NEW RUM FLEET ON COAST OF CALIFORNIA

COMMONS TO VOTE MONEY FOR ELEVATOR HERE WHEN TENDERS OPENED

Pacific Coastguard Forces Admit Inability to Handle Speedy Booze Running Ships

SAN DIEGO, May 12.—The Belgian ship Gerrude, reported by officers of the coastguard cutter Tamaros to be the first of the vessels of the rapidly disintegrating Atlantic coast rum fleet to make her appearance on the Pacific, is said to be only one of a fleet of five cruising off the Lower California coast.

The coastguard forces here are not as strong as on the Atlantic coast and it was admitted today that they were badly hampered in their efforts to prevent liquor laden ships now off the coast, four of which fly the British flag, from retaining their cargo to small boats which ply from the shore. The wet craft are all faster than the government boats.

The Tamaros, which is now in port, discovered the new fleet on May 4 and gave chase, the vessels scattering in different directions. One boat, which was followed for 150 miles, found refuge in Mexican territorial waters. Later another liquor fleet was found at a Santa Rosa Island rendezvous whence it first had fled but the Tamaros was forced to return to San Diego for fuel and provisions.

BLACK ROD USHER DIES

Soldier and Newspaper Man, Col. E. J. Chambers was Well Known Dominion Figure

OTTAWA, May 12.—Col. Ernest John Chambers, gentleman usher of the Black Rod since 1901, died suddenly at his summer home in Vaudeville on Sunday night following an attack of pneumonia trouble. During his career he was soldier, war correspondent, editor and former chief press censor. Sixty-three years of age, he was one of the best known figures in the Canadian parliament. In July 1923 he was on the Pacific coast on the occasion of the visit to Vancouver of the late President Harding.

AIR SERVICE MAN KILLED

Lieut. Walter Woods Loses Life and R. W. Roberts Hurt in Accident at Seattle

SEATTLE, May 12.—Lieut. Walter Woods of the United States air service reserve corps was instantly killed and R. W. Roberts was badly injured when an army airplane piloted by Woods fell 100 feet near Sand Point aviation field on Lake Washington. The plane took a nose dive into a grove of trees.

DEATH SENTENCE ON EIGHT BULGARIANS

Were Connected With Recent Bomb Outrage in Sofia Cathedral

SOFIA, May 12.—Eight men, including a sacristan who admitted his complicity with the recent bomb outrage in the Svetitski Cathedral, were sentenced to death yesterday and will probably be executed this week. The sacristan was granted private execution. The public accepted the sentences without demonstration.

KING SALMON SEASON STARTS AT CORDOVA

Fishermen Leave for the Grounds and Canneries Will Open on Friday Next

CORDOVA, May 12.—Many fishermen left here on Monday to fish for king salmon, the run of which started on Saturday. Canneries will begin operations on Friday. The salmon caught to date have averaged 25 pounds in weight. The ice on Copper River is expected to break today.

Word was received yesterday afternoon that the C.G.M.M. freighter, Canadian Prospector, which is coming to the local dry dock for overhaul, will not arrive until Friday. The vessel is coming direct from the Orient, having left Shanghai on April 23. After the work on the boat here is finished, she will proceed to Vancouver and Victoria to load cargo.

MURDER TRIAL IS PROCEEDING

Dr. B. Blackwood Was Witness in Janet Smith Case This Morning

VANCOUVER, May 12.—The adjourned preliminary hearing of Wong Sing, charged with the murder of Janet Smith, was resumed in the Point Grey police court this morning. Before the first witness was called, it was agreed between crown and defence counsel that the evidence taken last Friday should not be gone over. This evidence, chiefly of an expert nature with regard to the description of the apartment of the Baker house, was objected to at first by J. H. Jenker, counsel for Wong, because it had not been interpreted to accused. Since then, however, Gmyow, the interpreter, translated this to Wong.

Dr. B. Blackwood, who was summoned to the Baker home following the discovery of the body of the murdered nursemaid, was the first witness this morning. He testified that when he arrived the body was still warm and stiffening had not yet set in.

ELECTION NOT YET IN SIGHT

Conservatives in this Riding are, However, Getting Busy—Will be Hard for Them to Win

While there is no definite prospect so far of a federal election this year, preparations are being made all over the country, especially by the Conservatives, for the contest. The decision as to when an election will be held rests in the hands of the government at Ottawa. No indication has yet been given of an immediate dissolution of parliament but it is, of course, quite possible that an announcement may be made along these lines before the present session ends.

So far as can be seen on the surface, there is little political stir in this riding yet. The Conservatives have, however, called a nominating convention for May 20 and this week there will be a meeting of the local Association to select delegates for that convention. Who will be Conservative candidate not even the Tories themselves yet seem to have any idea.

In all probability, Fred Stork, the sitting member, will again bear the Liberal standard. He has given the district good service during the last term and it will be difficult if possible to find a candidate to beat him.

Democrats at Washington Plan to Rehabilitate Themselves by Controlling House and Senate

WASHINGTON, May 12.—By Canadian Press.—Democratic leaders will make a big drive next year to capture the House of Representatives. This is considered settled, in spite of the fact some of the Democratic chiefs have the feeling that if they do capture control of one or both houses next year it will hurt rather than help their party in 1928.

So far as the Senate is concerned, the Democrats believe they will capture it with little effort. This is the case because of the fact nearly all the Senators whose terms will next end are Republicans. In other words, the Democrats believe the Senate will fall into their control in 1926 almost inevitably and, that being so, they will do their utmost also to capture the House.

The danger the Democrats see in gaining control in Congress in the middle of the Coolidge administration is that it will enable the Republicans to place a large share of responsibility for the course of legislation on the Democrats. Now, the Democrats, having neither the executive nor the legislative branch, are free from responsibility. On the other hand, the Democrats feel that they will effect something for party rehabilitation if they organize and make a real fight for control in 1926. The process of reorganization and rehabilitation, as they see it, will tend to offset the drawback of having to bear some of the responsibility for the course of government in a Republican administration.

LOCAL MEN IN SMASH

Andy Donald and Babe Fortin Badly Shaken up on Pacific Highway

VANCOUVER, May 12.—Andy Donald and Babe Fortin, both formerly of Prince Rupert, were badly shaken up but not injured in an auto smash-up here yesterday. Donald, driving a McLaughlin Six, collided with a Ford on the Pacific Highway while driving with Fortin to witness a ball game at New Westminster. Both cars were badly damaged. Donald, whose nerves were badly shaken, is being charged with driving to the common danger.

MORE ABOUT MAYO BLAZE

Situation Was Saved by Bucket Brigade with Everybody in Town on Job

DAWSON, May 12.—Further word about the fire at Mayo states that six buildings were destroyed including a hotel. Many buildings were partly burned. The citizens had all they could do to keep the entire town from going up in smoke. The fire engine was out of commission and the situation was saved by a bucket brigade. Every man, woman and child in the town was on the job. The loss has not yet been estimated but it will probably run into many thousands of dollars.

BEER ON CANADIAN NATIONAL TRAINS

Hindenburg, Sworn in Today as President of Germany, Receives Cheers of Multitude Assembled

BERLIN, May 12.—Field Marshal von Hindenburg was sworn into office as president of Germany before a great crowd in the Reichstag today. The event passed off smoothly with the exception of a brief shout of protest from Communists. Hindenburg was given a vociferous welcome upon his arrival in Berlin yesterday and during his five mile drive through packed streets. The Socialists and Communists refrained from welcoming the Nationalist hero but did not indulge in any counter demonstrations such as were expected.

Half Million Estimate for Local Grain Plant Considered at Ottawa

OTTAWA, May 12.—The vote of \$500,000 to be devoted to the construction of the terminal grain elevator at Prince Rupert has been allowed to stand over until after tenders for the building are opened.

When the item came before the House of Commons on Monday in committee of supply, Hon. T. A. Low, minister of trade and commerce, agreed with members of the opposition that it might be advisable to return to the matter later in the session when further details of the construction will be available.

The tenders for the construction of the superstructure will be opened on May 18, it is expected, and no delay is anticipated in getting the money voted and the work under way.

AMERICANS GET BEST PRICES FOR HALIBUT

Total of 130,700 Pounds Marketed at Exchange—Bidding Was at Good Level

Halibut arrivals this morning totalled 130,700 pounds. Three American boats disposed of 77,200 pounds and six Canadians, 9,500 pounds. Prices were still fairly good, Americans getting in average of 15c and 6c—two cents better than the bids for Canadian fish.

PEACE RIVER RETURN MADE

Little of Property Given to Dominion by B.C. in 1871 is Disposed of

OTTAWA, May 12.—Little of the acreage in the Peace River block which was decided by the province of British Columbia to the Dominion in 1871 has been disposed of as revealed in a return tabled in the House of Commons on Monday. Of a total of three and a half million acres but 1130 acres have been sold, \$2324 being received as a result of the sale. In addition 75,231 acres have been leased and \$3,490 received for the rental.

CUSTOMS SEIZE RUM SCHOONER

Lirio de August, Nicaraguan Ship, Arrested on Return from Voyage to South America

VICTORIA, May 12.—The Lirio de August, a schooner formerly under Canadian registry but now flying the Nicaraguan ensign, was seized by the customs on its return Saturday from a South American voyage. The vessel cleared from Vancouver in January with 6,000 cases of whiskey and returned in ballast. Pending the making of a full report to Ottawa, the customs would not disclose the reason for the seizure.
