PROGRESSIVE PARTY CRISIS TOMORROW

LARGE NUMBER OF DUTCH SETTLERS ON WAY TO THE QUEEN CHARLOTTE ISLANDS

Chinese Houseboy in Baker Home Tells Same Tale to Police that he Told at Both Previous Inquests

Prosecution on Murder Charge Expected to Proceed When Case is Called Friday; Foolish Rumor Denied

VANCOUVER, May 4.—Crown counsel it is expected will be ready to proceed with the preliminary hearing of the charge against Wong Foon Sing on Friday when it is understood new evidence will be produced by the special investigator, M. B. Jackson, who was appointed by the government to delve into the case.

VANCOUVER, May 4.—Wong Foon Sing in Okalla jail cell Saturday afternoon told his counsel, Harry Senkler, K.C., that he had been kidnapped by masked men, who abducted him in the basement of the Baker home at Shaughnessy Heights on the night of March 20 and had been kept in some place like a disused stable within an hour's motor ride of Vancouver ever since. He had been ill-treated all the time and continuously questioned in regard to the happenings in the Baker home at the time Janet Smith was found dead last July.

NINE DROWNED DREDGE SANK

Cargo Shifted When Water Rushed in at Open Port

SANDESKY, Ohio, May 4.—By the capsizing of a sand dredge steamer at Kelly Island, Point Pelee, Lake Erie, on Saturday, nine members of the crew lost their lives. The boat had almost completed loading when a storm arose. The captain ordered the section hose withdrawn, water immediately rushing through the aperture, filling the hold and causing the cargo to shift. Most of the men were drowned in their sleeping quarters.

A preliminary investigation indicated carelessness on the part of some officer or member of the crew in not closing the open port.

SCREEN STAR IS SMUGGLER

Jewels Were Seized and Five Dollars a Bottle Assessed for Liquor

NEW YORK, May 4.—Customs officials yesterday seized jewels valued approximately at \$50,000 from Pola Negri, motion picture actress, who arrived on the Berengaria. The actress is also charged with an attempt to smuggle sixteen bottles of liquor which was destroyed and the screen star fined five dollars for each one.

FOUR PER CENT BEER ONTARIO

ONTARIO, May 4.—Regulations governing the sale and drinking of 4 1/2 per cent beer in Ontario are laid down by Attorney General Nettle. They strictly provide that refreshment must be served at tables in hotels, restaurants and cafeterias in full view of the public on the streets and in a manner which will preclude "hole in the corner" drinking in any form.

CHASE DOWN RUM VESSELS

Fleet of Over Sixty With Orders to Shoot or After Smugglers

NEW YORK, May 4.—Over sixty vessels, mostly speedy motor craft but including three revenue cutters were mobilized today at Stane Island base in preparation for a new war of extermination against rum row. It is expected they will put to sea tomorrow to wage war against the fleet from New Jersey to Connecticut.

The new police vessels will operate under orders to shoot first and investigate afterwards in case of suspected rum runners.

LOCAL JUDGE IS SUSTAINED

Attorney General Loses Appeal in Interesting Case Involving Constitutional Rights

The Court of Appeal has dismissed the appeal of the attorney general from the order of Judge F. McB. Young quashing the conviction against W. G. Cooper of Morietown. Cooper had been convicted before Magistrate Hoskins of Smithers and sentenced to six months for selling liquor to Indians. An appeal was taken to Judge Young on the ground that a person can only be convicted of selling liquor to Indians under the Indian Act and that the province had no jurisdiction under that act. Judge Young upheld this contention and quashed the conviction. From this decision the attorney general appealed to the court of appeal, which court has now upheld the finding of Judge Young.

The case was an important one in that it involved a constitutional question as to the rights of the province as against the Dominion with regard to Indians. Milton Gonzales was counsel for Cooper and W. D. Carter, deputy attorney general, appeared for the crown.

Large Sum Raised for Renovation of Methodist Church Reported at Annual Congregational Meeting

The sum of two thousand dollars has already been collected as the result of a quiet campaign by the officials of the Methodist Church toward renovating the building both inside and out, and bringing it in line with the other church buildings in the city, according to a report made to the annual general meeting of the congregation by Frank Dibb. It was thought that few street improvements were being made in front of their church was a suitable time to do the reconditioning.

A campaign had been quietly launched and the sum subscribed had reached over two thousand dollars and they had been promised other amounts which he had confidence would bring it up to from \$2,200 to \$2,300. This would be used for re-shingling, exterior painting, interior decorating and other necessary repairs and would perhaps include a motor for the pipe organ. The willing enthusiasm of the donors had greatly impressed Mr. Dibb and his committee consisting of Earl Barrie, Dr. W. T. Keggan, and Messrs. Cornish and Biggart.

Spirit of Confidence
Rev. G. G. Haeker thanked the congregation for the spirit of confidence and optimism. He reviewed the membership of the church for its sixteen years of existence, showing that the active member list was larger today than ever before. In deciding to remain here rather than transfer to the south, Mr. Haeker said there were compensations for Prince Rupert rain. POISONED BY BAD LIQUOR
Three Bodies Found in Lifelike Attitudes Around Table

MINNEAPOLIS, May 4.—The bodies of three men who were apparently killed by poison liquor were found grouped about a dining table at the home of one of the victims late Sunday. The fourth man was found unconscious.

When the police entered the home the trio were found sitting in attitudes of life about a table on which a pint flask was empty except for a thimbleful of colorless liquid. The men probably died Saturday night.

Forke will Submit an Ultimatum to Caucus of Progressives Tomorrow

Not Sufficient Cohesion in Party to Suit Leader and Feeling of Dissatisfaction Created

OTTAWA, May 4.—The Progressive Party is having its troubles. Important developments in the organization and policy in the House of Commons are likely to be the outcome of a caucus to be held by them tomorrow. It is reported that Robert Forke intends to submit to the caucus what practically amounts to an ultimatum. This ultimatum will be that there must be greater cohesion as to the policy of the party or he will resign the leadership and make public his reasons for doing so.

Questioned in regard to the matter, Mr. Forke declined to make any statement. He intimated, however, that he might have an important announcement to make following the caucus.

The fact that seventeen Progressives supported the government on the main budget motion evidently created some feeling among the Progressives.

CAUCUS CENTRE OF ATTRACTION

All Eyes on Progressives Until After Tomorrow: Something Slipped in Recent Vote

OTTAWA, May 4.—Something evidently slipped in connection with the vote on the budget last week. Conservatives had been relying on information given them by the Tory members of the Progressive Party that they would all vote against the Government and secure an appeal to the country. That is why they were confident there was going to be an election. Today all their confidence is gone and if the effort to unify the Progressive Party tomorrow night fails, their fond hopes will have been dashed.

Liberal leaders apparently knew that they could count on a sufficient following to give them a majority and they were not disappointed. Seventeen refused to obey the crack of the Progressive whip and asserted their independence by voting with the Government.

To-morrow the Progressive caucus will be the centre of attraction. On it will depend to a large extent the future of the party led by Robert Forke, which has held the balance of power since the last election.

OTTAWA TEAM WAS BEATEN

Champion Basketballers Say Two of Men Injured at Kamloops and go Home

EDMONTON, May 4.—The Ottawa Rideaus, basketball champions of Canada, claiming two of their players were injured in Saturday's game at Kamloops, were defeated by the home team here by 34 to 16. They cancelled the game scheduled here tonight and will return direct to Ottawa, calling off all further games en route.

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Pelagic Sealing Treaty Discussed.

The Vancouver Star discussing the sealing treaty urges that it be continued. Apparently Vancouver does not expect to benefit from the sealing business and the waters adjacent to Vancouver are not depleted by the seal herds. The seals pass outside of Vancouver Island, but here most of them travel north between Queen Charlotte Islands and Prince Rupert and they live on fish as they travel.

In the neighborhood of Rivers Inlet the Department of Marine expends a lot of money in killing off the sea lions. The fur seals are very similar in habits to the sea lions. They all eat fish and as they pass they take thousands of food fishes, thus helping to deplete the stock. But we protect them and ask that the number be increased.

If the sealing treaty is to be continued, Prince Rupert should demand a share of the pelts. While Victoria was once the sealing centre and may even yet take part in the business, it is Prince Rupert that would benefit from the open season. Then Prince Rupert should get part, at least, of that fifteen per cent that is paid over to the Dominion. Either open sealing or a share of the proceeds should be our demand from the Dominion government.

Japanese Immigration.

Canada has a gentleman's agreement with Japan in regard to admission of their nationals to this country. An understanding was reached that not more than 150 were to come here each year. Now it is claimed that the agreement has been broken and that last year 510 came to Canada, no fewer than 358 claiming to be wives or children of Japanese already here.

The only plan, if the agreement is to be continued, is for the British consul at Tokio or Yokohama to vise the passports and to refuse any beyond the stated number allowed to come.

Canada must control her own immigrants and must speak very plainly to any country that would force her people on us if not wanted. The Japanese are a wonderful people but they can best develop in their own country, under their own laws. They have many virtues and perhaps are better people than ourselves. In many respects they certainly excel over those of the white race, but that is no reason why a race problem should be thrust upon this country.

Who Will Do Work At Salt Lake?

Who is going to put in a dock at the salt lake to accommodate the visitors to that resort this summer? The swimming club seems to have failed to raise the necessary enthusiasm to get the work going and in the meantime the good weather is about due and the dock will be needed. Something should surely be done before long. The difficulty is to find anyone sufficiently interested to carry it on.

CROP REPORTS ARE EXCELLENT SO FAR

Rains Delayed Seeding in Some Districts but is in Progress Now

The crop report of the Bank of Montreal says that seeding in the prairie provinces as started earlier than usual and the seed bed was generally in excellent condition. In the Calgary district nearly fifty per cent of the seeding had been done and the moisture was ample. Rains delayed seeding in the Lethbridge district. In the irrigated districts in the south six thousand acres is ready for sowing sugar beets.

The country around Regina was delayed slightly by cold showery weather but seeding is now well under way under excellent conditions. Spring plowing is well advanced and there is only a slight decrease in the wheat acreage.

In the Winnipeg district wheat seeding is well under way and the acreage is about the same as last year in spite of the bad weather in the fall which hindered preparation of the land.

"I can't believe it is true," said Allan as he went to work with "America's Sweetheart."

WHITE SISTER TALE OF LOVE

Story of Self-Sacrifice Showing Eruption of Mount Vesuvius

Angela Chairmonte is the youngest daughter of an Italian prince. She is in love with Giovanni Severi and because of this love, her older sister, the Marchesa, is jealous of her. During a storm, Angela's father is killed and because of the machinations of her sister, Angela finds herself penniless, homeless, an outcast. She only has the love of Giovanni to sustain her. For a time she is happy, but Giovanni is suddenly called to military duty and sent to Africa where he is head of a small expedition sent there to fight the Arabs. NOT MUCH GRAIN IS LEFT IN STORAGE

WINNIPEG, May 4.—Grain loadings for the week ending April 30 at country elevators along the C.N. lines amounted to 915 cars containing 4,744,000 bushels, thus reducing the amount in store to 3,487,000 bushels and bringing the season's loadings up to 84,543 cars with 144,309,000 bushels.

Saskatchewan is leading provincial loadings with 595,000 bushels leaving in store in that province 1,455,000 bushels. Alberta loaded 363,000 bushels and now has in store 1,276,000 bushels. April 29 saw a total of 3,876 cars of grain arrived at Vancouver since August 1 from points on the Canadian National Railways.
