SALE OF 4.4 PERCENT BEER STARTS WITHOUT EXCITEMENT IN ONTARIO

Joint Commission May Control Salmon Fishing Fraser and Naas Rivers

WASHINGTON, May 21.—The treaty between Canada and the United States dealing with the control of commercial fishing on the Pacific coast with special reference to salmon fishing is expected to result from a conference to be held in Seattle in June when Canadian officials will confer with United States representatives in an endeavor to agree on a joint commission to deal with this matter. Commissioner O'Mally of the fisheries department expressed a hope that the treaty would be drafted in time to be presented at the next session of both the Canadian Parliament and the United States Congress.

CUT COSTS OF IMMIGRATION

Railway and Government Systems to be Co-ordinated Says Minister

OTTAWA, May 21.—The department of immigration is negotiating with representatives of the two big Canadian railway systems to reduce the cost of immigration and colonization activities abroad. The statement was made by Hon. J. R. Robb, minister of immigration and colonization just as the House adjourned after a three hour session of the salaries of the department of immigration. Mr. Robb's remarks implied that negotiations were now going on to co-ordinate the three services and eliminate duplicate expenditure wherever possible.

NO CANDIDATE YET CHOSEN

Conservatives Adjourn Until Tonight: Bushby Seems to be Favorite

Owing to delay in the arrival of the train the Conservative convention, which met last night in the Grand Hotel, adjourned without doing any business in order that delegates from the interior might have an opportunity to attend. They will meet tonight in the same place.

While nothing definite can yet be announced, it is generally understood that George Bushby of this city will be nominated to contest the constituency against the sitting member or whoever the Liberals may choose to represent them. Other names have been mentioned as possibilities but Mr. Bushby seems likely to be chosen, judging from the expressed opinions of local delegates.

MURDER CHARGE TWO CHINESE

Man Died Yesterday Result of Shooting Affray at Port Moody

VANCOUVER, May 21.—A murder charge has been laid against Shui Sing and Shen Say Yang following Tuesday's shooting at Port Moody. The third man Ng Hong died yesterday afternoon but it is expected the fourth will recover.

Mayor L. D. Taylor of Vancouver is expected to be one of the Vancouver Board of Trade party which will visit this city and district in July.

OTTAWA, May 21.—Now that the canners on Puget Sound realize that the only hope for a revival of the salmon canning industry is through the restocking of the Fraser River they are at last willing to have their businesses controlled by a joint commission, which will protect the river against over-fishing either at the mouth, where the Canadians fish or between the American islands where the American traps are placed. Canada has made overtures for joint regulations many times during the past ten or twelve years but so far without success. Now the U.S. canners have become alive to the situation.

Course of Fish
The salmon coming to the Fraser River take a peculiar course. They skirt the shores of Vancouver Island at Sooke or Otter Point where one or two Canadian traps are located. Then they strike across toward Puget Sound and take a curving course among the American Islands and back into the Straits of Georgia before entering the Fraser River. The result is that about seventy per cent of the fish are caught before they reach the Canadian river. They have to run the gauntlet of dozens of fish traps and seine nets.

There is a somewhat similar situation reported from the Naas River in Northern British Columbia near the coast of Alaska. The salmon there pass close to the American shore and many are caught in the traps before they reach the Canadian river.

A joint commission could regulate these traps as well as the fishing off the mouth of the rivers.

The Skeena River would not come under the control of the commission.

MINE SOLD AT HAZELTON

American Boy Taken by English Capitalists and will Ship to Swansea

VANCOUVER, May 21.—The American Boy mine at Hazelton has been sold by the owners Wellington and Al. Harris and John Mullen to English capitalists through Arthur Denby of London. It is announced.

The new owners, who plan to commence active operations immediately will ship the ore to Swansea, Wales, for smelter treatment.

It is understood that J. L. Parker, M.E., will be placed in charge of operations.

TRAINS GOING THROUGH AGAIN

Breach in C.N.R. Track at Prince George was Closed Yesterday—Man Said to Have Been Killed

Following the washout on the C.N.R. track just east of Prince George as a result of high water in the Fraser River, the road was made passable yesterday afternoon at 4.45 and trains are now going through according to announcement made at the superintendent's office this morning. The train, due from the east yesterday, arrived here at 7 o'clock this morning—15 1/2 hours late. This was a transfer train, passengers, mail and express having been brought across the breach which would not allow the train to get through. The train, due from the East at 3.30, was reported this morning to be on time.

Passengers arriving from the East on the train today stated that a man had lost his life at Prince George as a result of the flood but there was no confirmation of this available at the railway offices.

Disastrous Blaze Does Damage in Ft. William District; N.B. Suffers

FORT WILLIAM, Ont., May 21.—Numerous homesteads, farm buildings, sawmills and other property were burned in this vicinity for the past few days. With cooler weather and rain in sight, it is now believed that the danger is over.

MONCTON, N.B., May 21.—Nine buildings were destroyed and between four and five hundred acres of valuable timber were swept by flames as a result of a fire breaking out yesterday at West Galloway, Kent County. The loss is estimated at roughly \$100,000.

Branch to be Opened in Seattle for the American Smelting and Refining Company

SEATTLE, May 21.—The American Smelting and Refining Company of New York, the Guggenheim corporation, will reopen its northwest headquarters at Seattle, it was announced yesterday by Lewis Levinsaler, the mining engineer in charge.

Part of Levinsaler's duties consist in travelling in Alaska, British Columbia and the states of Washington and Oregon gathering data for expansion plans, particularly in regard to the lead smelters maintained by the Guggenheims at Helena, Montana and Selby, California. Copper, gold and silver are smelted at Tacoma.

SALMON PRICES IN THE SOUTH

New Scale Adopted Shows Increase in Price to be Paid for Sockeye

VANCOUVER, May 21.—The new scale of salmon prices approved by District Number 2 fishermen's Association was announced today by the salmon canners' section of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association.

The prices show an increase of three cents per fish for sockeye and half a cent for red springs over last year.

Disabilities Of Other Places.

While we have our disabilities as a district, we have a lot with which to console ourselves. We do not get flooded out here and we do not get driven out by storms or heat or intense cold. We do not get plagues of flies nor are we liable to forest fires. We have much to congratulate ourselves on.

Beautification Of This City.

Many cities are beautified by planting straight rows of trees. We hardly need to do that here because we have plenty of trees growing on the vacant lots that will provide shade and make the place picturesque. What is needed instead is to get rid of some of the stumps. The railway company should again be importuned to do something toward improving the approach toward Sixth Street by pulling out the worst of the old stumps which now disfigure the landscape. Grass is growing well on the lots and all that is needed is to get rid of the stumps. Another eyesore is the hayfield in front of the Armories and the St. Andrew's Society. This was formerly one of the beauty spots of the city and has badly deteriorated. Others might help in improving the city by pulling out stumps and making lawns. Many are already doing it but the more is done the better for everyone. The person who makes a nice garden in front of his house is a public benefactor.

Dress Indicates Character Of People.

In driving through some parts of Canada or the United States communities are found where everyone is poorly dressed and where the people are poor and dirty and give every indication of hard times. They have a hard fight against nature to get a living and it shows itself in every phase of their life. The writer has in mind such a place passed through on the northern borders of California. A number of people were met all of whom were dressed in slacks. When the little town was reached, investigation was made in hope of discovering a suitable place for lunch. None such could be found. All looked too dirty and uninviting. It was decided to drive on rather than risk eating at such a place with such people. It was unkmpl, unpleasant and run down. There is nothing of that about Prince Rupert except in a few of the buildings and some of the vacant lots. The people here, out of working hours give every indication of prosperity. They look well fed, are well clothed and all have that cheerful air that come of good living and hopefulness. It is a phase of life that we should always try to present to visitors. Let us put our best goods in the shop windows and make our town as pleasing as possible, especially during this coming season when we are expecting so many visitors.





HEUSTIS THREAT IS RECEIVED AND FILED

Secretary of Lords Day Alliance Gets Short Shrift From Farmers of Saanich

VICTORIA, May 21.—If Saanich fails to take municipal action to stop Orientals and others from engaging in work in their gardens and farms on Sunday, Rev. Charles H. Heustis, secretary of the Lord's Day Alliance in British Columbia and Alberta, will ask the Provincial Police to investigate and act in the matter.

This ultimatum was given to the Saanich Council at its meeting at Royal Oak by Rev. Mr. Heustis, in a letter written from Calgary to the Reeve and councillors, and was received with smiles by member of the council. The threat of the Lord's Day Alliance secretary occasioned great surprise, and the communication was the second to reach the council on the Sunday observance question.

"Received and filed" was the decisive manner in which the Saanich council treated Rev. Mr. Heustis' communication, which read as follows:

Dr. Heustis' Letter

"I have yours of April 28 in reply to mine in which I called the attention of the authorities of your municipality to alleged infractions of the Lord's Day Act within the municipality.

"I note that my letter was received and filed. I judge that this means that no action is to be taken. Would you kindly advise me if I am mistaken?

"If I do not hear from you within ten days, I will hand over the matter to the Provincial Police for investigation and action. We cannot permit matters to be dealt with in this manner."

ANOTHER FEAT BY LEIGH WADE

U.S. Flyer Will Make Non-Stop Auto Trip Across Continent Accompanied by World Flight Stowaway

NEW YORK, May 21.—Lieut. Leigh Wade, one of the United States round the world flyers, is to figure in another spectacular feat this year but not in the air. He announces that, accompanied by Linton Wells, a newspaper correspondent, he will attempt in June a non-stop motor car journey from New York to San Francisco. Taking turns at driving, the two will take their car over main highways, snatching food and sleep insofar as possible aboard the car. They will make no special effort to break transcontinental speed records.

It is interesting to note that Linton Wells, Wade's partner in this proposed adventure, also accompanied Lieut. Wade in his airplane during part of the world flight. Wells was a stowaway in the plane Boston from Calcutta and was not discovered till the planes were in the centre of India. When he was found, the flyers consented to take him on to Karachi. The matter, which was to be kept a deep secret in the event of the world flight proving a failure, was disclosed after the flight was successfully completed at Seattle.

BRITISH COLUMBIA GETS SHARE OF THOSE COMING TO COUNTRY

WINNIPEG, May 21.—Of the immigrants arriving in Canada at the week end and now just about reaching their destinations, 64 went through to British Columbia over the Canadian National system, 59 to Alberta and 56 to Saskatchewan.

In all there were 376 passengers reached here by C.N.R. trains and a number are waiting over here before deciding definitely on a location. Of the arrivals 160 were British, 97 Hungarians, and the others divided among eleven nationalities.

Sir Henry Thornton Expresses Faith in Prince Rupert Being Grain Port in the Near Future

Before the select standing committee of the House of Commons at Ottawa on railways and shipping owned, operated and controlled by the government, Sir Henry Thornton stated that he believed some day Prince Rupert would be an important outlet for western grain. Fred Stork also took part in the discussion and corrected wrong impressions in regard to this port. The full text of the discussion which was of a dissuatory nature, conversational in character, follows:

Sir Henry Drayton: Can you tell us about how we are getting on with our new warehouse storage at Prince Rupert.

Sir Henry Thornton: You mean the one that was built there some time ago.

Sir Henry Drayton: Two years ago, was it not?

Sir Henry Thornton: It was built before that. I think it has been there some years.

Sir Henry Drayton: How is that working out now?

Sir Henry Thornton: There is not very much business through it. We are negotiating now with, I think, some fishing company with a view to using a part of that for storage purposes.

Mr. Jelliff: I think it will be a good thing if you could arrange to get some revenue from it.

Sir Henry Thornton: That is quite true, but unfortunately we have not been able to find any useful purpose to which it can be put. It is a splendid warehouse, in fact we could not have a better arranged warehouse than that one and it is a shame that it is lying there not serving any useful purpose.

Mr. Dalrymple of the traffic department has been making every effort possible to try and find some business for it, but so far without much success. I think there was some effort put forward to get some fishing company interested in it; there was something that had some promise in it, but so far we have nothing definite. The same way with the dry dock there. It is a magnificent equipped plant, and probably as we go on we will succeed in finding something for it. These two things, our warehouse and dry dock are two of a kind and are as good plants as you can find anywhere. It is a pity we cannot get business for them, but we are doing our best.

Mr. Stork: I have not been there since February, but I understand some Alaska fishing concern is doing some business there.

Sir Henry Thornton: I think that is correct.

Mr. Milne: What amount of cargo comes into Prince Rupert, Sir Henry?

Sir Henry Thornton: I don't suppose there is very much besides some lumber and fish, not much else.

Sir Henry Drayton: The large movement is fish, coming to that fishing plant there. Do they still maintain that packing plant?

Sir Henry Thornton: Yes. That is running very well, and I think it is doing very well.

Mr. Stork: It is the biggest

thing of its kind in America.

Sir Henry Thornton: Yes, I believe they ship halibut to the eastern states.

Mr. Stork: Yes, to Boston and New York.

Sir Henry Thornton: All the way from Prince Rupert to Boston, if you can imagine anything more curious than that. Still they do it.

Mr. Stork: I believe there is a good deal of misapprehension about the traffic along the line of the Grand Trunk Pacific. Last year there were 26,000,000 pounds of halibut came out of the port of Prince Rupert, not by freight trains but by express cars, and I think if I remember rightly there were something like 1,500 refrigerator cars employed, and they came east with a load of anywhere from \$800 to \$1,000 a car, so that if you take the earnings of the road you will find they compare favorably with any other part of the system. Is that not the case?

Sir Henry Thornton: I think not. I am sorry I cannot agree with you. The earnings per mile on that road are pretty slim. We are doing everything we possibly can to increase the earnings, but if you should segregate the earnings on that road on a per mile basis you would find them pretty slim picking.

Sir Henry Drayton: With a high rate for express, there is still higher rate of expenses.

Sir Henry Thornton: It is a territory which has large productive possibilities in it. There is some splendid land, which I have seen myself, along the Grand Trunk Pacific and the day will come when it will probably be productive, but it is going to require a great deal of intensive immigration work and effort before it can be brought into a condition of productiveness. There is a great deal of lumber along that branch.

Mr. Stork: A lot of cedar poles and piling go over that line?

Sir Henry Thornton: That is so.

Mr. Stork: About the only available timber in that north country is along that line?

Sir Henry Thornton: There are mineral deposits as well.

Mr. Milne: Do you anticipate that when you get elevators there, there will be cargo going out and that you will draw more cargo from the Orient?

Sir Henry Thornton: Yes. That will certainly help to increase the traffic over the line. The west-bound grain movement is increasing from year to year. You have only to look at what is

happening in Vancouver, to see what is going to happen to west-bound grain. I believe some day Prince Rupert will be an important outlet for western grain.

Sir Henry Drayton: In connection with the question concerning grain movement asked by Mr. Milne, what is the percentage of your grain movement for Orient points as against European points? Perhaps Mr. Henry can give us afterwards the percentage of grain for points in the Orient passing through Pacific coast ports, as against Panama in 1924 as against 1923.

PRESBYTERIANS ARE IN SESSION STATES WHERE ARE TWO CHURCHES

COLUMBUS, May 21.—The 137th general assembly of the Presbyterian Church in the U.S.A. is meeting in Columbus today and continuing for one week. The general assembly of the Presbyterian Church in the U.S.A. are in session in the south. At several general assemblies efforts have been made to merge these two branches of the denomination into one, but thus far without success.

Approximately 4,000 duly elected commissioners will attend the assembly in Columbus, representing not only every state in the union, but also Alaska, Porto Rico, Cuba, West Africa, and various foreign countries. This is the annual congress of the denomination and will transact business for 46 synods, 299 presbyteries, 10,000 churches, and more than 1,800,000 communicant members.

Sir Henry: I think the Panama shipments were greater. They are increasing pretty rapidly.



ELEVATOR IS UNDER FIRE

Hansard Records Discussion in House of Commons Last Week

Hansard records the following discussion in committee of the House of Commons last week regarding the grain elevator under construction here for which a vote of \$500,000 has been placed in the estimates:

Sir Henry Drayton (Conservative, former minister of finance): What is the cost of this elevator?

Mr. Low (minister of trade and commerce): The contract has not been awarded for the superstructure and we do not know what the exact cost will be. The contract has been awarded for the foundation and excavation at \$222,000. Tenders have been called for the superstructure and they are due a week from today (May 18).

Sir Henry Drayton: Surely the minister can give us an estimate of the cost.

Mr. Low: It is the practice of the department not to make public the estimate until after the contract has been awarded.

Sir Henry Drayton: Can we look with any assurance upon the estimate here? I do not know whether it is the practice to mislead in these estimates or not. I do not suppose it is. We have here an estimate for \$500,000. Is that the whole amount?

Mr. Low: No, there will be a further amount in the supplement.
