ARNETT GETS
DREDGING JOB

Goes to Comox to Straighten Out
Courtenay River

Special to Daily News)

OTTAWA, May 26.—The W. C. Arnett dredging Co. of Vancouver has been awarded a contract by the department of public works for the straightening out of the channel of the Courtenay River at Comox. There were time tenders and Arnett's was the lowest. The sum of \$35,000 was voted for the work but the successful bid was lower than that.

Sir Henry Drayton referred to the project as "a political elevator."

E. J. Garland, Progressive, of Bow River said that if the Government was going to justify the building of the elevator it would have to give direct communication between the Peace River country and the Canadian National Railway.

Hon. J. H. King said he had no hesitation in advocating the building of the elevator.

Fred Stork, Skeena, resented the statement of Drayton that the proposal was for a political elevator.

Dr. King said that last year he recommended a half million bushel elevator for Prince Rupert but the engineers pointed out to Hon. Thomas Lowe, minister of Trade and Commerce, that there was little difference in cost of erecting one of double that capacity owing to the fact that the cleaning apparatus, work house and trackage has to be built in, any event, hence the large elevator.

Sir Henry Drayton, after asking what would be the use of creating competition between the Canadian National two western terminals and stating that the distance from Edmonton to Prince Rupert was 956 miles and to Vancouver 765 said: "If we are in the railway business for fun, if we like railway deficits, let us carry our grain further than we need to."

W. G. McQuarrie of New Westminster asked why the Government had passed by the Fraser River and chosen Prince Rupert as the point at which to erect an elevator. "If this is not political discrimination, I would like to know what it is," he said.

Hon. H. H. Stevens said if it was the desire of the Government to develop the hinterland of British Columbia it might have erected an elevator costing about half that at Prince Rupert, spending the rest of the money in the establishment of experimental stations in the northern part of the province.

D. M. Kennedy argued that the elevator was useless without proper railway connections with Peace River.

Hon. Charles Stewart, minister of the interior, defended the pro-

MINISTERS COMING TO PRINCE RUPERT END OF NEXT WEEK

Word was received here today that Hon. William Sloan, minister of Mines, and Hon. W. H. Sutherland, minister of public works, will leave Vancouver on Thursday of next week, June 4, to visit northern points. They should arrive here on Saturday morning, June 6.

Hon. T. D. Pattullo, minister of lands, will be unable to accompany the other ministers owing to his duties calling him elsewhere at that time. He will visit the district later.

OTTAWA, May 26.—Vigorous defence of Prince Rupert's elevator scheme was one feature of yesterday's Commons debate.

This came, among others, from Hon. J. H. King, minister of public works, who said the elevator

would be a boon to farmers in the districts of Vanderhoof, Smithers, Round Lake and other parts of the interior who at present were compelled to limit their crops very largely to hay and oats which they sell locally.

The Prince Rupert elevator will enable these farmers to raise some wheat and obtain cash for it, added Dr. King. "Even 800 bushels of wheat means much to a young farmer," said the minister.

Dr. King said that last year he recommended a half million bushel elevator for Prince Rupert but the engineers pointed out to Hon. Thomas Lowe, minister of Trade and Commerce, that there was little difference in cost of erecting one of double that capacity owing to the fact that the cleaning apparatus, work house and trackage has to be built in, any event, hence the large elevator.

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

On the way from Portland, Oregon, to Wrangell, Alaska,

Three Airboats Going North to Cassiar Goldfields; One Passed Through Yesterday

On the way from Portland, Oregon, to Wrangell, Alaska, where it is intended to use the machine in commercial flying, a Curtis F. flying boat with its owner, Roy J. Davis of Portland aboard, called here Monday afternoon to take on fuel at the Imperial Oil Co.'s station.

The plane has been a little over a week out of Portland. It made Seattle in the first day and there had a new propeller and other parts installed. It took off from Seattle last Tuesday but that evening was forced to come down on account of engine trouble, at Salmon River, about 45 miles south of Alert Bay.

An examination being made, it

was found that machine shop work was necessary so the next day, after the flyers spent the night at Sayward, Vancouver Island, the plane was towed to Alert Bay. Repairs being made at Alert Bay, the machine took off from there on Sunday afternoon and that evening made Bella Bella. It left Bella Bella 10:40 Monday morning and reached here at 4:10 the same afternoon. An uneventful flight from that point here was reported. Last night at 9 o'clock the plane took off continuing its flight north.

Besides Mr. Davis on the plane were the pilot, R. H. Merrill, and mechanic, O. Krueger. Mr. Davis saw service during the war with the French flying corps. Merrill was with the United States air force and Mr. Krueger has been doing commercial flying.

Their plane is powered with a 150 horse power Curtis motor and can carry three passengers. Mr. Davis will also use the machine to investigate the northern mining fields and will probably go into the Dease Lake gold fields with it. He has been in the north before. It was announced that the machine would spend the summer in Alaska making Wrangell its base.

This may be the third plane to go into the Dease Lake country this summer. The big Vickers-Viking flying boat under charter to Archibald Little, of Detroit, is still at the Prince Rupert dry dock awaiting favorable reports as to ice conditions on the Skeena valley lakes before taking off for Telegraph Creek. Col. J. Scott Williams, the pilot, announces that the machine will be put in the water today probably and will take off in a day or so. It has also been stated that the all-metal plane belonging to the Railway Employees Industrial & Investment Association which is now being prepared for service at Hazelton may go north to the Dease Lake country.

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

Opposition To Prince Rupert.

Apparently Sir Henry Drayton considers Prince Rupert of little value from a voting point of view. He seems to assume that it will go Liberal anyway at the next election and as a matter of policy it is not worth while to do or say anything in favor of this port. He opposed the vote for the local elevator when it came up several days ago and he opposed it and criticized the expenditure severely yesterday.

Sir Henry gets righteously indignant at any money being spent on a Canadian National port. He is the active leader of the Conservative remnant in the House of Commons, attending to most of the intensive criticism for his party. Happily for us some of the Progressives support the government, especially on such matters as this and as a result the elevator vote is passed and the completion of the structure assured. Fred Stork of course did his bit in getting it through.

Still Rumors Of Silk Trade Here.

There are still rumors that Prince Rupert will handle the silk trade from the Orient by way of the Nippon Yusen Kaisha steamer. New speedy vessels have been built for that big company and they can beat any other time by shipping this way, if the Canadian National Railway co-operates by speeding up its service. The Japanese have had their eyes on this route for a long time and one of these days it will be adopted. The coming of the Yokohama Maru here this autumn is likely to be the precursor of regular sailings if it is found that the business can be done this way.

Provincial Ministers Coming Next Week.

Two provincial ministers are to visit Prince Rupert next week during the course of a tour of northern British Columbia. Hon. William Sloan, minister of mines, will doubtless go north to Portland Canal points and probably will visit the interior. Hon. W. H. Sutherland, minister of public works, has not yet seen some of the newer public works which have been completed such as the Terrace bridge.

Both ministers are in control of departments of the government, which are very important to Prince Rupert and district and doubtless every effort will be made to show them the developments which are going on and to enlist their sympathies with new projects. Incidentally, too, they will be suitably entertained.

There is at present no provincial election pending and all will be able to unite to make the reception of the ministers as impressive as possible. Unfortunately, Hon. T. D. Pattullo will not be able to come. Duties of his department call him elsewhere.

Weeks later, after the formal court wedding of the Prince and Tamara, all misunderstandings are cleared up and they realize they love each other deeply and truly.


CORINNE GRIFFITH LOVE'S WILDERNESS
