EXTENSIVE CANNERY ADDITIONS IN DISTRICT NEGOTIATIONS GOING FORWARD FOR SALE OF PREMIER MINE TO SELUKWE

Offer Made for Premier Mine by Selukwe Company, Controllers of B.C. Silver, Causes a Flurry

English Concern Which Controls the Adjoining Property Trying to Buy and Unite Interests

VICTORIA, April 8.—Financial circles are excited by a report here that the Selukwe Mining Company of London, England, have made an offer for the purchase of the Premier Mine of B.C. Silver. The figure coupled with the rumored offer is \$1,000,000.

The Selukwe Mining Company owns a 62 per cent interest in the B.C. Silver, which adjoins the Premier on the southeast. The rest of the B.C. Silver stock is owned about 33 per cent by the Premier Company and the remainder by casual owners.

At one time an offer of a million and a half dollars was made by the Premier and the B.C. Silver and refused.

Recently it was reported that the B.C. Silver had struck the Premier vein and that added immensely to the value of the property. The Premier is said to have from forty to fifty million dollars worth of ore yet in sight.

The two properties go together naturally, both the tramline and concentrator of the Premier being suitable for working the B.C. Silver.

TAKE PHOTOS FROM AIR AT STEWART SOON

Work to be Carried Out This Summer by Royal Canadian Air Force

OTTAWA, April 8.—Some photographic work is to be carried on this season at Stewart by the Royal Canadian Air Force in conjunction with the topographical surveys branch of the department of the interior.

Owing to the Portland canal mining developments and the agitation to make Stewart the terminus of a transcontinental railway system, tapping the Peace River district and the Groundhog coal country, the photographs will prove of great interest, especially in settling a controversy as to whether it is possible to build a railway from the Bear River valley to the Na-panner waters.

Port Edward Cannery to be Much Enlarged; to Pack 100,000 Cases

The Pacific American Fisheries of Bellingham, which recently purchased the Port Edward cannery formerly owned by the R. V. Winch interests of Vancouver, plans a program of extension work which will make that cannery one of the largest producers in this district. The objective of the company is said to be a pack of over 100,000 cases per season. The cannery is to be extended some 200 feet, this work necessitating considerable wharf extension as well.

Archie Shiels, vice-president of the Pacific American Fisheries, and other officials of the company, are expected at Port Edward from the south at the end of this week.

Lady Listens to Concert From C.N.R. Station at Hotel Fort Garry

WINNIPEG, April 8.—A new long-distance record for broadcasting of the voice and music from Winnipeg is announced in a letter received today by station CNRW, the Canadian National Railways station in the Fort Garry Hotel here. On the special anniversary broadcast from this station on March 26 last, part of the program was received clearly in Glasgow, Scotland, according to a letter from a Winnipeg man who quotes his sister, a resident in Glasgow.

Her letter states: "We had a good lecture on the wireless last night, March 26, by a CNR man. He took us from Quebec to Vancouver and we heard the music at the Fort Garry Hotel, Winnipeg. It was very interesting and wonderful how they get all the different sounds up. All aboard and bells ringing at Winnipeg station." The Winnipeg correspondent, J. W. Blackstock, adds "they and their friends evidently enjoyed the broadcasting."

SUSTAIN PRICE HALIBUT TODAY

TIMBER DEAL AT VANCOUVER

Campbell River Company Purchases Mill and Standing Vancouver Island Fir

VANCOUVER, April 8.—More than 35,000 acres of timber land with a stand of over two billion feet of timber, a sawmill with a capacity of 50,000 feet of lumber a day, three large tugs and other equipment are involved in the purchased holdings of the James Logging Company of Vancouver by the Campbell River Company of White Rock at a price thought to be over \$5,000,000.

The holdings which have been acquired by the Campbell River Company include the Empire Lumber Company's timber on Vancouver Island, which has at least 85 per cent first growth fir.

VICTORIA, April 8.—There has been no disposal of one acre of the Empire Timber Company's property to anyone," George Boulton, manager of the Empire concern stated last night, referring to a reported purchase by the Campbell River Company. No timber limits have changed hands but it is stated that control of the James Company is secured through the purchase of stock held by four shareholders

Fairbanks Replaces Prosperity Alaska Prince Rupert Service Carrying Palladium Ore to Port

Replacing the Prosperity in the carrying of palladium concentrate ore between Salt Chuck Mine, Alaska, and Prince Rupert, the new motorship Fairbanks, Capt. Macdonald, arrived in port this morning on her maiden trip and is discharging at the G.T.P. wharf 32 tons of concentrates for transhipment East over the Canadian National Railways to Irvington smelter, New Jersey.

The Fairbanks is a neat little vessel of 37 tons net and is capable of making better time than the Prosperity. She was built in Seattle and is a brand-new boat for the past year or so, new boat. She is powered with a will, it is understood, now go Fairbanks-Morse diesel engine.

The Prosperity, which has the Fairbanks will make regular shipments of this ore here in this service.

Victoria Backing Abrogation Of Treaty.

Victoria is backing the abrogation of the sealing treaty, the agitation for which was commenced by this paper. Both the chamber of commerce and the city council of that city passed resolutions which will be forwarded to Ottawa asking that the statutory notice be sent to United States, Japan and Russia that one year from December next the pact will end and that from that time on sealing will be carried on in the open seas.

Prince Rupert fishermen have not been doing very well this year in the matter of prices and some of the smaller vessels find it difficult to pay expenses. Some of these, it is understood, would like to go out after seals. There is no reason why they should not do so, except that a treaty with the United States, Russia and Japan makes it illegal. This treaty can now be abrogated without breaking faith with anyone and Prince Rupert would be well advised to line up with the other coast cities in asking that it be done.

Capital Levy In France Proposed.

Just what is meant by the proposed French capital levy is not yet made clear, nor is it clear how the law is to be enforced. What is clear is that France owes huge sums of money and that her taxation on her people is not as heavy as ours. In other words we carry the burden and she enjoys the benefits. Without forgetting the sufferings of that country as a result of the war, it must be insisted upon that the financial burden be equally distributed. Taxation in Great Britain is tremendously heavy and even here in Canada it is heavy enough.

If France wishes to raise the money by a special levy, that is her business. The experiment will be watched with great interest.

Is Not Exactly A New Scheme.

There was a time many years ago when, if the King needed money for wars or other purposes, he called upon rich people of the country to make contributions. This they did voluntarily although not with good will. They knew it would pay to be generous. That was a species of capital levy, which was displaced later by a system of taxation. Now we shall all watch with interest this latest move of the French government. It may never go into effect as there is a possibility of the government going down and being replaced by another.

Religion Plays Part In Politics.

In France religion is a powerful factor in politics. The people of France are largely Roman Catholic but a great many do not conform to the tenets of that or any other faith and there is a more or less continuous political conflict between the two. The present government is not sympathetic to the Church and that is partly responsible for the present unrest. Add to that now the additional unrest caused by the proposed capital levy and there is bound to be a cauldron of emotions, seething politically and liable to cause a political explosion at any moment. A change of government may be looked for in France before very long. Religion and finance are always powerful factors in political life.

Welcome Cow Bay Back To Life.

Cow Bay has always been a civic political factor until at the last election it looked as if the controversy over that malodorous part of the city had been decently interred. However, the corpse seems likely to be revived and we welcome it back to life. We see in it a great future as a centre of strife. What could we do without it? We were casting about us, wondering what there was that could be trotted out for public inspection and to be used as a subject of public oratory. The situation is saved. Cow Bay breathes again, politically.

EDITORIAL WRITER MAKES COMPARISONS OF SHOCKING THINGS**Speaks of Killing Children in Far North and Other Killings Sanctioned Here**

(R.B.D. in Victoria Colonist)

Organized and civilized society must have been terribly shocked when it read that story about the doings of certain aboriginal tribes in the frigid North. Those pagans, or sun worshippers, or whatever they may be from a theological point of view, kill off their girl babies as soon as they are born. Boy babies are not treated so harshly, it seems. Boy babies are likely to prove more useful, probably are considered more capable of fending for themselves. Therefore they are permitted to live and take their chances in the battle which is constantly waged against the elements and the conditions up there.

At the same time we read a day or two ago another story which did not originate in the far or the frigid North. It was a story about a meeting of a society of learned men and wise women, and that meeting took place in one of the centres of modern civilization. The members of that learned society discussed the delicate question of birth control. Learned and wise women took as prominent a part as learned and advanced men in that discussion. They proposed to avert wars and famines and all the ills that beset humanity by killing babies, boys and girls alike, before they were born instead of after they were born. Now, as the fool said, what is the difference between the theories of highly civilized society and the conduct of the benighted barbarians of the frigid North?

Another thing: We observed that the meeting of the highly civilized society which discussed the question of birth control was attended by some clergymen, who took a prominent part, in the discussions. How can those reverend gentlemen reconcile their eugenics theories with the doctrines of the church respecting the soul which is a part of the enowment of every human being, and is possessed of the principle of everlasting life? If those ladies and gentlemen were not very learned and very far advanced we might say of them that "fools rush in where angels fear to tread."

MANY BRITISH**Out of 327 at Winnipeg Yesterday 147 Are From Great Britain and Ireland**

WINNIPEG, April 8.—One of

the finest bodies of new settlers to arrive in Western Canada in many years reached Winnipeg yesterday morning on a special Canadian National train which brought them from the S.S. Ausonia, from which they had landed at Halifax on April 4. Of the total of 327 in the party 147 were British and 82 Hungarians, the latter coming to Canada under the scheme of Dr. Aladar de Gedeon who is planning an extensive settlement of his countrymen at points along Canadian National lines near Indianhead, Saskatchewan.

The party arriving this morning comprised the following nationalities: British 147 (1 Irish, 3 Scotch, 143 English); Hungarians 82, Czechoslovak 42, Jugoslavs 30, Roumanians 5, Norwegians 4, Swiss 4, Russians 3, Poles 3, Greeks 2, Danes 2, Swedes 1, Bulgarians 1, Finn 1. In the party were included 22 boys and two families for the Church of England Hostel at Winnipeg.

By provinces the party will be distributed as follows: British Columbia 20; Alberta 43; Saskatchewan 66; Manitoba 198.

LA FOLLETTE LONGEST SPEECH ON RECORD IN UNITED STATES SENATE

Spoke for Over Eighteen Hours in 1908: Vice-President Against Marathon Talking

WASHINGTON, April 8—Vice-President Dawes' spectacular attack on one-man marathon talking events in the senate, and the more recent eight-hour speech of Senator Copeland of New York against the Isle of Pines treaty, has led capital attachés to dig up noted instances of lengthy senatorial addresses.

The unofficial record is held by Senator La Follette of Wisconsin. Speaking on a currency measure, on May 29, 1908, he held the floor for 48 hours and 20 minutes.

A 15-hour speech is credited to Senator Falkner of West Virginia, on January 16, 1891, when the Force bill was under discussion. Senator Allen of Nebraska on October 11-12, 1893, engaged the attention of the Senate for 14 hours on the repeal of the silver bill; and a similar period was consumed by Senator Carter of Montana on March 2-3, 1904, while discussing a rivers and harbors measure. Senator Jones, Republican, Washington, made a 13-hour and 35 minute speech on February 8-10, 1915, during consideration of the ship purchase bill; Senator Burton of Ohio spoke for 12 hours and 10 minutes on a rivers and harbors bill on September 18-19, 1914; and Senator Smoot of Utah is credited with a speech extending 11 hours and 35 minutes on July 22, 1913, when the Underwood tariff measure was under debate.

The chamber at the other end of the capitol can lay claim to no such prolonged oratorical efforts. House rules preclude any lengthy address by one man, the longest being two or two and a half hours, when the chairman of a committee, in charge of a major bill, is explaining its provisions.

TALE OF EXILE LONELY ISLAND

Missionary at Tristan da Cunha Cannot Even Get Mail Once a Year

NO WHITES THERE

CAPETOWN, April 8. — (By Canadian Press). — A strange tale of exile on the lonely isle of Tristan da Cunha, which lies almost directly in the middle of the Atlantic, between South Africa and South America, was told by Rev. Martyn Rogers when he arrived here recently on his way to England.

In 1921 Mr. Rogers took his young wife out to the lonely Tristan da Cunha for his three years' mission, and how, after working as doctor, missionary and school teacher in the world's most isolated community—Tristan da Cunha is almost two thousand miles from the nearest steamer lane, and almost as much from Cape Town—he is going back with his wife and a two-year-old son, Edward, who is the first white child ever to be born on the island.

For two years there had been no mailboats at Tristan, when the Ramon de Larranaga steamed up recently. It was by the merest chance that Mr. Rogers was able to leave.

Health Suffered

"To be back in the city is a queer business," said Mr. Rogers, "I feel almost as though I had been on a trip to the moon. Towards the end of our stay on the island there was such food shortage that my health suffered, and my wife and child were beginning to feel the hardship. The island potato crop failed. Cattle died. We drank tea only a few times a week."

"But I do not regret one moment of the time we spent there," he said. "There was so much to do. My wife and I were busy in school—our pupils' ages ranged from 4 to 40—every day there were four services to hold on Sunday. Often we had to attend serious accidents, and the medicine chest was always open. I had my troupe of Boy Scouts to train, and my wife taught domestic and religious subjects to the women and girls of the island."

"The greatest hardship of life on Tristan is the length of time which passes between visits from the outside world. Weeks are spent in vain longing for ships which never come. The islanders ask for but one mail a year.

Sail Ho!

It was just after daybreak on February 4, when someone shouted "Sail-ho." Instantly there was a move everywhere. Women left their kitchens and ran to catch fowls, geese, and other livestock for bartering purposes. The men dashed across the beach and launched their canvas boats.

Captain Jones, the master of the Laranganai, offered us a passage.

We visited a few sick people held our farewell church service, and married two couples. At the service the sounds of sobbing could be heard above the joyous strains of the wedding hymns. I shall never forget the scene.

"On the beach some of the women clung to my wife as though they could not bear to part with her; but the steamers' siren blew, and as we went
