LIQUOR LAW AMENDMENT PASSES COMMONS

CHARGE IS THAT NORTH VANCOUVER ELECTION INVALID: VOTES SWITCHED

Switching of Absentee Ballots is Charged at Election Last Summer

George S. Hanes produces affidavit implicating returning officer and others in alleged crime

VANCOUVER, June 24.—Allegations of ballot theft and switching in handling the absentee vote of North Vancouver last June are contained in an affidavit by George S. Hanes, the defeated independent candidate for North Vancouver constituency, in the election last June.

The affidavit was introduced yesterday during the hearing of an application before Mr. Justice Murphy asking to reopen the contested election of J. M. Bryan, Liberal, to the Legislature.

TREATY BILL PASSES HOUSE

Pact with Australia is Ratified by House of Commons at Ottawa

OTTAWA, June 24.—A bill putting into effect the trade which he declared that Master-treaty between Canada and Australia, whereby each gets a pre-opened the absentee voters' envelopes, switched or changed the ballots so as to elect Bryan and that D. McCall, former business partner of Kittson, sealed up the envelopes after the ballots had been changed.

When the bill came up for its second reading, a division was called for by the Progressives, the treaty being supported by 89 votes and opposed by 42. Four Conservatives voted with the Government and five Progressives favored the treaty. Many did not vote.

Pleading guilty to a charge of cutting down trees on the Skeena River highway, Charles Stewart was fined \$15 in the city police court this morning and given a lecture by Magistrate McClymont who gave warning that further offences of such a character would be more severely dealt with. The charge against Stewart was laid at the instance of the municipal public works department. Accused had been cutting down the trees, it is said, in order to sell them as fire wood.

SCHOLARSHIP GOES TO U.B.C. STUDENT

Archie Fee, Who Is Doing Research Work at Queen Charlotte's is Recognized

VANCOUVER, June 24.—Archie Fee, 19 years of age, now on the Queen Charlotte Islands, engaged in Government research work in biology, has been awarded the 1851 Exhibition scholarship, which entitles him to an annuity of \$250 while studying at any university in Great Britain, it was announced today. The award is described by University authorities as one of the greatest brought to the University of B.C. in recent years.

ORDER FOR RELEASE CHINESE HOUSE BOY

Signature Should be Appended Today and Bail of \$10,000 Put Up



MANY TOURISTS ON C.N.R. BOAT

Steamer Prince Rupert in Port
Today on First Voyage to
Alaska—225 Passengers

With a total of about 225 passengers, 150 of whom are making the trip to Alaska, the balance debarking here, G.N.R. steamer Prince Rupert, Capt. D. Donald, arrived in port sharp on time at 10:30 this morning and will sail at 4 o'clock this afternoon for Alaska. This voyage inaugurates the company's tourist service to Alaska. Included in the passenger list are many tourists from the East and Middle West as well as a number from the Pacific Coast, especially California. There are more passengers coming in from the East this afternoon by train to join the ship for the cruise through Alaska waters and south again. Ideal weather has prevailed so far for the trip up the coast and the passengers have apparently been enjoying the trip. They are being joined here by R. F. McNaughton, district passenger agent, and Mrs. McNaughton.

Sixteen Conservatives, led by Hon. Arthur Meighen, and three Progressives, constituted the opposition to the motion of Hon. J. A. Robb, acting minister of finance, that the House of Commons disagree with the Senate amendments.

Prevent Importation of Liquor into B.C. is Object of Measure

Amendment to Canada Temperance Act passed by Commons and passed on this morning to Senate

OTTAWA, June 24.—A bill to amend the Canada Temperance Act passed all stages of the House of Commons this morning and now goes to the Senate.

The bill chiefly affects British Columbia and will give that province the right to prohibit importation of liquor except for medicinal, sacramental and industrial purposes.

When the bill came up for consideration, opposition developed from the Conservative benches, General Clark of Burford and Capt. George Black of the Yukon objecting to the bill.

A. W. Neill of Comox-Alberni gave the bill his hearty support. He said that liquor was being brought into British Columbia, ostensibly for export and no excuse was paid on it. It was shipped a few miles out to sea and smuggled back and bootlegged on a large scale at prices with which the provincial liquor board could not compete.

Capt. Black said the Attorney General of British Columbia could withhold consent for licensing any export houses, thereby wiping them out. The British Columbia government was "only putting up a sham fight against bootlegging" which was desired as "one of their principal sources of revenue."

The bride was given away by her brother and Miss K. M. Ingalls, B.A., of Vancouver, attended the bride.

In order to harmonize with the foliage setting, the bride was gowned in nile-green crepe de chine.

LADY IS SUMMONED ON ABDUCTION CASE

Employee of Detective Agency is Thirteenth to Have Charge Laid Against Her

VANCOUVER, June 24.—Mrs. Elizabeth Donnelly, employed by O. B. V. Robinson's detective agency, has been summoned in connection with the abduction of Wong Foon Sing. This makes the thirteenth charge laid by the Provincial Police in connection with the notorious case.

Prolonged trade depression and steadily mounting unemployment has now reached a point where a crisis is foreseen.

The Laborites most blame the government, which they accuse of taking no action.

PREMIER MINE PAYS DIVIDEND

Sum of \$400,000 to be Distributed Among Shareholders Next Week

VANCOUVER, June 24.—Eight cents per share is to be the quarterly dividend of the Premier Gold Mine which will take \$400,000 of the company's profits and brings the total dividends paid by the company to date to \$7,840,000. The dividend is payable the end of next week.

Shares of the company, which had been showing a weakening tendency have strengthened considerably as a result of the action of the directors.

French Deputies Very Excitable.

The members of the French chamber of deputies have always shown themselves to be a very excitable people. Free fights are common there and uproarious scenes often make it necessary to adjourn until the members have had an opportunity to calm themselves. Then they go on with business as if nothing had happened.

One of those scenes took place yesterday when a member rose and struck a speaker in the face.

Any people that cannot debate without fighting cannot be trusted to keep the peace for long. As long as individuals want to strike each other, nations composed of those individuals will want to do the same.

How To Deal With Reverted Lands.

The Oak Bay council recently struck out a new path in the matter of dealing with properties which have been taken over by the city in lieu of taxes. Recently a company was formed there to buy at a low rate all the lands held by the municipality. The capital was subscribed locally and the deal completed. Then an auction was held and many of the reverted lands were auctioned off, the prices obtained showing the investors a good profit. Today the municipality holds no lands and a new value has been set for the tax sale which is to be held there soon. As a result of the sale, many owners will withdraw their properties from sale by paying up the taxes, and lots sold last year are being redeemed. While the lots were sold at lower than the taxes outstanding against them, they were not disposed of in such a way as to depress the market.

It looks as if Oak Bay has solved the reverted lands problem for some years to come.

Why Not Similar Action In Rupert?

Why could not a syndicate of Prince Rupert people be formed to make a lump sum bid to the city for all their reverted lands, which would be disposed of again at reasonable rates to those desiring them. The city could afford to make a good price in view of the benefits to be derived therefrom. The operating syndicate would stand a chance of making money from the transaction and the city would get its taxes, which is what is needed at the present time. Everyone would benefit from such a scheme if carried out carefully and wisely.

Winnipeg Has Its Reverted Land Problem.

Winnipeg seems to have its reverted land problem. Recently an expert appeared before the finance committee of that city and urged that no lots be sold for less than the amount due the city outstanding against it. It was argued that to do this meant to depress values of surrounding property and eventually to induce owners of vacant lands to throw up their hands and refuse to pay taxes. The question is one that has not been solved, so far as we know, by any other municipality than Oak Bay, the residential suburb of Victoria.

DAWSON SPOKE AT VANDERHOOF

Local Man Took Prominent Part
in Banquet Given Hon.
E. G. Barrow

F. G. Dawson, the prominent wholesale grocer, and director of Canadian National Railways, gave a most interesting address on the terminal elevator and agriculture in this section of the province says the Nechoke Chronicle of Vanderhoof. His remarks on main subjects were interspersed with anecdotes, in which the speaker exhibited a keen sense of humor.

Mr. Dawson Fred Stork, member for Skeena, and he had worked hard for a number of years to induce the Dominion government to build a terminal elevator at Prince Rupert, and since such an elevator is now under construction, the speaker felt that Mr. Stork and he had done a lot for the Bulkley and Nechoke valleys. Up to the present we have only had a local market. When the elevator is complete the farmers of the central interior will have a cash market for at least one product. It has been proven that the finest quality wheat has been grown in the Bulkley and Nechoke valleys. If the farmers go in stronger for wheat they will be able to obtain sufficient money to build up a fine dairy business, which will undoubtedly be our chief industry.

Peace River Railway Situation

Mr. Dawson explained the Peace river railway situation, in which he said at the present time the Dominion government really does not know just where it is in the matter. The Canadian Pacific Railway have a lease of the Edmonton and Duncan railway, which expires next month. Up to the present the Canadian Pacific Railway Company has not seen fit to show its hand, as to what the railway company will do when the lease runs out. Until then no plans can be safely made. The best part of the summer will be gone, and it will be too late to start anything this year.

Mr. Dawson strongly advocated the development of Prince Rupert, and the building of a railway line from the Peace River country to tap the Canadian National, so that the grain of the north country will arrive in the elevator at Prince Rupert.

POACHING FOOTBALL.

Editor Daily News,

A situation is developing within the sporting circles of football that will have the effect of disrupting the sport, unless the officials put a stop to it. The evil lies in the offering of jobs to good players, to join the club offering the job and play for them regardless as to whether the player is released. It is not in the interest of good sportsmanship, to weaken one team for the benefit of another. The wonder is—will the management keep the players thus poached, upon their payroll after the close of the football, or in the baseball season?

The players themselves should be a little more responsible and show more loyalty to their club and not be so ready to jump the moment a little coin is jingled by way of a job.

The officials in Vancouver of both the football and baseball leagues experienced the same trouble, but put a stop to it by suspending players and the official poaching.

One Team Shaky

Football as it is now, is very shaky and it will occasion no surprise if one of the teams drop out. In the league fixture on Tuesday night the game was called off on account of one team not having sufficient players.

It is a pity that we cannot have our growing boys look upon this sport as it was conducted in Canada a few years back—purely amateur. The players who purchased their own equipment and were loyal to their club or team, and would not dare or dream of offering a player on another team an inducement to join them.

It is to be hoped that the local officials will see to it that this method of obtaining players at the expense of another club, is stopped. Otherwise they can say goodbye to public support.



Here and There

Canada spent \$49,056,179 last year for pensions and re-establishment of Veterans of the Great War, according to a report recently issued from Ottawa by the department in charge of this work.

Without a dissentient voice over 4,000 cattle owners in 200 districts have voted to make Prince Edward Island a disease-free area under the Department of Agriculture arrangement which calls for a two-thirds vote of all cattle owners.

Two thousand young buffalo from the Wainwright herd will make a 700-mile trek northward this summer to the buffalo reserve on the Slave River where they will be turned loose to mingle with the wood bison which roam that area.

"In all parts of Canada and the United States," according to Robt. G. Hodgson, editor of the Fur Trade Journal of Canada, "Muskrat farms are being established, mostly on a large scale and they are rapidly turning what was once marshland of little value into the most productive part of the farm," Mr. Hodgson adds.

The record established recently at Acme when 114 horses worked in one field at one time seeding the crop of Mrs. C. W. King, has been broken at Gadsby, Alberta. When the neighbors of J. B. Ball who recently suffered a broken arm, put in his 100-acre crop, 39 outfits were at work on one day and 175 horses. The crop was put in in a single day.

H. E. Morrissey, whose horse Manna made a run away victory in the English Derby, will visit Canada in the fall en route to China from which country he hails. He will sail on the Canadian Pacific S.S. Minnedosa from Southampton on October 8, stay a short time in the Dominion, and sail from Vancouver for China on the S.S. Empress of Australia, October 29.

Rebuilt in nine months after the fire that destroyed it last October the Chateau Lake Louise hotel opened for the current season on Sunday, May 31 as the Trans-Canada air train arrived from its cross-continent run. The hotel was rebuilt under exceptionally difficult conditions in temperatures as low as fifty degrees below zero during which a wooden wall heated by stoves had to be erected about the construction works.

Following the opening visit by Their Majesties King George and Queen Mary to the Wembley Exhibition, the Duke and Duchess of York also went over the grounds. Their Majesties were especially delighted with Treasure Island, the Paradise of children, and travelled over the miniature Canadian Pacific train that runs around the Island, passing en route the replica of Banff Station and the reproduction of the Canadian Pacific Rockies.

Canada will be well represented at the New Zealand and South Seas International Exhibition to be held at Dunedin between November, 1925 and April, 1926. Both the Dominion Government and the Canadian Pacific Railway have announced their intention to send well-appointed exhibits to the Exposition. It is probable that the provincial governments and many Canadian manufacturers will follow suit.





NEW RADIO ON ARCTIC VESSEL

Canadian Government Ship to Keep in Touch With Home all Time

GO FARTHER NORTH YET

QUEBEC, June 24.—(By Canadian Press)—New Arctic radio transmission records will, it is expected, be established when the Canadian government ship "Arctic" enters the polar regions on her annual trip this summer, for the vessel will be equipped with a transmitting set especially designed to keep the Canadian government posted on her movements in the land of the midnight sun.

The vessel holds the present record for receiving and transmitting radio messages from the point nearest the North Pole. The Canadian government is preparing to start the ship off on her voyage earlier this year, in order to pierce farther into the Arctic ice fields than it did last.

The staunch ship, built especially for Arctic travel, is being reinforced on bow and stern with heavy steel plates to fight its way through the ice to a point farther north than it has been able to penetrate most of the 20 years it has been making annual pilgrimages to the Arctic Circle.

TALKED TO PITTSBURG

Last year the vessel continuously received messages from the Canadian government transmitted from Station KDKA at Pittsburgh, Pa., on the short wave, and establishing the "farthest north" reception record when a message from KDKA was received at Cape Sabine, north of Peary's winter base at Etah, and within 41 degrees of the North Pole.

Not all the reply messages sent from the vessel to the Canadian government were received, however, and in order to insure uninterrupted two-way transmission this year Commander C. P. Edwards, director of radio service of the Canadian Department of Marine & Fisheries, in collaboration with C. W. Horn, superintendent of radio operations of the KDKA engineers, is having a more powerful set built for the vessel this year.

BISLEY TEAM FROM CANADA IN ENGLAND

Winner of Last Year's King's Prize to Again Compete

LONDON, Eng., June 24.—(By Canadian Press)—The annual Bisley meeting will be held this year from Monday, July 6 to Saturday, July 18. As in previous years, Canada will be well represented, and Lieut. Desmond Burke, G.M., Ottawa, winner last year of the great Bisley classic, the King's Prize, will again be a competitor at the Bisley ranges.

RUPERT FISH IN NEW YORK

One of Places Where It is Sold
Is Fulton Fish Market

One of the important places for selling Prince Rupert fresh halibut is Fulton Fish Market, New York. This market has been in existence over one hundred years. Located in the lee of Brooklyn bridge its annual business is estimated at \$30,000,000, the supplies coming from as far west as the Pacific ocean and as far north as Bering Sea and the Labrador.

When Fulton Market was opened in 1822 its 340 original stands were taken largely by butchers. But early defaults on saw and cleaver leases, together with growing business among the hustling fishermen and oystermen caused the city authorities that October to set aside the east, or Beckman Street wing "for use of sellers of fish."

Wholesale activity developed, and six years later the fish industry moved to a shed of its own across South Street, opposite the main market, on the water. Ice, then, was unknown commercially, and fish were kept in floating "cars" which were suspended in the slip below, hollering against the hulls of the smacks. Today, ice is used in thousands of tons. Save for the period from 1843 to 1869, the same sites, with different roofs, has housed the wholesalers to this day.

Much of the deep set lang of Fulton Fish Market is felt to be lost with the passing of the old time fishing boats. Craft like the
