ORGANIZER OF KU KLUX KLAN IS BANNED UNLESS FREIGHT GOES TO VANCOUVER NOT OPEN PEACE RIVER SAYS EXPERT

Organizer for Ku Klux Klan Refused Entry to Canada; Lodge Appeal

Organization is started in Victoria under the direction of Captain Laycock, D.S.O.; Headquarters raid planned

VANCOUVER, Nov. 11.—The Ku Klux Klan got its first check yesterday when Major Luther R. Powell of Portland, organizer of the Canadian Knights of the Ku Klux Klan was refused entry into Canada by the Canadian immigration officials at White Rock. He was classed as an undesirable, according to the Sun, which paper says it obtained its information from boundary officials. Powell has appealed to Ottawa and his case being taken as a test.

The Sun goes on to state that it was known action was pending for the ejection of the Klan from the Shaughnessy Heights residence from where it was planned to direct a Dominion-wide organization.

VICTORIA, Nov. 11.—The Times yesterday said: "Organization of the Canadian Ku Klux Klan started in Victoria today. Captain W. B. Laycock, D.S.O., one of the leaders of the movement on the mainland, arrived from Vancouver Thanksgiving Day and at once started organization work."

POWER FOUND NOT GUILTY OF CRIME CHARGED

Age Tells Jury They Failed in Their Duty in Failing to Convict

VANCOUVER, Nov. 11.—Although Mr. Justice McDonald pointed out to the jury that the prisoner had admitted his guilt, J. G. Cowper was found not guilty yesterday afternoon of being indicted in the illegal detention of Wong Foon Sing.

Turning to the jury after they brought in their verdict, the presiding judge said: "I must urge this jury that you have lied in your oath. There was one verdict to return. You deliberately refused to accept my charge to you."

Before the court discharged the jury, the crown prosecutor urged the court to refuse to accept the verdict. The court, however, after criticizing the jury charged them.

The trial of the three remaining accused is proceeding today.

ORE TRIALS FOR ABDUCTION

B. Jackson and Others Appear in Court This Morning and Remanded

VANCOUVER, Nov. 11.—M. B. Jackson, Reeve J. A. Paton, Commissioner H. P. McCrane, Mrs. R. Stratton and David Patterson were summoned on information sworn to by Oscar Robinson, urging conspiracy to abduct Wong Foon Sing. They were remanded until Friday when they appeared in the police court this morning.

The trial of H. G. McDonald, def John Murdock and Sergeant Ray Kirkham charged with abduction opened this morning before Mr. Justice Aulay Morrison. Three pleaded "not guilty."

LARGEST CROP OF WHEAT IN HISTORY FORECASTED TODAY

OTTAWA, Nov. 11.—Forecasting the second largest Canadian wheat crop on record, the Dominion bureau of statistics estimate that this year's yield will be 422,327,000 bushels, an increase of 30,306,000 over the early estimates. Of the excess difference 27,806,000 is for Saskatchewan alone, where threshing results exceeded expectations.

BOMB FACTORY IS DISCOVERED

Eleven Natives Arrested in Calcutta on Occasion of Earl Reading's Visit

CALCUTTA, Nov. 11.—While Earl Reading, viceroy of India, was visiting the city today for the armistice celebration, the police discovered a bomb factory. A number of bombs were confiscated and eleven natives were arrested.

Better Not Build Railway to Peace River Than Have Freight go to Prince Rupert

(Special to Daily News)

VICTORIA, Nov. 11.—Influential members of the Legislature who are opposing the proposed extension of the P.G.E. north of Prince George have faith in the reports of the experts who investigated the whole situation in 1922, it was stated in the Legislature lobby today.

J. G. Sullivan, chief of these investigators, asserted that under no consideration should the line be built north of Prince George. His first reason was insufficient prospective revenue to justify the expenditure and secondly because the Peace River freight in his opinion would move to tidewater from Prince Rupert over the Canadian National to Prince Rupert, the nearest seaport, and not down the P.G.E. to Squamish.

Hon. A. M. Manson to Defend Himself in the Legislature on Friday in Wong Abduction Case

(Special to Daily News)

VICTORIA, Nov. 11.—Hon. A. M. Manson, attorney general, is said to be burning the midnight oil studying details and preparing a speech for Friday that is expected to be the biggest of his career.

It is stated in government circles that Mr. Manson will furnish abundance of facts and figures to refute the onslaught from all sides made on the administration of his department in the Janet Smith murder mystery and the Wong Foon Sing abduction.

"His career is at stake," said an opposition member. His opponents also admit that Manson is under a disadvantage in being forced to delay his speech while the Wong cases are sub judice.

Joshua Hinchcliffe, member for Victoria, in the House yesterday declared that the Attorney General remained silent when he held clues to the secret of where Wong was when abducted.

Mr. Manson intervened to say that private detective suspicion fell on Robinson from the outset and that his officers were on the trail in a few hours. "It is true they did not succeed for a time," he said, "but eventually they did succeed in liberating the Chinese and getting the conviction of Robinson."

Caadian Press

Shelter for Fishermen Will Be Discussed at Meeting of Joint Committee Very Soon

Fred Stork Initiates Movement to Have Federal Government Undertake Work on Waterfront View to Relieving Situation

Fred Stork, M.P., having communicated with the city council last night suggesting that that body consult with the Halibut Fishermen's Union and the Halibut Boat Owners' Association with a view to arriving at some decision as to the requirements for a shelter and mooring location for fishing boats in Prince Rupert harbor in which case he would be pleased to urge upon the government that immediate steps be taken to provide such a facility, the matter of obtaining an adequate fishermen's wharf for this port again becomes a live issue with perhaps more promise of actual accomplishment than it ever had before.

Mayor's Position

After Mr. Stork's letter had been read at the meeting last night, Mayor Newton at some length related how the Board of Works this year had endeavored to reach some solution of the question of furnishing a fishermen's wharf but without success. The proposal of the provincial government that the filling in of Cow Bay be permitted by the city which in turn would receive 200 feet of waterfront just east of the mouth of Cow Bay, it was true had been ratified by the electors but the Board of Works had subsequently decided that, as the cost of providing a wharf and shelter on the waterfront would be prohibitive as far as the city was concerned, it would be better to retain what shelter there was at the mouth of Cow Bay instead of losing that and not being able to provide anything else. Therefore, as far as the council was concerned, the filling in of Cow Bay had not been approved and the transfer of waterfront had never been effected. As for the suggestion that a shelter be provided at Seal Cove, the fishermen themselves had said they would rather stay with the limited facilities they already had at the mouth of Cow Bay. Thus the matter stood with no practical solution of the question having been obtained.

Different Situation

Ald. Casey said that up to this time, in dealing with the matter of a fishermen's wharf, the city had always been confronted with the necessity of making a large expenditure itself. This was the first time as far as he knew that any government official had called upon the city for co-operation with a view to having the facility provided. He felt that the council should have no hesitation in encouraging Mr. Stork or the federal government in an attempt to improve harborage mooring facilities for the fishing fleet. He was sure that many suggestions could be made along the line referred to in Mr. Stork's letter.

Mayor Newton again referred to the efforts that had been made by the Board of Works to reach a solution and said that he could not see how anything could be done to improve the situation for the fishermen. If any member of the council had any suggestion to make, he would be glad to hear of it.

Ald. Larsen felt that the city should not pass lightly over Mr. Stork's suggestion. He was of the opinion that the boat owners and fishermen would be better able to offer suggestions than the city council.

Ald. Perry thought that it would be well for the council to call the meeting suggested by Mr. Stork.

RUSHING GRAIN TO VANCOUVER

Several Hundred Cars Unloaded There Yesterday and Quantities More Going

NATIONAL'S BIG BUSINESS

There is Now 4,276,265 Bushels of Grain in Store at Pacific Coast Port

WINNIPEG, Nov. 11.—Statistics issued at the railway offices here today show that there is a particularly heavy movement of grain toward the port of Vancouver. With 238 cars loaded to that point during yesterday, 270 cars arrived there and 257 were unloaded by the Canadian National. This is the largest number of cars unloaded in any one day at that point and with 125 cars from other lines makes a big total at the port for the day. The day's arrivals brings the total western movement over Canadian National lines this fall to 5,187 cars, being 450 cars more than the entire Vancouver shipment of the previous crop season.

We Are Just What We Think.

If we think success, we shall succeed. If we think failure, then failure looms ahead of us like a dark abyss that is bound to overwhelm us. If we think joy we become joyful and life is pleasant for ourselves and our friends. If we think sadness and dwell on that which is sad, then sadness will be our lot, few our friends, and woe to those who cleave to us, for their path shall be saddened with the gloom of our companionship.

If we think evil, then evil will be ours as sure as night follows day. There is no escape. The mind is in control. It may not be the impelling force but it is the guiding force. It is the instrument through which our destinies are shaped.

What Will Happen In Parliament.

Many people are still speculating as to what is likely to happen in Parliament when it convenes. Nobody knows. Yet we can all guess. Our guess is that Mackenzie King's Government will be sustained and that it will carry on for a year or two. We may be wrong, of course, because this is only a guess.

If all the independent groups line up with the Government, they will have a majority of eleven over the Conservatives. Give the Conservatives two of the independents, eliminate Bagot, take out the speaker who has to be elected and still the Government has a majority of five over all. With that majority they can carry on. It looks reasonable that the men who were elected to carry out a similar policy should work together in order to prevent another group with another policy controlling the Government.

In discussing this there is no intention to re-introduce political controversy. The election is over and we hope there will not be another for some time to come. The convening of Parliament and the fate of the Government is something that we can now look at from an ex parte point of view. We are all spectators. We have cast our votes and can sit back and look at the result and talk over the possibilities.

Drunk Loving Cup With German Ambassador.

Austin Chamberlain, one of the most prominent members of the British Government during a banquet at the Guildhall, London, drank from the same loving cup with the German ambassador and referring to this Mr. Chamberlain expressed the wish that the people of Germany and Britain would also forget the war.

The Guildhall banquet is an annual event of greatest importance in British public life. The custom has grown up for prominent statesmen to make important public announcements on that occasion. Policies are outlined or pronouncements made. The policy of the British Government, it would seem, is to be one of conciliation and friendship toward Germany.

Disturbing Force In The Dominion.

The Ku Klux Klan, if allowed to proceed with organization, promises to become a disturbing force in Canadian life, whereas what is needed just now is a welding force that will bring together the different factions, nationalities and groups and make them one. We shall be sorry to see the Canadian people broken up into factions and the Klan has been a strong factor in bringing about such a condition wherever it has operated.



TAX REVISION CONTROVERSY

Coolidge Administration Trying to Lift Burdens from Wealthy and Place on Poor

SENATE FIGHT COMING

Democrats and Progressive Republicans Likely Thwart Republican Move in House

WASHINGTON, Nov. 11.—The tax revision controversy, which has begun before the House Committee on Ways and Means, and which will continue for most of the winter, is already beginning to take on important political aspects. Before it is finished, it promises to arouse a great political controversy which may have a bearing on the campaign in 1926, for the control of Congress. It may reach into the next presidential campaign in 1928.

Secretary of the Treasury Mellon has put forth a plan for the revision of the existing tax law which provides chiefly for the reduction of the surtaxes on large incomes and the repeal of the estate tax and inheritance tax. It has other features and comprehends considerable reductions in the income taxes imposed on the small taxpayers. What are known as the normal income tax rate would be reduced as well as the surtaxes. The plan of Secretary Mellon would lop off about \$300,000,000 from the present tax burden of the country.

Relieving Capital

But while Mr. Mellon would cut taxes all along the line, the avowed purpose of his plan is primarily to relieve capital and wealth of much of its present tax burden. His argument is that the public would thus be benefitted by relieving capital of burdens which now tend to hamper it and prevent it from engaging freely in industry.

President Coolidge is backing the Mellon proposals and the "Old Guard" republicans in Congress are likewise backing them.

On the other hand, the democrats and progressive republicans are already tending to combine to fight the Mellon program. They are calling for reductions which would total more than \$300,000,000 and which would, first of all, relieve the small taxpayers.

They are willing to make some reductions in the surtaxes but not as much as under the Mellon program. As for the estate taxes, the democrats and progressives, with some exceptions, strongly oppose repeal. They maintain the Mellon program is part of a program whose purpose is to bring about, inside of a few years, vast transfer of taxes from wealth to the banks of the people of small and moderate means.

Agricultural Elements

To a considerable extent, the agricultural elements of the country are lining up against the Mellon program. Already, the American Farm Bureau Federation is out openly against repeal of the estate tax on the ground that to repeal it would mean the farmers would have to pay more taxes.

The House will probably pass the tax bill about as Mellon and the administration want it passed. But not so the Senate. It is probable that combination of democrats and progressive republicans in the Senate will defeat the Mellon program and to a large extent shape the tax measures to suit themselves.

They will not only assail the Mellon plan as the plan of "big business" but they will strike at the Coolidge administration on the ground that its voice is the voice, not of the masses of the people, but of the classes.

CRITICISM OF LEGISLATURE

W. W. deGraves in Vancouver Star Has Some Interesting Impressions of Debate in House

TWIGG'S BIG GUN

Chief Use of Dick Burde to Keep Legislature From Being Dull

A Useful Barometer

Major "Dick" Burde, M.C., Port Alberni, is the barometer by which members tell whether they are getting across or not, says W. W. deGraves in an interesting article in the Vancouver Star.

Wise members who are making a speech keep their eyes on Richard. If they notice he is getting restless they speed up or else wind up and sit down, for a restless "Dick" Burde is a sure sign of a coming storm.

To see "Dick" turning in his chair, looking at the clock, and otherwise showing signs of restlessness, gives most speakers a queer feeling as they never know what the next minute will bring forth.

Usually it is very much to the point, and a member who has been wasting the time of the House in airy persiflage, has the error of his ways pointed out to him in a typical "Dick" Burde manner, which usually brings down the House.

Richard in the guise of watchdog, certainly has his uses.

A Hornets' Nest

And Major Burde can give a shrewd knock on occasion.

Witness this in the House on Thursday, when H. Despard Twigg, the Victoria opposition member was doubting whether an election pamphlet he was quoting from was the work of Dugald McPherson, the new member for Grand Forks.

"I not only wrote every word of it myself, but I am proud of it," replied the Grand Forks member, who although a tyro in the House, can look after himself.

"You'll stir up a hornet's nest yet, my friend," was the warning Major Burde gave Mr. Twigg.

"I may tell the honorable gentleman that I have stirred up many a hornet's nest in my day," boasted Mr. Twigg, but the drawled "Yes, and you've often been stung, too," from the Alberni member stopped the argument.

Only Good in Parts

Mr. Twigg's much heralded attack against the government was like a curate's egg, only good in spots. And not many spots at that.

But it served to enliven the House on more than one occasion. In fact, Mr. Twigg's speech was the only one in which interruptions did occur, the house paying H. G. Perry, the Fort George member, the compliment of letting him severely alone on Thursday, realizing that they were listening to the only constructive speech; in fact, some hearers said "the only speech" delivered this session so far.

All Disappointed

For instance there was the time when Mr. Twigg remarked that he was disappointed in "The Honorable the Premier's speech."

"We all were," commented Major Burde.

"Evidently the consensus of opinion is with me," rejoined Mr.

CITY COUNCIL NOT PLEASED

Protest at Refusal of Railway Company to Build Road Between Government and C.N.R. Wharves

A letter from W. H. Toby, C.N.R. superintendent, stating that the city's request for a road between the Government wharf and the C.N.R. dock had been given full consideration by the railway company and it had been found that the traffic over such a road would not warrant the expenditure of \$4,500 in building it and therefore the request could not be entertained, failed to find the approval of the city council at last night's meeting and it was decided to make a reply to the railway company setting out emphatically but politely what the city council thought of such an attitude on the part of the railway management.

Ald. Casey declared that it cost the citizens of Prince Rupert a good deal more than \$4,500 in a year to make the detour that was necessary to go from one wharf to the other. He thought the letter was a "pretty shabby turnabout" and he moved that the city council reply to the railway company stating that it did not view the spirit of the railway company as a fair one and that it still pressed for the building of such a roadway. HOME AFTER AN EXTENDED TOUR

Mr. and Mrs. Thomas McClymont Were in Portage la Prairie Election Time

Police Magistrate and Mrs. T. McClymont returned home on the Prince Rupert this morning after seven weeks' holiday trip. They visited in New York with their nephews; at Perth, Ontario, Mrs. McClymont's former home town; Winnipeg, Portage la Prairie and spent the past week in Vancouver.

Mr. McClymont reports farming conditions in Ontario in good shape and over that part of the prairies through which he passed by train threshing seemed to have been completed although in Southern Alberta the situation was reported to be not so good.

At the time of the election, Mr. McClymont was in Portage la Prairie. There being no Liberal in the field for that seat, the Liberals of the city were supporting Rt. Hon. Arthur Meighen the Conservative leader. There is a Boosters' Club in that city and they were strong for Mr. Meighen as they considered it would be best for the city to have the party leader as their member.

The result was that the city of Portage rolled up a majority of over 1,000 for Mr. Meighen, this easily offsetting the majority given by the rural part of the riding to Harry Leader, the Progressive candidate who beat Mr. Meighen in the 1921 election.

suggestion along this line emanated from the Federal Government. He thought the opportunity was too good to pass over and urged strongly that the city council at once arrange for a meeting with the boat owners and the fishermen.

Responsibility for such a wharf he felt should not be shifted to the city council and Mr. Stork he felt was the proper person to call such a meeting rather than the city council. He was pleased to see that Mr. Stork had seen fit to take up the matter so soon after the election.

Mayor Newton was of the opinion that it would be better for local interests to call the meeting suggested rather than Mr. Stork. His hand would be much more greatly strengthened if the proposal for the fisherman's wharf came from a joint committee of the council, Board of Trade, boat owners and fishermen than if it was known at Ottawa that Mr. Stork had been obliged to call the meeting himself to formulate a proposal.

Ald. McDermie felt that, now some assurance was forthcoming from the Federal Government, it might be possible to utilize the 200 feet of waterfront for the purpose desired where before it would have been impossible for the city itself to embark upon the project.

Ald. McDermie moved that the letter be acknowledged and that the mayor call the joint committee together at an early date to reach a decision as to what was required. This was seconded by Ald. Perry and carried.
