## Japanese And Salmon Fisheries.

There is considerable agitation going on among the canners of southern British Columbia against the restriction on Japanese fishing for the canneries. It is claimed by them that the white people do not want to fish and that when they do fish they cannot deliver the goods through lack of skill, persistence and knowledge.

The cut of forty per cent made by this government followed by another cut of fifteen per cent has, they say, forced out of the industry from seven to eight hundred men who have invaded other industries while their places have not been taken in the fisheries. They have not been driven out of the country.

Defenders of the action of the government say that the only way to retrieve the fisheries for the white people of British Columbia is to restrict the number of Orientals who may be employed. There had for years been criticism, especially in the north, of the fact that the Orientals controlled the industry and it was even stated that the canners favored the Japanese as against white fishermen and gave them more privileges. They were said to be the worst lawbreakers when it came to fishing with double length nets.

The matter was made the subject of inquiry by the commission of which Fred Stork was a member and they recommended the gradual elimination of the Japanese until the industry was once more in the hands of the white fishermen and this policy has been carried out with the exception of one year when the request of the canners to have the time extended was granted.

## Power Of Habit Subject Of Sermon.

The power of habit was the subject of a sermon preached last night by Dr. H. R. Grant in the Presbyterian Church. It showed the need of breaking up bad habits and the difficulty of doing so and the value of good habits. Perhaps the most interesting phase of the sermon was in which the preacher urged that in pushing out for new things it was necessary to build upon the past rather than to cut off from the former base. This was particularly true in social advancement. To carry on always in the footsteps of our forefathers was to make no progress but equally fatal to progress was if to cut off altogether from the past and launch out on an entirely new policy independent of everything which had gone before, as did the Bolsheviks.

Go forward steadily but let each step be carefully related to those that have gone before, building upon the experience of the past. In that way benefit is taken from the mistakes of the past as well as the successes. There must be progress. We cannot stand still. Either we are going forward or backward. Advancement must be our watchword but it must be the careful advancement of the army in the field always keeping open its communications with the rear.

## Unscrupulous Agitators Are Condemned.

At the Methodist Church yesterday Rev. Dr. Ferrier spoke scathingly of the unscrupulous agitators who kept alive the demand for treaty money on behalf of the Indians of this province. He showed how by spending the money on industrial education the Indians really benefited much more than they could from the receipt of paltry doles.

We should like to add our mite of condemnation of the practice. The Indians of this province are not a downtrodden people. Many of them are developing into excellent citizens and should take their places as voters and independent people. Nothing would retard them so much as the payment of money which they do not earn. Anyone who knows of the treaty celebrations in other provinces is well aware what a curse the treaty money is to the native there.



## SEND SIGNALS BY DAYLIGHT

### Short Waves Effective in Trans-Atlantic Message Picked up in England

**SOUTH MANCHESTER**, Conn., March 7.—In broad daylight at 10 a.m., Eastern Standard time, when radio waves generally reach out with only a small percentage of their normal strength on account of the deadening effect of the sun's rays, John L. Reinartz, inventor and radio amateur of this place, succeeded in sending signals from his code transmitter across the Atlantic ocean. He used a wavelength of twenty-one meters, further proving his theory that the very short waves can be as effective in daylight as the longer waves at night.

This feat is the culmination of many months of experimenting during which Reinartz has been co-operating with the navy department and amateur members of the American Radio Relay League. His success in being heard across the Atlantic in daylight was confirmed following receipt of a radiogram from a British operator. His signals were picked up with great reliability by F. A. Mayer, radio amateur of Wickford, Essex, England. At the time of course, the signals were in broad daylight all the way.

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## OBJECTION TO DRINKING ALL CITY'S MONEY

Cash Spent at Fraser Street Store Would Have Built Elevator, Says Preacher

Speaking on the topic of making Prince Rupert a big city without having to send for English capital or Government aid, Rev. George G. Hacker last night said the sum of \$1,195,889.15 had been spent in 3 1/3 years in one store on Fraser Street for liquor. This would build the new elevator for which there had been such agitation. It would have built 342 bungalows costing \$3,500 each or 56 miles of road such as is now constructed at a cost of \$4 a foot.

### Annual Drink Bill

Speaking of British Columbia as a province the drink bill was approximately thirty-five millions—This would build seventeen elevators costing over two million dollars each, and ten thousand bungalows. These would house the entire population of Victoria, while 1650 miles of road could be built with the province's drink bill in 3 1/3 years of "moderation." The annual provincial drink bill would build 550 miles of road.
