## LEADERS IN COMMONS FLAY EACH OTHER

### WORK ON FOUNDATION OF ELEVATOR IS PROCEEDING AT ONCE ANNOUNCED

#### Premier and Leader of Opposition Clashed in Parliamentary Debate

##### Meighen Criticizes Mackenzie King's Proposed Plan to Break Shipping Combine

OTTAWA, Feb. 10.—Right Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King, Prime Minister, and Hon. Arthur Meighen, Conservative leader of the opposition, clashed in debate on the floor of Parliament on the opening day of the debate on the address following addresses by the mover and seconder.

Mr. Meighen declared that the government had precipitated transportation anarchy and chaos. It had made an abortive attempt to control American vessel owners on the lakes but, disappointed by its failure, the government was now taking to the broad Atlantic and single handedly expected to control rates. In this he referred to the reported arrangement for subsidizing ten steamers of the Peterson line.

Mr. Meighen charged that the government in three years spent more than nine million dollars to bring 322,000 immigrants to Canada, while during the same time more than 600,000 Canadians had gone to the United States.

Mr. King challenged Mr. Meighen's criticisms and quoted United States authorities as declaring that Canada's industrial outlook was bright. He declared the trade balance in Canada's favor. Export markets were essential, the Premier declared.

Speaking of the shipping combine and the proposal to break it by subsidizing a line of freighters to operate independent of the combine at lower rates, the Prime Minister said the combine had been seeking to control the entire ocean commerce. It was hoped that Canada would have the support of other dominions and countries in breaking this ocean combine.

#### WAPITI PASS IS SUGGESTED

Colonel Cornwall Would Have Railway Join C.N.R. at Hansard

VICTORIA, Feb. 10.—Construction of the railway from the Peace River country through Wapiti Pass to the Canadian National at Hansard, 46 miles east of Prince George, is recommended by Colonel Cornwall, a member engaged in transportation on the Mackenzie River, in a discussion here yesterday with Premier Oliver.

By this route trains would travel to Prince George and then over the Pacific Great Eastern railway to Vancouver, making the distance from Grand Prairie to Vancouver about 700 miles.

Wapiti pass is said to be lower than Yellowhead Pass.

#### MANY BRUISED LABOR RIOTS

Communists at Marseilles Try to Break up Gathering of Catholic Federation

MARSEILLES, Feb. 10.—Nearly one hundred people including priests and police were wounded or bruised in a clash here last night when communists attempted to break up a gathering of newly organized Catholic National Federation. All public meetings of either party have been banned for an indefinite period.


#### GOVERNMENT SELLING LOTS AT UNIVERSITY

#### ST. MARGARET ON WAY HERE

New C.N.R. Coasting Vessel Left Scotland for this Coast on February 5

The steamer St. Margaret purchased recently in England by the Canadian National Railway for operation in passenger and freight service between Prince Rupert and Vancouver, left Aberdeen, Scotland, for this coast on February 5. The vessel, on arrival here, will be commissioned in the Queen Charlotte Island service and will also, it is expected, be used to relieve the two larger steamers in the direct Prince Rupert-Vancouver service while the rush of the tourist season is on. The vessel will be given a "Prince" name after arriving on the coast.

#### New Type Dirigible to be Built For Service Detroit to London

Will Have Metal Skin and Much More Durable Than Any Previous Craft of its Kind

DEARBORN, Mich., Feb. 10.—A new type of dirigible is to be built at a local automobile plant for the government as the first step towards establishing a three day passenger service from Detroit to London, England, according to the Aircraft Development Corporation.

The new ship is to be constructed with a metal skin of Duralumin. The plates are to be only eight thousandths of an inch thick but will be six times stronger than present fabric covering dirigibles. The fabric covering the dirigible will be 150 feet long, 53 feet in diameter, and it is claimed it will be durable and permanent beyond any similar structure heretofore attempted.

#### BOOTLEGGING IN ENGLAND

Cheap Liquor From France Run Across Channel by Smugglers

LONDON, Feb. 10.—England has a bootlegging problem, according to the Westminster Gazette, which threatens to necessitate the adoption of special measures to repress it.

The price of spirits in France is only half that in England, where the duty is high. This difference encouraged smugglers to run contraband spirits across the channel, whence it is taken to London and the other large cities of the country by lorry.

#### TAMPERED WITH NAVY SECRETS

Two Men Get Jail Terms in England Under Official Secrets Act

LONDON, Feb. 10.—W. P. O'Leary was sentenced to 18 months imprisonment and J. D. McCough to fifteen months for a misdemeanor under the Official Secrets Act. The men were arrested last month at the time an alleged plot to blow up British battleships and submarines was unearthed.

It is alleged that the men are republican army intelligence officers.

#### MORE MEN TO HELP MUSH OUT

Dog Team Expected to Reach Number 5 Cabin Tomorrow to Fetch Smith

The two men with four dog team mushing in toward number five cabin on the Yukon telegraph line to fetch out R. W. Smith, expect to reach their destination tomorrow afternoon, where Mr. Smith still lies helpless, unable to move his lower limbs. They will leave on the return trip at once aided by two more men both good mushers.

#### Contractors Are Today Laying Out Work at Elevator Site and Preparing for Construction

By next week actual work on the construction of the terminal grain elevator to be erected at this port by the Department of Trade and Commerce will have commenced it was announced this morning by William Smaill, chief engineer for the Northern Construction Co. Ltd. and Gen. J. W. Stewart, who have the contract for the foundations and dock. Mr. Smaill arrived from Vancouver on the Princess Mary yesterday afternoon accompanied by C. D. Howe of Port Arthur, head of the firm of C. D. Howe & Co., which has designed the elevator and will supervise the work for the department. R. Sharp, superintendent for the Northern Construction Co. who will be in actual charge, also arrived.

#### MORE ALCOHOL FOR ONTARIO

Strength of Beer Allowed to be Sold is to be Increased to Almost Double

TORONTO, Feb. 10.—The speech from the throne at the opening of the Legislature announces an increase in the alcoholic content of beer permitted to be sold under the Temperance Act. The reference says: "Legislation will be introduced to amend the Ontario Temperance Act by enacting that liquor with an absolute alcoholic content by volume of more than two and a half per cent shall be conclusively deemed to be intoxicating and to further amend the act to facilitate its enforcement."

This is taken to mean that two and a half per cent alcoholic weight will be provided for instead of two and a half per cent proof spirits as at present. This would in effect double the present strength, according to chemists.

**Concrete Work**  
A week from tomorrow, Mr. Smaill stated, the Northern Construction Co.'s concrete equipment will arrive here from the south and towards the end of next week actual pouring of concrete for the foundations will have started. The company will do this work itself as well as the pile-driving and such excavation as is necessary.

The contract for creosoted piles has been let to the Vancouver Creosoting Co. In about a month's time, the deliveries of piles will commence to arrive here. The creosoting will be done in Vancouver and the piles will be towed up the coast.

Mr. Smaill stated that, as far as the foundation and dock contract was concerned, the plant involved would not be such a very extensive one. A couple of foremen for the work will be brought from Vancouver but the balance of the men will be taken on here if they are obtainable. There will not be over 100 men at a single time employed on this contract, which is to be completed about the middle of April.

The actual elevator superstructure, for which the contract has not yet been let, will be the big job, Mr. Smaill stated.

**Company Well Equipped**  
The Northern Construction Co. Ltd. is fully equipped to carry out the work here. Associated with Gen. Stewart and with Mr. Smaill as chief engineer, among big jobs it has successfully executed in recent years has been the construction of the Ballantyne Pier at Vancouver and work on Welland Canal in Ontario.

#### DIRECTORS TO REFORMATORY

Home Bank Frauds Send Several More Men to Jail in Ontario

TORONTO, Feb. 10.—Richard Gough, vice-president of the Home Bank who was found guilty on six counts of charges in connection with the failure of the Home Bank was sentenced to one year determinate and one year less one day indeterminate in the Ontario reformatory.

J. F. Stewart, director, was sentenced to one month in the Provincial reformatory with four months indeterminate sentence.

S. Casey Wood, K.C. found guilty of concurring in false statement was sentenced to six months determinate and six months indeterminate in the reformatory.

#### SOLDIER SETTLEMENT

OTTAWA, Feb. 10.—The soldier settlement board report tabled in the House of Commons yesterday shows 30,604 war veterans placed on the land, loans being granted to 24,148 of them.

**Thomas Lawson And Frenzied Finance.**

Thomas Lawson, whose death was recorded yesterday, is best known to the people of this continent from his books, first published in magazine form on Frenzied Finance in which he exposed the inner workings of the Standard Oil ring, the copper manipulations and the means by which thousands of people were fleeced of their savings by those on the inside. He mentioned people by name and told of the suicides which followed financial panics caused by the manipulations. He told how members of U.S. legislatures were bought and the price that was paid for their votes. He dared them and other people who were mentioned in connection with shady transactions and, as he publicly branded them, urged that if what he said was not true they should sue him for criminal libel. A few suits were brought against him but they failed miserably.

Finding that he was unable to carry the people of the United States with him as he had hoped, he gave up the fight, but not before he had educated the people to look beneath the surface.

**Makes It Easier For The Government.**

The report of the grain commission which recommends the same freight rate for the west as for the east, mile for mile, will make it easier for the government to secure legislation giving the west what they have been clamoring for and what Premier Oliver has so long been demanding. It is one more phase of the fight and leads us closer to victory. Following the speech from the throne it is significant, especially in view of the fact that the government had access to this report before the speech from the throne was written by them.

If the equalization of rates west with east becomes an established fact, it means that much of the grain grown in Saskatchewan will be able to come out by way of the Pacific, and Prince Rupert will be in line for her share of the business. Undoubtedly the bulk of it will go to Vancouver but we shall hope to get a foothold on the rocky climb to prosperity in the export business.

**Not Yet Agreed As To Route To Peace River.**

There is as yet no agreement as to the route to be taken from Peace River to the Pacific. At present there are something like half a dozen proposed but no one seems to have much authentic information regarding any of them except the railways and they are saying nothing.

If it were certain that the best possible route would be chosen by the railway men and engineers, irrespective of political considerations, we would keep quiet and let them do the choosing without in any way trying to influence the decision. The difficulty is that we all believe political considerations do enter into the choice so it is necessary for us to play our hands in the best manner possible.

As to which pass is utilized in crossing the mountains we are not concerned, but what does seem reasonable is that the railway shall not be built backward, leading in the direction of Edmonton in order to reach the coast. Also it seems desirable that a new country be opened up and that the best possible. According to the available information it seems as if the best country is on this side of the mountains and also it seems clear that the most direct route is to come out through one of the northern passes and not in the neighborhood of Brule.

**Preparations To Meet And Entertain Tourists.**

It is time to remember that this is likely to be a big tourist year and Prince Rupert should do its share in trying to accommodate them. The first and simplest way to look after them is to drive them around and show them the city. This is best done in motorbuses with a man accompanying who will point out the places of interest and incidentally tell about the city and its prospects. The ordinary taxi service does not provide that. To take passengers around and tell them nothing about the place is losing an opportunity.

In all large cities they have large motor vehicles carrying twenty or thirty passengers each. By charging a dollar apiece it can be made to pay and a big car here should prove a profitable investment. At any rate it is worth investigating.

**MANSON ASKS A FAIR TRIAL FOR NEW LAW**

**Could Not Keep Proper Control if Other Things Sold in Beer Parlors**

VANCOUVER, Feb. 10.—"Taking into consideration all the difficulties which have to be faced in a matter of this kind, my personal opinion, knowing all the facts, is that a reasonably enforceable set of regulations have been drawn up, and ones which, with the co-operation of those affected, can be satisfactorily worked out," declared Hon. A. M. Manson in discussing criticisms of the recently published beer-by-the-glass regulations.

Mr. Manson also expressed the belief that the majority of the hotel keepers were satisfied to give the regulations a "fair trial."

**Many Disgruntled**

"Much of the criticism comes from people who have not the privilege of applying for licenses," he said. "Very strong pressure was brought to bear to have places other than hotels licensed, and there will be many disgruntled ones who will see no good in the regulations because their demands have not been met."

Referring to the decision to allow nothing but beer to be sold in the beer parlors, the attorney general pointed out that by allowing cigars to be sold, the beer parlors automatically came under another license department, and that the idea was to keep control of the situation by the Liquor Control Board.

**Single License Wanted**

"We could not adequately do this with overlapping licenses," said Mr. Manson, "and Mr. Davidson decided that in order to safeguard the situation only one license should be issued. To do this it was necessary to stipulate that nothing but beer should be sold in the beer parlors."

**PARTICULARS OF ALASKA SERVICE**

**Boats Will Arrive Here From the South at 10.30 Wednesdays; Same Hour From North Mondays**

Particulars of the Skagway service that will be instituted this summer by the Canadian National Coast Steamship Services have been received at the city ticket office here. The service will go into force on June 22 and will be maintained until September 7 by the steamers Prince Rupert and Prince George.

The steamers will leave Vancouver on Mondays at 8 p.m. and, after calling at Powell River and Ocean Falls, will arrive here at 10.30 Wednesday mornings. Leaving here Wednesday afternoons at 4 o'clock, calls will be made at Ketchikan, Wrangell, and Juneau, arriving at Skagway 7 a.m. Friday mornings. There will be a 36-hour stop at Skagway and the southbound schedule with the same stops as northbound will be as follows:

Leave Skagway 7 p.m. Saturday.  
Arrive Prince Rupert 10.30 a.m. Monday.  
Leave Prince Rupert 4 p.m. Monday.  
Arrive Vancouver 9 a.m. Wednesday.

Particulars as to the schedule for local boats, including the service to Anxox and Stewart, have not yet been received. As was the case last year, it is expected that boats will arrive here from the south on Wednesday and Friday, the former going to Anxox and the latter to Stewart.

It has already been announced that trains from here for the East will connect with the boats, leaving the city in the morning instead of the evening and making the trip up the Skeena in daylight.





"There are several other matters to be dealt with which would result in additional benefits such as cargo insurance, harbor facilities, rates of competing railroads, marketing of lower grade forest products, etc. It will naturally be advisable to work on these in conjunction with other public bodies such as the Board of Trade."

The report also expressed the belief that the result arrived at by the provincial government with respect to royalty adjustment would result in material benefit to the industry in Prince Rupert district.

# TOM LAWSON AND FINANCE

Spectacular Career of Man Who Died Yesterday Reads Like Novel

BEGAN EARLY IN LIFE

Built Yacht for \$200,000 and Then Broke it up: Two Million House

The life of Thomas W. Lawson, financier, author and sportsman, whose death was recorded yesterday, reads like a novel. He opened the way to his spectacular career by running away from school in Cambridge, Mass., to work in a financial house in Boston as an office boy. His employers found him so promising that they persuaded his mother to let him stay. This was in 1869.

Five years later at the age of 17, Tom Lawson was worth \$60,000 made from a pool he had organized the year before to buy railroad stock. Of this sum he promptly lost \$59,841 in another stock deal. Reduced to \$159, he gave a dinner to friends at a Boston hotel and when the bill was paid found himself with \$130.

From the boy who in his teens could make a small fortune and lose it developed the man who tumbled money markets, who was a millionaire one day and "flat" the next, who paid \$30,000 for a carnation and who, in a temper, junked a \$200,000 yacht built to defend the America's Cup.

### Bought Copper

Tom Lawson's identity with copper began when he was a young man. He knew nothing of the mineral but when the Butte and Boston mine opened he took a tip from a newspaper friend and began buying at 16. Then he sold the stock short and whittled the market down to 75 cents, taking up thousands of shares between that figure and two dollars. In this manner he obtained a majority of the stock and saw it bring far more than his predictions of \$60 a share.

This was the beginning of deals that ultimately won him the title of "Copper King" and which preceded the operations that led to the famous Amalgamated Copper transactions.

Lawson later became famous for his "broad-side" advertisements of advice and warning published simultaneously in large newspapers the country over.

The eccentricities of his financial career were matched in his recreations and diversions.

### Built Yacht

In 1904 he built the yacht Independence at a cost of \$200,000 and filled her out as a contender for the honor of defending the America's Cup. Recognition was refused him unless he would consent to enter the boat as a member of a yacht club. A long controversy ensued, Lawson insisting that he had a right to sail his boat as he pleased.

Angered by his rebuff, Lawson ordered the Independence broken up and sent bits of her bronze hull to his friends. He wrote an elaborately printed book on the affair for private circulation, the estimated cost of each copy being \$500.

The story of the famous "Lawson Pink" was told by the financier as follows:

"I went into the florist shop and saw that pink. I liked it and said 'How much?' The man said '\$30,000,' and I said 'I'd take it. I put it in my button hole and walked out. The next day it withered like all pinks but the glory of it went round the world. I got at least \$1,000,000 worth of advertising out of that fool transaction. Moreover, I like flowers."

### Made it Pay


With the pink, however, went the florist's entire lot of 8,000 plants, and from these the financier made a handsome profit on the transaction.

"Dreamworld," Mr. Lawson's summer house at Egypt, Mass., was built at a cost of \$2,000,000 to satisfy, it was said, a whim of Mrs. Lawson who had remarked that the stony site would be ideal for a summer place. The training building for his horses was as large as Madison Square Garden.

Lawson's stable of thoroughbreds was one of the best known in the country.

One of Mr. Lawson's superstitions centered about the figure three. His associates said that

he never bought shares in blocks of 1,000—it was always 999 or 333. He took an office at 33 State street and got 333 as a telephone number.

Lawson's advice to all who would play the market was: "Keep out unless you're on the inside."

"Apply logic to all business propositions. If they will not stand the test of logic, reject them."

### Published Books

Mr. Lawson published several books, among them was a history of the Republican Party, of which only four copies, printed on satin, were published. One of these he presented to President Harrison, one to Vice President Morton and a third to the Library of Congress. The fourth he kept himself. "The Secrets of Congress" appeared in 1888; a "Collection of Poems and Short Stories from Magazines" in the same year; "Frenzied Finance" in 1905; "Friday the Thirteenth" in 1907; "The Remedy" in 1912; and "The High Cost of Living" in 1913.

In 1878 Mr. Lawson married Jeannie Augusta Goodwillie of Cambridge, who died in 1907.

Mr. Lawson was president of the following organizations: Bay State Gas Company of Delaware; Thomas W. Lawson Copper Company; Trinity Copper Company and First National Copper Company.

**TRAINING FOR FOOTBALL**

Half-backs must support the attack and also perform defensive duties

(By "Andy" Dugat, Manager of Falham Club.)  
(Reprinted from "Greenock Herald")

Tremendous demand on a man's stamina is made if he plays in the half-back line. Throughout the game he is called upon to attack with the forwards and defend with the backs. The half-back needs to play a clever game, too.

He is called upon to do two opposite things well. He must use all the guile of a nimble forward. At the same time, he must put a prompt stop to any fancy work by the opposition front line.

Where Saturday afternoon relying on their forwards to get the ball down to the opponents' goal. The attack with only five men when they might use eight. The triangle game is the most effective of the modern attacking formations. It depends for its success on the close co-operation of the halfbacks. The second line keeps well up to the first. The ball travels from forward to half and from half to another forward.

**Should Shoot at Goal**

Many small teams believe that half backs should not shoot at goal. This is a fallacy. I have known some very useful shots put through by well-placed halves when the front line men were out of position. The half back should never shoot if a forward is more favorably situated but he should not need to think twice about it when he sees that he himself is the man with the best chance of getting the ball between the posts.

Your chief work as a half back, however, is to make openings for your forwards. This is not just a matter of passing the ball out to them. Placing your pass neatly is everything.

You should never pass direct to your man. In some teams a direct pass means that the half back wants the ball returned to him at once. The correct way to pass is to put the ball through a gap so that your forward can capture it by running towards the opponents' goal at full speed.

This means that you have to study your forward and his relationship to the nearest opponent. You must know, too, whether you can rely on this particular forward to put in a bit of sharp sprinting and so beat the opposition to the ball.

Every half back ought to start the game by looking carefully over the opposition defence. One

man must be weaker than the others. This is the sort of knowledge that comes useful in emergencies, such as the one I have already mentioned. If the slow defender is marking your most nimble forward, it is, even though he is closer to his man than the others, a gift for you.

Even though his favored forward is nearly always able to beat his man, don't repeat the tactic too often. Familiarity blunts its edge. Throw in surprises on the other side. Play this more certain winner just as you play trumps—when in doubt and when you need a sure trick.

Keep the ball low when passing. Never kick upwards unless your pass is blocked. High kicks give the opposition time to reach the ball.

And remember the use of occasional long kicks—say from right half to outside left. These are fine if you keep the ball low and so swing it across sharply.

Never chance waiting to tackle an opponent for the ball if you can beat him to it instead. You can beat a man who is much nearer than you are by springing sharply forward at the moment the pass is kicked. This is where professionals are so markedly superior in receiving passes. Your first two yards are everything in football. Professionals are trained—sometimes with the help of harsh words—to "jump to it."

### PLAYED MARSEILLAISE AT RUGBY MATCH WHEN IRELAND MET FRANCE

Paris Spectators Saw Irishmen March on to Field to Own Music

PARIS, Feb. 10.—"La Marseillaise" played as the National Anthem of the Irish Free State, came as a surprise to the 30,000 spectators who attended the France-Ireland rugby match at the Colombes Olympic Stadium. Few knew that behind the rendition of the martial strains of "Rouge et Lisle" the masterpiece there lurked the settlement of a diplomatic problem which has puzzled the French Rugby Federation since the creation of the Irish Free State.

In order not to wound any susceptibility, the Union Jack and the flag of the Irish Free State were flown on each side of the French tricolor.

"What anthem shall we play when you march upon the field?" the president of the French Rugby Federation asked Captain Crawford of the Irish team. Both Ulster and the south of Ireland were represented on the Irish team. The latter objected to "God Save the King," while the former were spared the necessity of protesting against the national anthem of the Irish Free State by the announcement of the leader of the military band on duty at the stadium, that his men could not play it.

LOUISVILLE, Ky., Feb. 10.—A record number of nominations for the fifty-first renewal of the Kentucky Derby is expected by turf writers who, taking into account the large number of high-class eligibles wintering at Louisville tracks and elsewhere, predict the 152 nominations of last year will be exceeded when the entries close February 21.

The race for three-year-olds, at a mile and a quarter, will be run at Churchill Downs Saturday, May 16, the seventh day of the spring meet.

The purse, with \$50,000 added by the Kentucky Jockey Club, may be the largest in the history of the half century old classic. Last year 19 of the 152 nominees accepted the issue, making the purse \$52,775 for the winner, Black Gold. The year previous when Zev, the Ranocas Stable's colt, won, 20 started, giving the race a net value of \$53,600. The starting fee, \$500, is added to the \$50,000 purse.
