# LUMBER INDUSTRY IS TO BE RESUMED HERE

## LACK OF CONTROL OF ORIENTALS IN DOMINION IS ALLEGED IN COMMONS

### Neill Urges That Jap Competition is Unfair

#### Urge Restrictions Against Holding of Land Similar to Those in Force in California

OTTAWA, April 2.—Restrictions in Canada similar to those in force in California to prevent Japanese invading agricultural lands of British Columbia were asked yesterday in the House of Commons by A. W. Neill, member for Gomox-Alberni, who said Japanese women and boys were coming into the province without restriction and the "gentleman's agreement" concerning the influx of adult males was not being strictly enforced.

Mr. Neill declared that Japanese were working in unfair competition with white men in the fisheries and canneries of British Columbia. General restrictions to reduce the number of Japanese in Canada were urged.

### COUNTERFEIT MONEY SEIZED

#### FINE GROUPS OF SETTLERS FOR WEST

Many British Among Those Arriving at Winnipeg from Europe

WINNIPEG, April 2.—The first group of settlers seen in years arrived in Winnipeg this morning by special Canadian National train and were despatched to destinations throughout the four western provinces within a few hours.

Distribution of the train's passengers is reported by colonization officials as 28 to British Columbia, 20 of them being for Vancouver, 146 to Alberta with parties of 65 for Edmonton and 36 for Calgary, 97 to Saskatchewan, 18 for Saskatoon, 11 Prince Albert, 10 Moose Jaw, 20 Regina, and 106 for Manitoba, 91 of whom are remaining in Winnipeg.

Oustanding in the crowd was the party of 31 families, the first to be brought out under the Empire Settlement scheme of the British and Canadian governments. These families averaged five persons each, an actual total 162 individuals being in the group. They were all re-ticketed to points in the western provinces where farms have been chosen for them. Ireland was represented by 51, Scotland 27, and the balance 217 being from England.


Other nationalities on the special train were 32 Norwegians, 15 Russians, 12 Danes, Belgians, Czechoslovaks, Hollanders, Finns, French, Germans, Poles, Roumanians and Swedes.

#### KETCHIKAN SCHOOLS CLOSING EARLY SO PUPILS MAY WORK

KETCHIKAN, April 2.—Pupils in the seventh and eighth grades and high school here are starting their schoolwork 45 minutes earlier so they may be dismissed at 2:45 o'clock in the afternoon instead of at 3:30 o'clock as heretofore. This action was taken at the request of the student body, many of whom have outside position after school hours, and after the school authorities had made an investigation of the situation.

### INDIAN TRIAL LIKELY TO BE HELD IN FALL

Further Witnesses to be Sought, it is said. Before the Case Comes Up

HAPPY AT OKALLA

Still Think They were Justified in Hanging Boy Head Downward for Witchcraft

Word has been received here that the trial of the five Northern Indians held at Okalla for trial here on a charge of slaying a nineteen year old boy in connection with a witchcraft allegation will be postponed until Autumn and that in the meantime further evidence will be sought.

Edie Loo, the aged Indian Kloochman and her brothers Dan, Clem and Jimmy and the other tribesman Big Alec, will probably remain at Okalla until the autumn assizes when they will be brought here and tried on the capital charge. In the meantime officers of the Provincial police will go north with the opening of spring and may return with further witnesses of the event.

According to information received from Okalla, the Indians are quite happy there, are learning English and adapting themselves to the ways of the white people, mixing freely with the other prisoners in the jail. They show no concern as to their fate and apparently still consider they were justified in hanging the boy Athol head downwards and leaving him there in Arctic cold weather for having bewitched the husband of Edie Loo, who died.

### Flood Conditions in Manitoba Become More Serious; Brandon and Portage Districts Suffer

WINNIPEG, April 2.—Flood conditions along the Assiniboine River were more alarming than ever this morning. The stream is overflowing its banks at Brandon and is making the lowlands a veritable lake. Residents have been forced to leave their homes.

A huge jam formed west of Portage la Prairie and caused much damage through flooding.

In many parts of the surrounding country farmers are forced to use boats and rafts as means of conveyance.

### Seal Cove Sawmill Will Begin Operations Monday After Years of Inactivity; Box Factory Soon

Cutting of lumber will resume at the Prince Rupert Spruce Mill next Monday according to an announcement made by J. A. Ward Bell who arrived in the city yesterday afternoon. For the past several weeks renovation of the plant has been steadily in progress. This work is now practically completed, a staff has been engaged and the first deliveries of logs are here so everything is in readiness for the whistle to blow and the plant, which has been idle for several years, to begin active operations once again.

For the first few weeks, activities will be confined to the cutting of lumber but a box machine will be in operation in about six weeks to supply boxes for the fish trade.

Mr. Bell arrived here from Surf Inlet where he made arrangements for further log deliveries. Enough logs are now contracted for to keep the plant running all this year and into next.

J. A. Smith, head of the Prince Rupert Spruce Mills Ltd., is expected here next Wednesday from Vancouver.

Ship Airplane Spruce

Within two weeks, Mr. Bell states, shipments of airplane spruce destined for the United Kingdom will start from here. They will go east by rail.

D. D. McMaster, manager of the mill, who returned from Vancouver yesterday, brought with him half a dozen skilled men for the plant including sawyers, edgerman, head grader and sawman. Mr. McMaster's son, H. L. McMaster, also arrived. He is a band sawyer.

### Pouring Cement For Elevator Commences Today Following Arrival of Scows of Gravel Here

Mixing and pouring of cement for the elevator foundations starts today. During the night the tug Earl arrived from Victoria having in tow two scows laden with gravel and sand aggregate which will be used in the work. This material was due here at least a fortnight ago, but recent stormy weather delayed its arrival. It is expected that this lot of gravel will fill the requirements as far as the foundations are concerned. The most of the holes for the piers are finished and ready to receive the concrete.

The gravel that will be used in making concrete for the superstructure will be brought from Prince George or Shames. It was impossible to get this for the present work on account of the snow in the interior. Salt water gravel and sand cannot be used.

It is expected that W. G. Arnett's dredge, which has been undergoing repairs at the dry dock after having been sunk in last week's gale, will be back on the job at Mexichell Creek tomorrow. Deliveries of gravel for the wharf fill will then be resumed. This ten day delay has just set back the actual starting of work on the wharf that much.

The pile driver, piles, timber, etc. is here ready for the wharf work to start as soon as the fill or part of it is finished. Had it not been for the accident to the dredge, pile driving would probably have been already underway.

It is expected on the job that the contract for the superstructure will be let about April 15.

VICTORIA'S RADIO STATION MAY CLOSE

Appeal Made for Funds and City Makes Vote of \$1500 To-ward it

VICTORIA, April 2.—The city council has voted \$1500 to the City Temple as a bonus with a view to aiding in keeping open the radio broadcasting station G.F.C.T. at Fletcher Brothers Music studio the cost of which is estimated at \$8,000 a year. The City Temple has been paying \$2,000 of this amount but the firm concerned announces it will close unless some arrangement for payment of the cost is made.

Support has been pledged by various organizations following appeals made by Dr. Clem Davies pastor of the City Temple, for funds.

SAN DIEGO, April 2.—Two aviators in two small naval seaplanes have been missing since yesterday afternoon when they left for San Pedro it was announced today.

Clark, who was the engineer of the boat, was drowned. The nearest provincial police officer is at Queen Charlotte and he has not yet fully reported on the accident.

### FLIGHT OVER WORLD'S TOP

Aerial Trip From Paris to San Francisco May be Made in September

SAN FRANCISCO, April 2.—An airplane flight from Paris to San Francisco, crossing the Arctic near the North Pole, is being planned as a feature of the diamond jubilee of the state next September.

The plan provides for the inauguration of a regular route, and the arrival of the path-finding airplane in San Francisco during the week of the celebration.

The projected flight will go north from Paris via the Spitzbergen Islands and will pass through northern Canada possibly along the Pacific coast to Frisco.

### CONFERENCE PEACE RIVER

If no Report from Railway Heads Soon will be Asked to Meet Minister

OTTAWA, April 2.—Replying to a question of D. M. Kennedy, Progressive of West Edmonton yesterday afternoon, Hon. George P. Graham, minister of railways, said he preferred not to give an opinion as to the probability of an agreement being reached between the heads of the two railways on the Peace River route.

"If some suggestion does not come shortly," added the minister, "I think I will ask them to join in another conference to discuss the question again."

With New Installation, Service is Extended to More Ranchers

A long distance telephone of composite type has been installed at McGregor's ranch, eight miles south of Telkwa. R. McGregor is the telephone agent in charge. This telephone, which has been put in by the government telegraph service, will serve the many ranchers at the south end of the Round Lake district.

## WEST IS BRIGHTEST SPOT IN COUNTRY

Report of Royal Bank Says Far Eastern Provinces Get Low Prices

In those sections of Canada where unemployment is at its height, where trade is poor, and where prospects seem none too good, the statement that better times are at hand would not readily be accepted. Yet there have been favorable developments which give hint of better business in 1925. The brightest spot in the whole situation lies in the West, where prices of grain have been high and where the distribution of the recent 35c payment by the wheat pool has already produced some improvement.

The statistics of western wheat deliveries to date indicate that some upward revision of the 1924 wheat crop estimate will be necessary, a favorable development. The farmers of British Columbia were also fortunate in regard to the prices obtained for crops and fruit, so that the buying power of Canadian farmers has been measurably improved. All through the country, livestock have wintered well and the high cost of grain is already having some effect upon the price obtained for select beef. The farmers of the Maritime Provinces, however, are confronted by low prices for their apples and potatoes. The English embargo upon potatoes—and the large crop in the United States has reduced the price to 75c a barrel, nor can \$2.50 a barrel for apples be considered a satisfactory return.

## COCOANUT KING IS BELIEVER IN CHURCHES AND WOULD HELP BOYS

**Drinking is Taboo, But All Roads Lead to Heaven Declares Philanthropist**

NEW YORK, April 2.—(By Canadian Press)—Leopold Schupp, known as the "cocoanut king," and who for sixty-five years has been accumulating a fortune through production of cocoanut by-products, has begun at the age of eighty-five to "give away" his wealth. The king's first thoughts were for his subjects and as a start he presented fifty of his warehouse employees with checks varying from \$500 to \$5,000.

Now he has turned to the youth of New York and as an initial step has announced that \$2,500,000 of his fortune will be set aside for the building up of a boy's welfare institution.

The institution will have as its objective the starting up in business of boys who have proved worthy. Mr. Schupp intends securing applicants from church dignitaries and Sunday school heads. When the boys are "ripe" and if they have lived up to a two year pledge, including abstinence from drinking, which the "cocoanut king" intends stipulating, they will be given \$200 and started in whatever career they choose. Church denomination will play no part in the selecting of boys for Mr. Schupp's welfare league. His two cardinal beliefs, he says, are:

"All roads lead to Heaven."

"There are 349 different ways of worshipping God and all of them are right."

Therefore the aged philanthropist has never joined a church but "worships God in his own way." He would like to see Catholic, Jew and Protestant unite in some great common religion, he declared.

## DOG HEROES TO BE SHOWN CINCINNATI

**National Show to Give Gold Medal to Self-Sacrificing Animal**

CINCINNATI, April 2.—The American dog which in the year between April 15, 1924, and April 15, 1925, performs the most heroic deed of self-sacrifice and devotion to the human race, will be sought and crowned by the Cincinnati Kennel Club in connection with the National Dog Show, which will be held here April 17-19.

A committee of jurists has prepared an outline of the bill which would knock out the ancient law altogether. The proposal as considered by the jurists is that the Crown should be as liable as any other employer for acts committed within the scope of an employer's authority.

LONDON, April 2.—Notwithstanding the fact that there are more than 1,000,000 unemployed in England, there are jobs paying \$10,000 a year going begging. Sir Charles Higham, London's best known publicity man, said recently in an address to the British Association of Display Men.

"People have come to me," Sir Charles declared, "crying out for men capable of earning \$10,000 annually, and I have said in reply: 'You will have to go to the United States to find them!'"

Sir Charles explained that he had offered the suggestion to search abroad for candidates, because there were so few young men here who had prepared themselves for the horizon of jobs paying \$10,000 a year.

## HALIBUT PRICES AND THOSE IN EAST HAVE SPREAD ELEVEN CENTS

**John Dybnavn Points Out Relation of Prices Quoted With Those Here**

John Dybnavn pointed out this morning in connection with a telegram received by Ben Self and published in these columns yesterday after being quoted at the Board of Trade meeting Tuesday, that on the date of the telegram no western halibut had yet arrived on the Boston market.

Mr. Dybnavn says that on February 24 the schooner Pollyanna with 35,000 pounds of eastern halibut arrived, and the Ingomar with 85,000 pounds which was sold at 25¢, 48¢, and 45¢, on the 25th the Onetha F. Spinney sold 22,000 at 26¢, 21¢, and 15¢. There were no further arrivals of eastern halibut until after the first shipment of western halibut arrived on March 4. Although the price of halibut here was low, so low as to cause much worry to local fishermen, there was never a spread of more than 11 cents between prices paid here and the price sold in Boston during the first two weeks of the opening of the season.

**British Scientists May Visit Her to Try to Effect Cure**

The woman is Miss Ana Swanson, of Liebenburg, age 35, who became unconscious in 1910 when she was notified of the sudden death of her fiance.

## JAPANESE PROBLEM BEING CONSIDERED OTTAWA GOVERNMENT

**Claim Made That Immigration Laws are not Being Adhered to and Many Japs Enter Country**

A special despatch by Bruce Hutchinson to the Vancouver Staff from Ottawa in regard to the Japanese question says:

Far-reaching changes in Japanese immigration regulations, amounting in effect to a new Oriental immigration policy have been taken under consideration by the cabinet, it was learned today. British Columbia members who are closest in touch with the Oriental question have been asked to lay recommendations before the cabinet so that out of these proposals the government may mould new immigration regulations more effective than those at present in force.

Consideration of a new Japanese policy is the result of widespread dissatisfaction with existing regulations, which it is held are being flagrantly violated.

British Columbia members assert that the number of Japanese immigrants entering Canada now is not confined to the number fixed by Canada's present laws, and they urge that if the government cannot see its way clear to effect a total exclusion policy it should at least frame rules which will actually limit Japanese immigrants to certain fixed numbers.

Immigration officials admit that present regulations are not being enforced effectively.

Application to Japan of present regulations enforced against Chinese is one of the proposals suggested to the cabinet. The Chinese regulations have produced excellent results, it is said.

It may take months for the government to take any final action on the Japanese problem because of international issues involved.

### BUDGET VOTE BY EASTER?

**Two Big Features, Freight Rates and Peterson Ship Subsidy, Yet to be Finally Settled at Ottawa**

OTTAWA, Apr. 2.—With preliminary fiscal skirmishes over, the government is preparing to press its budget to a final vote before Easter. This is part of the plan to wind up the session much earlier than the date of adjournment last year. This will give parliament all the time remaining after Easter to concentrate on the two main issues of session—freight rates and the Peterson ship subsidy.

No new government legislation will be introduced until after Easter. Almost immediately, on the House re-assembling, the government will bring down a bill establishing the single transferable vote system of balloting in all constituencies represented by one member. This will introduce proportional representation to a certain degree as it will give the voter the right to indicate his second choice, if more than two candidates are running. About the same time the government will introduce its legislation to stop handbook betting. Members are looking forward to adjournment early in June.
