# MOB LAYS SIEGE IN EASTERN STEEL WORKS

## INDIAN MANSLAUGHTER CASE PROCEEDING AT SUPREME COURT ASSIZES

### Canada Claims All Islands of Arctic between This Country and North Pole says Hon. C. Stewart

OTTAWA, June 11.—Canada's claim to the Northern Archipelago was again asserted in the House of Commons yesterday by Hon. Charles Stewart, minister of the interior. Tabling a large map, Mr. Stewart said that the Canadian claim was to islands lying north of the Canadian mainland up to the North Pole.

The limits of Canada's claim, as indicated on the map, formed a great triangle with the mainland as the base and the North Pole as the apex. The western boundary was the continuation of a boundary between Canada and Alaska. The Eastern took a line up Davis Strait between Canada and Greenland and then followed longitude 60 west to the pole.

### DATE SET FOR LIARD INDIAN MURDER CASES

Will be Proceeded With on August 19, Mr. Justice Macdonald Informs Grand Jury

In releasing the Grand Jury at the Supreme Court Assizes yesterday following a true bill having been brought in in the case of Rex vs. C. V. Symes, charged with manslaughter, Mr. Justice W. A. Macdonald announced that the jury should hold itself in readiness to deal at 10.30 on the morning of Wednesday, August 19, with the cases of five Liard Indians who are now at Okalla prison awaiting trial on charges of murder. To handle these cases, the present Assizes are really being extended until it is possible to bring out from the Cassiar district the necessary witnesses.

### CRITICISM OF SECURITY PACT

No Agreement Yet Reached; Therefore Nothing Yet to Lay Before Dominions

LONDON, June 11.—Following reports of criticism in the Dominions in connection with the security pact it is understood here the Dominions have been kept informed as to the progress of the negotiations and undoubtedly their approval and support will be sought before an agreement is reached. At present, however, there is no agreement which can be submitted to them. All that has been done so far is to indicate the responsibility which Great Britain is prepared to undertake.

### U.S. MARINES AND CANTON

Are on Island of Honan to Protect American Christian College

CANTON, June 11.—Serious clashes occurred this morning between Cantonese and Yunnanese troops for the possession of the city and numerous casualties are reported on both sides. United States marines landed on Honan Island near Canton to protect the American Christian College. Most foreigners are now outside the danger zone.

Hon. Dr. Sutherland, minister of public works, and Hon. Dr. Sloan, minister of mines, returned with their party on the Prince George last night after visiting Stewart, Anxoy and Alice Arm.

Dr. and Mrs. Sutherland continued south to Victoria on the Prince George but Mr. Sloan got off here and proceeded to the interior to inspect some mining properties. He will be back in the city towards the end of the week on his way south.

P. Philip chief engineer of the public works department; G. C. MacKay, district engineer, and A. L. Garruthers, superintendent of bridges, proceeded south to Bella Cooola.

### Urge United States Air Force Increased Three Times to Keep Pace with Modern Developments

WASHINGTON, June 11.—(By Canadian Press).—All indications are that the United States is about to enter on an era of big development of aviation and of its air forces, both army and navy. Development of aviation for other government purposes and civilian development of aviation look like practical certainties. The manner in which the Post Office Department is reaching out with air mail is one strong indication of the trend of things.

### DOMINIONS IN BRITAIN

Secretary of State For Dominion Affairs to be Created is Announced

LONDON, June 11.—The British Government proposes to create the office of secretary of state for Dominion affairs and the office of under secretary of state for Dominion affairs, Premier Baldwin announced in the House of Commons today.

The Premier said that the creation of these new offices would be part of the government's proposed reorganization of the Colonial Office. Up to the present all matters having to do with the Dominions had been dealt with by the Colonial Office.

### CHINESE CREWS OF SHIPS OUT

Twenty-Eight Vessels Tied Up from Lack of Sailors to Man Them

SHANGHAI, June 11.—The Chinese strike situation became acute on the river front today when the coastal steamers suspended sailings, leaving this class of shipping virtually paralyzed. Twenty eight vessels are being tied up for lack of Chinese crews.

### Nova Scotia Strikers Capture Power Plant; Man Killed in Fray

Company Police Injured Earlier in Day When Successfully Defending Building; Man Shot in Stomach

GLACE BAY, June 11.—After a pitched battle lasting upwards of fifteen minutes, striking miners captured New Waterford power house this afternoon and were reported to be in full charge of the plant.

One man, William Davis, was killed and Gilbert Watson was shot in the stomach, seriously wounded in the fray. A number of company police were injured earlier in the day when an attempt was made to take possession of the plant but were repulsed.

British Empire steel plant officials have been keeping the plant in operation.

Officials Missing  
General Manager H. J. McCann and a number of officials of the British Steel Corporation were known to be in the power station at New Waterford when captured by strikers. They are reported missing. A number of police and officials fled to the woods nearby when the force was overwhelmed and it is possible the missing officials are with these.

Later reports say that scores were injured. About forty police were at the plant along with officials and maintenance men. Most of them were pretty badly mauled by the strikers who overpowered the defending force.

### NEW MODERATOR FOR PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH

Rev. Ephraim Scott Heads Remnant Which Refused to Join United Church

TORONTO, June 11.—Rev. Dr. Ephraim Scott of Montreal was unanimously elected this morning to be moderator of the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church, controlling that section which refused to join the United Church of Canada. The election took place at the opening session here.

### SUGGESTS THAT SLOAN BE REPRESENTATIVE OF PROVINCE AT WEMBLEY

VANCOUVER, June 11.—A recommendation that Hon. William Sloan should attend the Wembley Exhibition as the representative of British Columbia, was made yesterday by the B.C. Chamber of Mines at a meeting of the directors yesterday. Mr. Sloan's presence at the Empire exhibition as head of the mining department of this province was held to be highly desirable.

### COWPER'S CASE IN HIGH COURT

Criminal Libel Charge Likely to be Heard at Assizes—Wong's Habeas Corpus Proceedings

VANCOUVER, June 11.—It was stated today to be unlikely that the libel case against J. S. Cowper, editor of the Saturday Tribune, would progress beyond the Assizes, also stated that it comes up on Monday and that the charge would be heard by the higher courts, probably the Assizes, next October.

G. L. Fraser, counsel for F. L. Baker, who swore to the charge against Cowper, who is preparing the case, also stated that habeas corpus proceedings on behalf of Wong Foon Sing, Chinese house boy, opening tomorrow, would be briefly spoken to and the real argument stood over until Monday.

### ASSIZES TO SIT TONIGHT

Progress Has Been Slow—Intention is to Finish Session by End of Week

When court adjourned after six o'clock last evening, the session of the Supreme Court Assizes being held here was only half way through the second of four cases on the docket. Attorney General Manson, who is prosecuting, has business in the south and is anxious to get away before the end of the week so Mr. Justice W. A. Macdonald stated that evening sessions would be commenced today. The two Indian manslaughter cases took up a great deal more time than had been anticipated.

### ESQUIMALT DRY DOCK FINISHED

**Have Canadian Flag That Is Distinctive.**

The Canadian flag today is not distinctive. The detail of the coat of arms is so small it means nothing and it does not represent all the provinces. What is needed is a simple device that will be easily recognized all over the world. Australia has such and Canada could easily select one.

The beaver, representing Canadian industry, would be a very suitable emblem on the red ensign. Some would prefer the maple leaf but it has no meaning. True it is ornamental, but that is all.

The beaver, the animal that saws wood all the time, would be an excellent emblem. It could be made ornamental if a good artist were given the work of designing one.

Armorial bearings or ancient heraldic designs do not mean much today. What Canada needs is something new and original.

**Trade Improvement Throughout Country.**

With Canadian currency at par, with annual exports nearly three times as valuable as in 1914 and imports only a third larger than before the war, with a decidedly larger proportion of our imports coming through our own ports and only half as much coming to us through the ports of the United States, Canada's position in international trade and finance is now far stronger than most people realize, says the Royal Bank monthly trade report. While it is true that we have experienced a prolonged depression which has left a strong feeling of pessimism among our manufacturers and business men, a readjustment has been taking place that is steadily strengthening our financial position.

Reports indicate that this spring has been favorable to agriculture and that soil, moisture and crop conditions are generally satisfactory in Canada, with the exception of points in Saskatchewan where cool weather is reported to have interfered with germination. While there is no great volume of building, yet the large scale of construction in Toronto and Vancouver is surprising. Most manufacturing plants are busier than in the preceding month and the unemployment situation is not serious. Mining operations are in full swing all over the country, and with the exception that there are bad conditions in the coal mines, we may regard the mining situation as quite prosperous. Prospects are bright for the salmon canning industry in the West, for agriculture in the Prairies, for manufacturing in the industrial centres and for the pulp and paper industry in the East. Altogether developments of the moment are quite encouraging and there should be only a minor reaction, if any, this summer.

The lumbering situation is undoubtedly bad. In fact, operators report that prices are so low that most current contracts are carried out at a loss. In order to find a market, Canadian lumber must be exported and the United States furnishes the best market. One factor which is upsetting that market is the situation in Idaho where trees are being cut on a basis of so much rent per acre, permitting the complete destruction of the forest. Such destruction may quickly exhaust Idaho's resources, but in the meantime lumbering can only be carried on at a disadvantage in those regions where commonsense or law makes some conservation requirements.

**Foreign Trade Is On Increase.**

For the fiscal year ending March 31, 1925, Canada's total exports amounted to more than one billion dollars in value, while her imports were only about three quarters as large; this means that we have reduced the volume of per capita imports to about three quarters of the value of those we were importing before the war. The volume of our exports, however, is 60 per cent larger than in 1914; while the total dollar value of exports was 2 1/2 times as great as at that time. So much has been written concerning the importance of Canada's dominant position in the grain trade of the present and future, that there is little need to emphasize the importance of this contribution to international trade. It is recognized that with the increase of population in the United States, it will not be long before the United States is predominantly an importer rather than an exporter of foodstuffs, and for some time to come Canada must be looked upon as the great granary of the world.

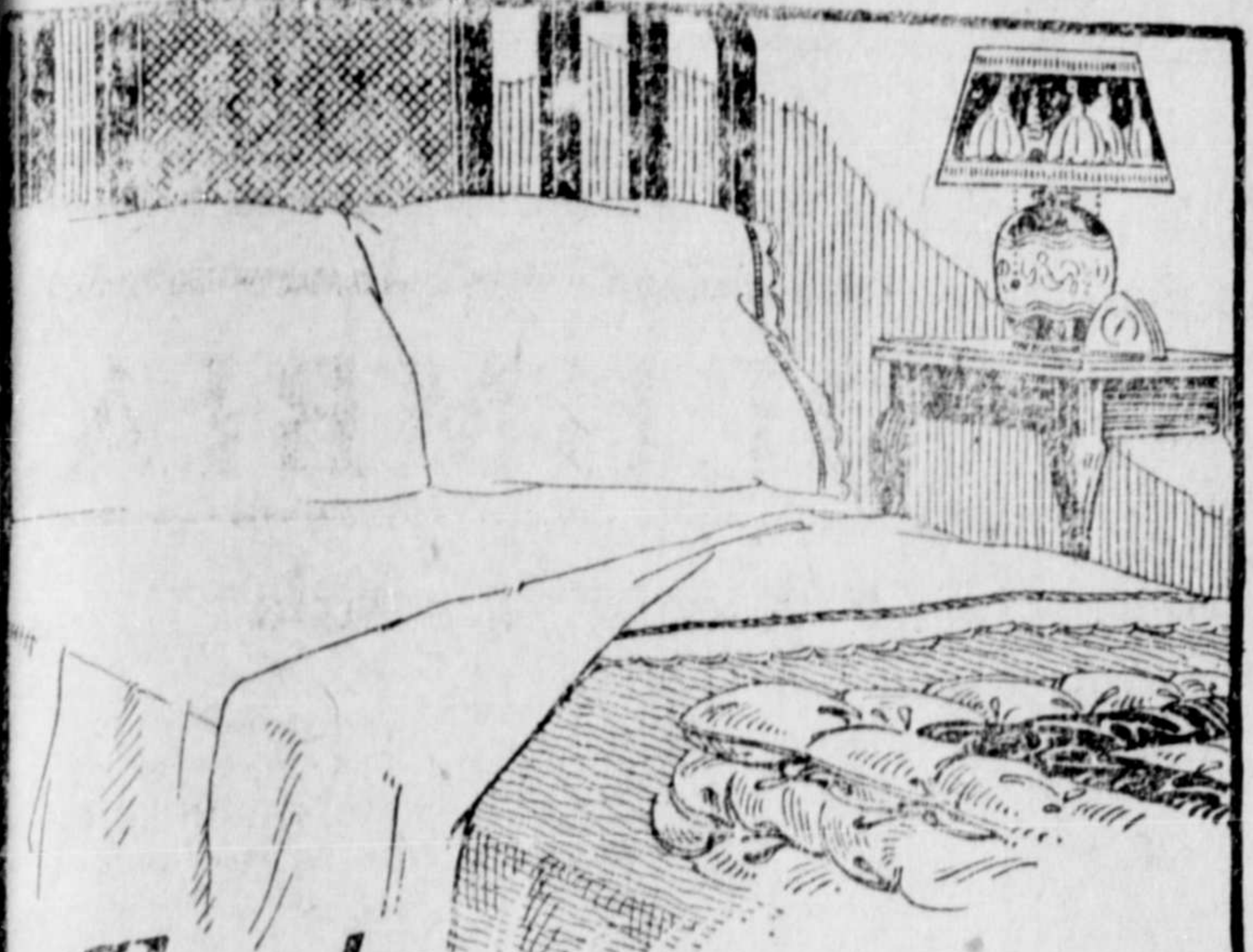

### Here and There

The popularity of the Nova Scotia apple is rapidly growing in Europe. 1,103,980 barrels and 8,693 boxes were shipped in 1924-25 to ports in England, Scotland and Germany. Shipments also went to Newfoundland, West Indies, Central Canada and the United States.

Production of sugar beets in Canada during 1923 amounted to 159,200 tons, valued at \$1,922,668, and grown on 17,941 acres, according to the Bureau of Statistics. 6,000 acres have been planted to beets this year in Southern Alberta, due to the establishment of a sugar beet factory.

Milton Sills, the well-known movie actor, with a company of 32 other screen artists, passed through Montreal recently to take scenes in "The Come Back" in which he is featured. The party went to Beauchesne, in Northern Quebec. Travelling by another train was a mother skunk and five kitten skunks which will also figure in the picture.

The 286 passengers on the Canadian Pacific S.S. Empress of France completed their 30,000-mile tour of the world on Saturday, May 23, when the vessel docked at New York. At their last stop at Havana, President Machado of Cuba invited the passengers to attend his official inauguration and to witness the unveiling of a statue to the preceding President.

Another aristocratic rancher recently passed through Montreal on a return visit to the ancestral estates in Transylvania, Hungary. This was Baron Josef Csavossy who, with his brother Andre, took over a 1,600-acre ranch last March near Cochrane, Alberta, on the Bow River. Incidentally the Baron was a passenger on the Trans-Canada on its first return trip of the season from Vancouver.

The Indian Day Celebration at Banff, it is announced, will take place as usual this year on the third Thursday and Friday in July. Preparations are already under way for this event, which enjoys an enviable reputation as an Indian show. The Stoney Indians arrive in large numbers from their reservation to take part in the ceremonies, which are the 23rd annual celebration of the function.

Edward G. Taylor, one of the best known game fishermen on the continent is authority for the statement that New Brunswick is losing none of its lure as a fisherman's paradise. Just back from a trip to the Cains River, N.B., Mr. Taylor said salmon were steadily increasing in numbers and size in the province. He added that he had caught on this trip a salmon 42 inches long and weighing 24 lbs. In the autumn such a fish would likely weigh up to fifty pounds.

The following story is told of Sir William Van Horne, first president of the Canadian Pacific Railway and a Major Rogers, who was in charge of the supplies for men working along the track. Van Horne said: "Look here, Major, I hear your men won't stay with you, they say you starve them." "Taint so, Van." "Well, I'm told you feed 'em on soup made out of water flavored with old ham canvas covers." "Taint so, Van, I didn't never have no hams." "From 'Canada's Great Highway,' by J. H. E. Secretan.

The Western railways of the United States comprising 67 roads serving Chicago and the West, have petitioned the Inter-State Commerce Commission for permission to advance rates. They state that for the years 1921 to 1924 inclusive, the average rate of return on capital was 3.5 per cent., which they claim is so small as to render it impossible for them to secure working capital for extensions and improvement of service by the sale of stock or issue of bonds at reasonable terms. They ask for rates that would give them a net return of 5 1/2 per cent., which it is generally admitted is what railways should have.

**CATHOLICS URGED TO GO TO BAPTIST AID**

MONTGOMERY, N.B., June 11. — When fire broke out on the roof of the Baptist church at Lewisville, N.B. on a Sunday morning, Rev. Father D. F. Leger, who was just beginning a service in the Catholic church in the town, informed his congregation of the blaze and requested the men present to go to the assistance of their Baptist brethren. The fire was extinguished with small damage.

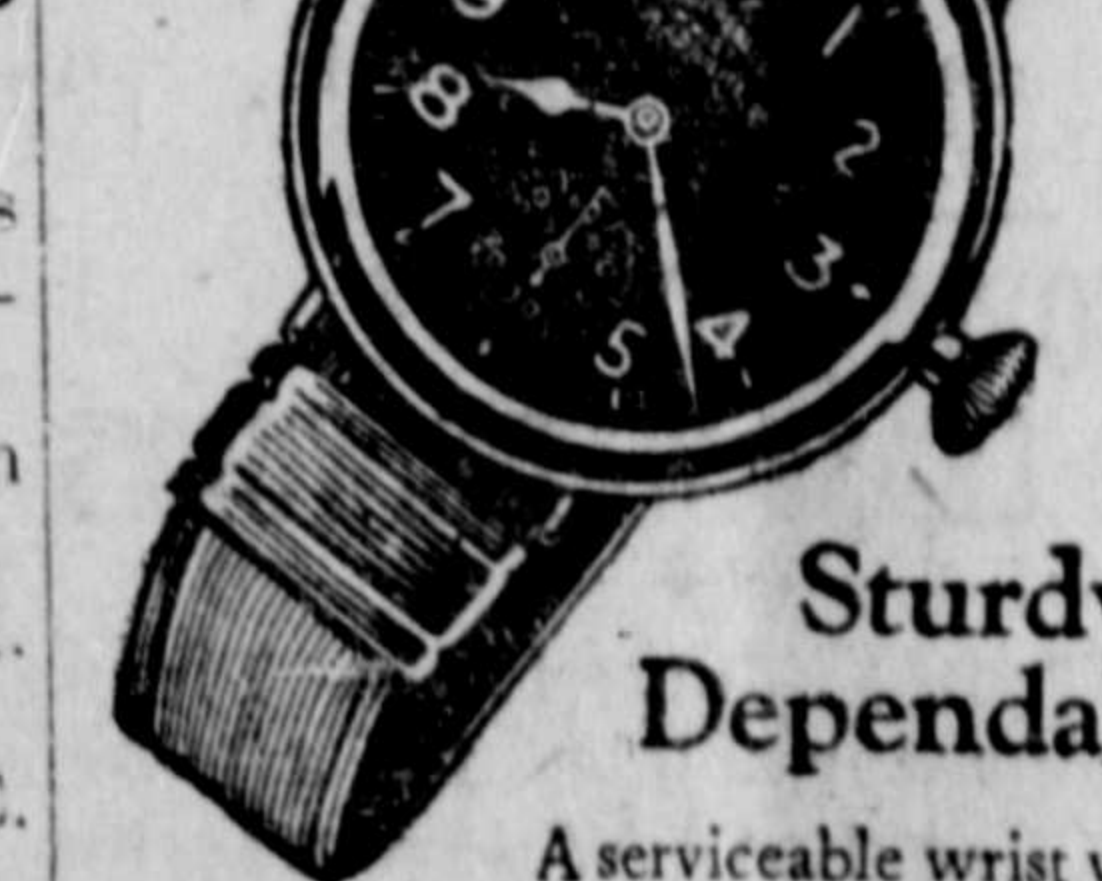

# FISHERMEN ARE NEEDING HELP IN SCOTLAND

Newspaper Urges Government Aid in Reorganizing Their Business

That the fishing industry of Scotland is not in a very happy condition is made plain from an editorial article appearing in a Scottish newspaper just to hand which follows:

Some years ago a Fishermen's Organization Society was set on foot for the revival of the fishing industry on the Cornwall coast. As the result of many handicaps, not the least being the competition from the great trawling combines, once flourishing herring ports, like St. Ives, were brought to ruin. The coast fisheries and the small boat fishermen were reduced to bankruptcy, their boats lay weedy and mouldering on the shore and the fishermen went about hungry and morose. Their condition was investigated by Mr. Cecil Harmsworth who was at the time secretary to Mr. Walter Runciman at the Board of Agriculture and

fisheries, and in order to save a fine race of men from extinction the society to which we have referred was formed with government assistance. The men were helped to procure and equip steam and motor boats. They were organized into groups for the disposal of their catches to the best advantage, thereby securing fair prices according to those ruling at Billingsgate, with the result that all the former fishermen are now regularly at work, with many more additional men afloat and ashore. The Cornwall coast fishermen are now a thriving body, the villages have taken on new life, and the motor boats are able to hold their own with the steam trawling companies.

### Are Left Alone

These facts are given in an interesting article in a recent issue of "Truth," and the writer goes on to say that the inshore fishermen are an asset of sterling value and that their disappearance would have been a calamity. So say we—and we have been saying so in these columns time after time when dealing with similar conditions among our own inshore fishermen.

### SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENTS

**PRE-EMPTIONS**  
Vacant, unreserved, surveyed Crown lands may be pre-empted by British subjects over 18 years of age, and by aliens on declaring intention to become British subjects, conditional upon residence, occupation, and improvement for agricultural purposes.

Full information concerning regulations regarding pre-emptions is given in Bulletin No. 1, Land Series, "How to Pre-empt Land," copies of which can be obtained free of charge by addressing the Department of Lands, Victoria, B.C., or to any Government Agent.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes, and which is not timberland, i.e., carrying over 8,000 board feet per acre west of the Coast Range and 6,000 feet per acre east of that range.

Applications for pre-emptions are to be addressed to the Land Commissioner of the Land Recording Division, in which the lands applied for are situated, and are made on printed forms, copies of which can be obtained from the Land Commissioner.

Pre-emptions must be occupied for five years and improvements made to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivating at least five acres, before a Crown Grant can be received.

For more detailed information see the Bulletin "How to Pre-empt Land."

**PURCHASE**  
Applications are received for purchase of vacant and unreserved Crown lands, not being timberland, for agricultural purposes; minimum price for first-class (arable) land is \$5 per acre, and second-class (grazing) land \$2.50 per acre. Further information regarding purchase or lease of Crown lands is given in Bulletin No. 10, Land Series, "Purchase and Lease of Crown Lands."

Mill, factory, or industrial sites on timber land, not exceeding 40 acres, may be purchased or leased, the conditions including payment of stumpage.

**HOMESITE LEASES**  
Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesites, conditional upon a dwelling being erected in the first year, title being obtainable after residence and improvement conditions are fulfilled and land has been surveyed.  
**LEASES**  
For grazing and industrial purposes areas not exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or a company.  
**GRAZING**  
Under the Grazing Act the Province is divided into grazing districts and the range administered under a Grazing Commissioner. Annual grazing permits are issued based on numbers ranged, priority being given to established owners. Stock-owners may form associations for range management. Free, or partly free, permits are available for settlers, cowboys and travellers, up to ten head.

around the north Scottish coast and in the Islands. What has been done for Cornwall could—and should—be done for our fishermen in the Highlands and Islands. The men of Cornwall, we are told, "give us our breakfast herring, and our supper lobster; in war time they form the finest reservoir of naval war power which the country possesses." This may be true so far as England is concerned, but in the Scottish north and west we have finer still, and besides herring and lobster, we have other fish than which no better are to be found anywhere else around the British Isles. Yet we are left to peg away—and to peg out, until there are many fishing villages on our coast in the saddest state of decay, from which the able-bodied are daily taking their flight for other lands where their worth seems to be more appreciated by the powers that be. Is it really beyond hope to expect that the present government will do for the fishermen of the Highlands and Islands what has been done to such good purpose—both locally and nationally—for the lugger men of Cornwall?
