where Mayor Anderson took a wounded man but nobody was hit.

BIG STANDARD OIL TANKER IS IN PORT

R. J. Hanna Arrived Yesterday
Afternoon and Tied up
this Morning at Imperial
Oil Dock

The big Standard Oil tanker R. J. Hanna, Capt. Wallace, arrived in port from San Francisco via Port Alice at 5 o'clock yesterday afternoon and, after anchoring in the stream overnight, tied up at the Imperial Oil dock this morning at 10 o'clock. She is discharging 45,000 barrels of fuel oil and will be here until Monday morning it is expected. The Hanna came up from the outside passage from Port Alice and was piloted by Capt. McNeill of Victoria.

The Hanna, which is the largest tanker ever to visit this port, is of 4388 tons register and carries a complement of 37 men. She is one of the Standard Oil Co.'s newer vessels.

Three Will Hang at London, Ontario on April 10 if Sentence of Court Carried Out

LONDON, Ont., Feb. 9.—Three men this morning were sentenced to be hanged on April 10. They are Sydney Murrell, Henry Williams and Clarence Topping, all convicted on murder charges during the past five days.

Topping was found guilty of murdering his sweetheart. Murrell was convicted of killing Russell Campbell during a bank holdup and Williams was convicted for the part he played in the same crime.

It is expected a request will be made for executive clemency to save Williams from the gallows.

Sum of \$200,000 Asked for His
Ransom: Refuses Pleadings
of Wife

HALIFAX, Feb. 9.—G. G. McKenzie, son of Archibald McKenzie of River John, Pictou County, who has been in Mexico ten years as manager of the Mexico Northern Power Company at Goquilla, is held captive by the Mexican bandit Hippolito Villa, who demands a ransom of \$200,000, according to messages received here.

McKenzie's wife visited Villa and implored him to release her husband, but the bandit refused.

The single peerage goes to Sir John Butcher, formerly member of parliament for York. The list comprises also five privy councillors, nine baronets, and sixteen knighthoods.

PLANS WILL FLY FROM LOS ANGELES

A recent despatch from Washington to the Alaska newspapers says Los Angeles has been selected as the starting point of the army globe flight instead of Seattle or some other point in the State of Washington as previously planned.

General Patrick, chief of the Army Air Service, said the starting place of the flight had been changed because the planes were at Santa Monica and the aviators would be given an opportunity to make tests of the planes before the start on March 15. They will go via Seattle, however, it is said.


