SUDAN MUTINEERS SURRENDER TO BRITISH

OLIVER GOVERNMENT SUSTAINED IN LEGISLATURE BY MAJORITY OF TEN

Sudanese Mutineers Surrendered to British Allenby Reported Ill

CAIRO, Nov. 29.—Surviving mutineers at Khartoum have surrendered to the British, it is officially announced. The mutiny among the troops was confined to two platoons of the Eleventh Sudanese and the mutineers surviving have surrendered after bombardment of the compound of the Egyptian army hospital. Two British officers were killed and eight wounded. The situation in Khartoum is well in hand, one officer and fourteen men of the mutineers are believed to have been killed. The behaviour of the other Arab and Sudanese troops are characterized as excellent.

LONDON, Nov. 29.—The Egyptian situation is serious but not critical. The interest centres mainly in the Sudan which is said to be quieted. Telegraphic communication with the Sudan has been restored. The report of the illness of Lord Allenby creates some anxiety.

CASEY ATTACKS CITY ENGINEER

**Demands Resignation of Fore-
man or Departmental Head
in Notice of Motion
Posted**

Ald. George B. Casey has posted the following notice of motion to come up at next Monday night's council meeting: "Whereas, the order of employing men in the public works department has been set out on several occasions by the Board of Works during the present year and the engineer instructed to follow said orders with a view to giving preference, first, to married men and, secondly, to single men residing in the city and, in particular, property holders; and, whereas, these orders have been continuously ignored by the officials in charge and, further, a downward revision in wages has been made without any authority from the council or committee; therefore, be it resolved that the city engineer be given until December 15 to provide himself with a competent foreman in place of J. McInnes and, failing that, the city engineer be given thirty days' notice and the council advertise for a successor."

HOOVER POLICY IN THE STATES

**Report of Commerce Department
Shows Improvements in
Many Lines**

WASHINGTON, Nov. 29.—Recommendations concerning legislation for the reorganization of the Commerce Department, for the control and development of radio and aircraft, and for a revision of the navigation laws, were submitted to President Coolidge yesterday by Secretary Hoover in the annual report of his department.

The secretary also recommended that Congress appropriate funds for a Department of Commerce Building of sufficient size to house all branches of the organization, which at present are scattered through a half dozen buildings in Washington.

Mr. Hoover's report defined the economic progress of the country for the past year, setting out as outstanding features the advance of agriculture prices which had lagged behind industry since the slump of 1922, the beginning of "sound" policies in German reparations leading to a hopeful measure of economic recovery in Europe, and the complete recovery of the nation's own industry and commerce, aside from agriculture.

The past year, the secretary reported, has seen great stability of prices, high production, full employment, foreign trade, and prosperity throughout the business world. There were some moderate decreases in activity of some lines during the latter part of the fiscal year, he added, but since its close, there has again been general recovery in these lines.

"In recent years the commercial use of air travel has increased to a considerable extent, though there is reason to fear that in this respect the United States is not keeping pace with some foreign countries. This method of transportation means much to our economic and social progress, and every encouragement, legislative and otherwise, should be given to its development. At the same time, there should be created a proper system for its regulation, having in view, primarily the safety of life both of passengers and operators, and the orderly conduct of air navigation.

Eliminate Waste

In the field of eliminating national waste, the secretary reviewed the progress made in the unemployment situation. Skillful handling of the problems of slump periods by committees of experts has done great good for general business conditions, he reported.

Seasonal building periods, the report set out, have been so dealt with that building is being spread over the year, eliminating this source of depression. The department's division of simplified practice has brought about a standardization and simplification in many industries with the saving of great sums of money both to manufacturers and to purchasers.

The department has encouraged the purchase and storing of bituminous coal during the summer months, the secretary said, to the great good of the industry which was hampered by its own overdevelopment. The department has also encouraged development of water power resources of the country as a

SLOAN TO VISIT MINE DISTRICT

**Promises to go With Sutherland
to Portland Canal Country
Soon**

VICTORIA, Nov. 29.—Hon. William Sloan, minister of mines, accompanied by Hon. Dr. Sutherland, minister of public works, will make a trip to Portland Canal district as soon as the snow is off the ground in the spring, to acquaint themselves with the real conditions in the district. This promise was made as a result of a plea for greater activity on the part of the government in opening up trails and roads in that section of the country, by a delegation headed by H. W. Rolston, publisher of the Portland Canal News.

After hearing the delegation, the minister promised to go north to investigate conditions.

TALKED VESSEL NEAR AUCKLAND

**Long Distance Record Made by
Estevan Wireless Station**

VICTORIA, Nov. 29.—Another record, the third in succession, has been established by the Estevan wireless station, now considered to have the most powerful sending and receiving apparatus on the Pacific coast. It announced last night that nightly communication had been established with the steamship Sahiti on its outward trip from San Francisco to New Zealand, the ship's position being obtained daily by the Canadian station until she reached Auckland, a distance approximating 6,250 miles.

ROYAL FAMILY WILL VISIT DOWAGER QUEEN

LONDON, Nov. 29.—The eightieth birthday of the dowager queen Alexandra will be celebrated by a gathering of the Royal family at Sandringham over the week end. The Dowager Queen is enjoying good health but has withdrawn entirely from public affairs.

25 YEARS IN PENITENTIARY

**Post Office Inspector and J. Il-
lician Both Sentenced for
Conspiracy**

CHICAGO, Nov. 29.—William Fahey, former post office inspector and James Murray, politician, recently convicted of conspiracy in connection with a two million dollar train robbery at Roundout, Illinois, have been sentenced to 25 years in the Atlanta penitentiary.

ROY MCKINLEY FOUND GUILTY

PRINCE GEORGE, Nov. 29.—The jury at the Supreme Court assizes here before Mr. Justice Gregory yesterday found Roy McKinley guilty of assault in City Police Chief Ezra Carlow and Sergeant MacLeod, R.C.M.P. Sentence will be passed today. The incident occurred some 18 months ago when McKinley was living here. The police attempted to arrest him but he got the drop on them with a gun and escaped. He made for the United States but later returned to Canada and was arrested at Alice Arm where he has been residing for the past several months. He was out on bail pending trial.

BRUSSELS, Nov. 29.—Giacomo Puccini, the famous operatic composer, died today from throat infection following an operation. Death was due directly to a heart attack.

Oliver Government Gets Good Majority on Second Division in the Legislature Yesterday

VICTORIA, Nov. 29.—Yesterday the government emerged triumphant from its second division on what practically amounted to a vote of want of confidence. The vote for the government stood 27 to 17. Those voting with the government included the three Labor members, three provincial party members, and the one Independent, Major R. J. Burde, of Alberni. Two Liberals and two Conservatives, who paired, were absent and one Provincial was away.

The result of the vote was received with acclamation by the government members, all of whom were very much pleased at the outcome.

The resolution was moved by Joshua Linchcliffe, the parson member for Victoria, and was in the form of an amendment to the budget motion. Its main feature was that the House "regretted the passing of orders in council under the Mothers' Pensions Act." The reverend gentleman claimed that these orders exceeded the powers conferred on the government by the Act and he made a long speech in regard to it. The amendment was opposed by the government and if it had been carried they would have resigned.

CHARGED WITH SWINDLING OF MANY PEOPLE

**Former Chicago Man on Way
Back to States in Charge of
Police**

HALIFAX, Nov. 29.—Leo Koretzet is on his way to Chicago to answer to the charge of swindling people out of several million dollars in stock selling schemes. With lawyers and the police he took passage on the liner Corona for New York.

While Koretzet worked, a wide search was being conducted for him. He lived in Nova Scotia as a wealthy retired businessman under the name of Lou Keyte.

The man's right name in a suit of clothes sent to a tailor for alterations led to his undoing.

O CANADA!

O Canada, our heritage, our love, Thy worth we praise all other lands above. From sea to sea, throughout thy length, From pole to borderland, At Britain's side, what'er betide, Unflinchingly we'll stand. With heart we sing, "God Save the King," Guide thou the Empire wide, do we implore, And prosper Canada from shore to shore.

O Canada, our home our native land, True Patriot Love thou dost in us command. We see thee rising fair dear land, The true north strong and free, And stand on guard, O Canada We stand on guard for thee. O Canada! O Canada! O Canada, we stand on guard for thee O Canada we stand on guard for thee.

Selfish Viewpoint In Political Life.

Canada is a political unit but a unit covering so much territory is bound to be divided more or less into factions. The French Canadian is more or less a political entity, the Maritime provinces have their particular viewpoint on affairs of state while the manufacturing centres of the East are bound together by the ties of self-interest.

So those whose interests lie on the Pacific coast are bound together by a strong tie, that of getting justice from the rest of the country. The Atlantic coast is historically the centre of commercial life and to transfer any part of it to the other side of the continent, breaks up old associations and jars the complacency of those who have felt themselves secure in controlling the business life of the country. This self-interest of the Pacific is bound to show itself in political life. We find ourselves handicapped by the old traditions and we seek to throw them off, but in doing so we step on the toes of the East.

Position Of Winnipeg Illustrates The Point.

The position of Winnipeg is a good illustration of the self-interest of political life. That city is on the Atlantic slope. Exports from Winnipeg go either east or south, speaking generally. The dividing line between East and West is several hundred miles this side of Winnipeg.

Winnipeg benefits from being a distributing and shipping centre for grain. That is her life blood. Until very recently every bushel of grain exported from the west has gone through Winnipeg. All railways lead there. She holds the strategic position. Then Vancouver interferes and begins to turn business to the Pacific, instead of allowing it to follow the old route, and immediately Winnipeg is against the Pacific. It is her self interest. She stands to benefit by squelching the aspirations of the people on the Pacific. She is forever showing the futility of the western route and objecting to any change in freight rates which would give the Pacific equal rights with the Atlantic.

West Must Show United Front.

The West must show a united front if it is to get justice. The interests of British Columbia, Alberta and Saskatchewan are the same. Saskatchewan will always ship either east or west and the province will benefit from having a choice of markets. It is just as much to the interest of Saskatchewan to be able to ship to the Pacific as it is for Alberta. Even Manitoba farmers will benefit for they will find it possible to ship their grain without the handicap of having the lines cluttered with the grain from the provinces to the west of them.

Because of this community of interest between the western provinces, every effort should be made to unify them politically. We should speak as one man, when it comes to looking after our own interests. It is all very well to have Eastern people say there should be no east and no west but just one united Canada. As long as the East is bleeding the West, we must keep alive the sectional feeling in order to fight for our rights.

Mile For Mile We Want The Same.

At the risk of getting tedious, it is necessary to repeat here that what the West wants is the same railway rate, mile for mile, between the Pacific coast ports and the prairies as is given between Fort William and the prairies. The whole thing is very simple and so far as the West is concerned there should be no two opinions in regard to it. We are not asking for favors but simply for justice. We have the railway grades and now we want the rates which naturally go with those grades.

TOBACCO IN ENGLAND NOT PROVING SUCCESS

Flavor Does Not Suit People of That Country Who Prefer Imported

LONDON, Nov. 29.—England will never be a tobacco growing country unless the present tastes of tobacco users change. The committee of the treasury appointed to inquire into the tobacco industry and to report on the possibility of growing and marketing English tobacco said in its report that the English tobacco has a distinct flavor which is foreign to the acquired taste of the consumer and therefore rarely appreciated by him. The trade, in fact, could never be profitable.

The committee does not recommend any further expenditure of public funds toward attempting to build a large tobacco industry in Great Britain.

IMPROVEMENTS MADE ANYOX GYMNASIUM

Community League Hears Report of Secretary and Deals With Routine Matters

ANYOX, Nov. 29.—At the last regular meeting of the Community League Council, with President Harper in the chair, the secretary reported that the basketball league had been organized and a governing body appointed. The banquet tendered to the participants in summer games had cost in the neighborhood of \$215 and had been voted a great success. The adjustable punching bag platform had arrived and been set up in the gymnasium and the shower baths would be ready by Friday evening when the basketball season opened. Preparations were being made for the Christmas dance to be held in Recreation Hall on Monday, December 22, and for the annual treat to all Anyox children on the afternoon and evening of December 23, and which promised to be the most successful affair of its kind ever held in Anyox. An effort was being made to start an organization of teen age boys, and considerable support had been promised.

A representative of Anyox Band desired the Council to withhold the monthly allowance of twenty-five dollars for the time being. Two letters from the L.O.O.M. were read, one of which suggested a card tournament between representatives of various organizations, the other stating that the Moose Order would hold their Christmas tree on December 26. A letter of thanks from the secretary of the Ladies' Hospital Auxiliary thanking the Council for the use of Recreation Hall on Halloween was read.

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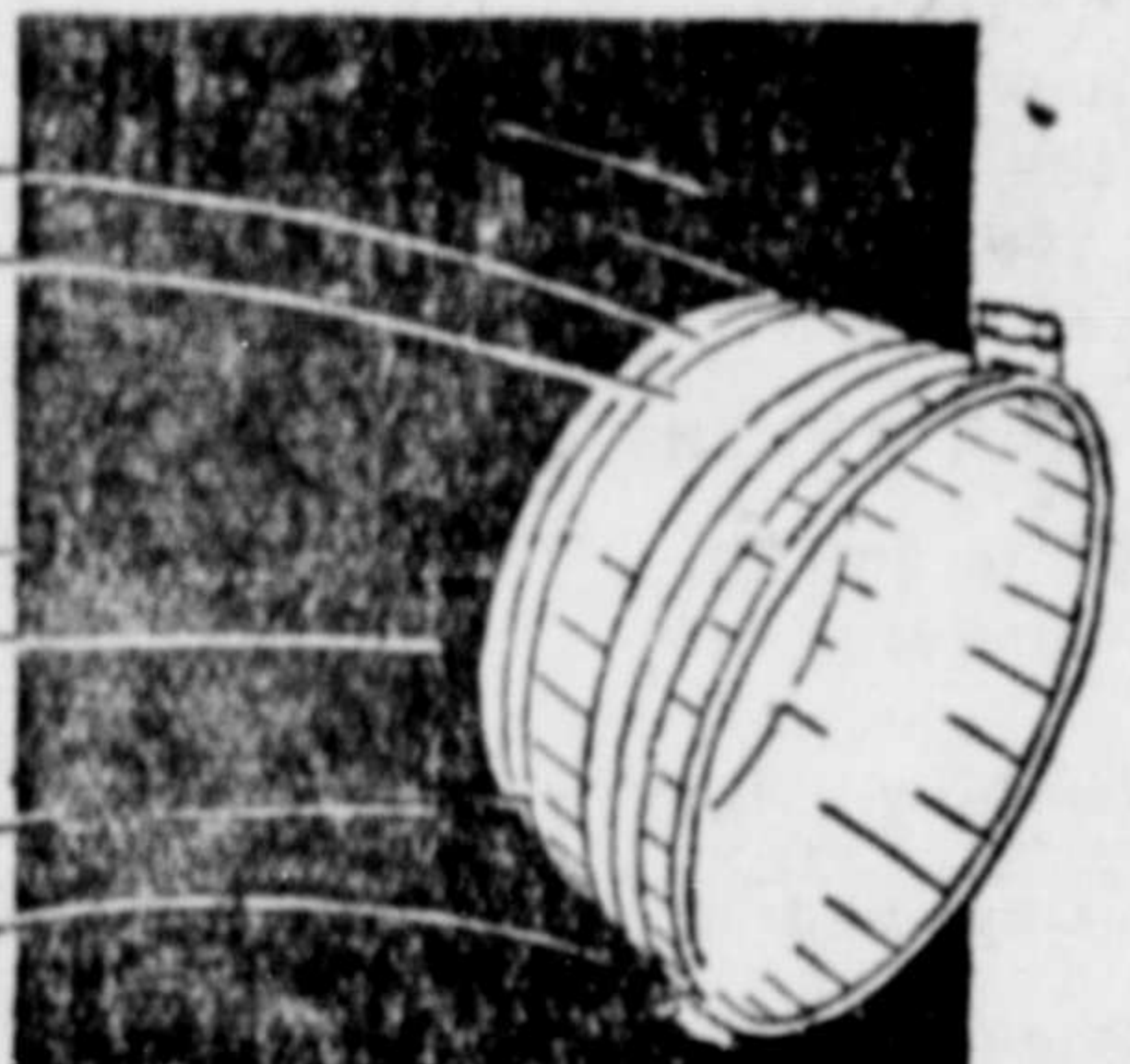

HOOVER POLICY IN THE STATES

(continued from page one)

measure in the elimination of national waste, and the work of the Northwestern Superpower Committee, of which Mr. Hoover is the chairman, was reviewed.

The department's work in co-operating with other agencies for the building of better homes, and more widespread home ownership, was also reviewed.

Trade Associations

Mr. Hoover in his report declared that one of the most important factors in elimination of national waste, was trade association organization throughout the country. He declared that while some of the smaller of these associations have operated to restrain trade and competition, trade associations generally have proved very valuable in the economic development of the country.

These associations are hampered in their work, however, he said, because there is no clearly defined line, either of law or court decision of what activities are and are not in the public interest. Many organizations fear to proceed with valuable work in the fear that their efforts will be construed to be against the public interest, the secretary said.

SWEDISH PARLIAMENT HAS MIXED MEMBERS

STOCKHOLM, Nov. 29.—Nothing short of an American jury can compare with the newly elected personnel of the Second Chamber of the Swedish Riksdag or variety of occupation and social status. The list of members contains more than 90 different titles to describe the pursuits and positions of the 230 persons constituting the full membership.

The Social-Democrats gained enough strength to dictate a new cabinet headed by the veteran statesman Hjalmar Branting, who has twice before been Social-Democrat premier of Sweden. Among his cabinet members are F. V. Thorsson, minister of finance, who rose from a shoemaker's apprentice to his present place at the king's council table. Per Albin Hansson began his career as a grocer's boy and is now minister of defence.

But the stores of obscure beginnings are no more fascinating than a perusal of the titles by which the present members of the second chamber describe themselves. They show blacksmiths and iron workers side by side with admirals and university professors. Farm hands, shoemakers and stone masons rub elbows with noblemen, governors, army officers of high rank, prominent lawyers and judges. No less than 72 describe themselves as proprietors of farms. The list contains 20 editors, 11 teachers and professors, nine carpenters and cabinet makers, four locomotive engineers and firemen and several other railroad employees.

Other occupations selected at random from the list are as follows: mechanic, chaplain, baker, miller, glass blower, clergyman, physician, merchant, dairyman, gardener, mail carrier and accountant. Of the three women members, one is a trained nurse, one a photographer and one sets herself down as "wife." There is one baron, one count and several other noblemen of Sweden's bluest blood.

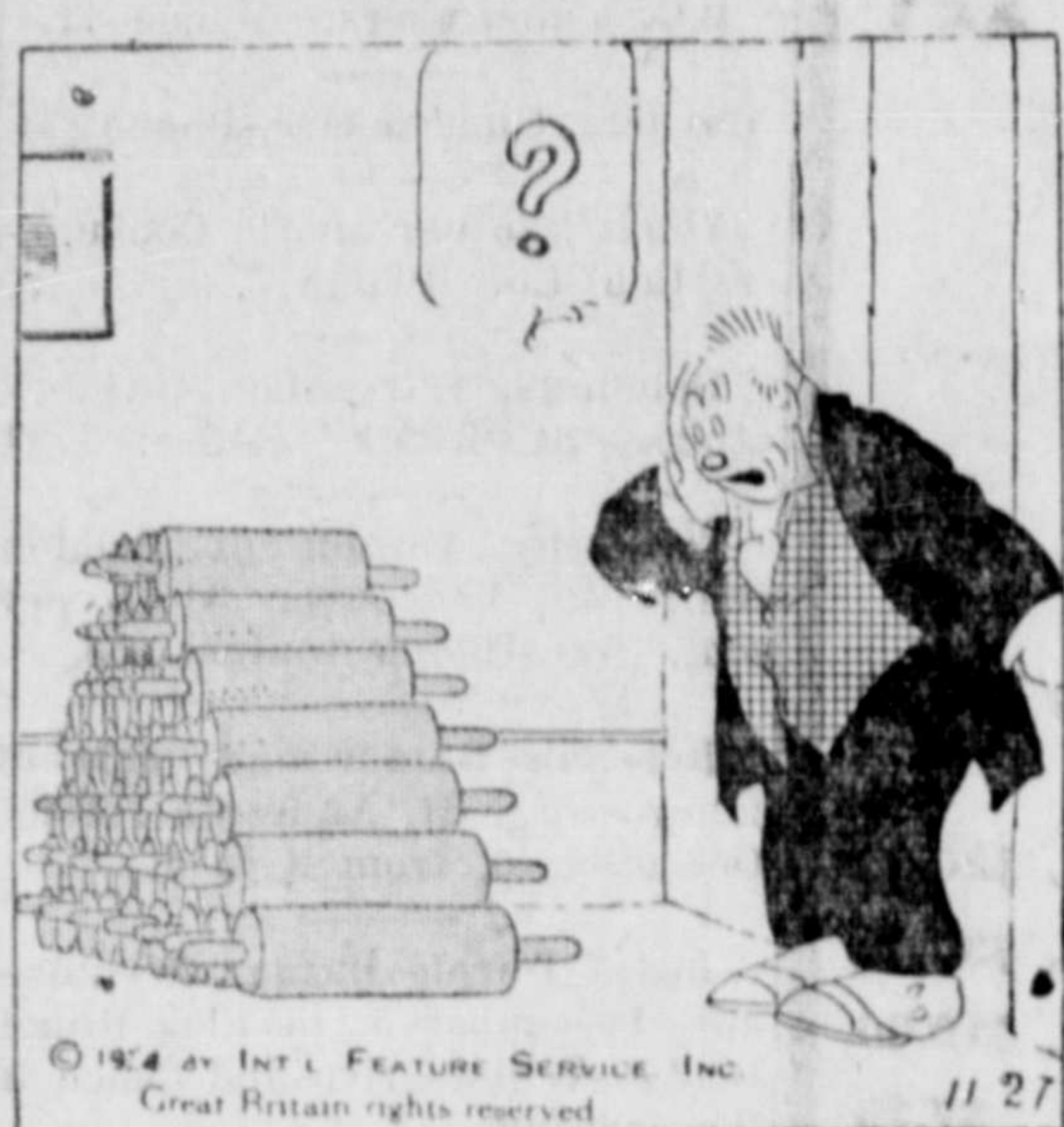
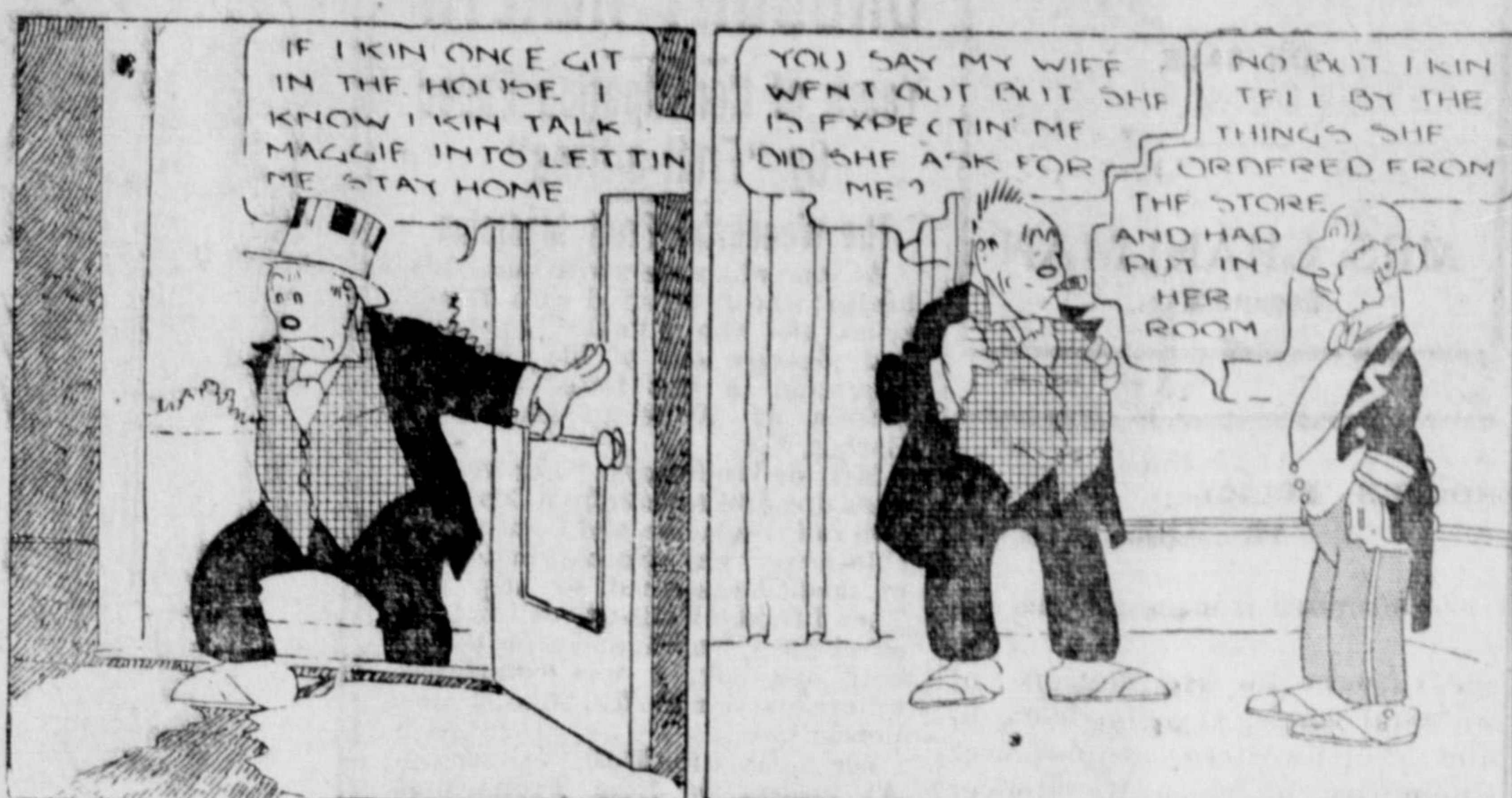

THAT MUSEUM

Editor Daily News.

If I might suggest, a museum collection could be made and housed in some suitable place such as a corner of the public library, without at present entailing any very large expense. Then when the collection is large enough to warrant such a move, a room could be secured until a complete library and museum building is erected.

Get the collection well under way before asking for any big expense and the institution will probably be a success. If I cannot attend the city hall meeting Wednesday evening I will at any rate contribute one or two specimens that should prove of value.
