# WITNESSES ARE CALLED FOR MURDER CASE

## AIRPLANE IS TO LEAVE HERE SOON FOR THE DEASE LAKE MINING DISTRICT

### Terrace Forest Fire Destroys Telegraphs

Started Yesterday Afternoon Three Miles East  
of Town and is Burning Both  
Sides of Track

A forest fire of some proportions, the first of the season, interfered with telegraphic communication last night and this morning. The blaze, which started yesterday afternoon, is some three miles east of Terrace. It started by the railway track and this morning was reported to be burning on both sides of the track to a width of 400 feet one mile long. No damage is being done to standing timber, the conflagration being in old slashings.

The railway company has had a crew out fighting the blaze since seven o'clock last night.

### IS VIOLATING ARMS PARLEY UNDERTAKINGS

G.W.V.A. Gets Novel View on  
United States Dry Enforcement Fleet

VICTORIA, May 6.—Under the nose of prohibition enforcement, the United States is building up a great mosquito fleet of armed speed boats which could immediately be put into service in case of war and is thereby violating agreements of the Washington disarmament conference, according to an assertion made before a Great War Veterans' meeting here last night by Capt. P. Shadford and W. G. Stone.

### R.E. BEATTIE DIES SUDDENLY

Vancouver Harbor Commissioner Died at Spokane While on Way from Cranbrook to Coast

VANCOUVER, May 6.—Robert E. Beattie, aged 50, harbor commissioner, died on Tuesday in Spokane while enroute from Cranbrook. His death was due to heart trouble and burial will take place in Cranbrook.

In the last Dominion election, Mr. Beattie was elected Liberal member for East Kootenay. He resigned his seat in favor of Dr. J. H. King, minister of public works, and was subsequently appointed to the Vancouver harbor commission.

### ADD TO POPULATION

HAVANA, May 6.—The population of Cuba increased 225,743 during 1924, a statement issued by F. V. Preval, chief of the national census office, says. The 1924 figures give a total of 3,368,925 against 3,143,219 for 1923.

### Mining Man at Vancouver on Way to Prince Rupert to Fly to Dease Lake Gold District

VANCOUVER, May 6.—Archibald Little, a Detroit mining engineer, is leaving here in a few days for Prince Rupert after completing arrangements here to fly from Prince Rupert into the Dease Lake and Peace River districts.

In an interview here Mr. Little said: "If we find anything, and we certainly expect to do so, there's plenty of eastern money behind us to back up a big program of development in this province."

ATLANTA, Georgia, May 6.—Six firemen were killed and it is believed that three more bodies are in the ruins as a result of the collapse of the upper floor of a building which was on fire here this morning. The firemen were fighting the fire from the street when the upper floor and front wall collapsed, burying them in the debris.

### Liquor Runners Being Sued by United States Government for Income Tax and Other Payments

VICTORIA, May 6.—Following the seizure of the Victoria rum-runner Quadra, with a \$500,000 liquor cargo, and the subsequent sentencing of members of her crew to prison and heavy fines; the seizure of the Coal Harbor with a \$500,000 cargo; the seizure of the Peschewa, also with a valuable liquor cargo, and the total loss by fire and explosion of the liquor carrier Speedyway, comes the advice from San Francisco that a suit against the Consolidated Exports Corporation, Ltd., and the Canadian-Mexican Corp., Ltd., of Victoria and Vancouver, to collect approximately \$91,000 in income taxes, penalties and interests for 1924, has been filed in the United States Federal Court.

The advice from San Francisco says:

Suit against the Consolidated Exporters Corporation, Ltd., and the Canadian-Mexican Corporation, Ltd., of Vancouver, B.C., to collect approximately \$1,000,000 worth of business in the United States last year, on which no income taxes were paid.

Liquor on Vessels

The suit is in the form of a lien against property owned by the companies in California, said to comprise two merchant ships, the Quadra and Coal Harbor, both of which were seized some time ago for rum running. It was reported several days ago that no indictment had been announced against the Coal Harbor or its crew. It is thought by local shipping men that the Coal Harbor is being held on a charge of unpaid income tax, as the vessel was twenty-two miles off shore when seized and outside the danger zone for rum runners.

That liquor exporting from this Province has been dogged by a consistent jinx is indicated in the number of seizures made by the United States coastguard, and the series of depressing incidents that has been trailing this business. In addition to the already mentioned incidents that have occurred to liquor carriers operating out of this port and Vancouver, the Prince Albert has been ordered to be sold at auction to pay part of the damage claim made by the Pacific Commercial Cable Company against that liquor carrier.

### Easy Enough to Cheat Eternity by Living 150 Years Says Sir Donald Ross, English Scientist

LONDON, May 6.—That the span of life can be extended to 150 years at the cost of a sixpence a head, is the argument of Sir Ronald Ross, the English scientist whose researches have led to cures for malaria and sleeping sickness. Sir Ronald claims that a sixpence from the pocket of every Englishman spent in scientific research, would result in new medical knowledge that would keep germs and old age away for at least 150 years.

The scientist thinks that the allotted span of three score years and ten should find a man in the prime of life, instead of edging him toward the grave. We live curtailed lives, he says, because we are the prey of countless germs. Conquer the germs and man can easily reach the age of 150 and maybe longer.

Change Already

"Eighty years ago," said Sir

This start on cheating eternity has just begun, the speaker continues. Nowadays the equivalent of one penny a head is being spent in Britain for research, and he asserted that the spending of a sixpence a head would make the monkey gland useless.

A scientist of the Pasteur Institute in Paris as predicted that in 100 years from now the average man will live to be 150 years old. Mechanikoff, the Russian scientist, has made the same prophecy. These visions of a future race of Methuselahs are to materialize through the agency of the research laboratory in Sir Ronald's opinion.

### Trace All Diseases

The laboratory worker in the next generation, if allowed full scope, will trace all destructive diseases to their source and exterminate them, instead of combating them after they have appeared, Sir Ronald said. Already research laboratories are at work on important medical problems. The Pasteur Institute is seeking to destroy cancer and tuberculosis and the Ross Institute in London is working for the eradication of leprosy.

Advanced English scientists hope to see research laboratories in every large city in the world, financed by the state or municipality. In them the search will be carried on for unseen enemies of the human family until the last germ has disappeared. If the medical world could spend \$10,000,000 annually instead of \$900,000 as now, Sir Ronald avers, our children's grandchildren would all be centenarians, and at that be only pipers to their posterity.

Joining the Interstate Medical Association along with several other leading Canadian physicians and surgeons, Dr. Kergin plans to go with them to Great Britain where the party of 350 doctors will visit the important hospitals at the big centres in England, Scotland and Ireland. A visit will also be made to Paris.

On his return to England the doctor will be joined by his two sons and they will spend a couple of weeks in England. The boys will remain and tour the country for a couple of months while the doctor returns to Prince Rupert.

### OPINION OF DR. PUTMAN

Educational Survey Head Says Finances are at Root of Troubles in This Province

OTTAWA, May 6.—Dr. J. H. Putman, who with Dr. Weir of Vancouver, investigated the school system for the B.C. government, declared last night that finances were at the root of British Columbia's problems as regards education. Taxation, he said, was rendered somewhat complicated owing to varied conditions. Dr. Putman said that the diversified training of teachers had a distinct advantage for B.C. and he praised the school attendance of the province.

### PITTSBURG HAS BAD EXPLOSION

At Least Eight Killed and Many Were Injured This Morning

PITTSBURG, May 6.—At least eight were killed and several were injured in an explosion which wrecked half a dozen buildings in Swissvale, a suburb this morning. The blast shook the entire district and it is feared that the search of the ruins will disclose other bodies. A daring rescue of four persons from a second story window was made by an automobile driven past the burning building.

### A Rub For The Men On Doing Their Bit.

A correspondent asks that the men be given a rub on doing their share in giving for the children's ward at the hospital. She thinks the women do their share and that men are the ones who like to make good fellows of themselves by giving money that belongs to women.

To the men we would like to say that they spend a lot of money carelessly and foolishly and neglect some of the important things. Just now an important thing is providing a place for children at the hospital. This is sadly needed. No matter what the opinion may be as to who should keep up the hospital or how it should be conducted, the need is there today and the only way to fill that need is to do it ourselves. If we do not provide the children's ward no one will do it for us.

All that is asked is a donation toward this worthy object. Those who have no children of their own should give double to show their appreciation of the work of the others in raising children to carry on the affairs of the nation.

### Beer Parlors And Rights Of Women.

If beer parlors are available for men they should also be for the use of women. That is logical and reasonable. Women have as much right to drink beer as men. If it is good for men it is good for women. There should be no distinction.

The brewers and others in the south, according to yesterday's despatches, fear that their business will suffer if women are allowed to continue to exercise the rights of citizens. To them, women are a danger, so they ask that women be kept out of the beer parlors and that the right to go there be reserved for the lords of creation.

While it must be admitted that not many men wish to take their wives and families to beer parlors, yet there is no reason why there should be discrimination against the weaker sex. These are the days of equal rights and to in this case shut off members of one sex from privileges which the other is given would be gross discrimination.

### Dolly Varden And Alice Arm Camp.

The success of the Alice Arm mining camp depends very largely on the operation of the Dolly Varden mine which has been closed for several years. If it were operated and the railway active, not only would the Dolly Varden be shipping ore but other properties near the railway could get their ore-out to tide-water. Just as the success of Stewart at first depended on the Premier Mine, so today the future of Alice Arm is very largely tied up with the Dolly Varden mine and railway. It is very greatly to be hoped that the mine will be sold and that there will be renewed activity at that camp.

### Girls In Training And Boxing Bouts.

At Smithers the other day appeared a number of boys and men in exhibition boxing bouts and on the same platform at the same entertainment was singing and dancing by ladies and a drill by a squad of the Canadian Girls in Training, a church organization.

There seems no good reason why boxing should always be associated with the rougher elements in the community. It is a manly sport and one that should be encouraged. It is altogether a different thing from prize fighting. The example of Smithers is one to be emulated. The only way to keep the game respectable is for the respectable people of the city to take an interest in it.

### Janet Smith Murder Centre Of Stage.

The Janet Smith murder still occupies the centre of the stage in British Columbia. No other news feature is read so eagerly as one having to do with the notorious case. The apparent attempt to hush the affair has had the effect of making people keen to know all about it. Under the circumstances it was to be expected that many people would be suspected who were not guilty. That is the fault of those who failed to take proper measures at the beginning to investigate the whole circumstances. The murder of a girl is something that cannot be passed up lightly and the attempt to smother investigation at the beginning leads to all sorts of suspicion.

## PLAIN TALK ON PEACE RAILWAY

Edmonton Paper Says Vancouver's Agitation is Wholly Selfish

### RATE TO RUPERT NEEDED

The Edmonton Bulletin, discussing the Peace River route urges subsidy instead of new line. It says:

If the aim is to get the Dominion Government to provide lower freight rates for the people in Peace River, the quickest and cheapest way to do that is to cut the rates on the E.D. and B.C. and pay a bonus to the operating company which would cover the loss.

If the object is to take Peace River trade away from Edmonton and give it to Vancouver, the surest way to do that is to build a railway through the mountains and leave the E.D. and B.C. to degenerate into "two streaks of rust."

The E.D. and B.C. can serve every requirement of the people in Peace River alike as an outlet for their products and a road in for their imports. It is not a new railway that is needed to meet the conditions there, but a schedule of rates over the existing railway that will make farming in the country profitable and therefore economically possible.

### Rate to Rupert

What is particularly needed is a low through rate from Peace River points to Vancouver and Prince Rupert on the grain, stock and other farm products of the district. Such rates would bring the earning power of the Peace River farmer to a parity with the earning power of his contemporary elsewhere. And correspondingly reduced rates on what he has to import would put his buying power also on a basis of equality with that of farmers in other parts of the province.

Peace River people need relief, not two or three years hence, but now. On the crops they will grow this summer they will make money or not make money according as that relief is granted. The prospect of short-cut through the mountains some time in the future will not raise the price of wheat in Peace River this fall by one cent per bushel, or per carload. And it is this season's crop, not some other season's crop that the Peace River farmers are concerned about just now.

The only way to give that immediate relief is to cut rates on the railway which is in being. To defer reduction until some other railway has been built would be to continue for the interval the conditions which have been driving people out of the country who did not want to get out.

### Cost of Short-Cut

A mountain short-cut would probably cost anything from twenty to fifty millions of dollars. The capital cost and operating expenses of the new line would be added as a first charge upon the production of the Peace River district. The capital charges and operating expenses of the E.D. and B.C. would remain as a first charge also upon the production of the district. The effect would be to double the railway debt of the Peace River country; not a very hopeful way of going about it to establish low freight rates out of or into the district.

The Dominion or the province would have to stand accountable for the capital cost of the new road. The province is already accountable for the capital cost of the E.D. and B.C. The losses on both would have to come out of the pockets of the public, as taxpayers of the province or as taxpayers of the Dominion. It would be cheaper to establish "cut off" through rates from Peace River to Vancouver over the E.D. and B.C. and pay the difference in the form of a bonus than to double or treble the liability without any essential betterment in the service.

### Would Annex Trade

Vancouver's consuming anxiety to get the Dominion government to build a new short line into Peace River does not spring from commissionership with the farmers of that district. The motive is an altogether laudable desire to annex the trade of the Peace River country to the wholesale interests of Vancouver and to cut that trade off completely from the business houses in Edmonton. The scheme





## FILL UP THE COUNTRY URGES ONE MEMBER OF PARLIAMENT, OTTAWA

Man Who is Not Success at Farming he Thinks Might Enter Parliament

OTTAWA, May 6.—In urging that the doors of Canada be thrown wide open to the immigrants from Europe and populate this country as rapidly as possible without restriction, As. W. Jacobs, Montreal, propounded some novel ideas in the House on Thursday and uttered some characteristic witticisms. A fair sample is contained in his concluding sentences. "My theory is to allow the people to go wherever they want to go. If they find they are not fitted for farming, they will go elsewhere. We have a continent to fill up. Surely it offers possibilities to every person who comes in. The man who is not a success as farmer may become a member of Parliament."

Angus McDonald (Temiskaming) suggested that the party with that doctrine should be called the Jacobs party, to which Mr. Jacobs retorted, "The original Jacobs had only twelve sons and he went to Egypt and was a success there."

## PROGRESSIVE PARTY EXPECTS TO RETURN

North Huron Member Says They Are Modest and Retiring But Will Come Back Strong

OTTAWA, May 6.—A prediction that the Progressive party in Ontario would come back strong after the next Federal election was made by John W. King, North Huron, in the House of Commons. "The Progressive Party," he said, "is a modest, retiring party, and we have been subjected to political thrusts, some of them not very clean, from all sides of the House—even from our own side; but I desire to affirm right here, that not only will the Progressive Party come back after the next election, but will come back more than a mere remnant—more than a sad remnant."





## GOOD WORD FOR C.N.R. BOATS

Conservative Member Speaks Appreciatively of Canadian Government Merchant Marine

L. J. Ladner, Conservative member for South Vancouver, in a speech in the House of Commons recently criticized the Government but he saw one bright spot. That was the Canadian Government Merchant Marine. Of it he says:

On this point I want to say a few words in connection with the Canadian Government Merchant Marine. An hon. member opposite levelled a good deal of criticism against our merchant marine. There is a deficit, but I am glad to say that the deficit does not arise in the west. I have taken the trouble to collect some data in this regard, and I find that the twenty-one boats operating out of Vancouver produce a profit. There were fifteen vessels of 8,000 tons; two of 4,400 tons, and four of 3,900 tons. For the past six years every ship, with one exception, has sailed from Vancouver to a foreign port fully loaded, that is loaded beneath decks and on deck. In the single exception the boat had a full load under deck, but did not have anything on deck. The lumber trade in British Columbia has greatly benefited by the presence of these boats; they have been a most important factor in opening up new markets for western Canada, markets

## HINDENBURG ON GERMAN GOAL

Imperial House the Rock on Which She Must Build

TORONTO, May 6.—In September, 1919, Field Marshal Paul Von Hindenburg, new president of the German Republic, wrote the story of his life. In the last chapter, "My Farewell," he says:

Comrades of the German Army, once the proud and mighty German Army! How can you talk of despondency? Think of the men who gave us a new Fatherland more than a hundred years ago. Their religion was their faith in themselves and the sacredness of their cause. They built up a new Fatherland, not on the foundation of doctrines strange to them, but on those of the free development of the individual within the framework of the whole body politic, and on our sense of responsibility to the state. Germany will tread that path once more as soon as she is permitted to do so.

#### Faith Unshakable

"Germany, the goal and starting point of so much that is inexhaustible in human civilization and culture, will count as nought only so long as she ceases to believe in her great historical mission. My faith is unshakable that the best among us, with their deep, strong thoughts, will succeed in fusing the ideas of today with the precious relics of ancient times and on them set the stamp of eternal qualities which will bring salvation to our Fatherland."

"Such is the firm conviction with which I have left the bloody battlefields of this war of nations. I have witnessed the Japan and China carrying large heroic struggle of my Fatherland quantities of lumber, wheat and other products. The management is very active. I know of one instance where they stepped in and took from our friends to the south in the states of Washington and Oregon an order for 35,000,000 feet of ties, an order which is renewed every year, and my confidence in our Fatherland was its death struggle.

"I have often been asked the question on what I based my hope of our ultimate victory in even in the darkest hours of the war. I could only point to my faith in the justice of our cause which is renewed every year, and my confidence in our Fatherland and the Army.

#### Hopes of Fathers

"For the time being a flood of wild political passion and sounding speeches has overwhelmed the ancient structure of our state and apparently destroyed all our sacred traditions. Yet this flood will subside again. Then from the tempestuous seas of our national life will once more emerge that rock—The German Imperial House—to which the hopes of our Fathers clung in days of yore and of which the future of our Fatherland was confidently set, nearly half a century ago, by our own efforts.

"When our national ideals and our national conscience have resumed their sway among us, we shall see how moral values have been struggling to birth in our present grievous trials and the Great War on which no nation is entitled to look back with more pride than the German people so long as it remained true to itself. Then, and then only, will the blood of all those who fell believing in the greatness of Germany have been poured out not in vain.

"In that hope I lay down my pen and firmly build on you—Young Germany.
