COMMONS STRONG AGAINST HIGH TARIFF

LIBERALS WIN ELECTION IN SASKATCHEWAN BY VERY LARGE MAJORITY

Majority Against Higher Tariff in House of Commons Was Large Only 37 Voting Favor of Motion

OTTAWA, June 3.—By a majority of 110 votes the House of Commons last night defeated an amendment moved by Hon. Arthur Meighen, Conservative leader of the opposition, calling for an immediate revision of the tariff on a definite and consistent protective basis. The vote stood as follows:

FAILURE OF PROGRESSIVES

New Party Projected Into Saskatchewan Met with no Success at Election

(Special to Daily News)

REGINA, June 3.—An outstanding feature of the Saskatchewan election yesterday was the complete failure of the two party opposition. Progressives were just as violent in opposing Premier Dunning and his cabinet as were the Conservatives, but in almost every case they failed. Up to this morning they had apparently elected only four Progressives and two Conservatives. While final returns may add another or two to the list, enough is known this morning to show that the system has failed.

Liberalism is as strong as ever in a province that has always been Liberal. It is thought here that the result will act as a deterrent on any move on the part of the opposition to try to bring on a Dominion election just now.

HABEAS CORPUS FOR WONG SING



Liberals Returned in Saskatchewan Again; Substantial Majority

Premier Dunning and Cabinet Given Another Term of Life but Attorney General Cross Defeated

REGINA, June 3.—The Liberal government of Saskatchewan, headed by Premier C. A. Dunning, was returned at the polls yesterday. While very few constituencies had reported returns complete, the results this morning indicated that the Liberals had elected 43 candidates and in ten remaining the outcome was doubtful early today. In six of these the Liberal candidate was leading.

On the basis of these results the government supporters are claiming that the government will have an unimpaired majority in the next Legislature.

In the last House the government had 49 out of a total of 63.

One of the features of the election was the return of Premier Dunning and his entire cabinet, with the exception of Attorney General Cross who was defeated in Regina.

Harris Turner, the Progressive leader, was defeated in Saskatchewan where Hon. A. P. McNab, minister of works, was elected. The standing this morning was as follows:

Mrs. C. K. Ramsland, the first woman ever elected in the Saskatchewan Legislature, who has won two provincial elections to her credit, was defeated by the Progressive candidate in Pelly. Mrs. Ramsland was a Liberal.

Results at Noon

REGINA, June 3. (Noon)—Electoral results at noon show 47 Liberals elected and five Progressives, two Conservatives, two independents, five doubtful, and two deferred.

BACK FROM FRANCE

NO VERDICT IN ROBBERY CASE

Ross Watson Must Stand Trial at Next Assizes For Robbery of Nanaimo Bank

NANAIMO, B.C., June 3.—Ross Watson, former Seattle police officer accused of being one of a gang that robbed the Royal Bank on December 12 last of \$12,000, will have to stand another trial. Following three days' evidence, the jury in the assizes court last night could not agree on a verdict. After three hours' deliberation they were dismissed and Watson was remanded until the next assizes.

EDMONTON, June 3.—A. R. McLennan was chosen by the Liberals of East Edmonton to contest the constituency, the vote for him being 104 and for Mayor Blatchford 99.

BIRTHDAY OF KING IS KEPT

Honors Include Eight New Barons and Twenty-five Knights

LONDON, June 3.—King George celebrated his sixtieth birthday today, the occasion being marked by the customary congratulations and trooping of colors by brigade guards at St. James' Palace.

The birthday honors include the creation of eight new barons and 25 knights.

Shanghai is an Armed Camp with Banks Closed and Stores Boarded Up Following Several Outbreaks

SHANGHAI, June 3.—Shanghai was an armed camp today. Two outbreaks this morning caused the police to open fire killing two persons and injuring many others.

In anticipation of trouble the banks closed and all store fronts are boarded up, food being rationed out by the shopkeepers.

Hotels and stores are being searched for arms while troops of several nations, including Great Britain, attempted the task of restoring order after a series of uprisings which were started last Saturday by Chinese students who organized a demonstration against the prosecution of strikers in the Japanese owned spinning mills.
