## DOMINION GOVERNMENT BALANCED BUDGET

## VICTORIA WINS 2ND HOCKEY MATCH AGAINST CANADIENS AT VANCOUVER

### Million and Quarter Surplus for Year is Shown Dom. Budget

OTTAWA, Mar. 24.—In the budget speech delivered here today Hon. J. A. Robb, acting minister of finance, told of a heavy reduction in public revenues, yet the government finished the year with a surplus of revenue over expenditure amounting to \$2,223,000. This he claimed was a remarkable result and one which Canadians could feel justifiable pride.

### STEWART HOTEL NEARLY BURNED

Effective Work of Fire Department Averted Serious Blaze in Mining Town

The Stewart Hotel at Stewart, B.C., formerly of this city, had a close shave according to word coming from the ground floor of the building caused flames to break out in the furnace room. The fire brigade did excellent work and had them in check within half an hour after the alarm had been turned in. There was some damage to the ground floor particularly to the hall adjoining the furnace room.

### Victoria Wins Second Hockey Match World Series; 12,000 Watched

(Special to Daily News)

VANCOUVER, Mar. 24.—Three goals to one in favor of Victoria in the second match for the Stanley Cup against the Canadiens of Montreal was the result of a furious hockey match last night in the big Arena here. Twelve thousand or more people watched the battle and cheered the British Columbia team to victory over the hitherto invincible French Canadiens of the East. Excitement ran high and a good deal of money changed hands. Fredericksen was the star player for the victors and he was ably seconded by Walker, who did a good portion of the shooting.

### GINGER GROUP FORMS PARTY

Thirteen Members of Ottawa Parliament to Work Together in Future

OTTAWA, Mar. 24.—The "ginger group" of the Progressives, thirteen in number, wishes to be considered a separate political entity. It broke away from the main body last year because it refused to submit to the rule of the Progressive caucus and to be kept in line by the party whips. It is to be represented in negotiations with the government by W. C. Good who will perform the functions of whip for the group.

### ORIENTALS IN B.C. SUBJECT DISCUSSION

Conference Took Place Last Night in Victoria to Consider Matter

VICTORIA, Mar. 24.—Delegates numbering 181 representing 80 different associations and societies at a meeting here last night discussed the Oriental problem in British Columbia and means for its solution.

After a review of all phases of the question by a number of speakers, adjournment was made to next week.

It was declared that money paid to Oriental labor was lost to circulation amongst the white population and retarded the prosperity of the country.

The meeting followed a preliminary gathering in Vancouver a week or two ago at which the feeling expressed was very hostile to the presence of Orientals in this country.

### SMALLPOX IN VANCOUVER

Every Man, Woman and Child Must be Vaccinated is Announced

VANCOUVER, Mar. 24.—The provincial statute requiring vaccination against smallpox for every man, woman and child will be enforced here, it was announced, following a meeting of the civic health committee yesterday.

Several cases of smallpox have been reported here recently and a determined effort is to be made by the provincial authorities to stamp it out and prevent it spreading.

### INQUIRY HERE IN REGARD TO WOOL FACTORY

British Corporation Asks For Information as to Possible Site and Power

The attention of an important Old Country woollen manufacturing concern is being directed by the provincial department of industries to the possibilities of Prince Rupert as a point of establishment. The following letter has been received by City Treasurer D. J. Matheson from D. B. Martyn, industrial commissioner for the province:

"The Department of Industries has an enquiry from the solicitor of a British woollen corporation asking for information in respect to a location in British Columbia. We wish to place before them the advantages Prince Rupert offers for the establishment of a woollen industry and would be pleased to receive from you particulars in reference to site, power and water.

"We are advised that this enquiry is directed by people prepared to invest large capital in an enterprise of this nature."

### New Canadian National Company to Devote Itself to Settlement of Country and Selling Lands

MONTREAL, Mar. 24.—To further the aggressive land settlement policy of the department of colonization and development of the Canadian National Railways, a charter has been granted at Ottawa to the Canadian National Land Settlement Association and the newly incorporated body possesses the powers of a wide character designed to obtain important results in colonization throughout the Dominion. Some of these powers are in measures of welfare proposals rather unusual in such matters particularly in conjunction with company organization.

Those applying for incorporation were William D. Robb, vice president Canadian National Railways; William John Black, director of colonization and development; Charles Price Green, commissioner; Ernest Joseph Sauve and Frederick Charles Biette.

**Purpose of Organization**

The petitioners explain the purpose of seeking incorporation is "to assist in bringing about settlement of vacant lands in Canada, more particularly along the lines of the Canadian National Railways; to give advice and assistance to or to make advances to prospective settlers entering or those now located in Canada. Other objects specified include assistance in interprovincial colonization, the coordination of efforts between associations, governments and railways for land settlement in Canada and the carrying out of activities of national development.

### DENNISTOUN CASE ENDS

Former Wife of British Army Officer Wins Suit for £5,000

LONDON, Mar. 24.—A verdict for £5,000 in favor of Dorothy Muriel Dennistoun was rendered this afternoon by a jury in her suit against her former husband for money it was claimed she loaned him.

The case has been going on for several weeks and a good deal of evidence of an unsavory nature was brought out. One of the obnoxious bits was the statement by Mrs. Dennistoun that her husband urged her to be intimate with an army officer in order to secure advancement in the army for him.

### CHINESE BANDITS ATTACK CHRISTIANS

Belgian Mission and Houses at Yongchenguen are Fired and Priest is Shot

SHANGHAI, March 24.—Unconfirmed reports state that bandits attacked the village of Yongchenguen in Mongolia on March 13, and burned the premises of the Belgian mission. Many houses belonging to Christians were destroyed and a priest was shot.

### City Comes to Terms with P. Burns Co., Ltd. Building of Abattoir

At its meeting last night the city council gave authority to the city solicitor to conclude an agreement with P. Burns Co. Ltd., permitting them to construct an abattoir on the property recently leased by them on the waterfront between Gow Bay and the Imperial Oil dock. The council will also make a personal appeal to Pat Burns to allow the farmers of the interior the right to kill stock there by payment of a small fee.

It was reported at the meeting that the board of works had had a long session Saturday in consultation with R. Moore, manager for the company and had met their special representative, John McMahon, when he was in the city. The company absolutely refused to allow the inclusion of a clause in the agreement giving the right to farmers to kill at the establishment. Mr. Moore explained to them that there had been a clause in the Vancouver charter giving the farmers of the Fraser valley the right to kill in the abattoir. This privilege was abused and the result was that jobbers were able to use the place in competition with the firm that had put its money into it.

### DESIRES NEW ARMS PARLEY

President Coolidge Instructs Secretary Kellogg With That End in View

WASHINGTON, March 24.—President Coolidge has suggested to Secretary Sate Kellogg that certain definite preliminary steps must be taken towards laying the ground work for a new naval limitation conference. The first work will be the determination of the technical aspect of naval limitation and the second, the sounding out informally of the sentiments of other powers on the desirability of calling a new conference.

### CHINAMAN DIED

Chin Hong, Chinese, died at 5 o'clock last night in the Prince Rupert General Hospital. The remains are in the hands of the B.C. Undertakers.

### Fierce Wind Yesterday Blew Seventy Miles an Hour and Damaged Post Office Building

Making local people think that the tail-end of the Illinois tornado must in reality be coming to town, Prince Rupert yesterday experienced the worst gale that has been recorded here in recent years. Digby Island meteorological station reported this morning that the velocity of the blow reached a maximum of over seventy miles. It was a spectacular gale accompanied by a torrential rain. The streets were soon deserted for there was some little danger of pedestrians being struck by flying debris. This morning, however, it was found that the damage done was not nearly so extensive as might have been expected.

### JACK DEMPSEY IS INELIGIBLE

N.Y. Boxing Commission Insisted That he Should Accept Willis' Challenge

NEW YORK, Mar. 24.—Failing to comply with a ruling that the world's heavyweight boxing champion must accept the challenge of Harry Wills, the Negro, for a title bout, Jack Dempsey and his manager, Jack Kearns, have been declared ineligible for a license, the New York State Boxing Commission announces.

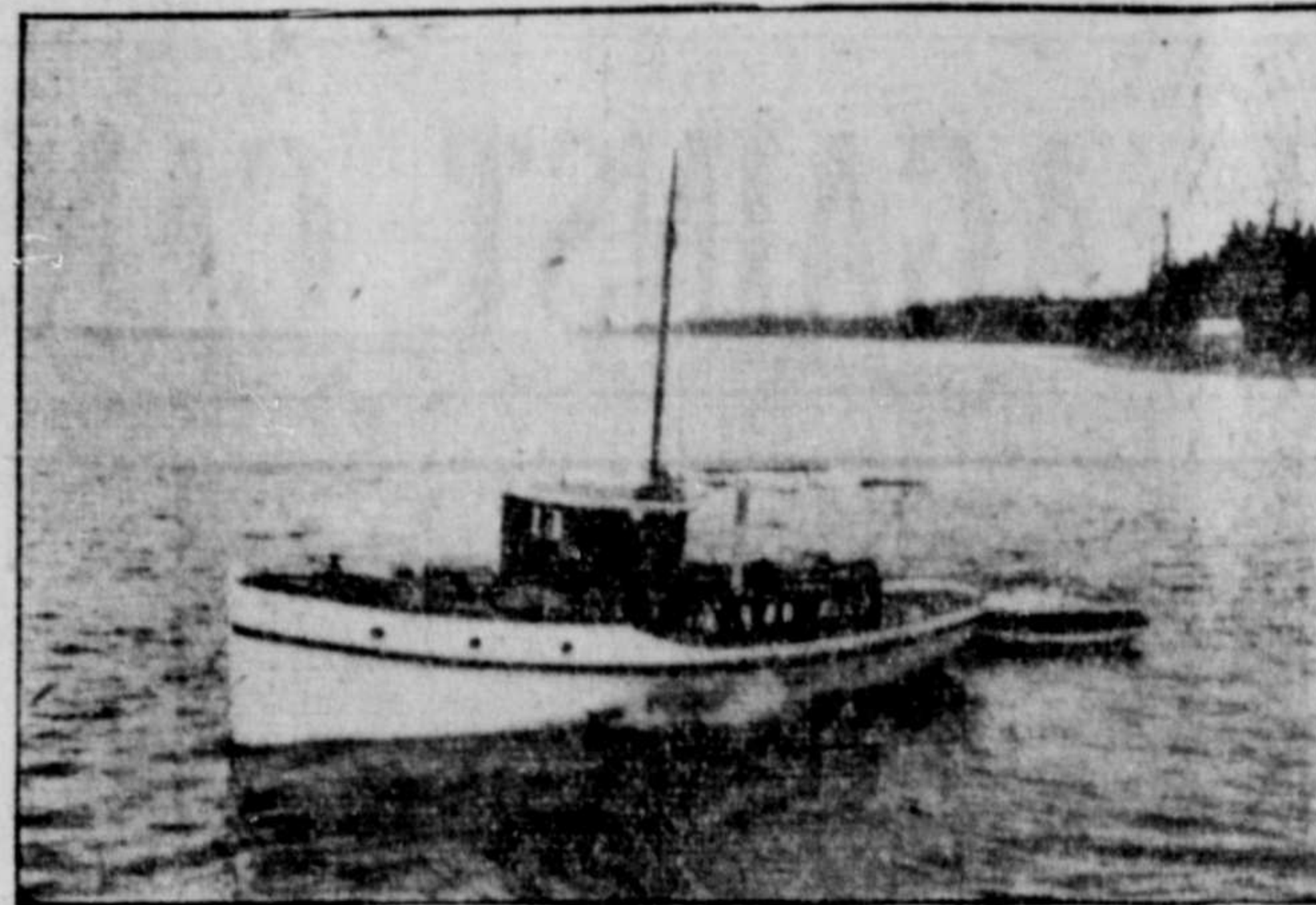

### Western Hope and Her Missionary Skipper Does Useful Work in the Queen Charlotte Islands District

The launch Western Hope, which is used as an Anglican Mission boat on the Queen Charlotte Islands, is a 40-foot craft powered with a 30 h.p. Vivian gas engine. It is not a fancy vessel but it is built substantially to weather the rough waters through which it is called upon regularly to ply. Its skipper is Rev. J. Gillett and most of the time its crew consists of Mrs. Gillett and their little daughter, Ruth.

The Western Hope is known by everyone on the Queen Charlotte Island as it calls in at all isolated points with its mes-

sages of hope and happiness to those in the quiet and lonesome places striving to build up the British Empire. The skipper also distributes magazines and other reading matter donated by people who are interested in his work.

#### Interesting Example

Once in the spring of 1924, two settlers from Skidegate, father and son, walked over to Port Clements, to make a grub stake at the logging camps. The mother was left alone to look after the farm while the father and son were gone. While working at the camp, the boy was accidentally killed. The mother desired that the body should be brought back to be buried at home but the father could secure no boat. Then some of the settlers got together and offered to carry the body over the trail—a distance of twenty miles. This, however, was found impossible to do. The skipper of the Western Hope heard about it and offered to take the body to its last resting place by water. The offer was gladly accepted and at day-break one morning the staunch

little craft entered Skidegate harbor with its flag at half mast. The body, accompanied by the father, was aboard. The voyage had taken a whole day and night. That same afternoon, Rev. Gillett laid the body in the grave with Christian rites in the little cemetery five miles west of Skidegate. This is only one instance of the many services of such nature that the skipper has performed for the people of the islands with his little boat.

The Western Hope averages a run of 300 miles per month. Among its calls is the Langara light on Langara Island. Out of twelve trips last year, it was possible to land only three times. This gives some idea of the rough waters that are encountered by Mr. Gillett in the course of his work.

The Western Hope was the first mission boat to go around the Queen Charlotte Islands by Langara Light and back through Skidegate Inlet.

### Keenly Interested In Sealing Article.

Numbers of readers of the Daily News expressed themselves as keenly interested in the article by C. H. Gibbons appearing in the paper yesterday. The importance of taking action to try to have the sealing treaty abrogated was emphasized. Seals passing our doors without being given the right to catch them and sell the pelts is an objectionable restriction.

### First Raft of Logs Arrives.

The first of a series of Davis rafts expected here to be used in feeding the Prince Rupert spruce mill at Seal Cove arrived yesterday and it looked like old times to see it passing into the harbor. It is a harbinger of busier times here. While the mill will not operate for two or three weeks yet, the arrival of the logs shows that there is likely to be little delay, once the plant is ready.

### Gale Was Serious But Might Have Been Worse.

The gale yesterday was a serious blow and those who suffered naturally do not like it, but we have the satisfaction of knowing that at other places they have worse. Had it not been for the rain which accompanied it we should not have noticed it so much.

A letter just received from a former resident of Prince Rupert who is in London says that it rains there worse than here and he is coming back. While we do not try to sell our climate, there are worse climates than this in the world and all one has to do is to travel a little in order to find it out.

### Always Rains In The Afternoon.


A traveller who was in Penang one autumn not long ago when leaving on a jaunt just after noon in a rickshaw inquired if it was likely to rain before they returned. "Rain! Oh, yes, it will rain," was the reply. "It always rains here about four o'clock." And rain it did. It poured. The heavens opened and let the water go all at once. The barebacked rickshaw boy covered his shoulders with an old sack and kept going through it all and within an hour or so it was fine again and the day's rain was over. That is in the sunny south.

### Petersen Line And Pacific Ports.

If the Petersen line is not to go into the grain carrying trade, as was intimated yesterday in a despatch from Ottawa, there is no need for us to worry. We are not shipping fruit or vegetables or even dairy produce by the Panama Canal route to Europe. What we object to is to any special privileges being given to grain shippers in the East as against the West. We have had enough of that already in the discriminatory freight rates. For some time past we have been fighting those with the object of getting them removed and we must protest strongly against any attempt to impose any discrimination in the form of bonuses on eastern routes which do not apply to the west.

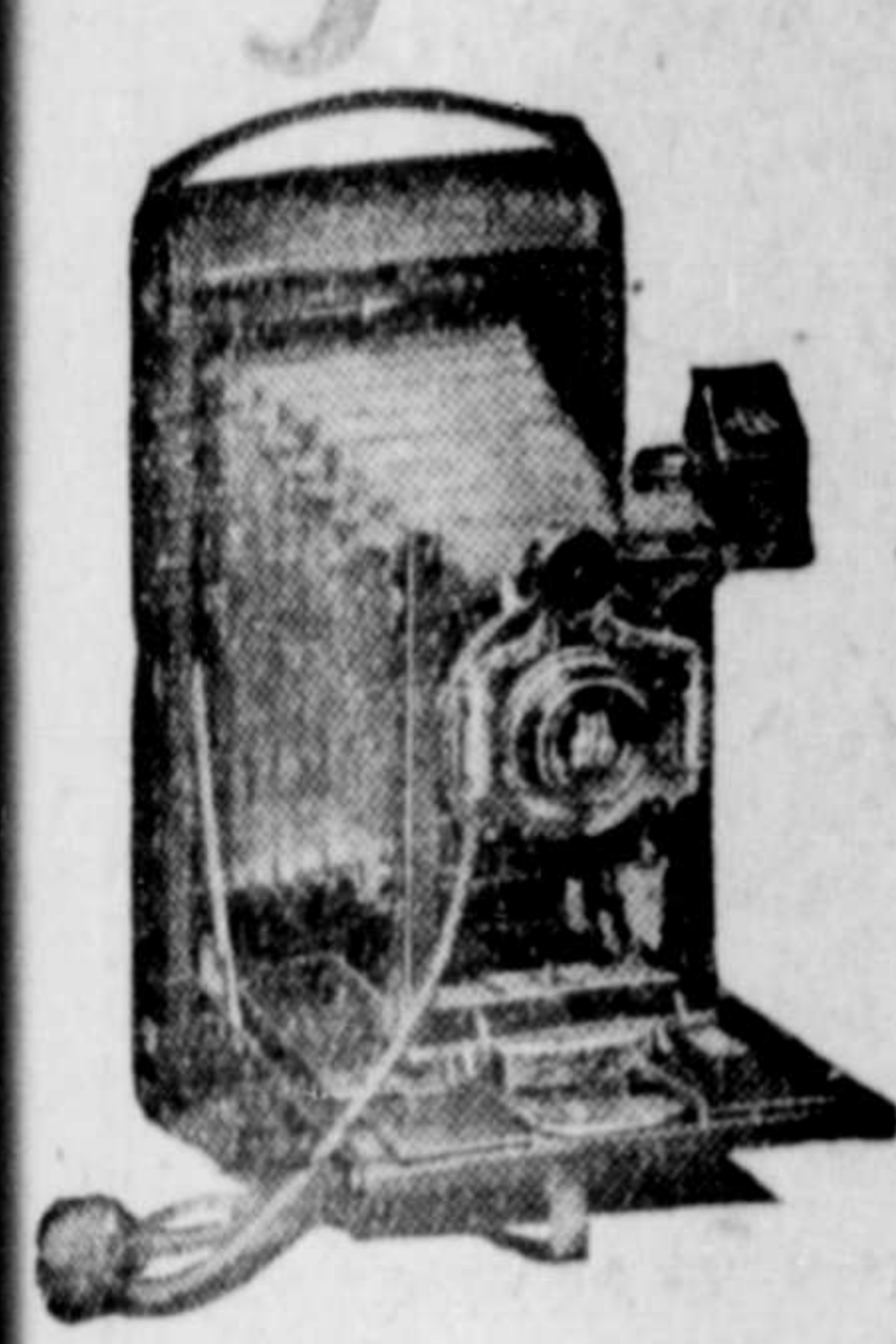

## GRAIN COMMISSION AND PRINCE RUPERT

A report of J. Guthrie Scott of the Royal Grain Commission speaking on the problem of marketing wheat:

"Every outlet should be opened wide to the farmer. The less he pays for the cost of putting his wheat in the world market in Liverpool, the more it will net him on the farm. And the price he nets for what he exports fixes the price at the farm for all he raises, whether he exports it or not. For this reason, the railways should make a specialty of export wheat. They have gone a long way towards this in adopting the Crow's Nest basis of rates to Fort William. They should go further and should reduce the rates to Vancouver and Prince Rupert to the same mileage basis as the Crow's Nest basis to Fort William."

TOKIO, Mar. 24.—The mysterious interiors of the temples of the two most powerful Buddhist sects in Japan are to be opened to the moving camera. 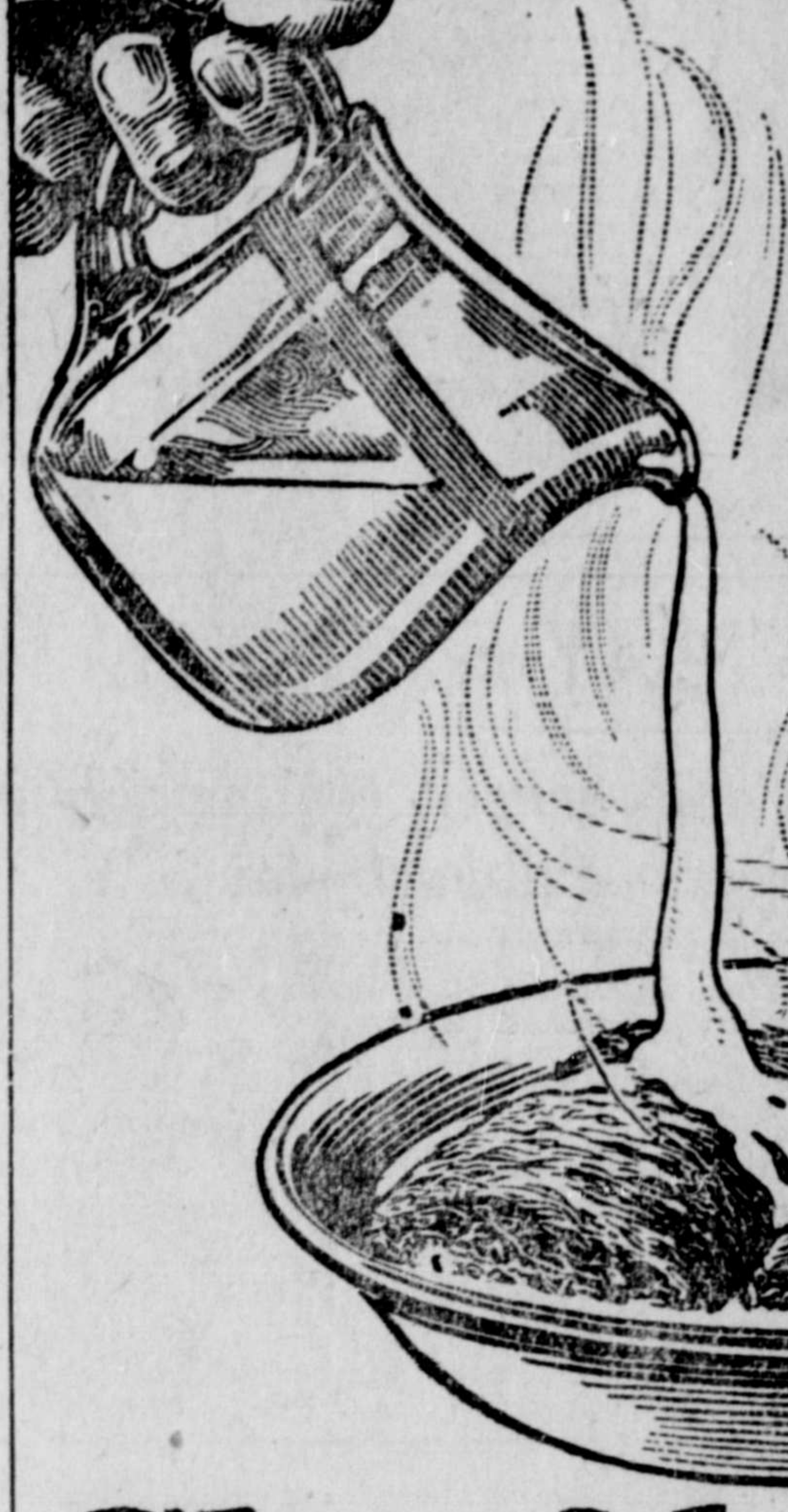

HOW TO PLAY FOOTBALL

Defence tactics have changed considerably in recent years---full-back play

(By "Andy" Ducal, Manager of Fulham Club.)

Full back play has altered a lot during the last years. Modern referees dislike the "hefty" tactics of some old-fashioned defenders. Weight, however, is still needed in a full back. Managers of professional clubs favor big, heavy men for this position.

Hard kicking and close tackling are the back's important duties. Many of your team are capable of being trained to carry out this work. Since the "big uns" have so great a natural advantage, they will be more able

Today the main tactic of full back play is this: the two backs cover each other.

Get your two backs into the habit of covering each other as closely as they naturally try to cover the opposition attack, and I can promise you a fine drop in your "goals against" average. One back must be up and the other behind him ready to stop anything he lets slip. This plan is nine-tenths of your defence.

Full Back Formation

Never must two backs be in line across the field. This is an old-fashioned game. What happens when it is followed? A centre forward kicks the ball between the pair towards the goal. They need to turn before they can run, while the forward has a straight sprint to the ball.

He shoots long before the defenders can close in on him.

Now consider the modern method of defence—one up and one down. The opposing forward, if he tries to dribble the ball past both backs is at a big disadvantage. The heavier men have the tackling power.

Even if he beats both of them, he finds by the time he is through that the first back has got behind his companion and is ready again.

Few forwards, therefore, ever attempt to dribble a ball through. What they often do is to kick forward with the object of beating the back in a sprint for it.

This is where the second back—behind the first—is so useful.

When a forward kicks the ball past the first back, he takes the risk of making a gift of it to the second. The second back, of course, must be covering his companion properly.

How Passing Started

Years ago, when backs played

self left free to cover his companion entirely. Thus:

- Attackers. Defenders. Outside Right. Left Back. Inside Right. Left Half. Centre Forward. Centre Half. Outside and Right half behind. Inside Left. (when the pair. Right Back.

Here, should the ball be swung across to the opposite wing the right half is able to harass the attackers long enough to allow the right back to come up. The left back then goes down to the middle to cover this new defence.

Kicking and Clearing

Spectacular high kicks right down the field are not so useful as they look. These kicks should only be resorted to when you are hard pressed. The best way is for the back to lob the ball to his half if the half is uncovered.

Charging is the surest method of dispossessing a forward of the ball. Any man who says that heavy charges in football are unfair is talking nonsense. A heavy shoulder-to-shoulder charge is all in the game, and no referee condemns it. But don't wait to charge if you can beat your opponent to the moving ball.

Many fine backs rarely seem to tackle at all. Their skill is in placing themselves so that they intercept the ball before the man they would have to tackle can get it.

Backs should rarely dribble the ball. Straight, low kicks are preferred. The full backs need a definite understanding with his wing half. This is a big subject which I deal with in a future article.

SWORDFISH HAS A REAL BATTLE

Actor Harpooned Monster and Then Fun Began as Seen Tonight

One of the features of the film "Women who give," shown last night at the Westholme and to be repeated tonight was a terrible conflict with a swordfish.

It all came about in this way. Director Barker and his company were aboard a typical fishing schooner busily filming scenes for the screen adaptation of "Cape Cod Folks," when one of the crew sighted an enormous swordfish swimming in the wake of the ship.

Chance for Realism

Immediately Mr. Barker realized that here was an exceptionally realistic action, so he turned to photograph some exceptionally realistic action, so he ordered Mr. Frazer and a helper into a dory and he followed in another with his cameraman. The actor was told by his director to harpoon the deep sea monster as soon as he got near enough, and then awaited developments.

Now Frazer had never before thrown a harpoon, but after a few minutes talk with his fisherman companion, stood up in the dory and hurled the steel-pointed weapon. Unfortunately, it fell far short of its object. It was not until the third attempt that it ploughed through the tough scales and skin of the swordfish and imbedded itself in the flesh, a signal for a battle royal.

Crazed with pain the giant swordfish hurled itself far out of the water, with its mighty sword flashing in the sunlight, a thing of majestic awfulness, a sight to strike terror into the stoutest of hearts. And then, diving again into the ocean, the fish swam swiftly away from the frail dory and soon some five hundred fathom of line had been let out, all that had been attached to the harpoon, and the small boat was being towed by the swordfish at break-neck speed. But soon he fired and the task of drawing him in began.

Sea Monster Gives Battle

Slowly the line was pulled in until the swordfish was within five fathoms of the dory. It seemed then that for the first time the giant fish became aware of the cause of his agony. Without the slightest warning he dashed for the dory and it was only by the quickest of skillful manoeuvres that the small boat was turned just enough to avoid being cut in two by the razor-like sword. As it was one of the oars was severed as cleanly as if by a buzz saw, and the dory was all but overturned.
