BLIZZARD SWEEPS THE PRAIRIE PROVINCES

SUGGESTED BEER REGULATIONS ELIMINATE DININGROOMS AND RESTAURANTS

Fierce Blizzard Sweeps Prairies Tying Up Street and Railway Traffic, Disorganizing Business

WINNIPEG Jan. 28.—Lower temperature brought a fierce blizzard from the northeast, the worst of the present winter. The wind is carrying the loose snow at a terrific speed over the open prairie and piling it high against buildings, trees and fences and making the roads impassable. Street and railway traffic is for the time being disorganized and the snow plows are all out trying to keep the main lines clear.

In the city most people are remaining at home and business is more or less suspended.

MOVE BUFFALO TO PEACE RIVER

Colonel Cornwall Has Contract
and Will Turn Them Loose
in North

WINNIPEG, Jan. 28.—Colonel J. K. Cornwall has received the contract for moving buffalo from Wainwright to the Hay River district north of Peace River, according to information received by the Canadian National Railways here. The animals will be taken over the G.N. lines to waterways on the Athabasca River near Fort McMurray, whence they will be taken down the Athabasca River by boat to a point beyond Lake Athabasca. There they will be turned loose to mix with the herd of wood buffalo which ranges in that part of the country. Several thousand head will be moved from Wainwright during the next five years as the herd there is now so large that the annual increase exceeds the grazing possibilities of the park.

LOCAL DEMANDS EXTRAVAGANT

Cost of Government High Owing
to Power of Public Opinion
Says Progressive

WINNIPEG, Jan. 28.—Extravagance of government is due to the demand of the people for service and indicates the power of public opinion, according to Robert Forke, Progressive leader, in an address. There is in Canada a great divergence of interest. The East and the West each has its problems and each locality has its particular demands to make.

The Progressives, according to Mr. Forke, are out for the settlement of freight rates by the Federal Parliament.

No details of the latter's suicidal attempt are disclosed.

NEW YORK, Jan. 28.—George Goulding of Vancouver, a veteran Canadian walker, came second in the two-mile handicap walking event last night, which was won by Charles Eschenbach, who was given 30 seconds.

Goulding made up half the time. His time was just a minute slower than his own world's record for the distance of 13 min. 38.3-5 sec.

Nurmi, the Finnish runner, broke the indoor record for three quarters of a mile, defeating the crack American runners. This is his thirteenth record since his invasion of the United States a few weeks ago.


FIVE LIBERALS TO BE INTRODUCED AT PARLIAMENT OPENING

PRICE OF GASOLINE IS VERY LOW HERE

OTTAWA, Jan. 28.—Five Liberals and one Conservative are to be introduced to the new House of Commons when it opens here. These have all been elected since the close of the last session. The indication given by this list is that the Liberals have not fared badly at the hands of the constituencies of late.

Gasoline is selling at a lower price here today than it has for a very long time. The present price is 21 cents which, with the addition of the three cent tax, brings it to the general public at 24 cents.

Distillate is also low, the present price being 17c without tax, much immigration.

Suggested Regulations for Retailing of Beer Published in Vancouver

VANCOUVER, Jan. 28.—Unless last minute changes are made, the new beer regulations come into force March 15 and will provide the hours of sale to be from 10 a.m. to 11 p.m. every day except Sundays, polling days, Christmas Day, and Good Friday, according to the Vancouver Sun. Other regulations announced as likely by the newspaper include:

The prevention of women employees in places where beer is sold.

That patrons must sit at tables.
That the strength of beer be limited to 4½ per cent.

That no other articles be allowed to be sold on the premises. This would mean that sandwiches, cheese and other usual accompaniment of beer cannot be enjoyed, effectively doing away with the restaurant or dining room licenses.

Premises are to have but one entrance and that directly off the street.

Blinds must be arranged to provide a full view of the premises from the street during closed hours.

It is expected that the first licenses will be issued on March 10 and that beer will be allowed to be on sale by March 15.

URGES GREATER POPULATION ON WESTERN LANDS

Premier of Alberta Says Settling
up Country Will Reduce
Freight Rates

LLOYDMINSTER, Jan. 28.—Speaking at Lloydminster, where he was one of the guests at a banquet given to the prize winners at the international show at Chicago, Premier Greenfield, the farmer premier of Alberta, urged the need of greater population on the lands of the west. He said that in Alberta they had only three to the square mile. He said they could only hope for cheaper freight rates by encouraging closer settlement and increasing the amount of business for the railways to handle. He urged co-operation with the British government and the lending of every possible aid to settlers in getting them located on the land and possibly in making loans to them.

Increased population would be one means of paying off the national debt consequent on the war, the speaker said.

DIPHTHERIA IS RIFE AT NOME

Anti-Toxin Has to be Sent 600
Miles From Fairbanks by
Dog Team

NOME, Jan. 28.—This town is in the throes of a diphtheria epidemic and several deaths have already occurred. There is no supply of anti-toxin here and it has to be sent 600 miles by dog team from Anchorage.

Rushing Medicine

ANCHORAGE, Jan. 28.—With the mercury varying from 30 to 54 below zero, relays of the fastest dog teams will carry 300,000 units of diphtheria antitoxin over 400 miles of rugged terrain from Tenana to the diphtheria quarantined town of Nome. It will be supplemented by 1,100,000 units leaving Seattle Saturday.

United States signal corps have issued a call for dog teams throughout the sub-arctic region and seasoned mushers have responded. Speedy relays will be arranged when the serum reaches Tenana.

Everybody Dreams A Little.

Everybody dreams a little now and then. If we don't dream at night we occasionally have our day dreams. We forget the present and launch ourselves out on the ocean of possibility. Often it is possibility but improbability. That is why it is a dream. It is beyond the realm of hope.

Some people dream of riches. The writer remembers years ago knowing an old couple who during their palmy days had been rather extravagant and who, as a result, had become poor, so poor that they had to live in a single room under rather sordid conditions. They had absolutely no hope for the future but they had dreams and often spoke of what they would do when they became better off. As neither was able to work and legacies were practically out of the question, the dream was a mere phantom thought to them.

So many people dream of a world of ease and comfort where strife will cease, all wants will be supplied, there will be no cold or poverty or want. That is our holiday world but it is not a practical world. There is strife through all nature. Even the atoms we are told are continually pounding against each other. If there is to be a world without strife it will have to be another sphere under different conditions to those which obtain here. Our very life here is possible only through effort.

Everywhere We Hear Of Worse Conditions.

During the last few weeks the alternating snow and sloppy streets has sometimes made Prince Rupert people a little dissatisfied with weather conditions. They did not like having to wear rubbers all the time and rather resented the idea that this was temporarily a gum boot town.

Then comes word from Dawson that the people there are almost frozen out. From the prairies they hear that they have been in the grip of a terrible blizzard. And again we struggle down before the fire or around the radiator and thank our lucky stars that we are not living anywhere except in Prince Rupert.

Fishing Vessels And The Close Season.

The close season ends on the morning of February 16 and it was generally understood that boats would not be able to leave port until that morning. Now word has been received that they may get away earlier and doubtless definite instructions will follow as to just how early they may obtain clearance papers. It takes some of the boats several days to reach the fishing grounds and it would seem as if the date of clearance should vary according to the distance the boats expect to go. At any rate the fishermen will be fully informed. Many of them will be pleased to know that they can commence work a few days earlier than they expected.

Good Service For North This Year.

There will be a good service and keen competition on the northern run this year. Both the C.P.R. and the C.N.R. will be booking passengers to Alaska and they will vie with each other in the matter of service. The public will likely be well cared for either way.

It is probable that many tourists will join the G.N.R. steamers here, go north and then continue on to Vancouver. That will make this a stopping off place. If there was a Canadian National Hotel here, passengers would stop off for a day or two with great benefit to Prince Rupert. That will be one of the next things we shall look for. It ought to be a great thing to the railway to have a hotel at a point such as this.

City of 100,000 Makes Progress Under City Manager in Tennessee; People There Are Pleased with It

There is a growing interest in the manager form of government throughout the continent. New places are adopting it and in almost every case they are pleased with the way in which it works. One of the recent additions to the list is the city of Knoxville, Tennessee, which has had the new system for over a year. The assistant-manager, Carlos C. Campbell, writes to John Dean of Victoria in regard to the work as follows:

Dear Mr. Dean — Your letter of November 30 received.

We feel that no city in America has a better government than Knoxville. We have had the city manager form of government for more than a year and it is very pleasing to notice that the popularity increases month by month. It so happens that the people have had occasion to show their sentiments in regard to the government in five elections. First, when they voted to adopt the manager form of government in preference to the commission form. The manager won the election by an overwhelming majority.

The next test came when the people elected the pledged friends who were put up by the city manager advocates under the title of the People's Ticket.

People Behind It

The third victory came in a recent primary when legislative candidates, who were pledged to protect the manager form of government in the Legislature, defeated unpledged candidates who were generally understood to oppose the present form of government and who would have sought to kill the effect of the charter by amendments.

The fourth test came in the November election when the voters elected by a big majority those pledged candidates.

The fifth stamp of approval was given last week, when the people, by more than ten to one, voted to issue \$2,500,000 waterworks bonds. This is particularly significant in view of the fact that only three years ago, under the old political form of government, the people defeated the same bond issue by more than four to one majority. The new water plant, which was to be provided by the bonds, was needed just as badly then as now. The only difference is the confidence placed in the present business administration.

What They Did

Many things of importance have been accomplished by the present council and city manager. In the first place, we now have an accounting system that is a model for the entire country. The new system gives the daily record on all expenditures and shows each business day the exact financial condition of every municipal department. One of the next accomplishments of the present administration was the establishment of a real health department. Our health department in the past had been largely a matter of theory or name.

Another outstanding accomplishment of the present administration was the purchase of the last available bit of open space in the uptown section for a big city park and civic centre.

Improved Streets

One of the most popular things which has been done is the tremendous amount of street paving and repair work which has been put through. More work has been done in this one year than has ever been done in three or four years previous—and at a lower expenditure than was made in any of the other years. In spite of all these things, the council refunded to the taxpayers 10 per cent of their 1923 tax money. Knoxville is the first city in America to actually refund cash to taxpayers.

The council is now working on a number of important matters for the near future. Among these is a viaduct which has been badly needed for many years; a new city planning and zoning ordinance and additional school facilities.

Were Ashamed

Before we secured the city manager form of government we were somewhat ashamed of our municipal conditions, but we can now lift up our heads and call attention of the whole nation to a government that is second to none.

Under separate cover we are sending you a booklet which will give you information concerning the details of the accounting system which has been installed,

We are also sending you newspaper summary of the first year under the city manager government.

Knoxville has a population of 100,000. Our city council is composed of eleven men. Five of these are elected from the city at large, while the remaining six are elected from the six districts of the city. The tax rate for this year is \$2.10 per \$100 taxable property. The assessment, while supposed to be 100 per cent, is actually about 70 per cent.

We are asking the director of finance to give you full information concerning the bond indebtedness, and the director of public safety to give you information concerning the number and salaries of police and fire department.

GRAPPLE WITH GOD IN HEAVEN

Appeal Against Religion Made by Zinovieff on Behalf of Communists

The Victoria Colonist commenting on a recent tirade against religion by the communists of Russia says:

The recent Christmastide was again seized upon by the Bolsheviks of Russia to give a new impetus to their war against religion. They mobilized the "Youthful Communists" to divert the Christmas celebrations into anti-religious channels, but these were ordered to avoid the crude obscenities which have marked their conduct in the past. M. Zinovieff, who appears to be one of the leaders of the anti-religious war, admits that the campaign has failed hitherto, but he says the Communists are undaunted and issues the following appeal:

We will grapple with the Lord God in due season. We will vanquish Him in His Highest Heaven and wherever He seeks refuge and we will subdue Him for ever. But we must understand that in our backward peasant country, where we are only as yet at the beginning of our work of culture and education, we must be cautious—much, much more cautious than hitherto.

Control Holidays

The Christmas campaign was carried out by the Soviet Press in a species of propaganda in which stress was laid on the impossibility of abolishing deep-rooted popular holidays, and the advice was tendered that the Communists should make efforts to gain control of these and convert them into Communist holidays. There were large quantities of anti-religious agitation literature distributed in the villages of the country and a society of anti-God workers was formed to bring the movement under one central authority. Up-to-date all the efforts of the Communists in this direction have been responsible alone for mere anti-religious hooliganism which has tended to produce the opposite results to those sought. It has had no effect whatever on the peasantry, and there is no longer a cultured class in Russia, as it was necessary that this class should be wiped out prior to the campaign against religion.



COOLIDGE TO

BE THE HEAD

SECOND DIVISION BILLIARD LEAGUE

Will Dictate Policy of State Department in Future, it is Said

WASHINGTON, Jan. 28.—By Canadian Press) — President Coolidge intends to be his own State Department and to dictate the foreign policy of the government himself. That at least is the interpretation generally placed here in the best informed circles on the appointment of Frank B. Kellogg, recently Ambassador to London, to the office of Secretary of State to succeed Charles E. Hughes.

Whether there has been differences between Secretary Hughes and the President is something on which there are differing views. In any event, Mr. Hughes is a person of strong views and with him Secretary of State the President is obliged more or less to defer to those views as to foreign policy. It is well known that he has not at all times been in complete accord with the Hughes program and ideas.

But with Mr. Kellogg, former Senator from Minnesota, in the office, the situation will be different. Mr. Kellogg is an able lawyer. That is conceded. But it is the feeling here that as head of the State Department he will be entirely willing to act as the administrator of the Coolidge policies on international matters. When in the Senate, it is recalled, Mr. Kellogg was generally found doing the will of the republican administration. It is against his nature to be insurgent.

Mr. Kellogg is a hard worker. His record is that of a believer in the League of Nations. He was one of the "mild reservation" element in the Senate when that issue was up. It remains to be seen just what he will do about such matters as a disarmament conference and Russia but that he will defer to the views of Coolidge without resistance is anticipated.

In the selection by Mr. Coolidge of Mr. Kellogg for the State Department and Charles B. Warren of Michigan for attorney-general, the President has made personal selections. Many look on them as forecasting that Mr. Coolidge intends to run again in 1928.

CHURCH UNION IN THIS CITY

Matter Being Discussed a Great Deal by Those Who Attend Places of Worship

PECULIAR SITUATION

An interesting situation may possibly arise in connection with the vote on Church Union being taken here. Those who vote on the question of union are those whose names were on the roll at the time the law uniting the churches was passed last summer. The number on the roll here is about one hundred of whom somewhere about seventy-five or eighty may be available to vote.

The church property is held by trustees for the congregation made up of those on the roll and all others who attend the services, numbering in all three or four hundred persons. Each of these has a right to vote in connection with the disposal of the property or the appointment of trustees. The election takes place at the time of the annual congregational meeting.

Might be Difference

It is possible for such a condition to arise as that the members of the church, whose names are on the roll shall vote against union whereas the congregation as a whole might be in favor of it and dispose of the property accordingly.

It is pointed out that it is hardly likely those on the roll would want to dictate to the whole congregation, especially in view of the fact that much of the income of the church comes from those on the outside and that the building was erected very largely from subscriptions of theirs.

The question is one to be handled with a great deal of tact in order that there may be no split in the congregation and consequent weakening of the church and of its usefulness in the community.

Methodists in Union

The Methodist Church here, it is understood will join the union without taking a vote. They are already in the union unless they vote themselves out. Many of those who attend the Presbyterian Church are not really Presbyterians but go there very largely because they admire the present incumbent and like his preaching. What will happen in case the Church stands out against the popular movement of the day does not seem clear. The general hope seems to be that there will be no clash of opinion but that the work of the church will continue as in the past, whether under union or the

Has so Far Resisted all Attempts at Matchmaking and Marriage not Likely

LONDON, Jan. 28.—Even those people who spoke with forbearance of the matrimonial shyness of the Prince of Wales are now getting uneasy with the announcement that the royal heir will prolong his visit in South Africa next year to include a trip to the Argentine. This can only mean to these Englishmen that another year will be added to the interval until the prince announces he has picked out a girl to be the future queen.

Postponement

And Englishmen have listened to the same tale of postponement for the last five years. Whenever the Prince of Wales remains in London for a long period, the busybodies, working mostly through the newspapers, get up a series of stories intimating that a certain interesting announcement on royal note paper will be forthcoming from Buckingham Palace, and even speculating who the girl is. Such great expectations have never been given a chance to materialize, for the prince has stepped out of the country on a trip to his future domains just in time and the ladies in question have, in most cases, married before his return home.

Now there are not so many eligible for speculation. The Ladies Mary and Rachel Cavendish, Lady Mary Gordon-Lennox and Lady Mary Cambridge, who were all freely discussed as prospective mates for the Prince of Wales, have married. In fact the list of English girls of suitable age is becoming distressingly narrowed, and as most Englishmen have made up their minds that David Edward is not going outside his father's realm for a bride, the prince will probably have to choose his bride from a younger generation.

No Girl Honored

So interested have the public become in this chapter of his life, His Royal Highness can hardly attend house parties or dances without a resounding echo connecting his name with some debutante being heard immediately throughout Mayfair, then down to Southwark and Clapham. Since returning from his last trip the prince has successfully counteracted this gossip by not appearing at dances and house parties. At the present time there is no girl being honored as the prospective Princess of Wales.

There are many people in London now who whisper that the announcement of the engagement of the Prince of Wales will never come and that he is going to be that strange complex, a bachelor king. Some who profess to know even say the prince has often stated he does not want to marry. So far as the outward circumstances show, the betting is on their side.



BUILD AMPHITHEATRE TO WELCOME CHRIST

LONDON, Jan. 28.—In order to wait for the second coming of Christ, 2,000 members of the Order of the Star in the East have built an amphitheatre at Balmoral Beach, near Sydney, Australia, says the Express correspondent. So deep is their belief that this return is imminent, preparations have been made at the cost of \$60,000, raised by enrolling members of the order who subscribed from \$50 to \$500 per seat.

While the order's belief is that Christ will return in human form, it is expected He will arrive at the amphitheatre by walking on the water from South Head, at the entrance to the harbor, to Balmoral.

The amphitheatre will contain a small model of a Greek theatre which will be used for the staging of Greek drama during the waiting period, as even the most confident member of the order will not say just when the second coming is to take place.
