### Bus Lines Must Wait For PUC Order to Raise Fare

VANCOUVER.—Arrow Bus Lines has been instructed not to alter fares until the Public Utilities Commission completes its review of company operations.

S. G. Furk, auditor for the firm, and Mel Forbes, manager, met with officials of the Motor Carrier Branch of the PUC here Tuesday to discuss the company application for increasing fares.

Mr. Forbes said today the Motor Carrier Branch will make recommendations to the PUC in Victoria after it has checked facts and figures presented by Mr. Furk.

"I think we have given the branch a very clear picture of our operations and the reason for our application," said Mr. Forbes.

"They now have all the information about the company, but we cannot make any changes in the fare structure until the PUC hands down its decision."

"If the boost had been granted the increase would have gone into effect next Monday.

**CITY OPOSED**  
Arrow Bus Lines seeks an increase of five cents in fares to offset increased operating costs. New fares would be 15 cents for adults and 10 cents for children—except on school days between 8 a.m. and 6 p.m. when the children's fare would remain at five cents.

While Prince Rupert city council has opposed the application, the PUC can grant the increase, but no doubt will take cognizance of the city's protest.

A decision is expected later this month from the PUC. Mr. Furk flew to Vancouver

last Monday to appear before motor carrier officials and Mr. Forbes motored to the city where he will spend a vacation before returning.

**HEARING REQUESTED**  
The Motor Carrier Branch controls all rates on buses, taxis and truck transportation in British Columbia. It also assesses licence fees.

City council, in opposing the bus lines application, asked the PUC to hold a hearing in Prince Rupert and public utilities committee in that city currently is studying a report submitted by city auditor Scott McLaren following his review of company books.

While Arrow Bus Lines runs the transportation system in Prince Rupert, it does not operate under a city franchise.

# Fishermen Ask Meeting With Premier Bennett

## U.S. Navy Investigates Reports Of Strange Subs in North Waters

WASHINGTON (CP)—The Navy said Wednesday it has investigated reports of recent presence of unidentified submarines off Alaska.

In response to a question about west coast rumors that submarines had been seen in the Nome area last Thursday night, a Navy spokesman said:

"There was a reported contact in Alaska area. Investigation revealed that no conclusions are practicable. No further action is contemplated."

## St. Laurent Speaks To Students on Tour

VANCOUVER.—Youth got top priority today as Prime Minister St. Laurent's let's-get-acquainted tour continued in British Columbia.

First call in today's schedule was at New Westminster Junior High School, where the Prime Minister is to speak to students and do some tree-planting on school grounds.

Second call is at Burnaby South High School to speak to an assembled public and to high school students.

Before leaving for Victoria midnight tonight, the Prime Minister will sandwich in a batch of other calls. These include receiving an honorary degree at the University of British Columbia, speaking at the formal opening of the new UBC law building and attending a dinner and reception.

Mr. St. Laurent arrived here yesterday with an announcement that set private radio broadcasters into speculation.

Reporting that the government wants an additional loan for CBC for construction of three new television stations, the Prime Minister noted:

"The part to be played by privately-owned stations in extending national television services in Canada is being actively considered by the government."

Reporters asked if this means that private radio might be allowed to operate television. Mr. St. Laurent said:

"It is certainly not the intention to have television any more a monopoly than radio broadcasting."

Beyond that, he did not elaborate.

The Pacific coast will get one of the new stations and the others will be located in the prairie provinces and in the Atlantic provinces.

## Sabre Jets Score New Record Blow

SEOUL (CP)—United States Air Force said that U.S. Sabre jet pilots today rolled up a near-record score for one day against Communist MIG jets—12 shot down and two or three crippled.

The best single-day performance by the fast Sabres was July 4, when they destroyed 13 Russian-built jets, damaged seven and probably destroyed one.

## Retired Railroad Engineer Likes the North; May Travel Some but Will Return to Rupert

Harry "Herb" White has pushed down the throttle for the last time on the old 1444 and now plans to do a little bit of traveling "with some one else pushing the wagon."

Herb, as everyone calls him although he was born "Harry," is a 59-year-old railroad engineer who retired from the service of the Canadian National Railways last week after 33 years and some months.

Known throughout the round-houses in western Canada as the engineer who never got mad at anybody, Herb says he's going to do a little bit of visiting, then likely come back to Prince Rupert.

"Of course, I don't think I'll settle down for a while yet, but I've got a farm up the line—just a few acres—and I think I'm going to spend some time up there," he planned aloud.

"Maybe I haven't travelled all around the world, but I've travelled half of it and there's no

place I'd rather be than in northern B.C."

The "lokie" engineer was born in Albertus County, Ontario, but was raised and educated in Winnipeg. He got his first taste of railroading in 1911 when he joined Canadian Pacific Railway in Bozano, Alberta.

He joined the Canadian Army in 1914 and went overseas with the Canadian Machine Gun Regiment of the Second Division.

When he returned, he joined the CNR as a fireman. Herb met, talked and played poker with the Duke of Windsor, then the Prince of Wales, in France during the First World War. The "Prince" was an officer in the British Imperial Army, attached to the Second Division of the Canadian Army.

"He's a swell fellow, one of the nicest men you ever wanted to meet," recalls Herb. There is a reason, he says, why he is called "Herb" instead of

## To Discuss Closure of Northern Area Canneries

B.C. salmon fishermen have requested a meeting with Premier W. A. C. Bennett and his cabinet to discuss closure of salmon canneries in this area.

Homer Stevens, secretary-treasurer of the United Fishermen and Allied Workers Union, said in Vancouver today a letter was forwarded to the premier Wednesday asking for an audience early next week "regarding this serious blow to fishermen and shoreworkers of B.C."

In a statement, he said: "Loss of earning power by those who catch and process fish will have a detrimental effect on the whole economy."

"Thousands of fishermen who normally operate in the Queen Charlotte Islands and the northern coast area will be forced to either terminate their season or turn to the overcrowded Johnstone Straits and Fraser River areas.

"In order to avoid a major depression in the fishing industry it is essential the federal government carry out an immediate review of their foreign trade policies."

The statement blamed the shutdown of canneries which went into effect following the Labor Day week-end, on loss of the canned salmon market.

Warehouses here are piled high with canned salmon and no large export orders are on the books.

**CEASE FISHING**  
Mr. Stevens also announced that salmon net fishermen in Alert Bay decided over the week-end to cease fishing and proceed to their home ports to await settlement of fall chum prices.

"The UFAWU has not called a strike," said Mr. Stevens, "the fishermen were opposed to fishing after September 1 without knowing what the price would be."

Under terms of the Salmon Price Agreement, prices for fall chums were to be negotiated on or before September 1. The union met the operators last Wednesday to open discussions.

Mr. Stevens said canners were asked to submit their price but refused to do so.

Prices for fall chums last year were: Johnstone Straits and Fraser River, 11 cents a pound; Central and Northern area, 9 cents; Queen Charlottes, 8 cents a pound.

Mr. Stevens said meetings were held at all points along the coast to obtain views of salmon net fishermen regarding prices to be demanded.

"Several meetings indicated that the 1951 prices are being demanded for the 1952 fall chum production."

Recommendation of the union negotiating committee was to proceed with discussions with the canners in an effort to reach a settlement.

**GREATER REVENUE**  
STOCKHOLM (CP)—Gross freight revenues of the Swedish merchant marine increased about 43 per cent last year, when the total reached \$270,000,000. Higher freight rates accounted for most of the increase.

COPENHAGEN (CP)—The cabinet has approved a change in royal succession which would make it possible for Denmark to have its first queen in 540 years. King Frederick, present ruler, has no sons. His Swedish born Queen, Ingrid, has borne him three daughters.

### Reds Don't Pay Canada For Ships

HONG KONG (CP)—China's second-largest shipping company, which includes several Canadian-built vessels not yet paid for, has been reorganized into a joint state and private enterprise, New China (Communist) News Agency reported today.

Its fleet numbers about 40 ships. Nine of them are ultra-modern vessels built in Canada under a scheme negotiated by the Canadian government and the Chinese Nationalist government before the Communists ousted the Nationalists from the mainland.

The vessels fell into the hands of the Communists and Canada has not been paid for them.

**Synopsis**  
The most active Pacific storm which has been seen for many a day is this morning moving in on the ocean weather ship in the Gulf of Alaska. By tomorrow morning this storm will lie near the Charlottes and strong winds and rain is expected in the northern sections overnight.

The storm is expected to weaken rapidly after it reaches the Charlottes but nevertheless extensive cloud and some rain will reach the southern coast and northwestern part of the interior tomorrow. 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**Our Share in the Games**

ALTHOUGH we may be accepting a pat on the back which does not belong to us, we are pleased to note Vancouver seems to be heeding our recent warning that something be done right away about raising money for the British Empire and Commonwealth Games of 1954.

It may be coincidence, but shortly after the Daily News bolstered its warning with the suggestion that Prince Rupert might ease Vancouver's problem by taking care of the boxing and wrestling events, the games committee began to see some action.

A plan for financing the games has been proposed which we think is a good one. It calls for the issuance of one million shares in the games to be sold across the country at \$2.50 each. An incentive for buying the shares will be \$100,000 in assets to be fairly distributed among the shareholders at a given time. Added to this incentive will be a natural desire to make the games a success.

Although Prince Rupert has no stake comparable to Vancouver's in this coming major event, we are as anxious as anyone to see it well handled. The impression it makes on visitors will to some extent also be their impression of B.C. and, possibly, of Canada.

For this reason we believe there are many here who would be interested in becoming shareholders under the scheme proposed. To ensure proper supervision, responsibility for circulating the shares might be assumed by a local club or other organization.

It is not reasonable to suppose, however, that any group could forfeit the time necessary for such an undertaking without receiving material benefit in return. Since physical development and recreation underlie the spirit of the games, perhaps some facility in this connection that we lack could be financed by the sale of these shares.

With this in mind we propose to the organizing committee that, if there is the intention to circulate shares outside Vancouver, consideration be given to a plan whereby outside communities be allowed a percentage of receipts in return for promoting sales.

We recall such a plan was carried out successfully in 1943 during the Navy League's treasure chest campaign. Prince Rupert's support on this occasion was particularly strong.

Under no circumstances should the games be considered a completely local endeavor. We are all rooting for its success and urge its organizers to find a practical method of utilizing this interest.

**As I See It**

**FLYING SAUCERS REAL?**

LON ANGELES—The best show in Hollywood is not put on by the movie or television stars for which this city is famous. It is one which runs four times daily in the mountain top park which houses the Griffin Planetarium.

Hundreds of people line up and pay 60 cents apiece for a most realistic "trip to the moon." The scientists who run the affair are really master showmen. They hold their audience literally enthralled for just one hour. In that hour they reproduce the skies, exactly as you would see them on some beautiful clear night on a mountain top, or some South Sea Island. A queer looking Buck Rogers type of machine in the centre of the circular theatre actually move the stars, the planets, the sun and moon, precisely as they really do move in their orbits.

You sit tilted far back, as you do in a barber's chair. The scientist in charge gives a talk that is an amazingly clever mixture of science and beautiful, poetic language—in spots as majestic as the dialogue in Job, the most majestic of all the books of the Bible.

WAITING for the show to start, the numerous small boys who flock to this spot give out with strange noises. They have quit playing anything so old-fashioned as cowboys and Indians. Nor do they make those horrible whining noises that small boys made ten years ago while fighting imaginary aerial dog-fights in the plane of World War Two.

Space-ships are what hold the imagination of the kids of today. So, when the scientist in charge of the lecture flashes on a new set of lights, we find ourselves inside the huge space ship and on our way to the moon.

THE hard fact which emerges out of the lecture and scientific show is that a trip from earth to the moon is well within the possibilities of what we already have.

There are many old cars around Hollywood which have travelled 240,000 miles—which is the distance from the earth to the moon," he said. He figured that rocket ships could easily make the trip—but he joked about the harder task of getting back to earth again.

But he said absolutely nothing that got me much further along the trail of truth about those "flying saucers." His talk, for my purposes, boiled down to this:

It will soon be an easy task to travel to the moon. But there is no life on the moon, nor are

there the necessary pre-conditions of air or water which make life possible.

It is not possible, even with the speediest rocket ships now planned or even contemplated by man, to travel to any other "world" on which life, like ours, might be possible. No one could live long enough for that.

This was the sum and substance of the lecture, as I got it.

WHAT THEN is the answer to numerous reports in the past seven or eight years of aircraft which outdistance our ordinary models, and literally fly circles around them?

Are flying saucers real? If so, do they come from this earth or from outer space?

These are the questions I came to this city to try to answer. In later articles I will try to show why no other city on earth has as many real authorities able, if they would, to give the answers.

**Young Canadians Happy in Israel**

HAIFA (CP)—Two young Canadian war veterans are well launched on a new career as operators of a sight-seeing motorbus service in Israel. Art Goldberg, 26, of Vancouver, and Lionel Druker, 27, of Sydney, N.S., hope to expand their business into a transport system connecting Israel with neighboring states.

After wartime service with the Royal Canadian Air Force the pair served in the Israeli army fighting the Arabs at the time the new Jewish state was formed. Three years ago they started business with a drive-yourself system, and the first of their streamlined sight-seeing buses took to the highways this summer.

The inaugural bus trip was accompanied by ceremonies attended by Major A. H. Friedgut, agent-general for the Zionist organization of Canada, and Israel government representatives. Until then, bus transportation had been a state monopoly here.

### Last Rites Held For Mrs. Hunter

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## Red Dominated People Must Learn New Way of Spelling

By Hubert Harrison

VIENNA (Reuters)—George Bernard Shaw's dream of a reform in spelling to make it simpler and easier is coming true in the Communist satellite countries of southeastern Europe—but according to a blueprint supplied by J. V. Stalin.

On orders from the Kremlin the theories of Stalin's "Marxism and the Problems of Linguistics" are to be applied first in Romania, then in Hungary and later probably in Bulgaria and Czechoslovakia.

In June this year, the order went forth that Stalin's brain-child must be reviewed in the satellite press. Now in Romania and Hungary, the linguistic theories of the Stalin's pamphlet are being put into force.

The main principle is that while the old national language has much in it which was useful, it has to be revised by the Communists to make it a better medium for conveying the ideas of Marxism and the orders of the Communist hierarchy.

The old system of spelling based on historical and etymological roots, it was asserted, must be modified to make it more simple for semi-illiterates to learn. Cosmopolitan—meaning the use of western words—have to be eliminated.

A new scientific council was set up in Romania by the academy to prepare this reform which was deliberately modelled on Russian spelling reforms since 1918.

Romanian spelling is a welter of contradictions. The language was in the main Latin by origin, but it had absorbed so many Slav and Magyar words that it was often difficult for educated people, who had learned the literary Romanian language, to understand the peasants.

A reform of Hungarian spelling on the same lines is foreshadowed in an article "On Hungarian Linguistics" which appeared in the Soviet publication "Problems of Linguistics" and was translated and published in Hungary.

The article said bourgeois linguistics, as employed by the philologists, have failed to satisfy "the progressive science building socialism."

## Veteran Official Built Many Roads

REGINA (C)—When H.R. MacKenzie cleaned out his desk and left his office this month he left behind 9,232 miles of highways. Retiring as deputy highways minister after 40 years of Saskatchewan government service, MacKenzie has been connected in some way with virtually all the road construction in the province.

In 1918 he drew up what might be called the province's first road map, although Saskatchewan had no trunk highways then. He had joined the highways department in 1912, serving as highways inspector, chief field engineer and chief supervising engineer before his appointment as deputy minister in 1939.

Most travel was on horseback when he started with the department. The first time he went by car to Winnipeg it took 2 1/2 days. Now Saskatchewan is only four hours from Regina by road; Winnipeg eight or 10 hours.

He is moving to the Pacific coast this winter, but doubts whether he'll stay there. "I have too many roots here," he explained. "I don't think I'll be able to stay away too long."

Among the many specimens of workshop is a large section of fine black walnut, from a tree planted by his father 85 years ago.

## Medical Corps Museum Opened By Royal Army

LONDON (C)—A Royal Army Medical Corps museum opened recently at corps headquarters, Crookham, Hants. Shows the long history and tradition of the R.A.M.C.

Among relics now in possession of the museum are dental instruments carried by Napoleon, the razor and notes written by Rolf Hess, the Nazi wartime leader, while in a British hospital. There are medical relics of the Crimean war and old-fashioned tattooing instruments. Recently a tattered flag flown by the 26th Field Ambulance in Korea was added as well as some waterproof invasion maps of southeast England captured from the Germans in the Second World War.

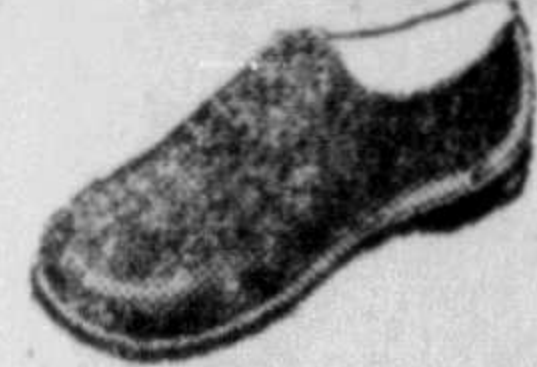

## Sugar Deficiency Lowers Mentality

LONDON (CP)—Dr. John Matheson, medical officer of Brixton jail, says in a current report that new tests are being tried on criminals who claim loss of memory at the time of their offence.

The test is based on a theory that if certain persons go without food for some hours, the amount of blood sugar falls to an extremely low level.

As the brain depends on blood sugar for nourishment, the doctor's report states, after a period of hunger these people may suffer blackouts and behave abnormally.

As a result of some tests carried out already, Dr. Matheson stated, some criminals have been given lighter sentences. Some have been acquitted. In several cases of minor infringement of regulations at Brixton jail, said the report, it was found that the rules had been broken after the men had been without food for a period.

The report referred to a murder charge of a year ago when a man was found guilty but insane. He had committed the crime after two days without food and authorities were able to establish, to medical satisfaction, that lack of sustenance was a major factor. In the legal sense, said the report, it was considered the man was insane.

He recalls the names of some well-known railroaders here with whom he worked in the early days.

For instance, he says, there is C. A. (Al) Berner, district superintendent, "who I worked for when he was a brakeman and a fireman."

And he made his first "paid" trip as fireman out of Melville, Sask., with Engineer Roy Chester "who is now pulling a passenger out of Prince Rupert."

Herb says he can give illustrations why he feels there is no place like northern B.C. and no men like the ones who work on the northern main line. **SHE DIDN'T HAVE A DIME**  
"Lots of extraordinary things happen most every day in our work. Here is one example," and Herb told of a cold, blustery day when he was fighting a long freight eastward out of Prince Rupert. He was flagged at Telegraph Point, 40 miles from here, and when he stopped, he noticed a "slip of a girl" jump onto the coal tender.

"The fireman and I wanted to

know what this was all about. She said she was broke, didn't have a dime and had made the section foreman stop the train. She told them she had to get home to Edmonton, that she had walked all the way from Prince Rupert.

"Well, I believed her. She had on those New York type of shoes with the high heels—one was broken off, the other sagging."

The girl got home to Edmonton alright. The whole train crew pitched in and bought her ticket and gave her meal money at the next station.

Another time his train was stopped at Shames. A young logger back in the bush was frantic about his wife who was going to have a baby. Engineer Herb and four other trainmen trekked miles through the snow

with a stretcher, brought out the weakened woman and brought her to Terrace Hospital.

"We found out next trip that it was a boy, baby and mother doing fine."

"I think it's because of such experiences that I think Prince Rupert and the north line boys are great."

Herb has pushed his last freight across the mainline, but it is more than likely that the "roundhouse gang" hasn't seen the last of him yet.

## Lawyers Seek Change in Canadian Divorce Laws

VANCOUVER (CP)—Proposals for changes in Canada's divorce laws will come before the 34th annual meeting here of the Canadian Bar Association.

Section committees from British Columbia and Saskatchewan are sponsoring resolutions urging that the association press for amendments to divorce legislation.  
Amendments would allow dissolution of marriages on the grounds of:  
Desertion without cause for at least three years; cruelty; and incurable insanity requiring care and treatment for five years.

"We deplore the disrespect into which our courts are being placed by the hypocrisy of the present law," said the report of the B.C. section committee.  
"The moral law—thou shalt not commit adultery—has become for those seeking to rid themselves of their mates, 'commit adultery.'"  
The four-day annual meeting of the association opened Wednesday with Prime Minister St. Laurent on the platform as Brig. J. A. Clark of Vancouver delivered his presidential address.

Clark proposed changes in the system of appointing Canadian judges. They should be free from political consideration, he said.  
Only the minister of justice should have a part in advising the Governor-General on judicial appointments. Now, appointments are made by the cabinet.

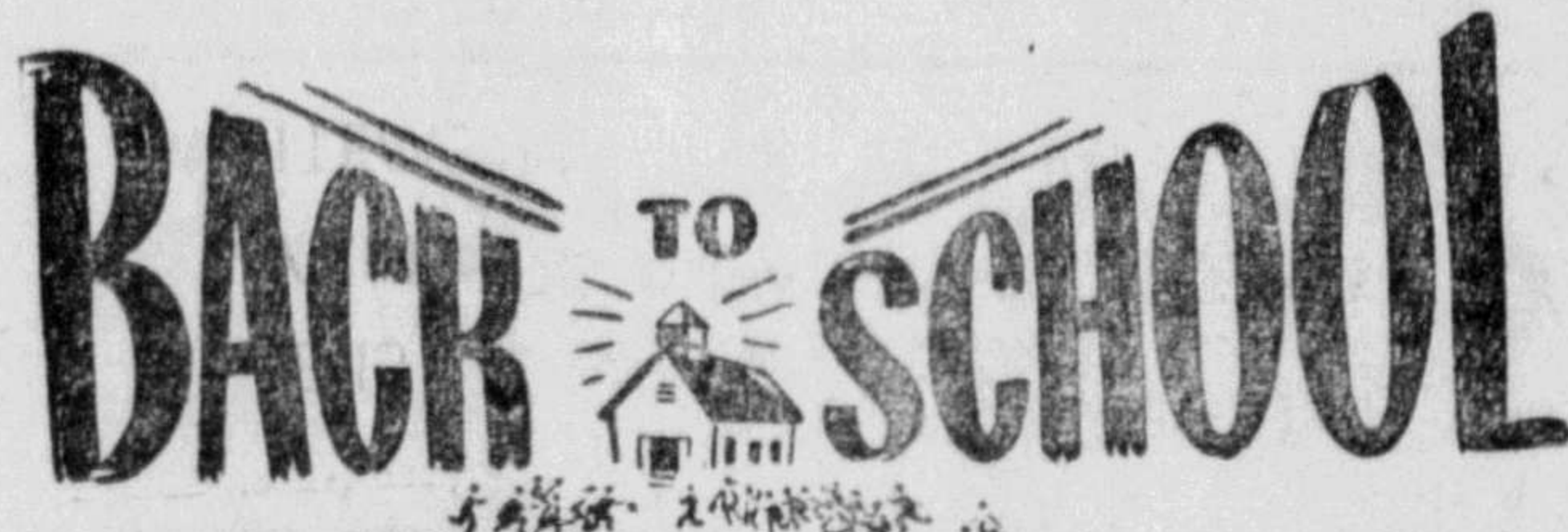
