NO WORD YET RECEIVED FROM AMUNDSEN-ELLSWORTH POLAR EXPEDITION

President of Taltapin Here Today following Visit to Babine Mine

Will be shipping property just as soon as road in good condition says W. C. Stearman

The Taltapin mine in the Babine district some 25 miles north of Burns Lake is already in a position to ship ore but improvements will have to be made on the road between the property and Burns Lake before much can be done states W. C. Stearman of Vancouver, president of the company, who is in the city today after paying his first visit to the mine. Mr. Stearman comes back highly delighted with all he saw and is confident that the Taltapin is the making of a big profitable mine. There are large bodies of silver-lead ore, both high and low grade, with strong showings of zinc in some parts.

HUGH DAVIDSON MAY RESIGN AS COMMISSIONER

His Liquor Policy Said to be Injurious to Government, Says Woodward

VANCOUVER, May 28.—Hugh Davidson may resign his position as liquor controller, according to a statement issued today by Charles Woodward, M.L.A. of Vancouver, which states that on May 12 as a member of a deputation of Liberal members from Vancouver he failed to impress upon Davidson that his liquor policy was a "serious weakness to the Liberal Party." The commissioner, however, stated that if he thought the liquor policy injurious to the Government he would resign.

BIG WINNINGS ON DERBY RACE

Liverpool Clerk and London Widow are Made Wealthy—Manna's Owner Makes Clean-up


LONDON, May 28.—James Garraw, a Liverpool shipping clerk, held the winning ticket in the Calcutta sweepstakes on the Derby yesterday. He sold a half interest in the ticket for \$10,000 and collected \$190,000 on the remaining half.

H. E. Morris, owner of Manna the Derby winner, in addition to taking the stakes, secured a half interest in the London Stock Exchange sweepstake for \$14,000 and collected approximately \$100,000.

Mrs. Anna Elliott, a widow clerking in a departmental store, won second prize in the Baltic Exchange sweepstake valued at \$100,000. She had, however, disposed of a half interest in the ticket.

GEOLOGISTS GOING NORTH

Will Study Formation in Dease Lake and Taku River Districts

VANCOUVER, May 28.—For the geological survey of Canada W. A. Johnston and Dr. F. A. Kerr have been assigned by the Federal Government to compile exact information on the Dease Lake district. Both geologists left last night on the steamer Princess Mary in company with Dr. W. E. Cockfield who is re-entering the Yukon to continue a research which has extended over 13 years.

Kerr will devote attention to the bedrock formation of the Dease Lake country while Johnston will study the placer deposits exclusively. Cockfield will take a party of youths trained in geology at the University of B.C. through the area in the northwest corner of B.C. where few white men and no geologists have been in the Taku River country.

DEATH TOLL IN EXPLOSION

Eight Bodies Recovered From Carolina Mine—Three Score More Men Feared Dead

COAL GLEN, North Carolina, May 28.—With eight bodies recovered from the wrecked mine of the Carolina Coal Co., at noon today, there were approximately three score miners still trapped one thousand feet below the ground as a result of the gas explosion yesterday. Little hope is held out that any of them will be recovered alive.

HOP-OFF SET FOR FRIDAY

Archibald Little and His Associates Hope to Have Lunch in Wrangell Tomorrow

Weather conditions today being unsettled, the hop off of the Vickers Viking flying boat which will take Archibald Little, Detroit mining engineer to the Cassiar gold fields will not take place this afternoon but is now set for tomorrow morning. Col. J. Scott Williams, manager of the Laurentide Air Service and pilot of the machine, stated that he hoped the party would be in Wrangell for lunch tomorrow. There is some business to be transacted there but it is possible that the machine may be flown on to Telegraph Creek tomorrow afternoon or the day following.

The machine was taken up for a test flight yesterday afternoon and it performed perfectly. It is now moored and anchored at its buoy in front of the dry dock ship shed all ready for the dash north. The party is packing up its effects at the Prince Rupert Hotel today in readiness for an early start tomorrow.

DAVIDSON DENIES HE WILL RESIGN

Not Worrying About Criticisms Made Over Issuing of Vancouver Beer Licenses

VICTORIA, May 28.—Hugh Davidson, liquor controller, denies any intention of resigning as a result of criticisms levelled at him over the issuing of beer parlor licenses in Vancouver.

TOM O'BRIEN PASSES AWAY

Was Well Known and Picturesque Local Figure—Resided in City Many Years

One of Prince Rupert's best known and most picturesque figures passed away yesterday afternoon at 3 o'clock in the Prince Rupert General Hospital when the death occurred of Thomas O'Brien, a pioneer of some fourteen or fifteen years' standing.

Mr. O'Brien, who was born some 68 years ago in St. John, N.B. of Irish descent, in his younger days was a sailor. When he first came to Prince Rupert he was a longshoreman and for the past few years he had been engaged as city pound-keeper.

A few months ago he collapsed in his residence on Ninth Ave. West and physical examination established that he was suffering from diabetes in an advanced stage. He was immediately taken to the Prince Rupert General Hospital and a leg was amputated but the disease was too far advanced to hope for recovery.

Funeral arrangements are in the hands of the B.C. Undertakers and interment will take place on Saturday morning under Catholic auspices.

The late Mr. O'Brien is survived by a sister believed to be residing in St. John.

The Ketchikan cannery packer Diamond T., Capt. Capp, arrived in port from Ketchikan yesterday with 7,000 pounds of fresh salmon which was discharged at the Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Co.'s dock.

Not Murder but Act of Insanity Was Killing of Child at Nanaimo by Victim of Religious Frenzy

NANAIMO, May 28.—Leslie Dickie, 64 years of age, charged with the murder of his two year old grandson under circumstances of extraordinary religious frenzy was late yesterday found "not guilty" by a jury of the assize court. The jury was out 35 minutes.

Counsel for accused did not ask for his discharge and later in the evening Dickie was examined by two doctors, who adjudged him insane.

Magistrate Beaver Potts signed the warrant committing Dickie to the asylum, to which place he was taken this morning.

As soon as the jury was discharged they hurried to the crown attorney and said that what they meant was that Dickie was not guilty because of insanity.

Dickie and his wife testified at the trial that his condition of religious frenzy was induced by his conversion through an evangelistic mission of so called "divine healing."

STEAMER CATALA LEAVES SCOTLAND

New Union Boat for Prince Rupert and Cannery Service is Now on Way to this Coast

The Union Steamship Co.'s new coastal steamer Catala, built in the Old Country for the run between Vancouver and Prince Rupert and cannery points, left the Clyde River yesterday bound for this coast. Capt. J. A. Findlay, master of the Camosun, is bringing the new boat out and it is stated that Capt. Andy Johnstone, now of the Venture, will take command of her when she enters service after arriving in Vancouver in July. The new vessel is similar to the Cardena but a few feet shorter.

PRINCESS VICTORIA CHARTERED FOR RACES

Victoria Regatta Interests Arrange for Big Vessel to Follow Events

VICTORIA, May 28.—The G. P. R. steamer Princess Victoria has been chartered by the Regatta managers for the period July 1 to 5, in order to provide a means by which the visitors may watch the big regatta to be held here during those days. She will make her headquarters at Cadboro Bay.

The regatta is expected to be the biggest ever held in Victoria.

AMUNDSEN IS STILL SILENT

No Word from Polar Aerial Expedition—May be Waiting at Point Barrow

LOCAL VIEW

NOME, May 28.—The ice which which has locked Kotzebue Sound, 200 miles north of Nome, is now going out. No word has yet been received from the Amundsen-Ellsworth polar expedition. Should they choose to wait at Point Barrow or Wainwright for a trading vessel to bring them out some weeks will elapse before news of their arrival will be received.

Col. J. Scott Williams, pilot of the Vickers Viking airplane which is here on its way to the Cassiar gold fields, is of the opinion that the polar expedition may have landed safely at the North Pole and may be going on with exploration work there. He is confident that Amundsen's knowledge of the region will ensure he and his party ultimately getting out safely providing their airplanes did not come to grief and the explorers were not thus killed or injured.

HABEAS CORPUS FOR WONG SING

Application to be Made in Supreme Court Next Week to Free Prisoner

VANCOUVER, May 28.—J. H. Senkler, K.C., counsel for Wong Sing, charged with the murder of Janet Smith, today announced that an application would be made for a writ of habeas corpus for the Chinese houseboy's discharge from Okalla on the grounds that there was no evidence against accused to warrant his committal for trial introduced at the preliminary hearing.

It is expected that the application will be brought on in the Supreme Court next week.

MAJOR GENERAL MORRISON DIES

OTTAWA, May 28.—Major-General Sir Edward Morrison, K.C., former editor of the Ottawa Citizen and prominent in the South African war and also in the Great War, died this morning aged 68. He was commander of the Canadian artillery during the Somme actions in 1916 and during the Victorians forward drive on the western front. During the later days of the war Sir Edward's military skill became widely known.

West Has Peace While East Is Being Worried.

Three provincial elections will be held this year, it is stated, the first of which will be in the province of Saskatchewan. That means that in the provinces affected there will be a certain amount of disturbance and conflict. British Columbia is out of politics, unless it should happen that a federal election is decided upon, in which case the war would be on here as well as elsewhere. It is hardly to be expected, however, that the Dominion government will appeal to the country. Nobody really wants an election. About the only thing that would force it at present would be for the Progressives to unite against the government, something they are not likely to do.

King's Threat Was Effective.

It looks as if the opposition was making a fight for show purposes. They are not sure when an election may take place so they feel they have to put themselves right with the constituencies. When the Premier threatened that if there was not more speed in legislation an election would be called, the opposition seemed to have got cold feet and made their opposition more reasonable. Better progress is being made and the House will adjourn in the near future, unless something unforeseen occurs.

Game Regulations Being Considered.

The Game Board is making investigations in regard to regulation for the protection of game and the benefit of the trapper. This is the time when those who have something to say about the regulations should say it. The members of the board will be in Prince Rupert before long and will be glad to receive suggestions.

The chief difficulty we see at present is making the regulations north of the railway different from those to the south. The railway is the centre of settlement and to make an arbitrary division of that kind is to tempt lawbreaking. True, the dividing line must be somewhere, but the opinion seems to be prevalent that it would be better to have it pass through an inaccessible region than along the middle of fertile valleys where people live close together on either side.

Member Exonerated Of Political Charges.

J. R. Colley, member of the Legislature for Kamloops, was threatened with the loss of his seat because his firm received money from the government for goods supplied before he was elected. Also it was charged that he sold small quantities of goods to the government later. According to the judgment of Mr. Justice McDonald some goods were sold to people who came for them and paid cash and the vendor did not know where they were to be used. They were used on government work but the judge exonerated Mr. Colley from all blame.

The idea of the law is to protect the province from legislators selling it goods and at the same time administering its affairs. To allow them to do business with the government would be to invite disaster. The law is a good one and it is good news that it has not been broken by any member of the House.

SCHOOL LIFE IS DISCUSSED

Inspector Fraser Would Not Have Everything Made Easy For Pupils

KEEP UP TO TIMES

School life should be a pleasure for the child from the day of first entering school until the last day in university or wherever studies may be ended, declared H. C. Fraser, inspector of schools, in addressing the Gyro Club yesterday. This joy should not be, however, because the path was an easy one but should be found in the accomplishment of difficult tasks. The child should early be taught to take pleasure in successfully doing tasks instead of turning to some recreation that might offer itself. As the child was in school so would the man be in the wider work of life in business, trade or profession, and success in school would probably mean success in life.

Referring to the entrance and matriculation examinations required under the present school system, Mr. Fraser expressed the opinion that neither of these tests should prove a strain either to pupils or teachers, providing the training in advance had been conducted thoroughly and systematically. Proper grading of pupils was an important factor in school work and mental tests in bringing about such grading were therefore advantageous.

School System

Some people said that the school system of British Columbia was "rotten" while others said that it was splendid and could not be improved upon. Mr. Fraser was inclined to feel that both opinions were extreme. The system was capable of being improved upon but it was far from being a poor system. The adoption of new methods was a slow process but gradually, if they stood the practical test, they would be assimilated. It was necessary for the successful teacher to keep abreast of the times and keep in touch with new methods.

Mr. Fraser dealt with the recent educational survey conducted in the province by the commission consisting of Dr. P. W. P. of Ottawa and Dr. Weir of Vancouver. This survey had been taken primarily at the request of the teachers themselves. Such surveys were being made at regular intervals in other provinces. While the recommendations of the commission had not yet been made public, Mr. Fraser predicted that they would call for changes, bringing about more efficiency in the schools as a whole. This would not necessarily mean a reduction in educational expenditure.

Stands by Examination

Mr. Fraser was inclined to stand by the system of examinations now in vogue for entrance to High School and University. The time was not ripe, he felt, for the adoption of the credit system as was followed in the United States. Examinations that had been held in Prince Rupert during the past two years had shown that very successful teaching was being done in the local public schools. The educational system in Great Britain and likewise in Canada, Mr. Fraser felt, was obtaining better results than that in the United States.

Mr. Fraser's address was listened to with a great deal of interest by the Gyro Club members. President R. F. McNaughton was in the chair and guests of the club were Howard Frizzell and Ross Draper of San Francisco.

THUNDERING HERD IS STORY OF BUFFALO

Zane Grey Tells How He Came to Write the Story Told in Picture

It would take a long time to tell all about how I came to write "The Thundering Herd"—almost as long as it took to write the book. But perhaps I can give you some idea in short space says Zane Grey, the author of the book.

In the first place, some fifteen years ago I had the great good fortune to become a friend of the old plainsman, Buffalo Jones, and he took me on some wild trips to the North Rim of the Great Canyon. He was really the saviour of the buffalo—that is to say, he captured most of the buffalo calves, from which have descended all the buffalo living today. Naturally, I became wonderfully interested in these fine, big animals.

One day I was pretty much scared by Jones' cowboys, who put me on a white horse that the buffalo hated, and the whole herd took after me and chased me all over the desert. Not until afterwards did the cowboys tell me that the white horse thought it was play, and could never have been caught by the buffalo.

From Buffalo Jones I first heard about the millions of buffalo on the plains in the early days—the vast thundering herds and the stories of how they were massacred for their hides and bones. Hides sold as cheap as twenty-five cents. This slaughter was one of the bloodiest carnages in the history of the world, and a terrible blunder. For the buffalo were superior to cattle, and would have enriched our great west. But they were butchered in a few short years.

I determined to write the story of the vanishing of the thundering herds, and set about getting my material. A few years ago I visited the plains of Kansas, Oklahoma and the Pan Handle of Texas, to make myself familiar with the prairie land where the vast herds used to roam. I found deep buffalo wallows and trails, but no other signs of the American bison. Then from all I had gathered I wrote "The Thundering Herd."

After the boy produced his specimen, the bedbug slayer was found all over Manitoba.

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

FORKE URGES TALKING PEACE


Says Should Have Skeleton Army of Smallest Possible Size

Robert Forke, leader of the Progressives, speaking in the House of Commons last week said:

"Mr. Chairman, the military men have had their innings in discussing this question. It seems to me that perhaps the military mind does not always view it just exactly the same as the civilian mind does. Sixty thousand Canadians laid down their lives in a war to end war. I want that phrase to sink into the minds of hon. members to my right, who have been talking about the 'next war'—sixty thousand Canadians laid down their lives in a war that was to end war; now we are busily talking about how we are going to raise another big army to go to war again. Just as long as we have discussions of this kind in every country under the sun we will have war. If we spend our time on the problems of peace, spreading the gospel of peace and showing how peace can be brought about, we will accomplish a great deal more in preserving peace than we can ever expect to by talking about preparing for war. Whom are we going to go to war against I want to know? Who are our enemies? Where is the hostile force that is hovering on the borders of this Dominion ready to attack us if we have not a large army to defend ourselves?"

Respects Other Opinion

I believe it is quite right to have a skeleton army of the smallest possible size to take care of any internal disorders that may break out, and to do its share if the country is ever attacked, which I think is a very remote contingency. I believe that if we attend to our own business and keep the banner of peace unfurled there is very little danger for a long time to come of this Dominion being invaded. I have every respect for hon. members to my right who were engaged in the late war

RUM RUNNING TRADE FROM BRITAIN TO BE CARRIED ON SECRETLY

Arrangements for Shipments Must be Made Without any Publicity

GERMANY IS GO BETWEEN

LONDON, May 28.—Despite the disastrous experiences of Britain's rum-running baronet and the many setbacks of the rum-running trade—the rum-running trade still goes on. It is very difficult now to get clearance for a cargo from any British port, however ingeniously the voyage may be planned, but there is no difficulty in shipping whiskey to German ports, and there is little difficulty in getting clearance in Germany for transference of cargo at sea or for West Indian destinations.

Most of the motor-schooner traffic seems now to be done from Germany, and a good deal of the spirits are made there. But there are still firms in the City who are at the back of the traffic, and officers and men are engaged here for the business. Naturally it is a shy business, and preliminaries are not arranged at offices. Some of the stories heard in mercantile marine quarters sound like opening chapters in Stevenson's novels.

A few weeks ago, for instance, a merchant's officer had an appointment made through a colleague with a gentleman "with an American hat and a white flower in his buttonhole" outside the Royal Exchange at noon. He went, but he did not see his man. Then word was brought to him that next time he came for a private appointment with a gentleman he was to come alone. He had gone to the rendezvous accompanied by a friend. Another appointment was made at the same respectable place, and he found the American gentleman with the American hat and white flower, but the ship's officer, in the view of the merchant, wanted too much security for his bonus for business to be done.




MOUNTAINS TEMPT LOVER OF OUTDOORS



ONE of the finest Alpine territories to be found anywhere on the North American Continent is that surrounding Mount Robson, (13,668 ft.), highest peak in the Canadian Rockies. Here the visitor finds magnificent peaks, awe-inspiring glaciers and delightful Alpine valleys with their magnificence of wild flowers to charm the heart of the nature lover. In 1924 the Alpine Club of Canada held its annual camp on the shores of Berg Lake, shown above, and members of that organization, many of whom have climbed in different parts of the world, were

unanimous in declaring that Canada held no more splendid Alpine and scenic territory than this. Nor is it necessary that the visitor be an experienced Alpinist to enjoy the beauties of the Mount Robson district, for there are within a short distance of the Berg Lake bungalow, splendid peaks which are easy enough in ascent for the tyro and yet offering splendid views of the surrounding Alps.

The photograph shows Mount Robson, the monarch of the Canadian Rockies, and Berg Lake, so named because of the icebergs which are constantly floating on its surface. Beneath is one of the Swiss guides from Jasper Park Lodge, coiling his rope in preparation for leading an ascent on Mount Robson, while to the right he is shown making his way round one of the difficult ice peaks of the climb.

NATIVE SONS TO ORGANIZE HERE

Meeting Last Night Decided to Apply for Charter — Past Grand President Speaks

An assembly of the Native Sons of Canada is to be formed in Prince Rupert. At a well-attended meeting in the Enad Hall last night, after R. H. Carson of Vancouver, past grand president of the Native Sons of Canada, had delivered an address a resolution was passed that steps be taken to form an assembly in this city. Sufficient names were then secured to obtain a charter and steps in that direction are at once to be taken. The meeting was presided over by Harry Breen.

In the course of his address, Mr. Carson gave a resume of the aims and objects of the Native Sons of Canada. The organization had had its inception in Victoria and there were now some 35 or so assemblies in British Columbia and Alberta. An endeavor was being made now to make it a Canadian national organization by linking up with bodies in the east having similar objects.

Mr. Carson has just returned from a trip as far east as Montreal. He stated that he had found in all centres of the east that thinking Canadians were very interested in the movement

as they felt that there was a necessity for some strictly Canadian organization having as its objective the uniting of Canadians both east and west by developing a distinctly Canadian national sentiment. One particular object of the organization was to promote the Canadian spirit among immigrants so that they might become desirous of embracing Canadianism in all its best aspects.

In the course of his trip west during the past few days, Mr. Carson, who arrived here on last night's train, visited the branches of the Native Sons of Canada in Edmonton, Prince George and Terrace. He found them in a very flourishing condition and he is satisfied that there is splendid material to form a strong assembly here.

Mr. Carson was met at Jasper by his wife and they will proceed south on the Prince George tonight. Mr. Carson is a well known Point Grey broker.

SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENTS

PRE-EMPTIONS

Vacant, unreserved, surveyed Crown lands may be pre-empted by British subjects over 18 years of age, and by aliens on declaring intention to become British subjects, conditional upon residence, occupation, and improvement for agricultural purposes.

Full information concerning regulations regarding pre-emptions is given in Bulletin No. 1, Land Series, "How to Pre-empt Land" copies of which can be obtained free of charge by addressing the Department of Lands, Victoria, B.C., or to any Government Agent.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes, and which is not timberland, i.e. carrying over 8,000 board feet per acre west of the Coast Range and 5,000 feet per acre east of that Range.

Applications for pre-emptions are to be addressed to the Land Commissioner of the Land Recording Division, in which the land applied for is situated, and are made on printed forms, copies of which can be obtained from the Land Commissioner. Pre-emptions must be occupied for five years and improvements made to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivating at least five acres, before a Crown Grant can be received.

PURCHASE

Applications are received for purchase of vacant and unreserved Crown lands, not being timberland, for agricultural purposes; minimum price for first-class (arable) land is \$5 per acre, and second-class (grazing) land \$2.50 per acre. Further information regarding purchase or lease of Crown lands is given in Bulletin No. 10, Land Series, "Purchase and Lease of Crown Lands."

Mill, factory, or industrial sites on timber land, not exceeding 40 acres, may be purchased or leased, the conditions including payment of stumpage.

HOMESITE LEASES

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesites, conditional upon a dwelling being erected in the first year, title being obtainable after residence and improvement conditions are fulfilled and land has been surveyed.

LEASES

For grazing and industrial purposes areas not exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or a company.

GRAZING

Under the Grazing Act the Province is divided into grazing districts and the range administrators under a Grazing Commissioner. Annual grazing permits are issued based on numbers ranged, priority being given to established owners. Stock-owners may form associations for range management. Free, or partly free, permits are available for settlers, campers and travellers, up to ten head.
