Mail Delivery To Homes

VANCOUVER (P)-A new basic rate of \$1.50 an hour has been established for 5,000 workers in British Columbia's pulp and paper industry. This is an increase of five cents an hour.

Operators Friday signed a one-year contract with the Pulp, Sulphite and Paper Mill Workers Union and the International Brotherhood of Paper Makers Union.

Companies affected by agreement are Alaska Pine and Cellulose, MacMillan-Bloedel, Pacific Mills, Powell River Company, Howe Sound Pulp Company, and Columbia Cellulose

Cruise Ship Crash Affects Army, RCAF

EDMONTON (P)—The Canadian Army had a major supply problem on its hands this week after the Canadian Pacific Steamship Princess Kathleen sank off the coast o fAlaska Sunday.

Aboard the ship were 35 tons of foodstuffs destined for Whitehorse, Y.T., to supply Army and Air Force installations in that area. Of this, 20 tons was urgently needed for issue by Sept. 18.

New supplies had to be gathered and inspected at Edmonton and a civilian truck transport hastily arranged.

Approximately 30 hours after Western Command headquarters in Edmonton had received word of the original supplies being 20 tons of foodstuffs needed immediately had left Edmonton for Whitehorse.

Two trucks, each carrying 10 tons of supplies pulled out from Edmonton Thursday for the Superforts Highway. They expected to reach Whitehorse Monday.

No doubt our ancestors in the days before Alexander Graham Bell were content to communicate with each other in more leisurely fashion. Once the telephone was invented, however, there was hardly any point in ignoring its progress as Prince Rupert has done for years.

Antiquity may have its charms but over a long stretch it becomes hard on the nerves.

Having made this leap into modern communications, we wonder if we cannot make another by asking for an improvement in our radio reception.

The scientific world has seen many changes since the Department of Transport has shown sufficient interest to send its technicians to Prince Rupert to correct the difficulties which make it unpleasant, if not impossible, to receive the broadcasts of outside stations.

The only evidence of interest we receive in the operation of our radios is the scrupulous collection of licence fees. While we pay these fees conscientiously, the thought crosses our mind that, if the fees were as small as the latitude of our reception, somebody should be paying us instead of vice-versa.

Check All Suits—Then Plan Strategy

When you are playing a hand as declarer, I have recommended that you check on each of the four suits in turn before deciding how to proceed. This principle applies with equal importance to the defenders' play. South dealer Both sides vulnerable

On defense, don't let yourself become fascinated with the play of one particular suit, giving all of your thought to that suit. It may well be that this suit only appears to be the vital one and that the key play on the hand actually lies elsewhere.

Take today's deal, for example. Mr. Abel opened the six of clubs and Mrs. Keen played her lone ten. For whatever value it might be in giving the enemy a garbled picture of his true distribution, Mr. Dale falsecarded by winning with the queen.

Mr. Abel asked for a second look at the trick and therefore gave his complete attention to the club suit. Obviously Mr. Dale had the king left. But how many others? If he had started with king-queen alone, the defenders could run the rest of the suit as soon as they got in. If he had started with K Q 5

Originally the term chamber music meant the music belonging to the household of a nobleman and was used in contrast with the music of the theatre or the church.

The modern meaning is that it music suitable for performance in a moderate sized room with not more than one player two or more persons, in the former case the parts being of equa vague.

In earliest chamber music, especially in England, the voice was frequently used, much of this music being "apt for voices or viols," seemingly indicating that the same music was interchangeably or even together.

However, in what might called the "Golden Age" period beginning with Hadyn and ending with Brahms, the use of the voice was virtually discontinued. Some modern composers searching for new effects, have restored the voice to a place in of others and must mold his own chamber music.
