BROTHER OF LOCAL MAN SHOT IN CHICAGO

UNUSUAL INTEREST IN SESSION OF COUNCIL OF LEAGUE OF NATIONS

Vancouver Man Shot in Chicago Drug Store as it was being Held Up

Brother of Nick Murchie of this City, Traveller for Vancouver Firm

VANCOUVER, Mar. 9.—Word received Sunday tells of the shooting to death of Archibald Murchie, 31 years of age, son of a local tea merchant, late on Saturday night in Chicago, when he entered a drug store to make a purchase on the way to his boarding house.

The drug store was being held up by a bandit who turned his gun on young Murchie and the young man died late yesterday.

Murchie was employed by Kelly Douglas Co. here. He was on leave of absence for three months taking an air course. He intended to return home at the end of March to re-join the firm.

Mr. Murchie was a brother of Nick Murchie of this city traveller for McLellan & McFeely, Ltd. He received the sad news this morning through the medium of the Daily News.

OBBS FOUND GUILTY; GETS PRISON TERM

LONDON, Mar. 9.—William Cooper Hobbs, solicitor's clerk, found on a charge of accepting bribes for £300,000 in connection with the blackmailing of Sir Hugh, Indian prince, was found guilty and sentenced to two years with hard labor.

The charge against Hobbs arose out of the famous "Mr. A." case.

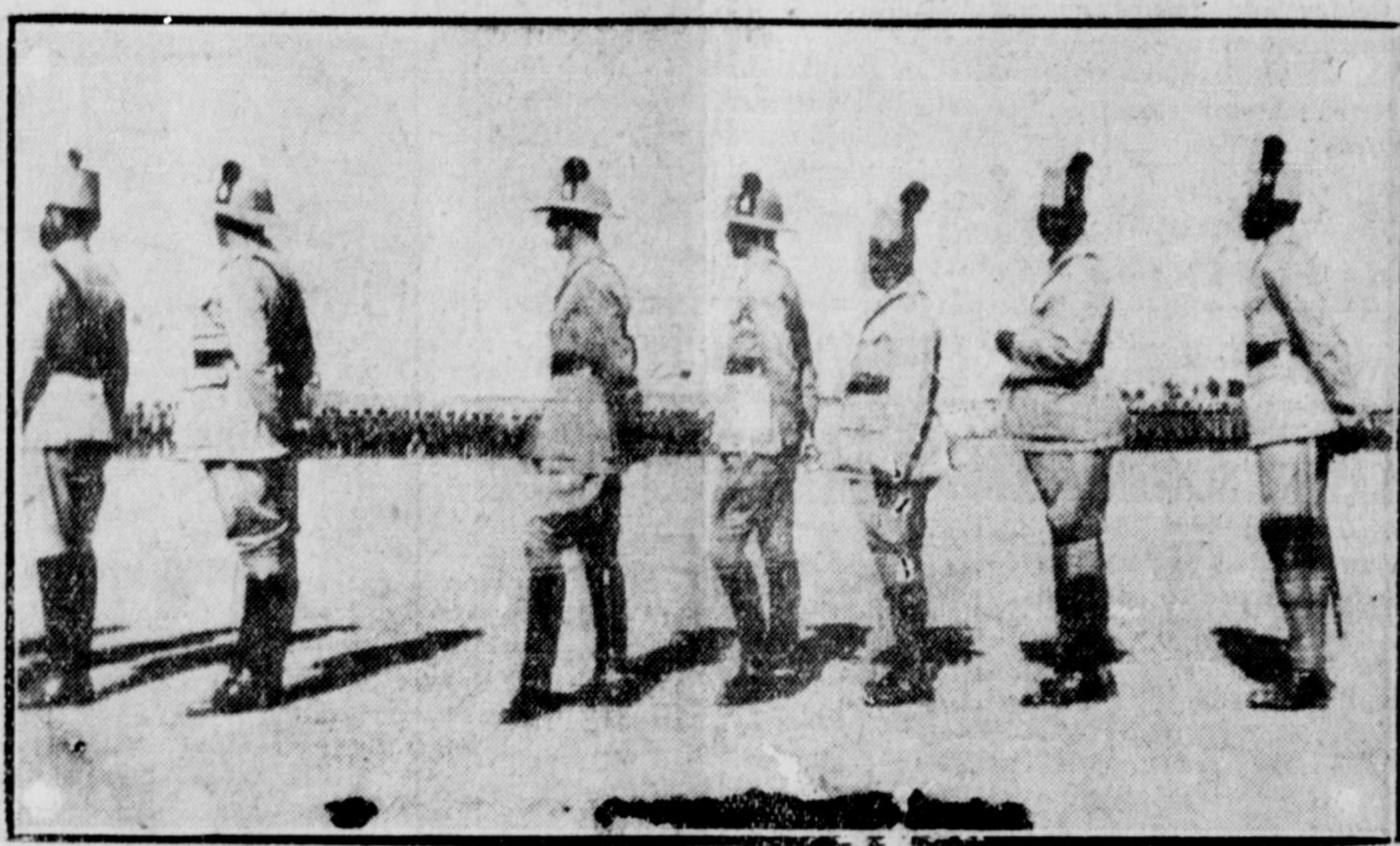
INTERIOR DISTRICT IN NEED OF HOSPITAL

BRULE CUTOFF RAPPED HARD

Engineer and Geologist takes Exception to Proposed Railway Route

A special despatch from Ottawa to the Vancouver Province says: The suggested Brule cutoff railway line, from Obed station on the Canadian National to Grande Prairie, receives a hard knock in the report of James McEvoy, eminent mining engineer and geologist of Toronto, who was engaged by the Dominion Fuel Board to determine the worth of coal deposits in the Sheep River and Smokey River districts of Alberta. As previously reported, Mr. McEvoy states there is no anthracite in either area.

Dealing with the question of transportation, Mr. McEvoy reports that it is not feasible from a practical point of view to construct and operate a line of railway to Grande Prairie and Peace River country which would pass through coal lands of the Smokey and Sheep river countries. The only practical route, he finds, would pass far to the northeast of these coal lands, and, to gain access to the coal, long branch lines would be necessary.

The reason why a through railway could not traverse the coal lands is that it would have to cross at right angles all the deep draining valleys of the intervening country.

Considered as a new source of coal supply, the principal fact about the Smokey-Sheep river area, according to the report, is that it contains a large tonnage of very high-grade bituminous coal one notable 14-foot seam grading in places, by analysis, as semi-anthracite.

This seam will give a superior steam coal but it is not noticeably better than the other high-grade bituminous coals already developed in Alberta in the quantities which domestic users require, namely, freedom from dirt, smoke and soot.

The other seams on the National coal reserve contain high-grade bituminous steam coals, probably equal to if not a little better than the best bituminous mined in Alberta.

Imperial Oil Co.'s tanker Imperial, Capt. Foote, was in port yesterday from Ioco discharging package goods at the local tanks.

Company Refuses Offer of Men in Nova Scotia Miners' Strike Vice-President Issues Statement

SYDNEY, Mar. 9.—There is no change in the situation in connection with the miners' strike today. No disturbances have taken place.

In a statement issued by J. E. McLurg, vice-president, the British Empire Steel Company declines to accept a proposal of union officials to provide maintenance men if the company would provide credit at the stores and guarantee minimum employment and pay 1924 rates until a settlement is effected.

The company insists that it cannot consider mining under the 1924 rates.

INSPECTOR PARSONS REACHES VICTORIA

Having in Custody Harry Sowash Who is Charged With Being Implicated in Hijack Murders

Inspector T. W. S. Parsons of the provincial police is expected to arrive in Victoria today having in custody Harry Sowash charged with being implicated in the Beryl C. hijack murders last fall. The local officer brought Sowash from New Orleans where he arrested him.

A press message received this afternoon stated that Inspector Parsons had arrived at Vancouver with his prisoner this morning and that he had proceeded immediately with him to Victoria where a preliminary trial is expected to commence tomorrow.

LIEUT. NELSON OF U.S. WORLD FLIGHT TO SANTA MONICA

WASHINGTON, March 9.—First Lieut. Erik H. Nelson, round-the-world flyer has been ordered to duty at the Douglas Aircraft Co. at Santa Monica, Cal., as production manager for air service contracts in the Ninth Army troops area, the war department announces. Lieut. Nelson is now assigned to McCook Field at Dayton, Ohio, but is on leave of absence at Miami, Fla.

League of Nations Council Opened today at Geneva and Attracted Visitors' Attention

GENEVA, Mar. 9.—Ansten Chamberlain, as president of the council, opened the 23rd session of the council of the League of Nations here today. A vast crowd was present, attracted by the council's program, especially in connection with the problem of the Geneva security protocol, which Great Britain is expected to declare unsuited to British ideas.

Present indications point to a postponement of this subject until the September meeting and that in the meantime negotiations for the guaranty pact recently proposed will be pushed.

C.P.R. MAY BUILD RAILWAY TO PEACE RIVER SAYS ROOSA

Japanese And Salmon Fisheries.

There is considerable agitation going on among the canners of southern British Columbia against the restriction on Japanese fishing for the canneries. It is claimed by them that the white people do not want to fish and that when they do fish they cannot deliver the goods through lack of skill, persistence and knowledge.

The cut of forty per cent made by this government followed by another cut of fifteen per cent has, they say, forced out of the industry from seven to eight hundred men who have invaded other industries while their places have not been taken in the fisheries. They have not been driven out of the country.

Defenders of the action of the government say that the only way to retrieve the fisheries for the white people of British Columbia is to restrict the number of Orientals who may be employed. There had for years been criticism, especially in the north, of the fact that the Orientals controlled the industry and it was even stated that the canners favored the Japanese as against white fishermen and gave them more privileges. They were said to be the worst lawbreakers when it came to fishing with double length nets.

The matter was made the subject of inquiry by the commission of which Fred Stork was a member and they recommended the gradual elimination of the Japanese until the industry was once more in the hands of the white fishermen and this policy has been carried out with the exception of one year when the request of the canners to have the time extended was granted.

Power Of Habit Subject Of Sermon.

The power of habit was the subject of a sermon preached last night by Dr. H. R. Grant in the Presbyterian Church. It showed the need of breaking up bad habits and the difficulty of doing so and the value of good habits. Perhaps the most interesting phase of the sermon was that in which the preacher urged that in pushing out for new things it was necessary to build upon the past rather than to cut off from the former base. This was particularly true in social advancement. To carry on always in the footsteps of our forefathers was to make no progress, but equally fatal to progress was it to cut off altogether from the past and launch out on an entirely new policy independent of anything which had gone before, as did the Bolsheviks.

Go forward steadily but let each step be carefully related to those that have gone before, building upon the experience of the past. In that way benefit is taken from the mistakes of the past as well as the successes. There must be progress. We cannot stand still. Either we are going forward or backward. Advancement must be our watchword but it must be the careful advancement of the army in the field always keeping open its communications with the rear.

Unscrupulous Agitators Are Condemned.

At the Methodist Church yesterday Rev. Dr. Ferrier spoke scathingly of the unscrupulous agitators who kept alive the demand for treaty money on behalf of the Indians of this province. He showed how by spending the money on industrial education the Indians really benefited much more than they could from the receipt of paltry doles.

We should like to add our mite of condemnation of the practice. The Indians of this province are not a downtrodden people. Many of them are developing into excellent citizens and should take their places as voters and independent people. Nothing would retard them so much as the payment of money which they do not earn. Anyone who knows of the treaty celebrations in other provinces is well aware what a curse the treaty money is to the native there.

"Potash and Perlmutter" is Burlesque of Real Thing in Movies

Betty Blythe, whose seductive vamping on the screen has set many a masculine heart a-quiver, is again a vampire in Samuel Goldwyn's "In Hollywood with Potash and Perlmutter," which will be the feature attraction at the week end, but she expects to be laughed at. Making Films

The meetings were held in the Smithers High School and, considering the difficulties of travel at this time of the year, was very well attended by teachers from all parts of the district. Among those present were Mrs. J. P. Wheeler and Miss D. G. Thomson of the Telkwa School; Miss Florence McDiarmid and A. R. MacNeill from Burns Lake; Miss Edith M. Corbould, Fraser Lake; Miss Margaret M. Gillett, Woodmere; Miss M. Jacquot, Evelyn; Miss L. M. Hibbard, Woodcock; Miss E. Cavalier, Kitwanga; Miss L. Saunders, Palling; Miss G. Keith, Decker Lake; Miss C. Cruickshank, Rose Lake; Miss F. McLean, Round Lake; Miss K. Ward, Tehesinkut Lake; Miss Margaret Lindsay, Perow; Miss Lane, Quick; Miss Marjorie Roberts, Driftwood; R. B. Wallace, Kispiox; D. Cochrane, Forestdale; J. E. Nixon, Topley; J. C. Loomer and C. E. Ritchie, Francois Lake; J. S. Wilson, Houston; and Miss M. Hanna, Miss M. Fawcett, Miss N. Fetterly, F. Rendall and V. Crockett of Smithers staff.

Cochrane, secretary, treasurer. As the meeting was such a decided success, it was proposed to hold at least two conventions a year; the next one to take place in the fall, preferably in October.

On Friday night a dance was held in the Town Hall and in addition to the teachers was largely attended by townfolk. A most enjoyable time was spent by all and when the "Home Waltz" was called about 3 a.m. the visitors had become acquainted with a large number of citizens. During the course of the evening, J. S. 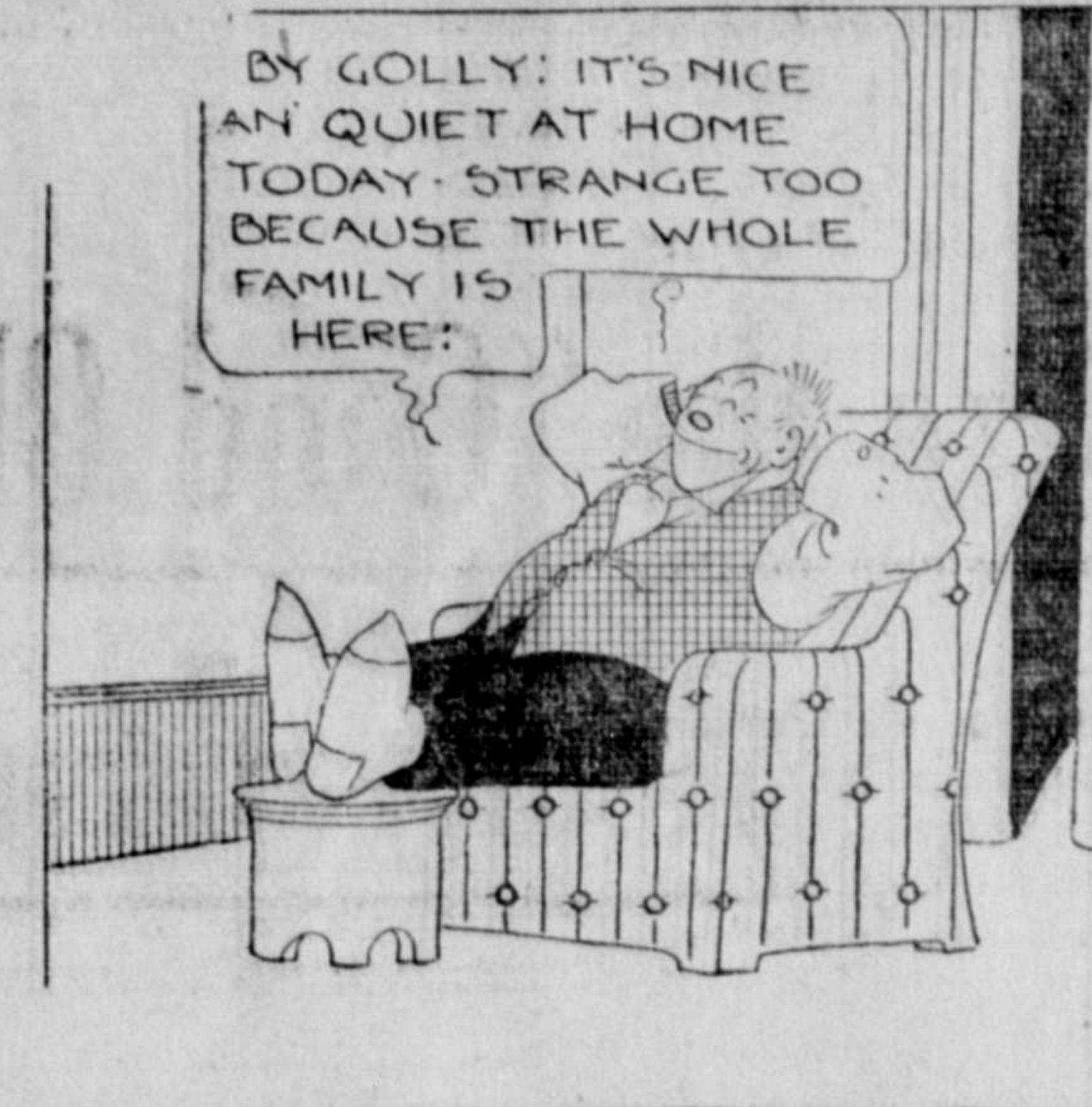

SEND SIGNALS BY DAYLIGHT

Short Waves Effective in Trans-Atlantic Message Picked up in England

SOUTH MANCHESTER, Conn., March 7.—In broad daylight at 10 a.m., Eastern Standard time, when radio waves generally reach out with only a small percentage of their normal strength on account of the deadening effect of the sun's rays, John L. Reinartz, inventor and radio amateur of this place, succeeded in sending signals from his code transmitter across the Atlantic ocean. He used a wavelength of twenty-one meters, further proving his theory that the very short waves can be as effective in daylight as the longer waves are at night.

This feat is the culmination of many months of experimenting during which Reinartz has been co-operating with the navy department and amateur members of the American Radio Relay League. His success in being heard across the Atlantic in daylight was confirmed following receipt of a radiogram from a British operator. His signals were picked up with great reliability by F. A. Mayer, radio amateur of Wickford, Essex, England. At the time, of course, the signals were in broad daylight all of the way.

Sport Chat

The arrival of the first touch of spring weather last week put an end to the interior hockey season and sticks and pucks are now being stowed away until next winter. The Smithers team was all ready to entrain for another series of games at Prince George when word was received that the rink in the Upper Fraser metropolis had given away before the warm weather of several days to such an extent that it would be impossible to play. Prince George was billed to play at Smithers at the end of last week but Old Sol also put the kibosh on those plans.

Hockey receipts from professional games at the Edmonton arena slumped by nearly 10,000 during the past season compared with the takings of a year ago which in turn was ten thousand less than 1923. The paid admissions amounted to 44,261 as compared with 54,077 a year ago and 65,258 in the 1922-23 season. Gross receipts totalled 841,277 for the past season while in the previous year the amount was 850,229 and the year before, 863,050. The best attended game of the past season at Edmonton was on New Year's Day with Calgary when the paid admissions totalled 5,227. The best attended hockey game ever played in Edmonton was on March 16, 1923, when 6,452 people paid to see Edmonton play Regina in a play-off.

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SALMON EGGS FROM ATLANTIC

Consignment of Over a Million Arrive on Coast for Vancouver Island

VANCOUVER, Mar. 9.—A car load of fish eggs arrived here from the Atlantic coast to stock some of the rivers of Vancouver Island. They are of the Atlantic salmon and are to be hatched in the Dominion hatcheries.

They were consigned to Major J. A. Motherwell, chief fisheries inspector, and the fry will be hatched in the waters about Vancouver Island and the mainland.

Some 1,100,000 eggs, contained in seven large cases, comprised the shipment, believed to be the largest ever made. Each case was lined with trays of the roe, covered with cheesecloth, and beneath layers of chipped ice and snow to keep them in a healthy condition during the trip. The eggs were packed in moss.

The eggs were obtained at South Esk, N.B., and shipped from Newcastle, the nearest railway station. Leaving New Brunswick on February 28.

Many smaller shipments of eggs in the past have proven most successful.

PRINCE GEORGE

FEMALE MAKES LOVE THEN EATS HUSBAND

Oddities of Courtship Explained by Professor Julian Huxley of Oxford

LONDON, Mar. 9.—Love-making is mostly a matter of color and sound, according to Professor Julian Huxley, famous Oxford biologist, speaking at the Royal Institution.

Describing devices used by males to attract females, Professor Huxley told how the male spider vibrates the web in such a manner that the female can differentiate between the lover and the prey.

Scorpions, he said, court by dancing, but after mating the female eats her husband. Grasshoppers court by chirping. Some butterflies have scent glands on their wings with a spraying apparatus by which the females are attracted. The argus pheasant has such a wonderful display of head feathers that the bird has to peer through a spread to see if the female is watching.

SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENTS

PRE-EMPTIONS

Vacant, unreserved, surveyed Crown lands may be pre-empted by British subjects over 15 years of age, and by aliens on declaring intention to become British subjects, conditional upon residence, occupation, and improvement for agricultural purposes.

Full information concerning regulations regarding pre-emption is given in Bulletin No. 1, Land Series, "How to Pre-empt Land," copies of which can be obtained free of charge by addressing the Department of Lands, Victoria, B.C., or to any Government Agent.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes, and which is not timberland, i.e., carrying over 3,000 board feet per acre west of the Coast Range and 5,000 feet per acre east of that Range.

Applications for pre-emption are to be addressed to the Land Commissioner of the Land Recording Division, in which the land applied for is situated, and are made on printed forms, copies of which can be obtained from the Land Commissioner.

Pre-emption must be occupied for five years and improvements made to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivating at least five acres, before a Crown Grant can be received.

For more detailed information see the Bulletin "How to Pre-empt Land."

PURCHASE

Applications are received for purchase of vacant and unreserved Crown lands, not being timberland, for agricultural purposes; minimum price for first-class (arable) land is \$5 per acre, and second-class (grazing) land \$2.50 per acre. Further information regarding purchase or lease of Crown lands is given in Bulletin No. 19, Land Series, "Purchase and Lease of Crown Lands."

Mill, factory, or industrial sites on timber land, not exceeding 40 acres, may be purchased or leased, the conditions including payment of stumpage.

HOMESITE LEASES

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesites, conditional upon a dwelling being erected in the first year, title being obtainable after residence and improvement conditions are fulfilled and land has been surveyed.

LEASES

For grazing and industrial purposes areas not exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or a company.

GRAZING

Under the Grazing Act the Province is divided into grazing districts and the range administered under a Grazing Commissioner. Annual grazing permits are issued based on numbers ranged, priority being given to established owners. Stock-owners may form associations for range management. Free, or partly free, permits are available for settlers, cowboys and travellers, up to ten head.

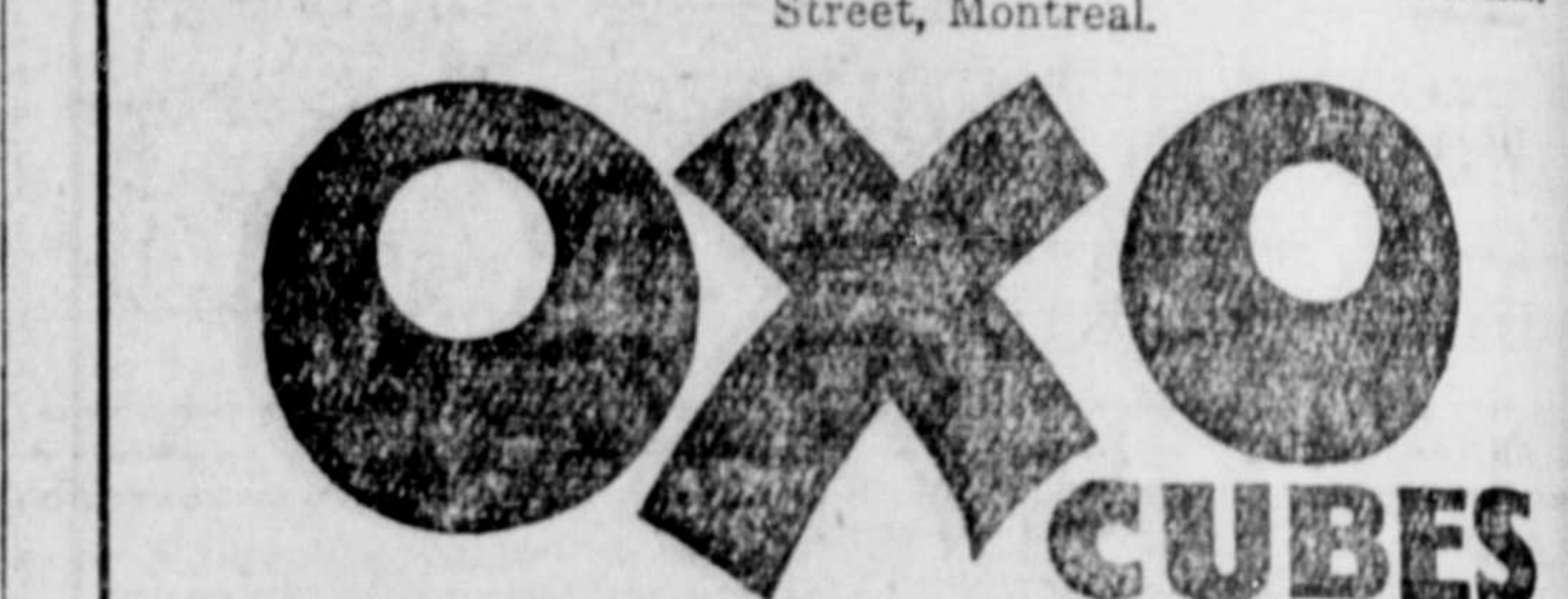
