

NEW YORK, June 23. - The opulation of the United States otalled 112,826,000 on January 1, 1924, according to estimates announced here by the National This compares with 110,883,000 on January 1, 1923, and the census count of 105,711,000 on January 1, 1920.

The most remarkable gain was recorded in the last half of 1923. the net increase being 1.162,000. a greater growth than in any other half year during the last two decades and probably preater than any six months period in the nation's history. The gain for the entire year was 1,943,000.

The Bureau estimates the population of the Continental United States for each half year since January 1, 1920, to have been approximately as follows:
