There was a large attendance at the annual National Fish Day banquet held in the St. Regis Cafe at noon today under the auspices of the local branch of the Canadian Fisheries Association.

T. H. Johnson, president of the association, was in the chair and the speakers were J. H. Meagher and James Coombes representing the fishermen and George G. Bushby of the Prince Rupert By-Products Co.

T. H. Johnson and John Dybhavn comprised the program committee and John E. Davey, Harry Meagher and James L. Lee looked after general arrangements.

In his introductory remarks, Mr. Johnson referred to the progress that had been made by the fishing industry and touched on other points of interest.

Mr. Johnson, in his address, referred to difficulties and conditions from the fishermen's point of view and extolled the worth and bravery of those thus actively engaged in the industry.

PASSENGER SAVED

VICTORIA, Dec. 10.—Pinned under the steering gear of the car Robert McGoubrey, proprietor of the Modern Shoe Store here, with stores in Vancouver and Courtenay, was drowned when he drove the automobile over the side of the pier at Ogden Point and plunged with it to the bottom.

Lockhart Halem, a Calgary bond salesman, who was a passenger in the back seat, fought his way clear as the car sank and abandoned a futile effort to extricate McGoubrey and swam about until rescued.

The men were returning from the cable ship Restorer where they had been visiting one of the officers.

United States Senate Will Discuss Big Navy Scheme and Also Debate the World Court

WASHINGTON, Dec. 10.—(By Canadian Press).—The big navy question will come up in the Senate almost immediately.

The navy question will arise in connection with the bill still pending in the Senate to authorize construction of eight swift cruisers and six river gunboats, and to provide for improvements to various warships.

The bill has passed the House and Senate but it was held up in the Senate on a motion to reconsider by Senator King of Utah.

CHANGE MADE IN MOTOR LAW

Driver Must Have License and Must Not be Menace to Public Safety

SPEED LIMIT GOES

VICTORIA, Dec. 10.—Drastic and almost revolutionary changes in the Motor Vehicles Act were adopted by the Legislature yesterday with a view to bringing about a condition of greater safety on the streets and highways of the province.

The House adopted the drivers' license amendments by which every person driving a car must have a license in his or her possession.

BATTLE IN SIGHT OVER ANTI-ORIENTAL MEASURE IN HOUSE

VICTORIA, Dec. 10.—A sharp battle is promised in the legislature tomorrow on the Domestic Servants bill introduced by Mrs. Smith to prevent the employment of Orientals in homes with white girls.

Reports show that copies of the bill will be forwarded to the Japanese Government.

Anderson Incident

FERNIE MINERS LEAVE UNION

FERNIE, Dec. 10.—After deciding to break away from the United Mine Workers of America and form a B.C. Miners' Association, the Fernie Coal Creek miners voted to accept the scale offered by the Crows' Nest Coal Co. on the basis of a 55 per cent increase in wages over the 1914 scale.

The new scale, the company states, is to be the absolute minimum, and if conditions warrant will be increased.

Final preparations are now under way for the immediate commencement of work at Coal Creek.

PRINCE RUPERT TO GET \$27,000 FOR ROADS THIS YEAR

VICTORIA, Dec. 10.—The vote for roads in the Prince Rupert district, as introduced into the Legislature yesterday amounted to \$27,000 and for Omineca the sum proposed to be spent is \$70,000.

O Canada, our heritage, our love,
Thy worth we praise all other lands above.
From sea to sea, throughout thy length,
From pole to borderland,
At Britain's side, whatever betide,
Unflinchingly we'll stand.
With heart we sing, "God Save the King,"
Guide thou the Empire wide, do we implore,
And prosper Canada from shore to shore.

Make Unit Of British Empire.

The tenor of the King's speech in London yesterday and the address by the Colonial Secretary both indicate that the present British Government is alive to the idea of unification of the British Empire. Doubtless the policy of buying abroad in preference to dealing with other nations of the Empire will all be changed and this will be of great material benefit to British Columbia. It will need a close watch kept on British purchases in order to draw attention to any lapses from the new policy. The Minister of Lands, who is also the member for this district, has done a great deal in drawing attention to the desirability of buying fish and lumber in Canada and he will doubtless still be on the job. There will be plenty to do and we must all take an interest in the matter and draw attention to any discrepancies. Nothing tends to cement the Empire as well as inter-imperial trade.

Perfect Equality Of Individual Nations.

If the British commonwealth is to be a real unit there must be equality in everything. The foreign policy is not any longer settled by Great Britain alone but by the British Government in consultation with the Dominion Governments. This being the case it will be necessary for the Dominions to support their own navies. They cannot expect free naval protection and yet have a say as to the policy which might bring the navy into action. If there is to be an imperial navy, then Canada must do more than she is doing today toward providing it.

We do not like the glorification of militarism or doing anything which will lead to increased expenditures either on the army or navy, but the recent Egyptian case shows clearly that a navy is necessary and if it is necessary, we should do our part.

Mob Rule Not Good For Any Community.

In connection with the growth of the democratic spirit and the development of a people in self-government, there is always a danger of the crowd now and then developing into a mob and carrying things contrary to justice and right according to the whim of the moment. The mass of people in a community can go wrong almost as often as an individual. Often they have little real discernment and are led away by demagogues.

This is no argument against rule by the majority for we believe in this thoroughly as the government of the future. We believe in the sovereign people and their ultimate ability to rule. Some day the voice of the people will be the voice of God but today the voice of the people is sometimes the voice of the devil.

In Hull, the dispatches state, a man was convicted of killing a girl, yet the populace wanted him reprieved. Happily the British Government refused to intervene and the hanging went on. The man paid the penalty for his crime.

Making Appeal Direct To King.

In connection with the Hull case, an appeal was made direct to King George. Yet if the King had intervened, he would have been exceeding his right as a constitutional monarch and the very people who called on him to save a murderer would have been the ones to cry him down if he made a practice of usurping the duties of the cabinet.

The Home Secretary is primarily responsible for the carrying out of the death sentence, but cases of reprieve are passed on by the whole cabinet. The King simply signs the warrant. In this as in all other matters of state the King acts on the advice of his ministers and they are the ones responsible to the people for the act and not the King himself. That is why the King can do no wrong. If there is a wrong it is the advisers of the King who are wrong. So the King is personally kept free from the political whirl.



Here and There

Rez Beach, the eminent American author, was recently in New Brunswick as a guest of W. G. McIntyre. On leaving for his home in the United States at the conclusion of his visit, Mr. Beach expressed himself as a strong booster for the hunting and fishing possibilities of the province, charmed with its scenic beauties, delighted with its people and solemnly proposing to return with his gang next year.

The largest and one of the most valuable shipments of foxes ever to pass through Montreal, Que., by Dominion Express Company, was handled by that organization recently. There were 35 animals in the shipment, valued at \$17,000, 30 being silverblack foxes and the rest black foxes. The former were destined for exhibition at Minneapolis, while the latter went to different points in the Canadian West.

The Eastern International Dog-Sled Derby, which was so successful last year, will again be held at Quebec in 1925, the dates set being February 19th, 20th and 21st. As on former occasions, the distance to be covered will be 120 miles, at an average rate of 40 miles a day. Earl Bridgman, Le Pas, Manito, now holds the hands-on trophy awarded for the race and is expected to defend his honors. The teams are already working hard.

A decided acquisition to Trois Rivières, Que., is the new Canadian Pacific Railway station, which was opened there on November 8th. The building is Italian in design. Ross and Macdonald of Montreal, were the architects. Remarkable speed was made in the construction of the contract for the work was on signed on June 2nd last. The opening ceremony was performed by Grant Hall, vice-president of the company, in the presence of many notables.

Three moose and one deer was the total bag of W. B. Leeds Jr., young American multi-millionaire, and his friends, Nils Florman, Albert Hopkins, Paul Smith and Mortimer Davis Jr., as the result of their recent hunting trip into the Kipawa district. The leader of the party expressed himself as delighted with the results, as he had not hoped for such luck. Great quantities of game of all kinds were seen.

That the Land of Evangeline (Nova Scotia) now ships over 2,000,000 bushels of apples abroad annually was the recent statement of F. G. J. Comeau, general freight and passenger agent, Dominion Atlantic Railway. A number of British apple growers and buyers are at present putting large tracts of land under fruit. With the apple growing industry increasing from year to year, at the rate of two to three hundred per cent per decade, only twenty per cent of the orchard land available in the province is yet under fruit.

Perhaps the most remarkable, certainly the first aerial stowaway in history was discovered by Pilot Caldwell of the Laurentide Air Service, operating in the neighborhood of the Rouyn gold-fields, the other day. Caldwell, on rising for a long flight, found his machine so badly balanced as to be almost unmanageable. Cigarette butts and other clues led to the uncovering of the extra weight, which turned out to be a miner. As the man had taken this cheap but decidedly dangerous way of reaching civilization in order to see his sick wife, he was not detained or punished.

In six months British Columbia has spent \$5,777,500 in liquor. The greater part of this amount has gone out of the country and will never return. This season, covering a shorter actual period, British Columbians wagered \$6,397,365 on race tracks. In the strict pecuniary sense this does not mean that this amount is a dead loss. Opinions will differ as to what its use in such a manner will have had upon the structure of society and economics as a whole. Last year British Columbia imported cattle and beef, butter and cheese, sheep and mutton, swine

and pork, to a value of \$8,822,949. British Columbia money could have been utilized in the production of these necessary foodstuffs in British Columbia. Economic benefits which would have been reaped by that self-feeding business would have been sufficient to have started us on our way towards a condition which we should be the exporter, not the importer, in respect of these important commodities.



CONNECTION WITH RING IS DENIED

F. R. Anderson, Vancouver Lawyer, Says U.S. District Attorney Has no Evidence Against Him

VANCOUVER, Dec. 10.—"Carr has not, and could not have, any truthful evidence that would connect me with the activities of the smuggling ring. The only evidence he has is that manufactured by his own officials. He is simply trying to save his face, and threaten and bluster as he may, he cannot do away with the fact that I have nothing, and never had anything, to do with the ring running operations."

This was the reply of F. R. Anderson, Vancouver barrister, when notified of the contents of a despatch received from San Francisco in which U. S. District Attorney Sterling Carr was quoted as saying that if Mr. Anderson returned to the United States he would be prosecuted to the full extent of the law. "We had more than enough evidence to convict him," Carr is reported to have said. He indicated that the amount of Mr. Anderson's bail should be returned, would be placed at a figure which would compel him to stay within the jurisdiction of the court.

Informed by letter from Attorney McNab of San Francisco, that he would be rearrested on his return to California, and bail placed at \$50,000. Mr. Anderson intimated that this new evidence of the crimes against him would not prevent him from appearing in court when his case was called.

MARCONI MAY TAKE OVER STATIONS NOW RUN BY GOVERNMENT

VICTORIA, Dec. 10.—It is said here to be quite probable that the Department of Marine will put into effect on the Pacific Coast the same arrangements with regard to wireless stations as now obtains on the Great Lakes and the Atlantic Coast.

Twenty Eastern stations are operated by the Marconi Wireless Company for a subsidy of about \$5,000 a year. In view of what is likely to take place in the way of extended operations by the Marconi Company on the Pacific, the department has now under advisement the proposal to transfer to the Marconi Company the stations operated by the Marine Department in B.C. under an arrangement similar to that in the East, and which has proved very satisfactory.

The stations which will likely be affected on the Pacific are as follows: Prince Rupert, Victoria, Estevan, Dead Tree Point, Queen Charlotte Islands, Bull Harbor, Alert Bay, Gape Lanzo, Vancouver and the Pashena di-

rection finding station. E. G. Haughton, superintendent of Government radio here, says that he knows nothing of this new development. It is unlikely that it will be put through as the Government at present is considering the establishment of another direction finding station on the West Coast of Vancouver Island, and also installing a continuous wave instrument at the Estevan station.

SLACKENING TIMBER CUT

Only Little Over Five and Half Million Feet Scaled During November

Timber scalings for the month of November were small compared with earlier months of the year owing to the camps and mills being shut down, only a little over five and a half million feet having been measured by the officials of the forestry department during that period. This brings the total for the year up to 73,230,812 besides poles, piles and ties. The cut for the month was made up as follows:

BOTH BEATRICE AND CAMOSUN TO BLAME

Canadian Pacific Railway Co. Wins in Appeal Following Collision of Steamers Near Here

Finding that both vessels were equally to blame and that carelessness on the part of both was responsible for the collision in McKay Reach, a short distance south of Prince Rupert about a year and a half ago, Mr. Justice McLennan, president of the Exchequer Court of Canada, has allowed the appeal of the Canadian Pacific Co., owner of the steamer Princess Beatrice, which had been held liable for the damage sustained by the Union steamer Camosun. Each party is ordered to pay its own costs and the damages will likely be lumped and divided between the two vessels. Each vessel is estimated to have sustained \$15,000 damage as a result of the accident. This finding agrees with that of the wreck commission but varies that of Mr. Justice Martin of the Admiralty Court who held the Princess Beatrice responsible.

GERMAN LUMBER INDUSTRY ACTIVE

STUTTGART, Dec. 10.—Germany's lumber business, which has been in the doldrums, is rapidly getting back to normal, according to a recent announcement of the trade. The wooden shoe factories of the country have been operated on full time recently the output being sold in Germany and Holland which take the bulk of the wares.
