# AIRPLANES OFF FOR NORTH POLE FLIGHT

## RELATIONS WITH JAPAN DISCUSSED BY PROFESSOR SHORTT AT LUNCHEON

### Two Amundsen Airplanes Hopped off Yesterday on Flight to Try to Reach the North Pole by Air

NEW YORK, May 22.—Two airplanes belonging to the Roald Amundsen North Pole expedition, hopped off late yesterday from Kings Bay, Spitzbergen Island, in an attempt to reach the pole and return in a quick dash.

As the planes are not equipped with wireless apparatus no information as to the result of the flight will be available until the party lands at some point where communication with the rest of the world is available.

Spitzbergen is directly north of the Scandinavian peninsula.

### NOT MURDER MAN INSANE

### GEORGE BUSHBY IS NOMINATED

Payette of Kamloops Who Crushed His Wife's Skull Is Acquitted

**WILL GO TO ASYLUM**

KAMLOOPS, May 22.—Payette, the man charged with the murder of his wife at Nootch Hill a year ago, was acquitted by the jury yesterday after an hour's deliberation, on the ground that he was suffering from alcoholism.

Payette will be held in prison to await his commitment to the asylum for the insane.

In a previous trial the man was sentenced to be hanged but upon appeal a retrial was ordered. Evidence showed that he crushed his wife's skull with a heavy poker and had been habitually a heavy drinker all his life.

### NOTED GENERAL OBEYS COMMAND

Earl of Ypres, Formerly Lord French, Died This Afternoon in England

DEAL, England, May 22.—Earl of Ypres, formerly Field Marshal Viscount French, died this afternoon, aged 73 years.

Lord French was commander of the British forces in France and Flanders for 16 months until December 1915. He was then made commander-in-chief of the armies of the United Kingdom until he was made Lord Lieutenant of Ireland in May 1918. An attempt was then made to assassinate him but he escaped uninjured.

### PROSPECTORS FOR STIKINE

Fourth Boat for Gold Country Left Yesterday for Wrangell

WRANGELL, May 22.—The fourth boat to carry prospectors and freight up the Stikine to Telegraph Creek left Wrangell yesterday. The three boats which left on May 10 have returned.

Several hundred tons of freight stored here will be shipped up the river before the end of the week.

S. J. Nixon of Anyox was a passenger going south on the Prince George last night. He is on his way to Montreal where he will board the Aurania on May 29 for Liverpool.

### ONLY AWAITING CLEAR WEATHER

Aerial Prospecting Expedition Will Probably Leave Here Early Next Week

A clearing up of weather conditions between here and the Stikine River is all that is now awaited before the take-off is made for Telegraph Creek today announced Archibald Little, Detroit mining engineer, who will go north from here aboard the Vickers Viking flying boat piloted by Col. J. Scott Williams of Montreal on a prospecting expedition to the Cassiar district. Reports received are to the effect that the ice is practically out of the Stikine River. The plane itself is already for the air. It is probable that the expedition will depart early next week.

### ACCIDENTAL DEATH VANCOUVER HARBOR

Coroner's Jury So Declares in Connection with Body of John Smith of Campbell River

VANCOUVER, May 22.—The coroner's jury declared the body taken from the inlet Sunday to be that of John Smith, a Campbell river farmer and miner, who disappeared from the steamer Charmer on March 12. It was found that he came to his death by accident from falling from the deck of the steamer and hitting a projection before striking the water, thus causing the fracture of his skull.

### OFFICIAL FIGURES ON HOSPITAL DONATIONS

S. K. Campbell, president of the hospital board, states that the official total of receipts for the children's ward at the hospital is \$2,075.10 and there are a few promised subscriptions that have not yet been received.

### BIG BOOM OF LOGS ARRIVE


Cape Scott Came in Yesterday With One of Largest Tows Ever to Enter Harbor

Bringing in one of the largest tows ever to arrive in this harbor, the Beaufort Straits Towing Co.'s tug Cape Scott, Capt. F. J. Brown, came in yesterday afternoon in front of a flat boom of 16 sections of logs or roughly two million feet from the Abbotsford Logging Co.'s camp at Alice Arm for the Prince Rupert Spruce Mill.

The boom, which consisted mostly of spruce with a small quantity of hemlock, took several hours to handle in the harbor but the logs were finally safely delivered at Seal Cove. The Cape Scott then returned north to Alice Arm to bring down another boom for the local mill.

### Floods at Prince George Drive Residents From Homes: Children Enjoy Riding on Rafts in Streets

PRINCE GEORGE, May 22.—From 11 a.m. Wednesday to 2 p.m. yesterday the water had risen seven inches in the flooded section of the city. Water covers an area of about half a mile square from the G.N. grade on the north to the hills on the south and from about 200 yards east of George Street to the hills on the east. A number of the residents of this district have had to move to higher ground and if the water rises a much during the next twenty-four hours as it has in the past a much larger number will be compelled to move.

The Connaught Hotel on Second Avenue east of George Street being built in a rather low spot is practically surrounded by water which is within a few inches of the basement windows on the west side of the hotel.

The kiddies of this city are having the time of their young lives riding on rafts and even some of the adults seem to be taking their turns at it. Yesterday afternoon it was a common sight no matter which way you looked in the flooded district, to see from one to four kiddies in bathing suits riding on rafts and swimming to and from them. The board sidewalk is afloat and tied to stakes driven in the ground. The water runs from a depth of about a foot to four or five feet in the low spots. The water on both sides of the G.N. grade now is at the same level and flood conditions now depend entirely on the rising of the rivers.

### FIRES CHECKED NEW BRUNSWICK

Welcome Rain Came Last Night and Aided Fire Fighters: Timber Destroyed

GICHIBUCTO, May 22.—Forest fires starting near here Wednesday are practically under control this morning following heavy rain last night. The flames swept through the hardwood forests causing the loss of hundreds of thousands of dollars worth of timber besides the destruction of four homesteads and outbuildings.

### BUSH FIRE IS NEAR HUTTON

PRINCE GEORGE, May 22.—A big bush fire is reported burning along the right of way of the C.N. about one mile east of Hutton. No. 3 westbound passenger train was held up at this point for some time last night on this account. All wire communication east were interrupted also. Further details of the fire are not yet to hand.

### Granby Company Commences to Develop Zinc Property McGrath Mountain, Alice Arm, This Week

ALICE ARM, May 22.—The Granby Company began active operations here this week looking toward the development of their McGrath Mountain property. The first work consists of constructing a pack trail suitable for pack horses from the end of the present trail to the Standard Group. As soon as this trail is completed supplies will be freighted in and actual development work will begin.

The first work on the property will consist of trenching and stripping in order to get a line on the ore bodies, preparatory to diamond drilling later.

The Standard Group of claims lies about two miles from tide water on the south slope of the McGrath mountain. It was bounded from Miles Donald and associates early in the year. The predominant mineral is zinc with gold and silver values.

Earle Anderson of the Granby Mine staff will be in charge of operations.

### Japanese Steamship Map Shows Line from Yokohama to This Port

Professor Shortt urges cultivation of friendship with Island Empire and courteous treatment

That there is hanging in the offices of the Nippon Yusen Kaisha, Japan's greatest steamship company, a large map on which a dotted line shows a projected steamship line to Prince Rupert, was mentioned at the Rotary Club luncheon yesterday by Professor Shortt of the Anglican Theological College at Vancouver. This company is the largest in Japan and is backed by the Japanese Government. It is the company that is sending the Yokohama Maru here on a trial trip at the end of September.

Professor Shortt, who is here substituting for Archdeacon

Rix, who is administering the diocese of Caledonia until a Bishop is appointed, spent eighteen years in Japan. He said that Japan was not concerned with having her people come here. She did not want them to come. She had her eye on this port, however, in the way of trade and had planned a steamship line here at least ten years ago.

The shortest route to Liverpool from Japan by way of the Pacific was through this port and the Professor said he had often, when in Japan, thought to see this port grow into importance. He could not see that it could be otherwise than one of the great world ports on one of the great trade routes.

Discussing the attitude of Canada toward Japan, the Professor suggested that people here knew very little of Japan and her people. "Japan is a great empire and is prejudiced in favor of the British at present," he said. This was a time, he thought, to cultivate the friendship of Japan. The immigration problem was not a serious one and the country might become a great asset if looked on rightly and treated rightly.

When Ambassador Paige held office representing the United States in Britain he urged upon his government the desirability of being courteous to the British people. So the Professor urged that it would be the part of wisdom to treat the Japanese wisely and well. He urged people here to read as much as possible about that country and visit it if convenient.

**CHINESE REMANDED ON MURDER CHARGE RESULT OF SHOOTING**  
Coroner's Jury Brings in Finding that Two Should be Committed

NEW WESTMINSTER, May 22.—The coroner's jury at the inquest on the body of the Chinese who were slain at McNaught's mill camp at Port Moody Tuesday night found that Mack Dip shot Fred Lambert and then shot himself. They also found that as a result of evidence submitted Sue Fee and Ching San Young should be committed on murder charges in connection with the shooting.

**BIG TORNADO IN COLORADO**  
Three People Killed and Many Injured From Severe Wind Storm

DENVER, May 22.—A trail of debris 75 miles long remains in northeastern Colorado today following a heavy windstorm which tore through a dozen villages and the intervening country yesterday killing three persons and severely injuring a number of others and causing thousands of dollars in damage. The gale lasted an hour and during its height reached tornado proportions.

### Swift Retribution For Drug Addicts.

"If you start to slide from the top of a steep roof you know how much chance you have of stopping." That's what a learned doctor says, when trying to describe the swift downward course of the drug addict.

It is useless to talk to a person that takes drugs or to try to persuade him that he is foolish. He probably knows it but he is sliding and nothing but a miracle can stop him.

This is written to warn youths and young girls of the danger of playing with anything so dangerous. A sniff of "snow" or a stab with a hypodermic needle is often sufficient to start a person on the fatal slide.

### Cultivate Friendship Of Japanese People.

Professor Shortt, speaking to the members of the Rotary Club, urged cultivation of the friendship of the Japanese people. He pointed out that we might benefit very greatly from this friendship and suggested that the immigration problem was not serious because Japan did not wish to send her people to Canada. What he suggested was that we avoid "pin pricks."

We are expecting a big Japanese vessel here in the early autumn, which may be the beginning of a line of steamers coming out of this port. We want those steamships to come here. In order to encourage them we should cultivate the friendship of Japan. That is sound sense and good business. Every merchant tries to cultivate the good will of his patrons.

### Annexation Bogey Is Being Discussed.

The annexation bogey is still being discussed by the newspapers of Canada. Under the caption "Shall we Lose the West?" the Ottawa Citizen says:

When Mr. Hoey, M.P., made dark allusions to the West preceding, the editorial writers of the East fell upon him with wordy bludgeons and said he was a lunatic and a dangerous agitator. Those who talked with the western representatives who came to Ottawa last week to urge the completion of the Hudson Bay Railway must have been disturbed to discover that some respectable and intelligent fellow westerners of Mr. Hoey's, if not subscribing unreservedly to the latter's views, at least freely admitted that there was more than talk in it. Canadian-born prairie citizens were frank in their declaration that if the East did not come to a realization of the facts in the West, secession was a possible eventuality.

The idea is gaining currency elsewhere. The possibility of the prairie provinces leaving the Confederation is referred to in an article in the April 'Nineteenth Century' by T. Kerr Ritchie, an English writer, who toured Canada in 1924. Now comes Dr. G. E. Lloyd, Anglican Bishop of Saskatchewan, who in a featured article in Lord Beaverbrook's 'Sunday Express' writes:

"It is because I fear the eventual loss of these three great provinces—Saskatchewan, Alberta and Manitoba—that I have come to England . . . Unless we do something quickly and largely, in ten years' time we shall have lost a large part of the Dominion of Canada."

"Mr. Hoey fears the loss of the western provinces for economic reasons. Bishop Lloyd's apprehensions are based on racial grounds." He believes that unless Britons come to Canada and farm the inflow of people from other lands, including the United States, will lead to foreign domination and the ultimate annexation. But both see the same culmination to events now shaping themselves.

The situation thus presented is anything but reassuring. The apprehensions may be groundless and the talk mostly talk, but as indicating trends of thought and development in Canada the utterances referred to are of the greatest significance."

### An Edmonton Paper Gives Opinion.

An editorial article entitled "Annexation and the West" appears in an Edmonton paper as follows:

"An interview appears in the London Sunday Express with Bishop Lloyd of Saskatchewan, in which he declares that there is the utmost danger of the prairie provinces seceding from the Dominion. The rest of Canada is quite sound, he is reported to have said, but Saskatchewan, Manitoba, and Alberta, 'will be gradually lost by the inevitable trend towards the United States. In fifteen or twenty years they'll be big enough and strong

enough to go their own way by themselves by the power of their own will and their own vote."

"These statements are bound to cause much alarm in the Old Country, particularly as they come at a time when secession from the Empire is being so openly preached in South Africa. Our interests there must suffer accordingly. While the bishop is entitled to his opinions, they are those of very few western Canadians and the evidence that can be adduced in support of them is exceedingly slight. It is to be feared that he has allowed his judgment to be clouded by the intensity of his desire to promote immigration from the British Isles, which he regards as essential to the maintenance of the West as a British country.

"We need this in large volume, but, whether it comes or not, there is little basis for the belief to which he has given such untimely expression. Annexation sentiment has been strong at different times in other parts of the Dominion, but at no stage has it been a factor to reckon with in the West. If it had any strength here, we should certainly have heard something of it during the past few years, which have been of a character to encourage agitation for political changes which there was any chance of bringing about."

### GOSSIP ABOUT LONDON PEOPLE

#### Engagement Announcement Held Back; Covering up Shingles; Foot of Lipstick

LONDON, Eng., May 22.—(By Canadian Press)—Here is a charming story that has been going around London this week and it is vouchcd for by no less a person than Prince Henry himself.

About a month ago he was asking his royal father and mother when his engagement to a certain Lady Mary Scott could be officially announced, and they told him he would have to wait until the season was over. And this was where they showed a delicious piece of royal tact and thoughtfulness.

Because with Wales a thousand miles away, Prince George going to the China Seas, and the Duke of York back in London with his Duchess, there would be no Prince Charming for debts to dream of—if Henry had his way. Official engagements knock the bottom out of dreams like that, so Henry, to all intents and purposes an unattached young man, has got to play the social game just about as hard as he can, and his friends say that he won't find it very difficult.

#### Queen's Notebooks

And whilst on the subject of Royalty and their ways, Queen Mary has adopted a new style in her private notebook. When Mrs. Burner-Wheatley who was formerly a Maid of Honour to the Queen before she married Burner-Wheatley, of New York, some years ago, sent her some flowers the other day, the Queen replied on some handsome, ragged-edged paper that bore in one corner an etching of the Queen's favorite corner of the Palace Gardens.





## CROP CONDITIONS FAVORABLE SO FAR

### Northern and Central Alberta Outlook is Very Good Says Report

That wheat seeding is practically completed over the central and northern section of the province at the end of the present week is the information conveyed in the first of the season's series of monthly crop reports compiled on the information secured from its country correspondents says the Edmonton Journal. As a result of a questionnaire sent out to points throughout this area information as to the progress made with spring work in approximately 100 districts is made available.

### Ground in Fine Shape

These reports indicate, without exception, that conditions at the present time are more favorable than they have been at this season for a number of years, and as far as they can be predicted at this time, prospects are exceptionally bright for the 1925 crop. Moisture in every instance is abundant and the seed bed is in splendid shape.

### Acreage Increased

That there will be a considerably increased acreage sown in this part of the province this spring is evident, the estimated increase running from five per cent. in some districts to as high as 25 or 30 per cent. in others. This increase, it is pointed out, has been reduced in some instances by the lateness of the spring. Another factor which has retarded seeding in many cases is the fact that a comparatively small percentage of land for the 1925 crop was plowed last fall. This, unfortunately has resulted in a larger than usual acreage being "stubbed in," a situation which will cause little difficulty if the present ample supply of moisture in the ground is supplemented by sufficient rainfall in June.

The plant represents an investment of over \$2,500,000 and is the largest of its kind in the Province.

## RUPERT MEN ANYOX SMOKER


Jimmie Mitchell Presided and Eddie Criggs Gave Exhibition With Mitts
