# RECOMMEND REVISION EDUCATION SYSTEM

## MARINE INSURANCE ON THIS COAST MAY BE CHANGED TO FAVOR RUPERT

### Report Suggests Change be Made Favor of Prince Rupert in Marine Insurance Rates on Pacific Coast

OTTAWA, July 7.—Details of the conclusions reached by the Imperial Shipping Committee in the second report on Canadian marine insurance says Prince Rupert has been treated less favorably than circumstances would appear to require in the matter of the North Pacific Warranty, which requires additional premiums upon ships using certain ports.

The suggestion that a joint hull committee of the British marine underwriters consider the application of the warranty requiring additional insurance premiums from ships using the port of Prince Rupert, is contained in the report.

The report states that there is a North Pacific warranty agreed to by marine underwriters to the effect that without the payment of an additional premium ships must not enter ports on the Pacific coast of North America north of latitude 50°. The result is that a ship can enter Vancouver without infringing the warranty but she will invalidate her policy if she goes to Prince Rupert which is 54 degrees north latitude, unless she paid an additional premium.

The report in this connection states "East of B. C. is free from ice and we understand fog is less frequent at Prince Rupert than it is at Vancouver. The sea, no doubt, is more stormy in the more northern latitudes but there can be no question that Prince Rupert is approached from the ocean by a much less intricate and dangerous channel than is Vancouver. We suggest therefore that the joint hull committee reconsider the warranty to Prince Rupert. We assume that insurance on passenger steamers navigating the coastal route from Vancouver to Prince Rupert are subject to a special bargain."

SALINAS, Cal., July 7.—Cav-  
alrymen from Monterey Presidio and citizens from the towns adjacent to Moss Landing, near here, joined hands today to run down the crew of belligerent hijackers who killed one member of a posse last night and injured two peace officers, and drove county and state police to cover fire from a machine gun, according to reports reaching here.

### 7 CHILDREN ARE DROWNED

Upset Into Water of Lake in Full  
View of Parents and Relatives.

ST. THOMAS, Ont., July 7.—Eight persons, seven children and one woman, were drowned on Monday at Pinaford Lake, a small body of water adjacent to the city, when two flat bottomed boats planked together capsized, throwing 27 persons into the water.

The children were all from St. Thomas or the vicinity on a Sunday school picnic of three Anglican churches. It occurred fifty yards from the shore in twelve feet of water, in full view of the parents, brothers and sisters of the victims.

The children ranged in age from five to twelve.

Doctors Putnam and Weir propose many changes in financing and creation of junior high school

VICTORIA, July 7.—Remodelling the provincial education system from top to bottom is recommended by Doctors J. H. Putnam and G. M. Weir in their report on the school conditions of the province.

Briefly the investigators propose that the entire system of financing education be reformed with far-reaching school taxation so as to distribute the burden of school costs more equitably than at present.

The public school course will be completely revised with the creation of a Junior High School to direct pupils into more useful studies later on.

### City Finds Itself Not Able to Supply Power Enough for Elevator

Delay in ordering equipment results in difficult situation; will probably buy from Drydock

The grain elevator now being constructed at this point will have motors installed totalling 1,500 h.p., and electric power amounting to 800 h.p. will be required to give satisfactory service. This was reported to the city council last night by a letter from the superintendent of utilities. It was also intimated that the need for the load would occur about Nov. 1, by which time Supt. Love intimated that the city would not be ready to deliver the power from their own plant as the necessary equipment ordered to take care of this would not arrive in the city before October 1, and it would take the city six weeks to have it installed.

Alderman Perry was anxious to see something done at once, as the case was urgent to the city as a whole and they could not afford to fall down on their part now.

The matter was finally left to the Superintendent to report on.

#### Fish Business Is Of Utmost Importance.

The halibut fishing business is of utmost importance to the people of Prince Rupert and to the railway company and for that reason it is a little difficult to understand the action of the company in refusing to carry local fish offering by the buyers at this port. There probably are mechanical difficulties but the fish must get to market quickly if the business is to be retained here. The case is accentuated when the sale takes place on Saturday, no train goes out on Sunday and Monday's train cannot take it all. By Tuesday a lot of valuable time has been lost.

It is to be hoped that negotiations now under way will result in some better arrangement than seems to be in force at present.

#### Sports As Means Of Getting Together.

The value of athletic sports and games to improve international relationships and to bring about closer association between cities and towns and village communities is seen everywhere. The other day in the name of sport a special boat was chartered which took Prince Rupert people to Ketchikan. Villages along the railway meet in competition at baseball or football. So in every part of this country and the world we find sports and games drawing people closer together. They meet to play and the result is beneficial to each.

#### Salmon Fisheries Holding Their Own.

It is very satisfactory to know that the salmon fisheries seem to be holding their own in spite of the rather intensive fishing which is going on. The regulations providing for a weekly close season seem to be effective in allowing a sufficient number of salmon to pass the nets to the spawning grounds. Added to that is the action of the fisheries department in keeping the streams free from obstructions.

Complaints are sometimes made that fishing is allowed too close to the mouths of small streams with fatal results, but these are small matters of administration and do not affect the main issue.

#### Providing Business For The Elevator.

There seems to be a little difference of opinion as to the best method of proceeding in getting business for the elevator. While a great many favor the formation of a local brokerage company, others seem to think it would be better to try to interest brokers to establish here. In any case the effort is good and it may be desirable to form a company that would go into the business to insure that right from the first the elevator will be utilized.

Every ship that comes here has to be lined with lumber and thus provides a market for the mill and also work for carpenters and others. It is of the utmost importance that the elevator operate just as soon as it is completed.

## JOHN HOUSTON - Trail Blazer

Rummaging through accumulated old papers with intent to burn most of them, I came across one letter in handwriting I did not at first remember. It was a forceful flowing hand, the letters boldly black, words intermittently linked together, lines well spaced and trending upward (according to chirographical experts invariably indicative of daring optimism) and every stroke dogmatically decisive. No man could write such a hand unless of determined type. He could never be a "yes, yer'er." I looked for the signature. "Why of course—that's just how he would write!" The signature was "John Houston."

There wasn't anything in that particular letter to warrant its preservation, but it started memory back-trailing to the days when Houston was an uncrowned king of the Kootenay, idol of Nelson City, mayor there so long as he wanted to be, publicist and champion of his habitat and its legislative representative—a pioneer of a species now all-but-extinct, a trail-blazer, a man of vision, a virile journalist, not always scrupulously correct in conduct or suavely spoken, but physically and mentally strong, in times and places where strength was the masterkey, I wonder if Nelson ever has raised any permanent monument to him as its first mayor, its first newspaper champion, its first provincial parliamentarian? Or has Prince Rupert or Prince George, in each of which places also he was in the vanguard of courageous pioneers?

#### A Man's Man Always

John Houston was fiercely opinionated, direct in speech and action, a friend to the last ditch and a resourceful and uncompromising enemy. No man did more, foundationally, toward making Nelson the city it is. No man gave himself more usefully or disinterestedly to public service in the early days of Prince Rupert. No one worked half as hard or in the face of such heavy handicaps to put Prince Rupert on the map.

Houston was at one and the same time a tower of strength and a thorn in the flesh of Provincial Conservatism, in the infancy of the McBride regime when the politicians and the public were still a trifle bewildered over the new party alignment in British Columbia affairs. His political leader also was a shade embarrassed by the impossibility of controlling this outspoken supporter, especially as to railway policies. The government desired to live in amity with the C.P.R. The mayor of and member for Nelson was out with knife and tomahawk in quest of the company's scalp. He sniffed brimstone at each and every C.P.R. move and mistook the transcontinental highway for the track of a Satanic tail.

There was a time when Shaughnessy himself, supported on the one hand by General Superintendent Marpole and on the other hand by Executive Agent George McL. Brown now (Sir George) invaded the editorial den at Nelson either to read the riot act or to extort terms of peace from their fiery foeman. Just what their program was remains veiled in mystery. They never had a chance to disclose it before Houston, single-handed, evicted them. A flying inkstand reputed to have registered darkly on Mr. Marpole's countenance. Mr. Brown for a week or more tentatively caressed a bump on his head that looked like an abnormal development of philoprogenitiveness but which really was the record of an introduction to an old-fashioned ebony ruler—a convenient and formidable desk weapon for one of sedentary habit.

#### No Modesty Complex

When John Houston came to Victoria to assume his parliamentary duties, it was with no vagrant modest thought of warming any back-bench seat. Nor did he see any reason he should serve a novitiate while familiarizing himself with the ropes of the imposing law foundry overlooking James Bay. On the contrary he was firmly convinced that he was cast by nature in the mould of an ideal Mines Minister. He confessed it to the Premier, too, and so elaborated his claims and qualifications that his name soon after was submitted for cabinet pre-ferment.

Came the unexpected! Sir Henri Joly de Lotbiniere then reigned at Government House. His Honor, too, was a strong man



### NEW LIFE SAVING APPARATUS TO BE CARRIED ON SHIPS

LONDON, July 7.—New Board of Trade regulations relating to life-saving apparatus to be carried by ships became effective July 1. A motor-boat or boats fitted with wireless apparatus and searchlights, must be carried in vessels with more than 15 life-boats. If the vessel does not carry a motor-boat, but has more than 10 life-boats, one of these must be fitted with wireless.

Life-boats in all foreign-going ships will be required to carry one pound of condensed milk for each person, in addition to the water and biscuits required by the present rules.

**HOW TO PLAY FOOTBALL**

**Final hints regarding defence work, tackling and shooting and goalkeeping points**

(By "Andy" Ducat, Manager of Fulham Club.)

(Reprinted from "Greenock Herald")

For the final article of this series, I cannot do better than give a series of golden hints which it will be worth the while of every young footballer to cut out and keep.

If you are a forward:

Pass in a forward direction when you wish to run the ball down quickly.

When you want to give a pass to a fellow forward who is being marked by an opposing player, make a feint with a view to drawing your opponent towards you, leaving your comrade clear.

Take risks in shooting; you cannot always expect certainties.

Goals—not pretty play—are what your team expects of you. Make for the goal; never run round and round with the ball.

The object of the centre forward is to make yourself as big a nuisance to the opposing defenders as possible.

Your centre forward must be right in the middle of the picture as you near the goal. A pass out wing near the goal is a pass wasted—and perhaps a goal thrown away.

Ignore the spectators. Never shout at the referee.

Learn to pass with the side of either foot.

Keep on playing—even if you suspect a breach of the "off-side" rule—until the whistle blows. If the whistle doesn't blow your stopping may have lost you available position.

Take free kicks quickly—otherwise opponents may pack their goal.

Find the weak spot in the defence and attack it. There is always a weak spot.

**Half Backs as "Terriers"**

For the halves, here are additional golden hints.

Make sure you are in everything that is going on. Your place is to be where the fight is thickest. Never slacken.

Pass while on the move. It wastes time to stand still and pass.

Clear to the wings as often as you can.

Worry the opposing forwards but don't neglect to feed your own forwards.

When both backs are engaged on one side of the field, it may pay the disengaged half to fall back and form a reserve line of defence.

If the half back line "cracks," the whole team falls to pieces. So keep fit.

When you see an opening, pass the ball through it. In first class football hundreds of goals are directly the result of openings seized upon by the halves.

**Tackling and Shooting**

In getting the ball away from an opposing forward, aim at first to block it completely. Don't try to hook the ball away with your toes. If you block the ball successfully, a slight nudge at the same time will usually force your man away from it.

A half is justified in taking a shot at goal when the forwards are not placed to do it for him.

Keep upright when heading the ball.

The centre half takes the middle of the picture for a "throw-in." But he should not get beyond his forwards.

Backs need these hints as well:

Kick with the top of your foot. A low, accurate shot is more reliable than a "ballooned" ball. To raise a dead ball on wet turf, however, a kick with the toe is good.

One back must always play up to his half back.

Dribbling is strictly forbidden for backs. It wastes time. Your work is to clear the ball speedily and safely.

Two backs covering each other with perfect understanding form a cast-iron defence.

Never pass the ball back to your own goalkeeper unless you know he is waiting for the pass.

**Goal-Keeping Points**

The goalkeeper needs a set of hints all to himself.

What the team needs in its goalkeeper is reliability. Never try to be brilliant.

Handle the ball whenever you can. A flying kick—unless it is absolutely forced on you—is dangerous.

Catching the ball and kicking it away is the sure method of clearing.

Hug the ball to your body. To catch it like a cricket ball is to ask for trouble.

The body forms your second defence whenever you have to stop a ball.

The time to use your fists is when the opposing forwards are so near you that if you hug the ball they will charge you.

When a ball is just too high for a header, tip it over the bar or round the posts.

Never come beyond the penalty area when running out. Deprived of the use of your hands, you are simply doing work that a back ought to do.

The only time to run out is when the forwards are far enough away from the ball to make you sure to get it.

Clear to the wings as often as you can.

Worry the opposing forwards but don't neglect to feed your own forwards.

Cost of Overhead Said Not to be Included in Price Submitted

### FOURTH AVE. GRADING

Tenders were opened last evening by the city council for the work of rough grading Fourth Ave., E., and the contract was awarded to the city engineers' department for the sum of \$5,343.85. Other tenders were from C. K. Yterberg for \$14,040.25, G. Carlstrom for \$13,003.34, and A. Antonelli for \$10,985.80.

Alderman Stephens asked who was responsible for the preparation of the city tender, and wanted to know whether the city would be able to do the work for the amount stated. Alderman Perry, in reply, took the responsibility for the preparation of the tender and felt sure that if the city were awarded the contract that it would be carried out for the amount stated.

Considerable discussion arose as to the possibility of the city carrying out the work for such a much smaller sum, and Alderman Larson said that while he did not know as to the basis of the city figures, nevertheless he did know that it was a physical impossibility for a firm of private contractors to do the work as cheaply as the city because the city had the equipment to do the work, and drilling could not be done nearly as cheaply by hand as by the air compressor which the city would use.

#### How About Overhead

**GREAT MONTH TO VIEW STARS**

Several Interesting Planets Easily Seen and Recognized; Triple Star

WASHINGTON, July 7.—Shortly after sunset during July the five brightest planets—Mercury, Venus, Mars, Jupiter, and Saturn—all will be above the horizon at the same time for the greater part of the month.

On the evening of July 10, says a bulletin from the American Nature Association, Mercury, Venus and Mars will appear so near together that they might almost be mistaken for a triple star, although in fact Mercury will be about 105,000,000 miles from the earth, Venus 146,000,000 miles and Mars 239,000,000 miles.

Mars is increasing its distance from the earth and drawing in toward the sun so it will be increasingly difficult to find it in the twilight. Mercury and Venus now are approaching the earth.

Mercury will reach its greatest eastern elongation on July 28 when it will be more than 27 degrees east of the sun. This, the American Nature Association points out, is within one degree of its greatest possible distance from the sun and great enough to enable it to be picked up easily in the twilight after sunset.

**Playing Tag**

Anyone watching these three planets this month with the aid of a small telescope or field glasses might imagine they were playing tag or running a race in the northwestern sky after sunset.

All three will move eastward during July from Cancer into Leo, but all will be moving at different speeds with respect to each other and the earth. Mars, the slow-moving one of the trio, will be at the beginning of the month farther east and higher in the western sky than the other Canada. He is in town on official business.

There arrived in the city last evening E. S. Bushy, of Ottawa, chief inspector of customs for two, but the other two planets will pass it on July 10. Saturn, which has been above the horizon in the evening hours for some time, has been moving slowly westward, but on July 12 it becomes stationary, as viewed from the earth, and then begins to swing slowly backward toward
