GERMANY CONTINUES MILITARY TRAINING

PRELIMINARY STEPS TAKEN LOOKING TO ANOTHER ARMS CONFERENCE

Military Training going on in Germany Is Contrary to Peace Treaty says Military Mission

PARIS, Feb. 18.—The report of the allied military control mission on the state of Germany's disarmament was delivered to the allied war committee today. The mission sets forth the difficulties under which it worked, declaring obstructions placed by Germans in the way of investigations absolutely prevented any discoveries by direct search.

Despite the obstacles the mission declares it obtained important information from German pacifists relating to the military training that was going on contrary to the treaty of Versailles.

C.G.M.M. SHIP IS ABANDONED

Was Afire Fore and Aft and is Now Reported Danger to Navigation

INTERMEDIATE TYPE

Vessel Sailed from Halifax for West Indies on January 24 Last

KINGSTON, Jamaica, Feb. 18.—The Canadian Government Merchant Marine freight steamer Canadian Navigator, which was sighted on February 17 afire fore and aft, has been abandoned and is reported a danger to navigation. The vessel sailed from Halifax for the West Indies on January 24.

The Canadian Navigator was one of the C.G.M.M.'s intermediate type of boats. She was built in 1919 at Montreal and has been operated on the Atlantic coast. She was 319 feet long, 43 feet wide and of 22 1/2 feet depth. Her gross tonnage was 3,161 and registered tonnage, 1,929. She was smaller than the Canadian Rover, two familiar Pacific coast boats.

Manslaughter True Bill Against Brother Usmar Assault Against Second

MONTREAL, Feb. 18.—The grand jury today returned a true bill against Brother Usmar, on the staff of the orphanage at Huberdeau, who is charged with manslaughter in connection with the death of Hector Galarneau, a lad eight years of age, who died from scalds received in his bath at the institution.

The jury also returned a second true bill against a brother boy at liberty on bail, which charges him with having "grievously assaulted" a boy last fall and "having incited and induced other small boys grievously to assault and wound the victim."

ATLIN ROUTE TO DEASE LAKE

Trail to Telegraph Creek Over Which Mail is Delivered

A protest comes from Atlin against the statement made by the Stewart Board of Trade as published in this paper, in which it was said that the Stikine River was the only available route at present time to Telegraph Creek and the new gold discovery in the Dease Lake district. Telegram from the gold commissioner, C. L. Munroe, says the writer is apparently under a misapprehension as there is a trail from Atlin to Telegraph Creek and all mail for that district is now and has been for years, delivered over that trail via Atlin during the winter months.

WHISKY RUNNER WAS CAPTURED

Seized by Coast Guard Cutter and Towed Into San Francisco

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 18.—The steamer Coal Harbor, said to be a rum runner of Canadian registry was captured by a coast guard cutter early today and towed into port.

The vessel is reported to be operated by the owners of the recently seized Quadra and the ill-fated Speedway.

Crew Arrested

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 18.—Thirteen of the crew of the boat Coal Harbor have been arrested. Officials estimate that ten thousand cases of liquor valued at \$600,000 is aboard.

PRINCE RUPERT GRAIN OUTLET

Mentioned in Report of Grain Board in Connection With Peace Country

Prince Rupert is mentioned as an outlet for the grain of the Peace River country in the report of the grain inquiry board which recently reported at Ottawa. At the time the information was gathered there was prospect of an elevator being built here but nothing more and that was stated in the report. Stress was laid on the facilities at Vancouver.

The report mentions that the future development of the Peace River is dependent on railway facilities to the Pacific coast.

WILL REPORT SOON ON PEACE RIVER RY.

Grant Hall, Vice-President of C.P.R., Mentions Subject at Calgary

CALGARY, Feb. 18.—Grant Hall, vice-president and general manager of the C.P.R., announced here that an early report would be given in regard to railway extensions in the Peace River country. Investigations were being made and to use the vice-president's own words, the report will be made "quite shortly."

MANHART PLEADS NOT GUILTY OF MURDER

Charged with Killing Mrs. Morley of Victoria in Taxi at Seattle

SEATTLE, Feb. 18.—A plea of not guilty to charges of first degree murder was entered by Elmer Manhart in court here today. Manhart is accused of slaying Mrs. Lillian Morley of Victoria, B.C., in a taxicab here. Demurrer to information against Manhart was presented by his counsel but overruled by the court.

ANOTHER ENGINEER FOR THE ELEVATOR

Haertvig Os, engineer for C. D. Howe & Co., designers of the grain elevator to be erected here, arrived in the city from Port Arthur on this morning's train. Mr. Os will be associated with W. N. Chater in connection with the supervising of the work and expects to remain here until next fall.

ARMS CONFAB CONSIDERED

Principal Powers Have Been Approached with that end in View

WASHINGTON, Feb. 18.—The principal powers have been approached by the United States on the subject of a new arms conference. The discussion has not reached the advanced point characterized by diplomats as formal negotiations but are being followed up quietly and persistently in all the principal world capitals.

Officials here will not discuss what are the obstacles encountered or what measures of success appears to have resulted from the exchanges up to the present.

WILL DESTROY SEIZED LIQUOR

Bootleg Brew and Other Concoctions to be Poured Down Sewers

VICTORIA, Feb. 18.—Destruction of seized liquor held by authorities in various parts of the province was authorized by the Government today. Some of the liquor is "bootleg brew" taken in blind pigs and some the genuine stuff seized because it did not bear the Government label.

Thousands of bottles of the liquid will be poured down the sewers on a liquor outpouring date to be named by officials.

Court Martial Proceedings Against Colonel Pousette in Connection with Contracts

OTTAWA, Feb. 18.—Court martial proceedings against Lieut.-Col. G. Pousette, supply officer of Military District No. 10, will be instituted to investigate charges in connection with coal contracts for Tuxedo Barracks at Winnipeg. Announcement to this effect is made by Hon. E. M. MacDonald, minister of national defence.

Following submission of the report of the royal commission which investigated the charges, it is understood that the Department of Justice will also institute private proceedings against the Canadian Coal Sales Co.

FIRST HALIBUT BOAT ARRIVED IN PORT WITH CATCH

This morning it was reported along the waterfront that the first halibut boat had arrived with her catch. The matter was investigated and found to be perfectly correct. The name of the craft is not available nor is the name of the owner offered for publication. The vessel was propelled by oars and the catch consisted of one halibut tipping the scales at 45 pounds.

ACTION OF SENATE MAY CAUSE ELECTION

Reform of Second Chamber Will be Live Question When Appeal Made to Country

OTTAWA, Feb. 18.—What is likely to cause an election this year is the action of the Canadian Senate. If that body persists in thwarting the will of the Commons the government may find it necessary to appeal to the people of Canada against its decision. At any rate it is pretty certain that the Senate reform question will be prominently before the people at the next election.

BOOTLEG KING IS DISMISSED

Case Against Olmsted and Guests on Conspiracy Charge Remains

SEATTLE, Feb. 18.—Roy Olmsted, reputed king of the Pacific coast rum runners, his wife and nine guests, who were arrested in a prohibition raid on his home in November, have been released and the charges of violating the prohibition laws dismissed. The dismissal does not affect the indictment charging all released except one with conspiracy to violate the National Prohibition Act.

JAP COTTON MILL STRIKE

Trouble is Said to be Partly Due to Chinese Bolshevik Activities

SHANGHAI, Feb. 18.—A strike in thirteen Japanese cotton mills involves thirty thousand workers. The strikers attacked the mills today and damaged machinery as well as injuring six persons. The trouble is believed to be partly due to Chinese Bolshevik activities.

DREDGE DUE HERE TODAY

Ground to be Broken Tomorrow and Soon Work Will be in Swing

MAIN CONTRACT NEXT

Satisfaction Expressed Here at Placing of Half Million in Estimates

W. C. Arnell received word yesterday that the dredging outfit for the gravel fill in connection with the elevator foundation would probably arrive here this afternoon. Actual work will commence in about two days, as soon as everything is in readiness.

Robert Sharp, superintendent of the foundation construction work, announced this morning that in a few days work would be in full swing.

Excavation equipment is arriving from Vancouver today and concrete mixers, etc., will be here next week. First ground will probably be broken tomorrow.

Satisfaction was expressed here at the placing of a half million dollars in the main estimates presented to Parliament yesterday. The contract for the superstructure should be let in about a month and then it will be known exactly what the total cost will be and the remainder of the sum required will appear in the supplementary estimates brought down later in the session, as was done in the case of the Edmonton elevator.

COMMITTEE ON PEACE RIVER

Sub-committees Formed at Meeting Yesterday Afternoon to Report Next Week

Mayor Newton was appointed chairman of the joint committee of the city council and the board of trade to go further into the matter of the Peace River railway route with a view to looking after the interests of Prince Rupert, which met yesterday afternoon in the Council chamber. Hon. T. D. Pattullo was present and offered his assistance in connection with the matter. The chairman of the three sub-committees were appointed. Alderman Casey heads the committee on finances, J. C. McLennan on statistics and John Dybbavn on publicity, the chairman to select their own sub-committees from the members of the joint committee.

It was decided to adjourn until next Tuesday evening when some concrete plan of campaign will be formulated.

DEPOSITORS TO GET SOME CASH

Moral Claim in Equity to be Recognized by Parliament is Proposal

OTTAWA, Feb. 18.—Premier Mackenzie King announced in the House of Commons yesterday that the Government had decided to introduce at this session of Parliament a measure recognizing the "moral claim in equity for compensation" of Home Bank depositors. The extent of the compensation is not indicated.

The Premier declared the bill would be presented for the approval of the House and would especially specify the amount proposed to be paid.

GRANBY STOCK IS VERY LOW

Financing to be Done by Company this Spring has Bearish Effect

NEW YORK, Feb. 18.—Granby Consolidated has a financial problem to look after this spring. On May 1, \$2,500,000 bonds mature and the money to pay these will have to be raised. This has had a bearish effect on Granby stocks which are now held very low. The failure to pay dividends to holders of common stock for several years past has also had a discouraging influence.

It is said here that the outlook is better for Granby and the stock may improve in value soon.

KING GEORGE BETTER TODAY

His Majesty Passed a Fair Night After Attack of Bronchitis Following Flu

LONDON, Feb. 18.—An improvement in King George's condition is reported officially. He has been suffering from bronchitis following an attack of influenza. He passed a fair night and, although there is no change in his bronchial condition, generally His Majesty shows an improvement. He contracted a chill last Friday when he accompanied the Queen to a theatre.

FLOES OF ICE WRECKED DOCK

Also Swept Away Fish Traps at Western End of Alaskan Peninsula

DETCH HARBOR, Alaska, Feb. 18.—Sweeping floes of ice partly wrecked the dock and destroyed all the fish traps at False Pass, the extreme western end of the Alaskan peninsula early this month. Captain Johansen of Seattle reports that deeply driven piles of fish traps were crushed like paper, according to information given him by natives.

Capt. Johansen is master of the steamer Starr, which is discharging cargo here.

Government Aid Against Swindlers.

Some Ontario farmers who have been duped by foreign oil stock peddlers are now howling to the government for aid to help get their money back. It is to be hoped that the government will let them stew in their own fat. Any people who send money to speculate in get-rich-quick schemes in the United States deserve to be stung. They cannot be protected against their own folly.

It is difficult to impress upon people that when they get more than eight per cent for their money they are taking risks and even that high rate of interest is not by any means gill edged. Government bonds run from four and a half to five per cent and every one per cent above that rate means just so much more risk.

When any person comes along and intimates that you may double your money or even make twenty per cent, you know that you are likely to lose the whole investment. You are taking grave chances.

Much of the foreign stock sold in Canada is not worth a cent a share. People who would buy that kind of stock deserve to be stung.

Always Are Lambs Ready To Be Fleeced.

There are always plenty of lambs ready to be fleeced. New crops are raised at regular intervals and the same that are shown once can usually be shown again at frequent intervals. The only way to keep them safe is to put them in the fold and lock them up. They seem born to be victims.

Even in Prince Rupert there are many people who put their money into one fake scheme after another and they never learn the lesson. They have the gambling spirit and want to get rich overnight. The result is disastrous. All that is needed is a clever stock seller and a romantic proposition far enough away to give it the proper atmosphere.

Straightening Out Many Difficulties.

One by one Prince Rupert's difficulties are being straightened out. The latest is the settlement of the site for the Burns abattoir. The project was delayed, it was claimed, by the delay of the railway company in giving its decision. Now the company announces that it has done its part. The site is granted and the trackage will be built and everything possible will be done to aid the project. It doubtless will be one of the new developments of the present season.

Western Earnings Better Than The East.

The western section of the Canadian National Railways comes close to paying its way, something which cannot be said of the far eastern section. Given a proper outlet from the Peace River district and doubtless the lines would at once begin to pay. With only a little over a million dollars to the bad in the year, it is to be supposed that the present season will see sufficient improvement to wipe out that small deficit.

Prince Rupert Should Soon Do Her Share.

Prince Rupert should soon do her share in the recuperation of the railway. If wheat begins to come rolling down along the Skeena and out to the Orient and the United Kingdom, and lumber, poles and ties are carried back to the prairies and other easterly points there should be an improvement. Fish shipments are likely to be even larger than ever this year and Alaskan business is showing signs of improving. Every prospect is toward better conditions for the railway, and the success of the railway is the success of the terminals.

Rich Prospects in Babine Range Northward from Smithers Includes Cronin's Famous Babine Bonanza

(Third of Series of Articles on Mining in Bulkley Valley, based on Smithers Board of Trade Report)

For a number of years mining men have been prospecting in the Babine Range to the north of Smithers. From time to time good veins of ore have been discovered that look as if they would develop into rich mines and the result is that today there are some splendid prospects there in various stages of development. In 1924 a number of locations were made and during the summer a Dominion geological survey party under Dr. George Hanson worked in the vicinity and the report he made is awaited with much interest by the residents of the districts and mining men everywhere who know something about that part of the country. The best known property in the Babines is that located by James Cronin, the aged miner and prospector.

Babine-Bonanza

James Cronin's well-known Babine-Bonanza mine was idle throughout 1924. In October an inspection of the property was made by L. E. Drummond, mining engineer. A further inspection to have been made for Missouri interests in November was cut short by the illness and subsequent death of the engineer—G. W. McCaskell.

This is a silver-lead-zinc mine lying on the northeastern or Babine Lake slope of the mountains, reached by road from Telkwa, thirty miles away. It is owned by James Cronin of Spokane and others. Extensive and consistent development carried on during the past fifteen years by Mr. Cronin has proved a large body of high grade ore. Transportation difficulties are very considerable. It is probable that a concentrator will be put in to handle the ore at or near the mine, and this should stimulate development of near-by properties as well.

Debuture

The owners of the Debuture had a little work done in the summer of 1924 by a party under Henry Bretzins of Hazelton. This is a silver-lead property on the north-eastern slope of the Babine Range. It was purchased several years ago by Chicago interests. Although a large body of high grade ore has been shown up, the property is a long way from the railway and transportation difficulties are formidable.

Victoria

Patrick J. Higgins and partners have a six claim group near the Cronin mine called the Victoria. A contact ore body carrying high values in silver, lead and zinc has been opened up by a 45 foot shaft and a main tunnel. This latter runs for over 100 feet as a cross-cut and then for another 100 feet as a drift on the vein. Further work was added last season. This property bears every mark of being a likely mine, and should a concentrator be established at the Babine-Bonanza the transportation of ore will not be a difficult problem.

Silver King

Continuing from the Victoria over the summit of the Babine range and down to Driftwood Creek, Higgins and partners have also the Silver King group. This is reached by the road and trail from Smithers, up Driftwood Creek, a distance of twenty miles. Of different showings on the claims the most important would appear to be a quartz vein discovered in a canyon of Driftwood Creek. On either side of the creek a drift tunnel has been driven on this, that on the east side being more than 100 feet in length. In this ore has been found assaying across eighteen inches in width: Gold 22 oz., silver 168 oz., lead 10 per cent, copper 5.5 per cent. At forty feet lower elevation a cross-cut tunnel is being driven. Development was continued in 1924. In the past, disputes between owners did much to delay the opening up of this very promising prospect.

Harvey Group

Only twelve miles from Smithers and one mile from the Driftwood Creek wagon road is the Harvey group of five claims, owned by C. G. Harvey, W. J. Larkworthy and D. A. McRae. Two main showings have been developed by shafts 65 and 60 feet in depth. In both high grade ore has been discovered—values being in silver, copper and lead. Assays are said to show an average of \$50 to \$60 per ton across three to four feet of ore. Some years ago a twenty-five ton shipment, hand-sorted, was made and brought returns

of \$200 per ton, all values. In 1921 an Edmonton syndicate had the property under option and commenced a cross-cut tunnel to strike the vein at 250 feet in depth. Internal difficulties led to the breaking up of the syndicate and, coming to the end of their finances, the option was dropped with the work uncompleted. Since then the owners have been continuing the work in a small way. At the end of 1924, with Mr. Harvey in charge, the tunnel had reached 240 feet and was nearing the point where the vein is likely to be encountered. The work is continuing.

RAILWAY BALL WAS EXCELLENT

Over Four Hundred People Present at Big Event Last Night

One of the largest crowds that ever gathered in the auditorium for a dance was there last night at the annual ball of the Canadian National Railway employees. It was a success from the very beginning and when the home waltz was played between three and four o'clock there were more dancers on their feet than attend many of the ordinary events. Miss St. Cyr's six-piece orchestra played the newest things in dance tunes and W. H. Tobey as M.C. kept everything moving with proper decorum. The official patrons were F. G. Dawson, I. A. Macpherson, and J. H. Pillsbury, but there were also present Hon. T. D. Pattullo, minister of lands, Cy. Annett of Vancouver, who is in charge of part of the operations in connection with elevator construction here; Mrs. Frank Little of Terrace and a number of others not usually seen at dances in Prince Rupert. The railway idea was well carried out in that at the farther end of the hall was to be seen Canadian National Engine 1925 with its headlight showing the way forward to a successful year while the orchestra platform was the observation car with its rear lights and other necessary accompaniments. The moonlight effect was produced also by a railway headlight, shaded just sufficient not to be dazzling, a great improvement on the flashing lights often used for this purpose.

RUPERT MARKET FOR BULKLEY

Report of Meeting in Which Creamery is Discussed at Length

A report of the Board of Trade meeting at Smithers in which Prince Rupert as a market for the dairy products of the Bulkley Valley was discussed as reported in the Interior News follows: The pros and cons of the indication existing on the merits of a creamery at Prince Rupert or the establishment of a distribution depot for whole milk at that point was well churned at the regular meeting of the board of trade at Smithers on Monday night, and while the butter was allowed to remain in the churn until a little more information was secured on the subject, some real progress was made toward assisting in a solution of this whole question of dairy development in the Valley.

The subject was precipitated into the meeting by Vice-President J. P. Wheeler of Telkwa, who gave a very clear exposition of the subject as it had been unfolded to him in an investigation extending over many months and which is failing to provide any unalterable course of procedure had given him the germ of an idea which he reasoned out before the meeting, and had certainly convinced him that something must be done—and that in the very near future—if we are to retain our present farming population on the land.

Should be Creamery

Weighing up the shortcomings of the whole milk business, Mr. Wheeler expressed his conviction that the greatest welfare of the largest number rested in the establishment of a creamery at Prince Rupert, and he made it plain that he had given way to a former belief held that the creamery should be established at a point in the Valley. With a creamery, he contended that the full product of the farmers would be utilized and in addition it would create its own market through the subsidiaries of ice cream and butter milk, as well as in the manufacture of butter, whereas in the whole milk business alone any surplus would be a loss and for some weeks in the hot weather the shipment of milk was a risky business.

The unfortunate career of the Vanderhoof creamery was taken under review, and rather than being an argument against a creamery the speaker contended that it was the best support in favor of a creamery on the coast where the natural market was to be found. All dairy experts recommended a creamery, he stated, and they also recommended Prince Rupert as the location, the argument that the by-product of skimmed milk being a loss not being serious from the fact that only a very few shippers of cream would be able to take advantage of this were the creamery located in the Bulkley Valley.

Government Aid

Mr. Wheeler also thought that the government should profit from the experience of Vanderhoof and raise their paternal supervision period from one year to five. One year, he claimed, was insufficient time for the farmers to get into the business. Mr. Wheeler went into the conditions existing on many farms in the Valley and stated that it was a matter of keeping these settlers or seeing them leave for want of a market for their dairy product. The welfare of the settlers rebounded to the welfare of everyone, and he asked the board to give the question their immediate and serious consideration in an effort to find a solution at the earliest possible moment.

L. E. DeVoin opened the discussion with a technical review of milk and cream classifications and prices, butter fat content, and other details that must be considered whether the decision be whole milk trade or a creamery. Mr. DeVoin leaned toward the whole milk business as bringing greatest returns, using figures quoted by Mr. Wheeler of one farmer in the Fraser Valley who had been shipping to a creamery and receiving around \$90 for his cream, and who had joined the Fraser Valley Milk Producers' Association in supplying the city of Vancouver, and who from the same cows received as high as \$175. Mr. DeVoin

stated that for a variety of justifiable reasons the milk consumption at Prince Rupert was only one quarter of normal and he felt that this could be developed by education and good milk. While he favored the whole milk business, he also gave arguments favorable to a creamery should this be decided upon.

Milk of Cream

D. D. Munro also expressed his views on the subject, stating that the matter of developing a dairy industry had a scope which demanded a great deal of thought, and he cautioned them against undue haste in action. He could not see where the district could consider catering to the whole milk and cream business at Prince Rupert and still have sufficient cream to justify a creamery.

Several others expressed opinions on the subject, and in the end a motion referred the whole question to the agricultural bureau to secure information and suggestions from Prince Rupert and to bring in any recommendations not later than the next regular meeting.

NEW HAZELTON

Besides the matter of finding a community hall for New Hazelton, the Community League here is considering the establishment of a sports ground and a flower garden at the railway station. Various committees have been appointed to take charge of the several departments of the league's endeavor during the coming year.

On Thursday afternoon, the death occurred of Lizzie Morrison, aged 43, the wife of R. J. Morrison, New Hazelton. The funeral took place on Sunday to Hazelton cemetery, Rev. Mr. Pound officiating. Deceased married Mr. Morrison in October 1923, and had resided here since, having come from Aberdeen, Scotland. An infant daughter survives.

Fred Peterson has returned to Telkwa after spending several weeks in the hospital here.

A debate took place last Thursday night on the subject:

CANADIAN NATIONAL HOTEL IN VANCOUVER NOW BEING PLANNED

VANCOUVER, Feb. 18.—Definite negotiations are being carried on by the Canadian National Railways with private capitalists for the erection of a large hotel to cost at least \$1,000,000 in a central location in Vancouver according to Ald. G. H. Worthington who has returned to the city after interviewing railway heads in the East. The proposal is that, once the hotel has been built by private capital, the railway company would lease and operate it in connection with the railways.

MANSON PLEASED AT ACTION OF OTTAWA

Other Provinces Falling in Line With B.C. Affects Situation

VICTORIA, Feb. 18.—Attorney General Manson is pleased with the outlook for handling the liquor problem more effectively as a result of the proposed legislation of the Dominion government to prevent importation into a province where sales are controlled by the government. It should prevent private importation into B.C.

The law will not affect export houses as they do not technically import liquor. It simply passes through the province in bond.
