President of Germany, Receives Cheers of Multitude Assembled

BERLIN, May 12 .- Field Marshal von Hindenburg was sworn into office as president of Germany before a great crown in the Reischstag today. The event passed off smoothly with th exception of a brief shout of protest from Communists. Hindenburg was given a vociferous welcome upon his arrival in Berli. yesterday and during his five mile drive through packed streets The Socialists and Communists refrained from welcoming the Nationalist hero but did not indulge in any counter demonstrations such as were expected.

Observing Hospital Day In Prince Rupert.

Today, May 12, is officially designated as National Hospital Day-a day set apart for the education of the public on hospital matters. Because the day will be more convenient, Thursday of this week will be observed in Prince Rupert as National Hospital Day. The hospital board is inviting the public at large to visit the hospital on that day so that it may be seen at first room, a laboratory, a reference hospital library, and suitable hand how a hospital is administered. Before visiting the hospital, it might be well for people to have some advance knowledge as to how the institution is managed and conducted. view of this the following statements are published:

General Management Of The Hospital.

The general management of the Prince Rupert Hospital is in the hands of a board composed of five members elected by the association members in annual meeting, two representatives from the city council, one from the provincial government, one from the medical association and one from the ladies' hospital days' vacation each year. auxiliary, ten in all. Miss Edith McCaul, R.N. on Nursing Profession

Women who intend entering the nursing profession should give the matter a great deal of consideration. One not adapted to the work is sure to find it wearisome but to those who possees the necessary qualification, nursing offers a life of unusual interest and asefulneess. To an intelligent and progressive student it opens a wide range of knowledge and an unlimited means of self development as well as its rare opportunity to help others. It is found that mere sentimentality is completely discouraged when put to the test of the arditous and monotonous

routine of the essential practical work. The qualifications necessary for making a good nurse are considered under three headings; physical, mental and moral. Candidates must be over 19 years of age with two years high school or its equivalent. Women of superior education and culture when equally fitted for the work are given the preference. Nurses must make 75 per cent or over at the final yearly! examinations and are required to pass the provincial examinations at the end of their third year, which qualifies them to City Delivery, by mail or carrier, per month \$1.00 practice nursing as called for under the Registered Nurses Act. Each pupil desiring to become registered shall make applica-\$6.00 tion to the registrar in whatever province she is resident or in To all other countries, in advance, per year \$7.50 whichever province she had her training, stating qualification, training school attended and length of course and must furnish satisfactory evidence of residence, character, age and identification and shall produce the diploma or certificate of qualification awarded by the training school. Every applicant who

> titled to practice professional nursing in the province and to append the letters R.N. to her name.

> All training schools in British Columbia came under the inspection and supervision of the Graduate Nurses' Association of B.C. which demand that such school give a three year course of instruction and provide general training in medical, surgical obstetrical and pediatric nursing and which schools are then registered by the council under this Act as approved training schools. Schools which do not provide adequate opportunities in all the above departments are not registered as approved schools unless they affiliate with institutions approved as giving such opportunities. (It may be stated here that the Prince R 1pert General is the only approved training school without affiliation, in the north). It demands a class and demonstration living quarters (separate from the hospital building) and all accredited schools must provide instruction to their pupils as set forth in the nursing curriculum. It demands a superintendent or director of nursing who is a registered nurse in that province and possesses such qualifications as will enable her! to direct the nursing service and completely administer the affairs of the school, also graduate nurse supervisors of various departments, especially maternity and operating room.

Each student is permitted two hours each day off duty for recreation, one hour for study, one hour for meals. Also half day per week free and four hours on Sunday with twenty-one






