PROPOSE THAT GOVERNMENT TAKE C.P.R.

CHINESE HOUSEBOY BADLY ABUSED WHEN KEPT IN CAPTIVITY RECENTLY

Proposal That C.P.R. be Taken Over by Canadian National is Made in House of Commons

Progressive Leader is Not Favorable to any Amalgamation Claiming Railway would Then Own Country

OTTAWA, May 8.—The latest angle on the railway situation in Canada is a proposal to merge the Canadian Pacific Railway and the Canadian National under one system to be operated under government ownership. Most of the members seem to favor some change but as to just what change should be made there is at present no unanimity of opinion. The probability is that nothing will be done this year. Government ownership has not been such a decided success as to make the average person enthuse over getting a double dose of it. The difficulty is that no person or party has yet presented a well thought out policy which seems suited to cope with the present situation and secure the support of a majority of the members of the House. It will probably be on the railway policy that the next election will be fought and it is not probable the Government will launch its policy until after the session or until forced to appeal to the country.

There is considerable criticism of the figures given by Sir Henry Thornton in regard to the saving to be made under a union of the systems. It is claimed that the history of the past, especially in the United States, does not warrant the expectation that the saving would be very great.

Discussed Situation

The House discussed the railway problem yesterday from various angles. The civic vote for the department of railways was under review and the vote passed but the main appropriation for the C.N.R. remains for further discussion.

Hon. Arthur Meighen took the ground that conditional multiplication of capital charges on the Canadian National would lead to trouble. The rate of increase was appalling and must be checked. Some way had to be found to prevent the Canadian National and Canadian Pacific competing at the expense of the people's pocket.

Robert Forke, leader of the Progressives, was not favorable to amalgamation of the two roads. He said that if one corporation owned all the railways it would also own the country.

TO ENCOURAGE FOOD IMPORTS

That is Contained in Report of Royal Food Commission of Great Britain

LONDON, May 8.—The chief feature of interest in the majority report of the Royal Food Commission issued today is probably the suggestion for co-operation with the governments of the Dominions regarding inter-empire commerce in food supplies. It may be desirable, the report states, to discuss with the Dominions the possibility of encouraging food to reach the markets of Great Britain in the interests of both producer and consumer.

Queen Charlotte Sawmill Will Begin to Cut Lumber for Market End Next Week: Island Activities

The sawmill at Queen Charlotte City, recently acquired by Ewart & Sereth of Vancouver, will start cutting for the market on May 15 according to word brought to the city on the Prince Charles which arrived from the Islands last night. The Prince Charles brought north from Vancouver a number of men who will be employed in the plant.

Preparations are being made for the reopening towards the end of the month of the whaling stations at Rose and Nader Harbor. The Prince Charles brought north some of the members of the staff of the latter plant and also 22 Chinese employees. It is understood that the Prince John will make a special trip to Rose Harbor leaving Vancouver at the end of this week.

CUT THROAT OF HER HUSBAND

Woman Says She Did Not Intend to Kill but to Frighten and Bluff Him

NEW WESTMINSTER, May 8.—Mrs. Mamie Golich, wife of Paul Golich, a C.N.R. employee of Hope, B.C., charged with attempted murder of her husband by cutting his throat, was last evening found by the assize court, guilty of wounding with intent to do bodily harm. She will be sentenced later.

"It's no use beating about the bush. I cut his throat, but I never meant to kill him, only to frighten and bluff him," said Mrs. Golich, in giving evidence on her own behalf.

HEARS ABOUT N.Y.K. VESSEL

Japanese Consul at Vancouver Tells About Yokohama Maru Coming Here

CONSULATE POSSIBLE

Possibility of Japanese Calls Being Regular if Proved to be Successful

VANCOUVER, May 8.—A trial ship of the Nippon Yusen Kaisha, probably the Yokohama Maru, will return to Japan by way of Prince Rupert after calling at Vancouver and Seattle next September, according to the Japanese Consul here. If the call is satisfactory the consul has been assured that the port will be visited regularly thereafter. A Japanese consulate may be established there.

H. Mochida of Prince Rupert just recently returned from Yokohama where he interviewed the heads of the line, who gave him a satisfactory hearing, he informed the consul here.

TOURISTS OVER P.G.E. RAILWAY

Pullman Service to be Inaugurated: Coal Being Drilled at Hat Creek

VANCOUVER, May 8.—Hon. W. H. Sutherland, minister of railways, will leave here Friday on an inspection tour of the P.G.E. preparatory to launching a campaign for tourist traffic over the railway. A Pullman sleeping service is to be inaugurated on the line.

Drilling operations to determine the size of coal seams at Hat Creek are proceeding and are being watched by the department of railways. If the seams come up to expectations of the backers a spur line may be built in anticipation of this important source of freight.

PRINCE OF WALES IN OSTRICH LAND

QUEENSBORO, Cape Colony, May 8.—The Prince of Wales party arrived here today in the heart of what is known as "Unfeatherland" so called because of the abundance of ostriches.

TWO DROWNED BENEATH CAR

Mr. and Mrs. John Chapman of Vancouver Met With Accident Way to Bellingham

VANCOUVER, May 8.—Mr. and Mrs. John Chapman of Vancouver were drowned last night when the automobile in which they were journeying to Bellingham skidded on the highway near Cloverdale, and overturned in a ditch filled with water. When taken from the water underneath the wreckage, both were dead.

CONSUL GENERAL GREATLY PLEASSED

Ralph J. Totten of U.S. State Department Returns to Washington After Visit Here

Ralph J. Totten, consul general of the personnel staff, State Department, Washington, D.C., sailed on the Prince George this morning after having paid a visit of inspection to the local United States consulate. He will proceed from Seattle direct to Washington.

Though Mr. Totten is one of the most widely travelled officials in the consular service, this was his first visit on the Pacific coast north of San Francisco. He was greatly pleased and surprised with the port of Prince Rupert and was particularly interested in ascertaining facts regarding the past of the place and its future prospects. He made it known to local people that he intends, within the next two years, to return here on a hunting and fishing trip.

YOUNG STRIBLING AS HEAVYWEIGHT BOXER

BOSTON, May 8.—Young Stribling, the Atlanta schoolboy is now a recognized heavyweight fighter following a technical knock out verdict over Quinton Pomeroy, the Chilean heavyweight last night which ended in the fourth round.

Chinese Houseboy was Injured by Abductors who held him Recently Trying make him Confess Murder

VANCOUVER, May 8.—Medical examination, it is stated this morning, shows that Wong Foon Sing, the Chinese houseboy from the Baker home at Shaughnessy Heights, who is accused of murdering Janet Smith, the Scotch girl who lived in the same house, has some permanent injuries as a result of ill-treatment at the time he was held by abductors. Three doctors examined him yesterday and state that he suffered a slight fracture of the skull, his ribs were broken and he is totally deaf in one ear.

Efforts are still being made to locate the men who carried the Chinaman off and kept him in confinement.

MURDER CASE ADJOURNED

Disagreement Between Counsel Necessitates Delay Until Afternoon

VANCOUVER, May 8.—The preliminary hearing of the case against Wong Foon Sing, charged with the murder of Janet Smith, opened this morning in the Point Grey police court. When the charge was read the prisoner did not enter a plea and the case was adjourned until this afternoon owing to a disagreement between the defence and crown counsel over the employment of Chinese interpreters.

HAWTHORNTHWAITTE GOING TO CASSIAR

Former Socialist M.L.A. Heads Company Recently Formed in Victoria

J. H. Hawthornthwaite, former Socialist member of the B.C. legislature, is expected here shortly on his way to the Cassiar gold fields where he will spend the summer. Mr. Hawthornthwaite is president of the Stewart Consolidated Gold Mines Co., Ltd., a Victoria concern which plans to enter actively into the development of the northern mining grounds.

Among those present is Mr. Henry Swanson of Armstrong, the first white woman born in the interior of the province.

FIRE DESTROYS QUEBEC VILLAGE

Forty Houses Go up in Flames and Many Have Narrow Escapes: One Killed

QUEBEC, May 8.—Fire destroyed the village of St. Joseph Dalma last night and this morning destroying 40 to 50 houses. The property loss is said to reach a million and a quarter dollars. One man was killed by a dynamite explosion and there were many miraculous escapes from death.

The fire started in the Victoria theatre as the result of a gasoline explosion, flames spreading to adjoining residences with amazing rapidity fanned by a high wind.

No Need To Worry About This Paper.

In writing opinions day by day on three, four or five different subjects each issue of the paper, we are bound to differ a great deal from many of our readers. Now and then we make mistakes and sometimes we over-emphasize matters which seem to us important but which perhaps with a wider perspective might not be so.

The other day, when endeavoring to stir up some interest in the children's ward for the hospital we trod on the toes of some of the women, as we intended to do. In some quarters we are told we raised somewhat of a hornet's nest and the hornets did considerable buzzing. We are glad of it. If women spent less time at afternoon bridge and silly teas and did more useful work instead, the city would be much better. However, that is not our business. The ladies can carry on their affairs any way they wish. We would not dare to say what they should do. All we would like would be to see the children's ward properly established and we have sufficient faith in the men and women of this community to believe they will do it. A good beginning has been made.

Lord Leverhulme Was Great Man.

Lord Leverhulme was a generous and discerning patron of man. Of course he had defects in his character, as all great men have. The greatness never extends all the way round.

Lord Leverhulme was a generous and discerning patron of painting. A few years ago there was a good deal of amusement over his differences with two celebrated portrait painters to whom he had for his portrait. In the first instance the painting was returned to the painter with the head cut out. It was at once explained that the return of the mutilated painting was entirely unintentional, although Lord Leverhulme maintained his general objections to the painter's efforts. In the second instance Lord Leverhulme objected to paying the stipulated price for a full length portrait when only a three-quarter length work had resulted. Very naturally these incidents caused a certain amount of indignation among painters, and a not at all uncertain amount of amusement among the general public. To Port Sunlight Lord Leverhulme presented an art gallery and museum in memory of his wife. He made notable benefactions to his native town of Bolton, and to Masonic and other charities. Socially he was one of the happiest of men, and after seventy years of age was often ready to dance through a whole program.

Pertinent Things About The Tariff.

During his recent speech Mr. Archambault had some pertinent things to say about the tariff and the Robb budget. "The best reason for concluding that this budget is a sound and reasonable one is that it has failed to please the extreme wings of this House," said Mr. Archambault. "It does not please the high protectionist and it also does not please the free trader. The budget reminds me of the attitude of Sir Wilfrid Laurier on racial and religious questions. The Tories of Ontario used to say that Sir Wilfrid wanted French and Catholic domination, and at the time the Tories of Quebec were stating that Sir Wilfrid was betraying his race and religion. The principle that Sir Wilfrid Laurier did follow should apply to the fiscal policy and I can see in this budget the embodiment of that principle. Our geographical situation is such that it is impossible to please everybody, and unless we make a firm determination to adopt a policy of give and take, a policy of conciliation, it will mean the disruption of Confederation."

Daily Mail Service Is Needed Here.

A despatch to the coast announces that the postal authorities have at least consented to establish a daily instead of a tri-weekly baggage car mail service on the Canadian National Railway between Edmonton and Vancouver. That is satisfactory as it means that baggage car mail services are practicable. It is what we have been asking for alternate days here.

The weak spot in the mail service in the west is now that section of the line between Jasper and Prince Rupert. Another effort should be made to try to impress on the post office the desirability of establishing such a service and thus giving the people of this part of the country a similar service to that extended other parts of the west.

BANQUET GIVEN BY ROTARIANS

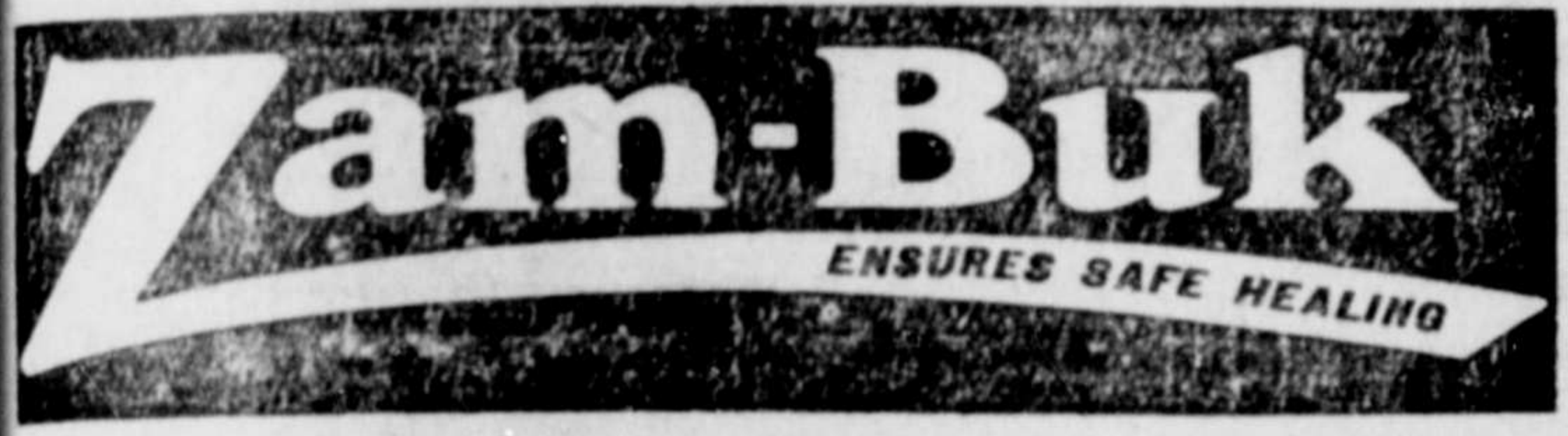

CAMPAIGN AGAINST LEWD LITERATURE

Some American Publications Sold in Canada Should be Banned it is Claimed

VANCOUVER, May 8.—"We are marshalling forces to bar filthy literature from Canada," said Rev. A. M. Sovereign, president of the General Ministerial Association, discussing the decision of that organization, to protest to civic, provincial and Dominion authorities against the entry into Canada of "filthy magazines masquerading as literature."

"It was a newspaperman who first drew my attention to the fact that the Vancouver market is flooded with lurid, lewd, illustrated magazines, coming, I regret to state, from the United States. I was amazed at their content. I have been overseas and I thought I had seen crude literature, but the examples I exhibited at the meeting of the Ministerial Association Monday were worse than anything I had ever seen.

"These magazines are attractively produced," said Mr. Sovereign, "and I would think that in connection with growing boys and girls whose minds are so susceptible, their influence would be lowering in the extreme."

"Local Women's organizations are being appealed to for co-operation in a drive to ban such literature from Canada, and it is understood that the parent-teachers' association has a formal protest to Dominion and provincial authorities well under way.

LABOR MAN SEES AN IMPROVEMENT AHEAD

R. H. Neelands Says Outlook is Exceptionally Bright and Work More Plentiful

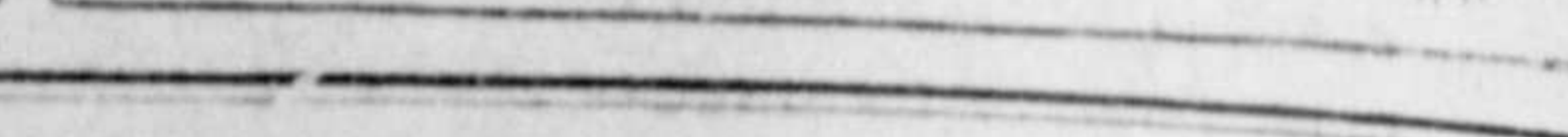

ARMY TELLS OF WORK

The Editor, Daily News. In recent issues of your paper, there have been news items which indicate that business of all kinds in western Canada is in a better condition, and that there are prospects of a reasonable measure of prosperity, for all. I am satisfied that the coming year will show a continuance of this betterment, and that the wealth of the country will steadily increase. At the present time in the Salvation Army our officers and soldiers are in the midst of the annual period of Self Denial, and I write to you to suggest that out of the resources which are being provided there may be set apart a portion for the humanitarian work which the Salvation Army is carrying on amongst the poor, the distressed and the unfortunate.

Rapid Growth

This year the organization celebrates its Diamond Jubilee. Founded as the Christian Mission in East London in 1865, the work spread in the following decade to many English cities. In 1878 it took its present name and adopted a military plan of organization—with uniform and other distinctive features. From the early eighties it spread to many parts of the world, so that at the death of the Founder and the appointment of General Bramwell Booth in 1912, it was operating in fifty-nine different countries. It is now at work in

eighty countries and colonies, and proclaims its message in fifty-three languages.

While first and last the Army seeks to spread the religion of Jesus Christ, it has developed a considerable variety of agencies in its purpose to serve and bless the people.

Welfare Work

Men of all nations are pleased to applaud its Welfare work—its care for the neglected and friendless—and similar services. They recognize in it a valuable agency of Social Regeneration. Through its instrumentality, bad men are made good, and turned into a force for righteousness; drunken mothers are made sober and home-loving; wayward sons and daughters are transformed and restored to friends; prisoners the despair of loved ones and the authorities, are made anew. The Army's work in the social realm, is unquestionably a gain. It's Homes are havens for the distressed and friendless. It has hospitals for the sick, homes for the wayward and unfortunate girls, and a range of other helpful agencies, including the inquiries department. This department has branches in every town all over the world for the tracing of lost friends and relatives.

Army officers visit weekly all the prisons and assist the men and women to get on their feet again, after discharge. Magistrates frequently hand prisoners over to the Army's care; the great majority of these do not enter prison, but are helped back to better living and worthy citizenship.

Saved from Shame

In western Canada the Salvation Army maintains four Rescue Homes, these being also Maternity Homes. Through these agencies an annual average of 300 girls are saved from a life of shame. Besides these institutions the Army has also homes for children and for girls, as well as metropolises for men.

The fact of western Canada being a new country has made it impossible for us to meet the actual requirements. Social Institutions are badly needed in many cities—Women's Rescue Homes, Children's Homes, Men's Metropolises—but we have not the money to erect the buildings. In centres where we have been able to open this work, we find our accommodation inadequate to meet the needs. All our homes are overcrowded and it is with sadness that our devoted and hardworking officers have to turn many a way through lack of room.

Training School

It will be recognized that for all this work, officers are required, and it is therefore essential that adequate training facilities be provided whereby men and women consecrating their lives to this service may be trained and equipped. This training makes a great demand upon the limited resources of the Army. At present there is only one small building for this purpose, and for such a training, the best and most adequate facilities possible should be provided. It was one of the dreams of the founder, William Booth, to found a University of Humanity. There are, he said, great universities for knowledge and its pursuit, then why not for the service of Humanity? But our hands are tied in this as in other sections, through lack of money.

In view of the fact that the Army is this year completing its sixtieth year of service, and celebrating its Diamond Jubilee, in view of the fact that the Army is operating a total of twenty institutions in western Canada, in view of the fact that there was a deficit of over twenty-thousand dollars last year, in view of the fact that the officers serve for the bare cost of living, and that all these institutions are

operating at a minimum of cost, may I not be permitted to ask through your paper for a cordial response to the financial appeal which the Army makes on this occasion of Self Denial.

SLIGHT DECLINE IN TRADES UNIONISM

Annual Report of Department of Labor Shows Present Status of Organizations

OTTAWA, May 8.—That there are 2429 trade union branches in Canada with a total membership of 260,643 is reported by the deputy minister of labor. This is a decline of membership of 47,449 and in branches of 58, over the report of a year ago.

According to the same authority there are 89 international organizations operating in Canada, five less than a year ago. The total international membership is 201,981 or 78 per cent

WHOLESALE CLEANUP OF CHINESE BANDITS

Missionary Tells Gruesome Tale of Slaughter Outside Chungchow

TORONTO, May 8.—Spring cleaning of a somewhat gruesome sort is making good progress in China's Far West. Letters from that region to the Methodist Mission offices in Toronto disclose significant details of a "clean-up" of bandits on a wholesale scale. Where the missionaries lived last summer in dread of raids there have been executions of bandit leaders of renown. The wretched followers of these braaves have perished miserably on a field of slaughter just outside the city of Chungchow. Writing from that river port, Dr. T. A. Pincock, a Canadian Methodist medical missionary, says that during recent weeks the round-up has been thorough in his district.

"In Chungchow and district some two thousand have been executed," writes Dr. Pincock, "and daily the people flock to the execution grounds. I know of five robber chiefs who have been killed, one very notorious and another who held sway in the hills and whose men looted and did considerable damages during the past winter months to our property."

With such perils summarily removed the missionaries hope to proceed with additions to hospital, schools and church. Although buildings have been overcrowded and patients have had to be turned away for lack of space in the wards, the presence of organized banditry on a large scale was a factor working against undertaking to gather materials for a constructional program.

At the court which William continues to hold, the same stiff ceremonial as obtained in Berlin days is observed.

One of the former emperor's chief ambitions is to become popular with the people, and especially the young folk of Doorn. He therefore often goes out personally to shop and addresses the townfolk in their native Dutch dialect. He even deigns now to tip his hat pleasantly in greeting, whereas formerly he had everybody bowing to him.

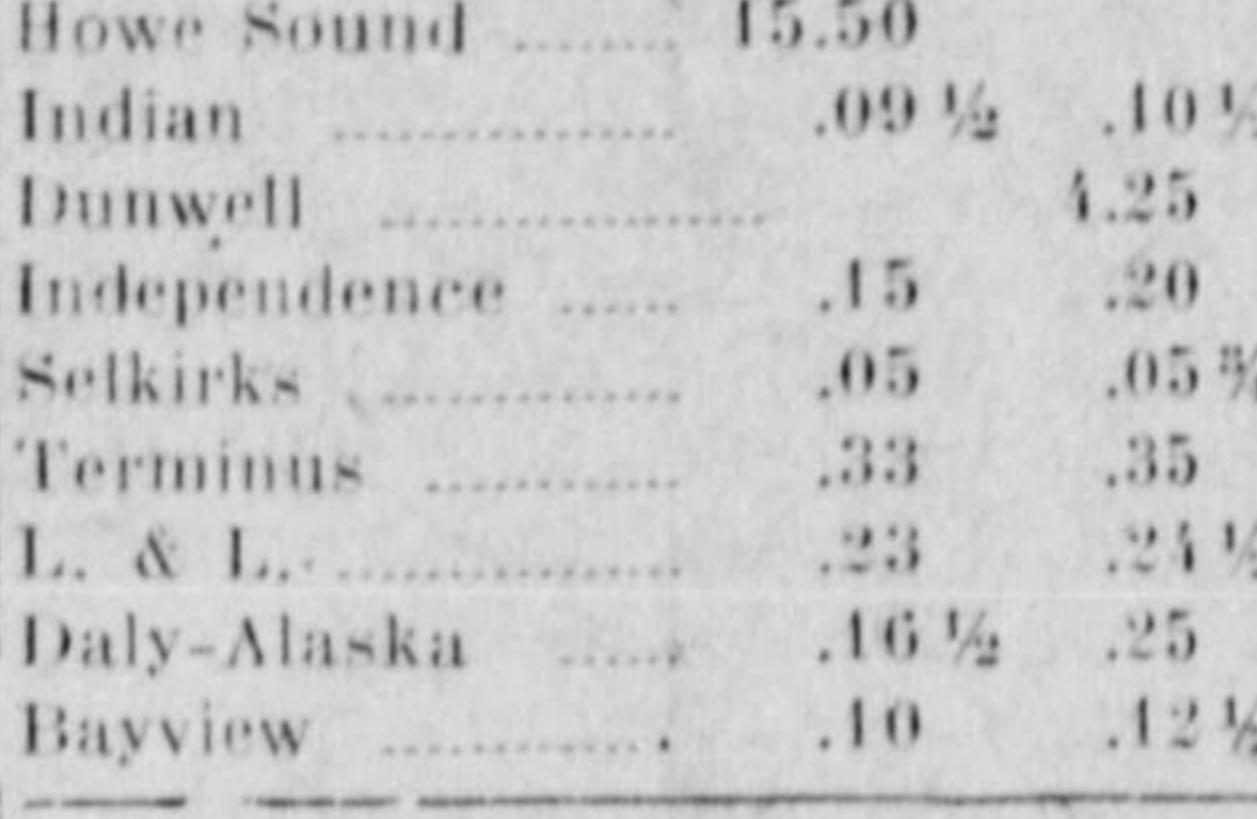
